

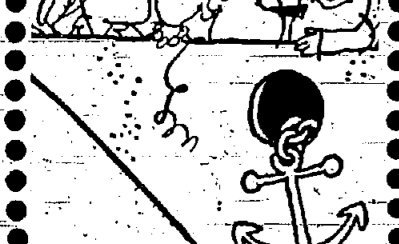

New urban, environmental programs to be instituted by Union College in fall

"Shaping America's future will be the focus of the new curricula at Union College," Cranford, Elizabeth, and Plainfield. Urban studies, environmental engineering, environmental science will be offered as options to existing programs, beginning in September, it was announced this week by Prof. Elmer Wolf, dean. Urban studies will be offered as an option in the liberal arts curriculum; environmental engineering as an option in the engineering and physical science curricula; and environmental science as an option in the biological sciences curriculum.

"The need for these programs is almost self-evident," Prof. Wolf stated. "Urban America is in a crisis—a crisis of interwoven problems. A solution to these problems is essential to the future of our nation and will require the talents of urban specialists."

Carbon monoxide detrimental to hatching of eggs, study finds

Carbon monoxide is definitely unhealthy even if you're protected by an oxygen mask, research at Rutgers has shown.

"Ever since scientists found that babies of less than average weight were born to mothers who smoked during pregnancy, there has been much concern over the effects of carbon monoxide on embryos," says James McGrath, associate professor of environmental physiology at the College of Agriculture and Environmental Science, New Brunswick.

Together with research assistant John Mofa, Dr. McGrath constructed a special incubator to test the effect of carbon monoxide on the hatching of chicken eggs.

"With the introduction of 100 parts carbon monoxide per million parts of air (or only 1/100th of 1 percent) the percentage of eggs hatched fell from 79 to 62 percent. At 300 parts per million it declined to 12 percent," he says.

The embryos found dead in the shell showed the red discoloration, hemorrhages, and blood clotting associated with carbon monoxide poisoning. Unlike normal embryos, the yolk sacs were only partially absorbed.

There were no significant differences, however, in birth weight, heart size, or concentration of hemoglobin in the blood of the chicks who did survive. But at the same time, the body can adapt physiologically to this particular poison. Aside from carbon monoxide, other components of tobacco smoke other than carbon monoxide was responsible for weight loss.

"Our understanding of the long term effects of carbon monoxide poisoning is clouded by a number of discrepancies like these," Dr. McGrath concludes.

"Smokers are, of course, exposed to more carbon monoxide than non-smokers. But at the same time, the body can adapt physiologically to this particular poison. Aside from carbon monoxide, other components of tobacco smoke other than carbon monoxide was responsible for weight loss."

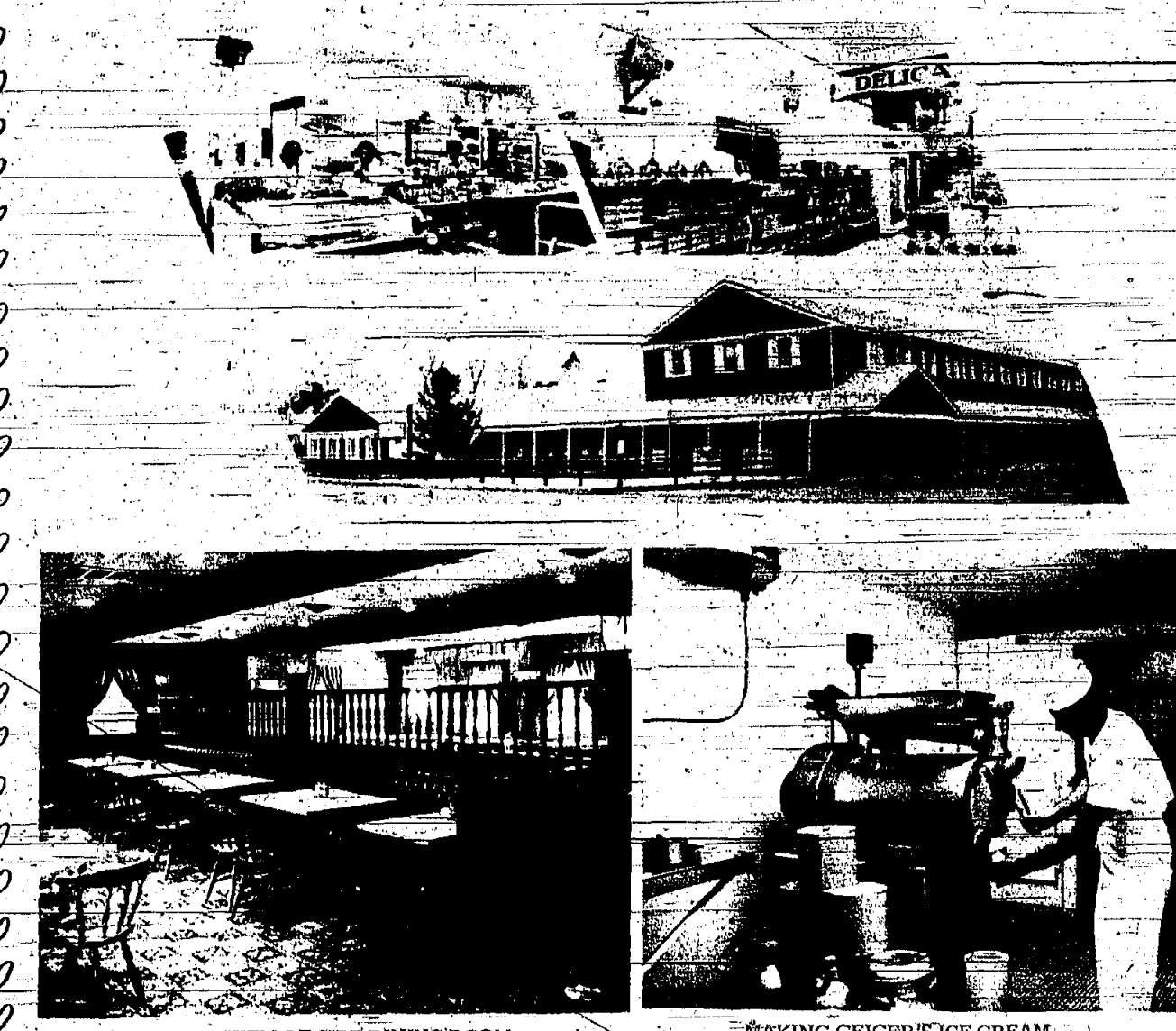

Prof. Dexter will speak at UC's commencement

Prof. Forrest P. Dexter Jr., retiring professor of geology and physics who has served in various teaching and administrative roles at Union College since 1945, will be guest speaker at Union College's 39th commencement exercises to be conducted on Saturday, June 10, at 10:30 a.m. on the East Lawn of the Cranford campus, it was announced this week by Dr. Kenneth W. Iversen, president.

The invitation to Prof. Dexter to speak at commencement was extended by the Student Council which expressed the desire of the student body to honor the retiring professor in a public as well as personal way.

"The student body of Union College is indebted to Prof. Dexter for his many years of generous service," said Richard Wusthoff of Edison, president of the Student Council. "He is a distinguished professor as well as a friend who is committed to our personal growth. His speaking at commencement will be a fitting tribute to show our appreciation while his

remarks will provide each of us with a personal message."

The request by the students that Prof. Dexter speak at commencement is believed to set a precedent in seeking commencement speakers at Union College.

"We wholeheartedly support our student body in their request to have such a fine person deliver the commencement address," said Dr. Iversen.

THERE ARE 177 CANDIDATES for the associate in arts degree which will be conferred by Dr. Iversen and Edward Aborn, chairman of the Union College Board of Trustees. They will be assisted by Prof. Elmer Wolf, dean.

Prof. Dexter, who is serving a temporary assignment as acting dean of arts, will complete 27 years of service at Union College in June, where he has also taught chemistry and anthropology and fulfilled parttime assignments as financial aid officer, counselor,

student-adviser, and faculty adviser to the Student Council, the Interfraternal Council and the Geology Club. He holds the rank of full professor.

A graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry, Prof. Dexter earned a master of arts degree in physics from Harvard University and has done additional graduate work at Brown and Rutgers Universities. He has also studied at Oklahoma State University and Indiana University under a National Science Foundation grant.

PROF. DEXTER WAS the first junior college faculty member in the United States to head a committee of the American Chemical Society.

His professional affiliations also include the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Association of University Professors, the New Jersey Mineralogical Society, and the Geological Society of the American Museum of Natural History.

Before joining the Union College staff, Prof. Dexter served as a research chemist with Tidewater Oil Co., and American Cyanamid, and as an analytical chemist with New York Consolidated Gas Co.

As a faculty member at Union College, Prof. Dexter has served on numerous committees, assignments on a professional and extracurricular basis. He served for several years on the Student-Faculty Relations

Committee. Prof. Dexter is also noted at Union College for his countless field trips to many areas on the East coast with students interested in geology and minerals.

Prof. Dexter's wife, Ruth Alice, is a former member of the Cranford Board of Education.
