Profile--Sen. Clifford Case

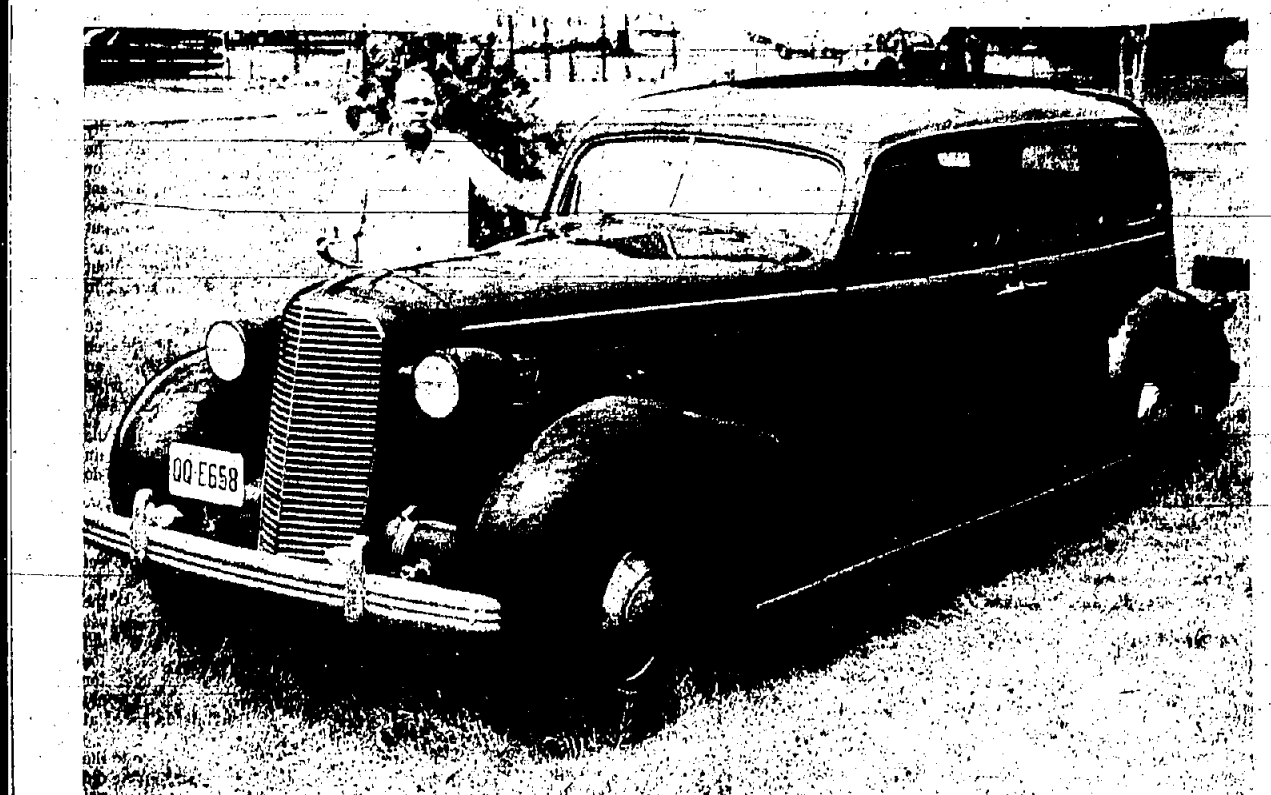
Following is one of a series of Profiles on candidates running for office this year.

But if he has a secret for his success he isn't telling anyone. "I don't know any special formula," he said. "I've been terribly fortunate in the support I've had. And most important, I have never run a campaign against an individual opponent. I have always run on the basis of the issues involved."

Case added that he feels municipalities "should have a very proper claim against the state for the loss of tax revenues from land sold for highway rights of way and then lying idle for a decade or more, without bringing local towns as fast as possible. This is the first time residents are to be made aware of the advantages of improved transportation."

Business is his job

Regional schools official busy

"There's no business like business," notes Lewis Fredericks, assistant superintendent of business for the Union County Regional High School District.

"All the financial affairs of the Regional District are the responsibility of my office," explained Fredericks. According to state law, the money collected from taxes is recorded and deposited by the custodian of school funds; in the Regional District this is Dr. Minor C. K. Jones, board of education member from Mountainside. "Once properly deposited in accounts, the school monies are dispersed and closely accounted for by the Regional business office," said Fredericks.

The regional business office is the center for district-wide purchasing. "All items from textbooks to fuel oil are purchased through this office. In addition, the budget is finalized in this office," he noted. Once approved by the board of education and the Regional public, the budget is activated and endorsed by the business office personnel.

Recently, the Regional board of education approved the adoption of a computerized budget accounting system. By computerizing the Regional budget, the business office will be able to produce reports which enable the business personnel to show exactly when and where school money is being spent.

Typically, the assistant superintendent of business sends various financial reports to Region from which the amount of state aid to the Regional District is determined.

Jennings Lynch, director of transportation, and Walter Rubin, director of maintenance, frequently report to the superintendent of business to inform him of their various activities.

As the head of the business office, Fredericks coordinates the current construction projects of all four Regional high schools. He works closely with architects, Eisenbar and Miller, the attorneys, Johnsons and O'Dwyer; the additions and the various building contractors. The contracts call for the completion of the Regional building program by Oct. 19, 1973.

In July 1969, Fredericks was appointed secretary to the board of education, a post he holds to this day. As the board secretary, he lights the minutes at all board of education meetings, handles board communication and releases notes of meetings.

In addition, the board secretary is responsible for organizing the annual elections of the Regional High School District's board of education.

As a mechanical inspector for airplanes, Fredericks served in the United States Air Force for 4 1/2 years. His overseas service was spent in the Pacific.

Presently, the Fredericks family resides in Clark. Lewis and Genevieve Fredericks have been married for 23 years and have two children, Robert 15, and Ellen, 12. Genevieve is a busy housewife who enjoys sewing. Robert will be a freshman in the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School beginning in September and Ellen will be entering the seventh grade in the Carl H. Kumpf school.

Bell designs a solid state mini color TV camera

Engineers at Bell Laboratories, Murray Hill, have designed and operated the first all solid state color television camera. The new camera weighs only a few pounds and fits easily into a desk drawer.

Bell Labs engineers expect this exploratory model to lead to a new generation of color television cameras, much smaller, simpler and less expensive than conventional color cameras.

The complete camera, which measures 8 inches x 9 inches x 3 inches, can be still further reduced in weight and size, probably small enough to hold in one hand.

Bell Laboratories is the research and development unit of the Bell System. The new solid state camera is the result of Bell Labs engineering efforts to improve techniques and equipment for visual communications.

The solid state camera uses three tiny charge-coupled devices (CCDs) as image sensors instead of the more cumbersome vacuum-tube and electron-beam-scanning system of existing color cameras.

CCDs are a new type of silicon electronic device invented at Bell Labs in 1970. The charge-coupled device (CCD) is a silicon chip which makes it possible to use simple devices to perform electronic functions usually requiring complex integrated circuits.

As with conventional tube cameras, light from the scene to be televised is split into red, blue and green images by a prism. Each primary color is focused on one CCD sensor. The image is converted into an electrical charge pattern by the sensor and this charge pattern is then read out as a video signal.

The solid state camera uses three tiny charge-coupled devices (CCDs) as image sensors instead of the more cumbersome vacuum-tube and electron-beam-scanning system of existing color cameras.

compact, self-contained camera that requires only low voltages to operate.

The new camera completely overcomes difficulties of picture alignment, color registration, color fringing, caused by alignment problems and by electronic "lag" in camera and existing cameras, and is completely avoided with the new CCD device.

CCD cameras are expected to be more rugged and reliable, insensitive to electromagnetic interference, and longer lived than current cameras. They are also instantly ready for use when turned on, since CCDs don't have to "warm up."

Present CCD cameras have not yet reached the resolution capability required for commercial television applications since current integrated circuit fabrication processes are not able to routinely make devices large enough for such applications.

However, Bell Labs engineers expect that such processing techniques will soon be sufficiently improved to make CCD technology available for practical video systems.

Still hurricane season, CD aide tells residents. Here are a few of the safety rules listed on the hurricane posters:

- Check your supply of boards, tools, batteries, non-perishable foods and other equipment you will need if a hurricane strikes your town.
- When you hear the first tropical storm advisory listen for future announcements; this will prepare you for a hurricane emergency in advance of the issuance of watches and warnings.
- When your area is covered by a hurricane watch continue normal activities, but stay tuned to radio or television for all National Weather Service Advisories. Remember: A hurricane which means a possible danger within 24 hours; if the danger materializes, a hurricane warning will be issued. Meanwhile, keep alert. Ignore rumors.
- Plan your time before the storm arrives and avoid the last-minute hurry which might leave you marooned or unprepared.
- Keep calm until the emergency has ended. Secure outdoor objects that might be blown away or uprooted. Garbage cans, garden tools, toys signs, porch furniture and a number of other harmless items become missiles of destruction in hurricane winds. Anchor them or store them inside before the storm strikes.
- Store drinking water in clean bathtubs, jugs, bottles, and cooking utensils; your town's water supply may be contaminated by flooding or damaged by hurricane floods.
- Keep your car fueled. Service stations may be inaccessible for several days after the storm strikes, due to flooding or interrupted electrical power.
- Remain indoors during the hurricane. Travel is extremely dangerous when winds and tides are whipping through your area.
- Remember that hurricanes moving inland can cause severe flooding. Stay away from river banks and streams. Radio announcements will help keep you informed on river flood stages.

Cancellation limit put on homeowner and fire policies

New Jersey Insurance Commissioner Richard C. McDonough has approved new rules (filed, submitted by two major insurance rating organizations) that would limit a company's right to cancel either a homeowner's insurance policy or a fire insurance policy on an owner-occupied dwelling.

The commissioner said the new rule is significant to the insurance buying public because it would remove "some of the irritants" where policies are sometimes cancelled before their normal expiration date.

Occasionally, policies are cancelled by a company shortly after a loss occurs, or when the completion of the underwriting check-up shows that the risk has characteristics that make it undesirable, such as a home that is left unoccupied for extended periods.

Under the new rule a company will have to make its decision during the first 60 days whether it wants to provide coverage. After the initial 60 days, the company cannot cancel the policy except for stated reasons such as non-payment of premium, fraud or material misrepresentation, a substantial change in the risk characteristics or willful or negligent act or omission by the insured that increases the hazard substantially.

The rating organizations that requested the change are the Insurance Services Office and Transportation Rating Bureau. Both organizations combine to represent companies writing about 75 percent of the homeowner's and dwelling fire insurance business in New Jersey.

The new rule went into effect Aug. 30 for the homeowner's insurance policy. The cancellation rule for dwelling policies will be effective within 30 days.

The homeowner policy is the more comprehensive of the two. It covers protection against loss from fire, windstorm and related perils, as well as burglary or theft and personal liability coverage. The dwelling policy provides coverage only against losses caused by fire and related hazards such as windstorm and lightning.

With respect to non-renewals as opposed to cancellations, if a company under the new rule decides not to renew a policy at the end of the policy term, it must give notice to the insured at least 30 days in advance.

Art - any form of high performance Hansen explains 'happening experiments'

An experimental artist at the Rutgers Newark College of Arts and Sciences has come up with what, to the layman at least, appears to be a headlocking conception of art.

Art, says art instructor Al Hansen, "is any form of high performance in any human undertaking." And, without quite saying so, Hansen illustrates his point by his own varied activities. Also, Hansen implies that proper application of an approach to art can solve most of the problems of New York City.

A graduate of Pratt Institute and former commercial artist for advertising agencies, Hansen since the mid-50's has evolved into a creator of "happenings," architectural communications and "energy events." In addition to being an experimental artist, Hansen is also a magazine columnist and author.

His art criticism and reviews have appeared in the magazine "Earth" and "The Village Voice" and his book, "A Primer of Happenings & Time-Space Art" is a historical text considered invaluable by students of new art forms.

Hansen recalled that his work with happenings was greatly influenced by composer John Cage's class in electronic music at the New School for Social Research. He and other painters, writers, sculptors and composers in the class discussed and evolved an art philosophy he said was based loosely on the principles of Zen Buddhism and existentialism.

The various interests of these artists were coordinated and developed into what was then a new art form—the happening.

What has developed from this, Hansen said, is a "mixed-media," environmental art parodied by his contemporaries, such as Yoko Ono, Claes Oldenburg, George Brecht and Simon Morris.

The genre is the outcome of these artists' concept of aesthetics, philosophy, education and communication, Hansen said.

"We were seeking a way to survive the 'grey 50's,'" Hansen explained. "In the period following World War Two, composers realized humans as a form of energy. This was in turn followed by a celebration of the digestion of all the information that was happening, gathering and mixing in the 60's."

A master of collage and assemblage and widely known for his Hersey candy wrapper artworks, Hansen said in further explanation that the happening experimentation was "getting out to do things without any idea of what the results would be."

Hansen added that he was convinced that even though the happening is sometimes ridiculed as nepotistic and anti-art, it is actually a bona fide 20th Century art form.

Vegetables and young minds growing in new programs at Gaudineer School

A "small garden is growing alongside Florence Gaudineer School on S. Springfield Ave., an "18th Century" garden with corn and squash and even a row of cotton plants. In the same," said teacher George Benson, "For instance, in the study of the colonial period, we learn the values of the people, how these were related to their European background and how these values changed. And we learn by doing."

Thus the students learn about the clothes by actually constructing garments, growing the food staples of the period, singing its songs, studying its art.

Benson explained there are lessons for each unit of study which the individual teacher breaks down to his specialty. Then the students are given a list to choose the areas in which they will fulfill the course. "It's an individually oriented program," he said, "but one in which we still try to maintain group cohesion."

IN ONE PERIOD, a student can be instructed by three different teachers, or go to the library and read, watch a film strip, study a print—all involved with the program. Reading and writing are a part of every class, also.

"We've also added a fourth," said teacher Tom Brown: "Reasoning. We take the attitude in this program that there are no right or wrong answers. The student, through an individual, valid conclusion."

The seventh graders are the ones involved in the colonial study, while fifth graders are beginning to learn of primitive man. The eighth graders go into a study of contemporary social issues.

"Who am I? How old I teach the stage I'm at, and where am I going from here? Those are the questions these students will pose to themselves," Benson said.

"Our aim in emphasizing value studies is to see what developing factors could have influenced a generation which produced the tragedy in Munich. The young should take it

Progress, and sometimes a lack of it, in municipal efforts to fight flood control, was the major topic at the Township Committee meeting Tuesday night at Town Hall. Committee business took up less than a half-hour and comments from some of the 20 citizens in the audience lasted for the remainder of the evening.

In other matters, the governing body approved immediate construction of a traffic light at Mountain and Hildebrand avenues, an ordinance limiting the hours during which garbage cans can be left at curbside before and after collection and approved a resolution amending its previous support of the proposed Hilden Valley Park.

The flood control issue was raised by Albert Holder of 75 S. Maple Avenue, who commented that "Springfield has a lot of very good plans on paper, but I would like to see the dirt start flying." Holder is a member of the municipal flood control committee.

Committee member Nat Stokes declared, "What we need now is to have the Army Corps of Engineers appropriate the money which has been authorized for work in Springfield. They can get the bids out to do the work. Springfield hired an engineer to start on the plans long before any of us now here was on the council."

"We have all the engineers we need. Our top priority now might be to hire a public relations man to work on Congress so we can get the money."
