Revaluation appraisers offer some questions, answers

1. Why is a revaluation program necessary for the township?  
A. The primary objective of a revaluation program is to equally distribute the tax burden among all property owners in the township.

Is there a difference in the assessed value of these buildings?  
A. If the dwelling that has not been maintained has deteriorated to the point where major repairs to the structure are required, then the value of this building will of necessity be depreciated.

What is the purpose of an interior inspection?  
A. The purpose of an interior inspection is to record information relative to the structure which will affect its value.

## Truck fails to stop, starts chain mishap

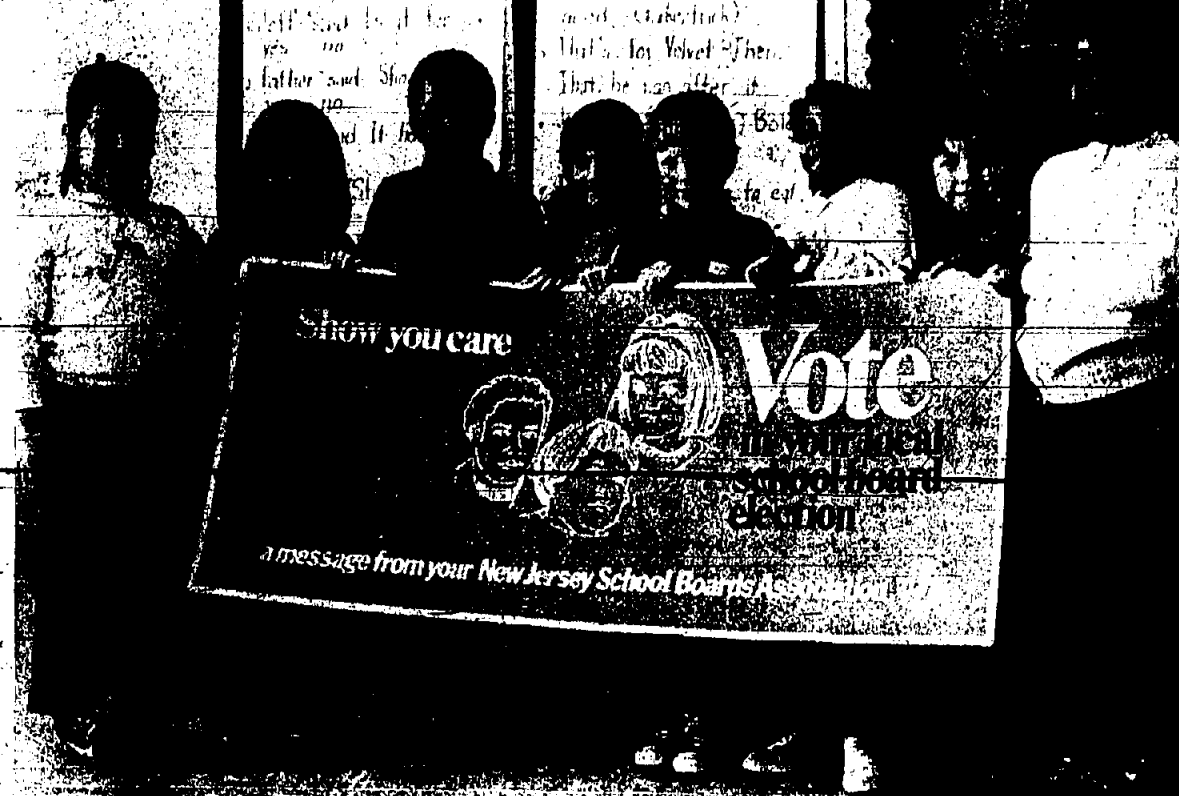

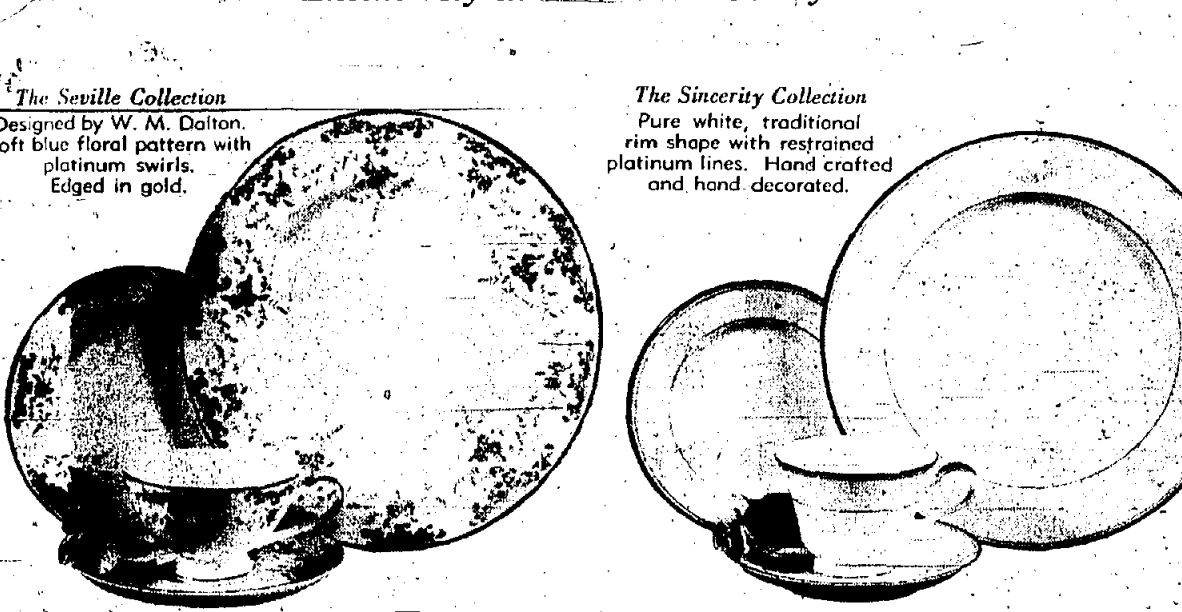

Friday was the day the rains came, again, to Springfield. Township residents who by now are used to bailing out their basements were surprised to find that the water was still there. Members of the fire department came to their aid and spent the whole day pumping water from local homes, the basement at Town Hall, at the Edward Walton School, and at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

At one point during the evening, the firemen were called upon to ferry a family into a flooded home. They said they had to come to Springfield morning to the same task. ### Rinaldo urges increased funds for flood control

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-12th Dist.-N.J.) this week announced a two-pronged approach to increasing the funding for flood control on the Rahway River.

Rinaldo, who described the Administration's \$103,000 budget request for fiscal 1974 as "entirely inadequate," said he would appeal to the Office of Management and Budget and the Congress itself to increase the level of appropriations for the project.

Congressman Rinaldo said he estimated the real need for the upcoming fiscal year at \$215,000 rather than the "disappointingly small amount" in the budget proposed last week by the Administration.

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## Murders, assaults lead increase in county crime

There was a 1.5 percent increase in crime in Union County during January-September, 1972, as compared to the same period in the previous year, according to the State Police. In the Crime Index Report issued this week, there were 197 more serious incidents for a total of 12,529. The highest increase came in murders, from 14 to 20, and forcible rapes, from 19 to 21.

Other crimes and their figures: Robbery, 729 to 855; atrocious assault, 435 to 565; breaking and entering, 5,662 to 5,194; larcenies, 586 and over, a decrease from 2,828 to 2,431; and auto thefts, from 2,391 to 2,387.

Other counties had large increases in forcible rapes. Atlantic County saw a hike of 26 to 41; Camden went from 54 to 80; Cape May from 2 to 19; and Essex from 205 to 208.

For the Northeast Region, which includes the counties of Union, Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Middlesex, Morris, Passaic and Somerset, there was a total increase of 1,353 incidents. Murders went from 229 to 243; forcible rapes, from 138 to 153.

Congressman Matthew J. Rinaldo, chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, said the increase in crime is a cause for concern. He said he will be sponsoring legislation to create a crime commission to study the problem.

When the law was passed for 21-year-olds in 1968, Halpin said he issued 112 cards, with the advent of the 18-year-old majority law, his office has become a landmine business. His office now is capable of issuing 1,000 cards on the spot.

Under the terms of the existing law, the licensee still has the option of refusing to serve anyone with the card unless the licensee is satisfied the bearer of the card meets the age minimum for beer or wine purchase, and the A.B.C. There is presently a movement in the State Senate to relieve the licensee of any responsibility for serving minors. Halpin said he has no objection to the responsibility on the bearer of the card.

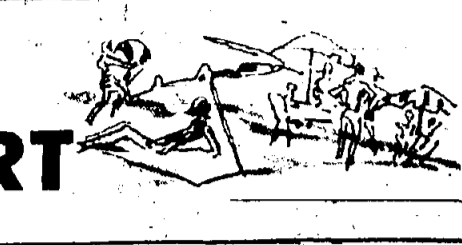
