WASHINGTON, D.C.-Rep. Matthew J Ringldo (R.-12th Dist., N.J.) announced yesterday that he has written President Nixon to urge that fair rent controls be included in the hase IV economic plan now being prepared. Although there ware some inequities, tenants had uniform protection under Phase II, when there was a 2½ percent ceiling on rent increases," Rinaldo said. "Additionally, the internal Revenue Service enforced this Internal revenue service enforced this protection against unwarranted increases." The Union County Congressman noted that more than 30 municipalities in New Jersey have adopted local rent stabilization or-dinances which are based on the consumer orice index.

"Nobody wants to deprive a landlord of a fair return on his investment," Rinaldo continued. "But certainly we cannot permit the handful of rent-gougers to take advantage of the seven iousing shortage." Rinaldo said that in the absence of uiniform

In my last two reports, to do a little sum marizing, I suggested (I) that among the most a thorough reform of our election laws. money in political campaigns, and (II) that central to such a reform would be the sub-stitution of "scrip" - issued by the Treasury in denominations similar to money, serially numbered, computerized, and so designed as to identify by name and address every tran-"saction from contribution to expenditure to redemption -- in place of cash or checks, in order to assure maximum accountability and disclosure and thus help restore citizen con-fidence in the integrity of the process by which

we elect those who govern us. In addition to my scrip plan - which, I am_ happy to report, is gaining growing support here on Capitol Hill - other, and related, reforms are necessary. Three such reforms, experience shows, are especially important: (1) A limitation on the total amount which a single contributor can give to a single candidate or committee and an overall limit on total funds a candidate can raise. While the principle of a limitation is more important than the precise amount, that amount should (a) be "small enough to prevent a single contributor or small group of contributors from exercising a "disproportionate claim on the gratitude of a candidate, and (b) be large enough to permit adequate financing of an election campaign. And, in turn, scrip will provide much of the data and evidence which a Federal Elections Commission will need to enforce these reforms properly. But - and the question is a vital one - are these reforms necessary? To those who may still doubt either their need or efficacy, let me

cite two rather well-known instances from the last Presidential campaign: (1) the contribution of \$200,000 in cash by an international financier who, at the time of the contribution, was under active investigation b a Federal agency for alleged violations which

have since been revealed to be the biggest c ed to be the biggest cas States. Though he was subsequently indicted, it was not as a result of his contribution. - (2) the contribution of an estimated \$2 million by an individual (who, by the way, sough appointment to a high Federal office) wh carefully disguised this massive amount b breaking it-up into piecemeal donations \$3,000 to each of several hundred committee all with the sole aim of financing a single candidate - an effort designed in part to evade the Federal gift tax on donations of more than

\$3,000. While these two cases display a certain dramatic flair, how many other more prosaic, but equally destructive, evasions or "laun-dering" of contributions, will continue to go undiscovered?

We will never_know - unless and

problems, the kind caused by creaky floor boards, leaky basements, clogged gutters and the like, you may need a visit with the "house" doctor" for a prognosis and a prescription. Joseph McNeill, an adjunct professor with he Rutgers University Extension Division, has been making "house calls" by means of a new weekly radio series produced by the Rutgers Office of Educational Radio and Television and aired on local stations. A registered professional engineer and a

veteran of the home inspection business, McNeill dispenses during the five-minute program advice on a host of topics, including drainage problems, insect infestation, septic systems, air conditioning and heating and

olumbing. He discusses ways of saving money on materials, tools and equipment, offers tips, techniques and methods used in home care, repair and improvement, and gives advice on ow to purchase materials and services. The aim of the program, he says, is to convince homeowners that the trick for keeping a house in good working order is regular preventive maintenance

"This means checking up regularly on those parts of the house that are liable to get out of good working order," he says. "If you wait until something goes wrong, it will take you longer, and cost you more to fix." The content of the radio show is aimed at answering numerous questions in the minds of homeowners, particularly, "What is it. How can I spot it, What will it cost, Why should I do

it, and How do I know if it's done well?" Listeners can obtain a "prescription" for house problems by writing the "doctor" in care of the local station for a script of each show and a detailed house maintenance checklist. McNeill plans to keep the program on a level that is understandable to everyone. Terminology and data are the same as that used by







outlines concept of development rights Transfer of development rights, a new idea in community planning to help keep land in open space, is explained in a new publication from Butgers University.

"The development right concept permits municipalities to make their own decisions as to where building may occur, or be prohibited, without penalizing the individual property owner," says B. Budd Chavooshian, land use specialist for the Cooperative Extension Service at_Rutgers and author of the publication.

Transfer of development rights (often known TDR) is initiated when a municipality designates an area of open space where development is prohibited. Then the residential development potential in that area is trans-ferred to another district or districts where the citizens agree that increased develop s feasible.

- Landowners in the preserved areas, who wi continue to own their land, may sell their rights to further development to other landowners or builders who wish to develop open land now designated for increased residential density. "In this way, everyone can benefit," Chavooshian says. "Planned growth with preserved open space is assured, and lan-downers in the preserved area will receive a

fair compensation for their property." The publication, entitled "Transfer of The publication, entitled "Transfer of Development Rights: A New Concept in Land Use Management," suggests how municipal enabling legislation might implement com-munity planning and subsequent sale of development rights. TERGATE: WHAT NEXT? --- III

In my last two reports, to do a little sum-marizing, I suggested (1) that among the most constructive actions Congress could take in the attermath of the Watergate scandals would be a thorough reform of our election laws, specially as they concern the role and effect of money in political campaigns, and (II) that central to such a reform would be the substitution of "scrip" - issued by the Treasury indenominations similar to money, serially numbered, computerized, and so designed as to identify by name and address every transaction from contribution to expenditure to redemption - in place of cash or checks, in order to assure maximum accountability and disclosure and thus help restore citizen con-fidence in the integrity of the process by which we elect those who govern us.

happy to report, is gaining growing support here on Capitol Hill other, and related, reforms are necessary. Three such reforms, experience shows, are especially important: (1) A limitation on the total amount which a single contributor can give to a single can-didate or committee and an overall limit on total funds a candidate can raise. While the principle of a limitation is more important than the precise amount, that amount should (a) be small enough to prevent a single contributor or small group of contributors from exercising a amail group of contributors from exercising a disproportionate claim on the gratitude of a candidate, and (b) be large enough to permit adequate financing of an election campaign.
 (2) The requirement that all campaign contributions to a single candidate go through a single account or single finance committee a single account or single finance committee and single account or single finance committee and single account or single finance committee account or single finan precaution designed (a) to prevent big con-tributions from being hidden in the guise of numerous smaller contributions to a large number of phony paper committees, and (b) to

strengthen the objectives of disclosure and accountability. (3) The establishment of an independen bipartisan Federal Elections Commission with authority and resources to supervise Federal . elections in accordance with the applicable laws, to investigate alleged violations, to prosecute directly or certify for timely prosecution in the Federal courts those cases warranted by the results of investigation, and to enforce the law by invoking appropriate sanctions and penalties including, in extreme cases, the nullification of an election.

Although it may seem obvious, it is worth emphasizing that these reforms are all closely emphasizing that these reforms are all closely related and interdependent. Each supports and reinforces the others. Each is an essential part of the whole pattern of reform. For example, despite the limitation on the amount of contributions, the clear intent of such a law could be circumvented by con-libiliting the maximum smount to each of several carefully disputed committees with

several carefully disguised committees, with the total bundle ultimately used to benefit a single candidate – unless, that is, the law also required a single account for each candidate, and unless something like my scrip plan made It possible to identify the actual funds in terms of who gave them, who got them, and how they vere spent. 

(1) the contribution of \$200,000 in cash by an international financier who, at the time of the contribution, was under active investigation by a Federal agency for alleged violations which . have since been revealed to be the biggest case of securities fraud in the history of the United In addition to my scrip plan - which, I am States. (2) the contribution of an estimated \$2 million by an individual (who, by the way, sought appointment to a high Federal office) w carefully disguised this massive amount breaking it up into piecemeal donations of \$3,000 to each of several hundred committee all with the sole aim of financing a single \$3,000.

Congress demonstrates the concern and courage to modernize election finance laws and put some muscle behind their enforcement. It's not that election reform will ever change people's characters or make honest men of those determined to subvert the democratic process. It won't. But it will make them pause, and it may make them desist. And for those who don't, it promises a degree of disclosure and deter




Forecasts of electric sales and construction xpenditures were revised downward by Public Service Electric and Gas Co. at an un-,


The company's new electric sales forecast projects sales growing at an average annual rate of about 5.9 per cent over the next 10 years. The company's previous forecast projected an average growth of approximately 6.4 per cent per year. The new figure reflects a slowdown in sales to residential and industrial customers: sales to commercial customers remain very strong and are expected to grow at an average. annual rate of 8 per cent.

The company also announced new estimated construction expenditure figures for 1973 through 1977 of \$2.5 billion, down ap--preximately \$400 million from the previous estimates, The new estimates, by year: \$383 million in 1973; \$330 million in 1974; \$447 million in 1975; \$678 million in 1976, and \$651 million in 1977. The company attributed most of the reduction to the delay of construction at Newhold Island and other, proposed generating.

THE NUTRITIONISTS at Martland have worked out some simple and healthful menus for people who want to eliminate their meat intake while maintaining a properly balanced diet. For breakfast, they suggest: one serving of high Vitamin C. fruit or fruit

juice, such as orange juice, grapefruit, tomato one ounce of protein food such as 1 slice of ard cheese or ¼ cup cottage cheese or one egg or two tablespoons of peanut butter:

one serving of enriched cereal; one serving of whole grain or enriched bread; two teaspoons of margarine or butter; and an eight-ounce glass of milk. A simple reakfast menu might include orange juice, scrambled egg, toast with butter or margarin and a glass of milk.

A good lunch for youngsters would include a peanut butter sandwich, a glass of milk and a piece of fruit. An adult could get a similar balanced diet and protein intake from two ounces of protein food such as half a cup of cottage cheese or tuna fish or two ounces of hard cheese; two pieces of whole grain or enriched bread; one serving of vegetable (cooked or raw), one teaspoon of butter or margarine; one serving of fresh, canned or dried fruit; and an eight-ounce glass of milk. The dinner menu includes: three ounces o protein food from poultry, fish or at least 12 cup of dried peas, beans or lentils; one serving o whole grain or enriched bread; a potato or on leaspoon of butter or margarine; one serving of dark, green leafy or yellow vegetables; one eight-ounce glass of milk; and a serving of frui in season.

A WELL-BALANCED DAILY DIET contains elements from four main food groups: Milk, Vegetable-fruit, meat, and enriched bread, cereals and substitutes. Youngsters need from two to four cups of milk a day; most adults can get by with two cups; pregnant and nursing







Learning how to avoid contagion and ways to cope with illness may help to avoid spoiling an otherwise exotic ad-

HEW's Center for Disease Control (CDC), keeps health departments throughout the country up to date on vaccination requirements hroughout the world. Your advice from CDC is to call your local health department two weeks before your departure to obtain current information on the countries you will visit since sailing, a fishing trip for city children, tips on bealth conditions are constantly changing. You will get answers to three important questions: What vaccinations will I need to return to the U.S.? What do other countries require for entry? What immunization should I get for my own protection?" Requirements ar ased on whether or not smallpox, yellow fever or cholera is present in the countries you visit. Recommendations for your protection might include polio, typhoid, hepatitis or malaria. The United States no longer requires vaccination for returning tourists with one possible

exception: If you have been in a country where smallpox has been reported within 14 days before arrival home, you will need to show proof of smallpox vaccination.

If you're suffering from "homesickness" problems, the kind caused by creaky floor-boards, leaky basements, clogged gutters and the like, you may need a visit with the "house doctor" for a prognosis and a prescription. Joseph McNeill, an adjunct professor with the Rutgers University Extension Division, has been making "house calls" by means of a new mobile radio scripts, produced by the Butgers weekly radio series produced by the Rutgers Difice of Educational Radio and Television and

Office of Educational Radio and Television and aired on local stations. A registered professional engineer and a veteran of the home inspection business, McNeill' dispenses during the five-minute program advice on a host of topics, including drainage problems, insect infestation, septic systems, gir conditioning and heating and humbing.

plumbing. He discusses ways of saving money on materials, tools and equipment, offers tips, techniques and methods used in home care, repair and improvement, and gives advice on how to purchase materials and services. The aim of the program, he says, is to con-vince homeowners that the trick for keeping a house in good working order is regul preventive maintenance.--"This means checking up regularly on the parts of the house that are liable to get out of good working order," he says. "If you wait until something goes wrong, it will take 'you longer, and cost you more to fix."

The content of the radio shows is aimed at answering numerous questions in the minds of homeowners, particularly, "What is it, How can I spot it, What will it cost, Why should I do it, and How do I know if it's done well?" Listeners can obtain a "prescription" for house problems by writing the "doctor" in care --of the local station for a script of each show and

a detailed house maintenance checklist. McNeill plans to keep the program on a level that is understandable to everyone, Terminology and data are the same as that used by the experts, but McNeill say he tries "to make it fit more comfortably on the tongue of the layman who must purchase various supplies


