

Three-cornered race? Diaper Derby at Steel Pier

The 36th annual Diaper Derby, the world championship baby crawling race, will take place at the Atlantic City Steel Pier Thursday July 12, at 10 a.m.

All babies who are still in the crawling age are eligible to enter. There is no entry fee and nothing to buy. Any baby who gets up and walks will be disqualified.

The Diaper Derby is a registered service mark in the U.S. Patent Office, owned by Palsades Puggants, Inc., of Fort Lee and licensed to the Steel Pier. The Derby, which has been one of the top attractions at Palsades Amusement Park until its closing in 1971, last year's Diaper Derby also took place at Atlantic City Steel Pier. Interracial Business Council lists record year 'in all areas'

The Interracial Council for Business Opportunity (ICBO) of New Jersey "achieved highs in all areas of minority economic development," Malcolm L. Corrin, executive director, announced this week in the organization's annual report.

"The financial assistance program was immensely successful—three quarters of a million dollars over the previous record year of 1971. Since 1971, ICBO clients have received \$1,812,586," Corrin reported.

Corrin said that loan losses to financial institutions "have been remarkably low due to the careful screening and sophisticated of ICBO business development specialists. Since 1967 aggregate losses are 20 cents for \$177,056, representing 3 percent of total loans disbursed and a 4.6 percent of dollar amount. National averages for all small business failures range from 50 to 75 percent.

Corrin stated that, "much of the success of ICBO of New Jersey can be credited to the cooperation of the Small Business Administration and the participation of the banks, the insurance companies, MESBICs, and major corporations in the state. Without their financial contributions and support little could have been accomplished."

The formal management training program, conducted at the Rutgers Newark campus, previously acknowledged as "among the best in the country" by evaluators for the Ford and Rockefeller Foundations, was again acclaimed in 1972 by consultants for President Nixon's Task Force on Education and Training for Minority Business Enterprises. The 250 graduates of the program in 1972 brought the total to 1,138 since its inception in 1969.

A Minority Vendors Directory, the first of its kind in the state, compiled and distributed to over 4,000 purchasing agents of industry and government, provides them with a tool to increase their purchases of goods and services from minorities.

Regional board extends free time at two schools

The Regional High School District board of Education last week voted unanimously to extend for another year two experiments adopted last spring at the urging of student councils in two of its four high schools. They are the open lunch hour at David Brewster Regional High School in Kenilworth, and the late arrival-departure plan at Jonathan Dayton Regional in Springfield for youngsters with busy hours in the first and last periods.

Meeting at Brewster Regional, the board also voted unanimously to continue the Merschuk as superintendent of schools for the coming year, at a salary of \$33,000. The decision gives Merschuk tenure as the district's chief executive.

Merschuk revealed that the board has approved appointment of teacher leaders for some subject areas in all schools. They will assist the coordinators for each subject in supervising the work of classroom teachers.

The open lunch vote continues a program begun on May 1, which had permitted students to leave the hourly grounds for the second half of the 45-minute lunch period. Students next year will be able to leave for the full 45 minutes.

Town OKs museum bond, acts on Spring Brook field

The Township Committee Tuesday night voted to achieve three goals sought for some time by various groups in the community — a museum, win for the Springfield Public Library, construction of a playground for Spring Brook children and the start of flood relief work for the east and west branches of Spring Brook.

Before a capacity Town Hall audience of some 40 people, ranging from senior citizens to the members of a county pre-teen championship girls' softball team, the governing body voted unanimously for the three actions.

Final approval was given for a \$75,000 bond referendum to construct a museum wing for the library. The plan had been urged at almost every meeting this year by library trustees and others stressing the town's historical heritage. Mayor William A. Ruocco noted that the cost will be shared by the library trustees.

Another vote authorized preparation of a \$150,000 bond ordinance for the Spring Brook playground. Residents had worked for several years to win approval for the playground, to be constructed on state-owned land near Short Hills Avenue and Rt. 78. The committee action followed immediately upon receipt of state approval for the project.

The Spring Brook drainage contract was awarded to United Paving and Construction Co., Union, which last month had submitted a low bid of \$1,100,000 for the work. The project, some five years in the planning, is expected to relieve flooding in a strip from Lyons place and Rt. 78 to York Road's Creek near Town Hall. The work involves straightening and channelization of both branches of the brook.

SEVERAL MEMBERS of the governing body commented on the determination of concerned citizens which had secured action on all three projects.

Town ordinance regulating taxicabs is upheld by court

A State court last week upheld the Springfield taxicab ordinance which had been challenged by Joseph J. Partillo Sr., owner of the In-City Cab Co.

Partillo had brought action against the township, the police chief and the Township Committee in an effort to have the ordinance declared null, void and unconstitutional, particularly in regard to that portion of the law concerning the age and mileage of vehicles used as taxis.

The ordinance, adopted in July 1972, states that automobiles purchased new may not be used as cabs more than three years after their purchase date. Used cars that are bought for use as cabs also may not be operated if more than three years old and are subject to other restrictions.

Township Attorney Sanford A. Meskin represented Partillo in the case, which was argued by Judge Edward W. McGrath on May 2. Partillo, represented by Edward F. Peil-Clair, argued that the ordinance was unconstitutional, particularly in regard to that portion of the law concerning the age and mileage of vehicles used as taxis.

In the decision upholding the law, the court stated that the purpose of the ordinance is to protect the tax-paying public from the increased risk of harm caused by cabs that are in substantial operating condition. Excessive use, functional obsolescence and deterioration that are inevitable correlates of the age of a vehicle contribute to that risk, the court said.

It concluded that the portion of the law relating to the age of the vehicles is "reasonably related to the security of public safety" and that the limitation is a "reasonable and necessary part of the ordinance, charges that were dismissed by the court.

Children make 'capture' Find turtle at Meisel Pond

Five Springfield youngsters who trekked to Meisel Pond after the drying downpour which hit the township Tuesday returned home with an unusual find—a giant snapping turtle believed to be 40 to 50 years old.

The reptile, which measures nearly two feet from nose to tail, was discovered on the banks of the pond by Scott and Cheryl Newman of 47 Cottage lane, Steve and Bonnie Berber of 18 Cottage lane and Steve Ward of Sherwood. It reportedly had been viewed occasionally in the water, crawling along the shoreline after floodwaters in the area had subsided.

Roadside hazards studied by Council in safety campaign



The New Jersey State Safety Council announced this week that it is undertaking a statewide program through the 3,000 members of its County Traffic Safety Committees and other organizations to identify and report for corrective action roadside hazards that could kill or injure the unwary motorist who chanced to run off the road and hit them.

Annually, 100 lives are lost in the 100 lives snuffed out annually on New Jersey roads are the result of a vehicle striking a fixed object.

According to the Council, these lethal fixed objects or "boobytraps" are physical features of the roadside environment such as open end dumptrail, rigid unyielding supports for traffic control devices and lights, large rocks and trees only inches from the path of speeding traffic.

Bridge abutments and un-protected utility poles which vehicle might crash with high impact "areas"—these regular highway construction features are the most common roadside hazards that could kill or injure the unwary motorist.

The Council cited as a good example of what can be accomplished by an objective inspection of highways, the accident experience of General Motors at its proving grounds, a 75-mile network of roads conducted at Jersey State Safety Council, Room 221, 58 Park Pl., Newark, New Jersey 07102.

"The Court clearly made it a matter for states to apply common sense in determining what is obscene," Msgr. Hayes said, "and certainly action taken thus far in New Jersey against pornography indicates a matter for states to apply common sense in determining what is obscene."

College gets Hew-grant of \$15,000

A \$15,000 College Library Resources grant has been awarded to the University of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. It was awarded to the college by Dr. Kenneth W. Iversen, president.

The grant was awarded to three separate colleges to libraries at the college's campuses in Cranford, Elizabeth and Plainfield. Each library will receive \$5,000 to expand collections in different academic areas.

New career for ex-pilot Seeks doctorate at Rutgers

Thousands of Americans have faced the emotional and financial trauma of being forced at mid-career, for health or other reasons, to seek a new way of life and livelihood.

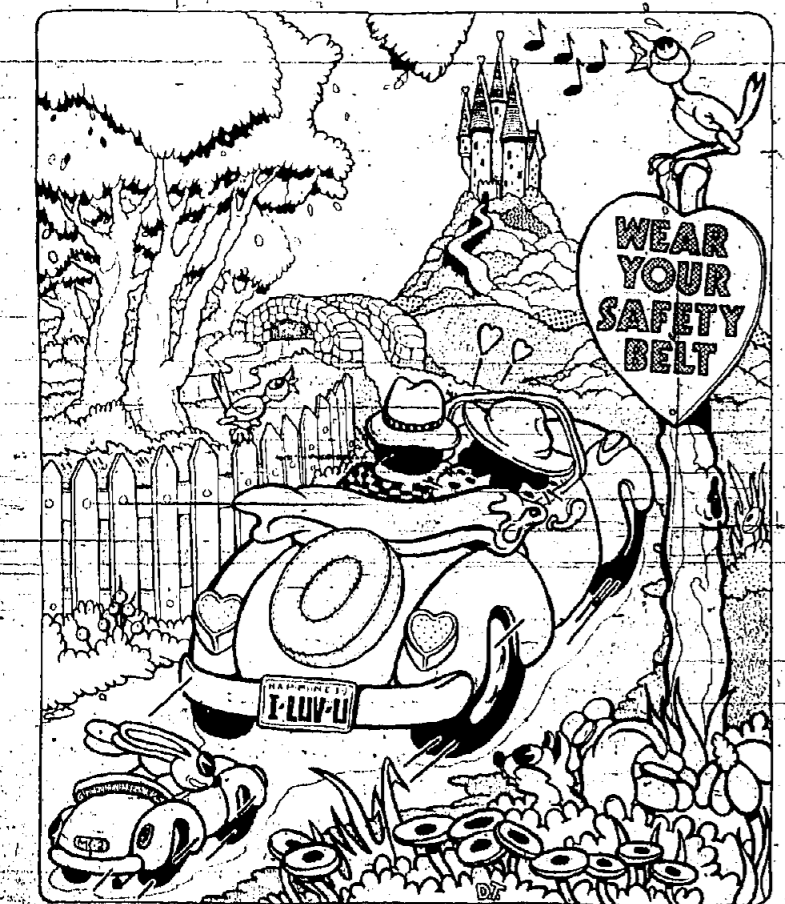
"I had a feeling that I was in good shape and the job going to me," he explained.

A former builder of model airplanes who took his first flying lessons at 13 in old World War I planes at the former Hadley Airport in South Plainfield, Marlow was a licensed pilot when he entered the Army Air Force.

During World War II, Marlow was required to fly 35 combat missions before being rotated back to the States. Marlow, flying out of England, was shot down on his 29th mission over Germany - which happened to be the last Allied bombing run of the European War.

He and his crew escaped unscathed after making a crash landing behind U.S. lines. When a jeep came to pick them up Marlow found himself being greeted by a soldier who had grown up two blocks from him in Plainfield.

Marlow amassed about 1,000 flying hours each in B-24, B-25 and B-17 bombers. He was training for duty in the Pacific Theater when the war ended.

WATERGATE: WHAT NEXT? - III

In my last two reports, to 50 a little more constructive action Congress could take in the aftermath of the Watergate scandal would be especially as they concern the role and effect of money in political campaigns, and (11) that central to such a reform would be the substitution of "scrip" - issued by the Treasury in denominations similar to money, serially numbered, computerized, and so designed as to identify by name and address every transaction from contribution to expenditure to redemption - in place of cash or checks, in order to assure maximum accountability and disclosure and thus help restore citizen confidence in the integrity of the process by which we elect those who govern us.

In addition to my scrip plan - which, I am happy to report, is gaining growing support here on Capitol Hill - other, and related, reforms are necessary. Three such reforms, experience shows, are especially important:

(1) A limitation on the total amount which a single contributor can give to a single candidate or committee and an overall limit on total funds a candidate can raise. While the principle of a limitation is more important than the precise limit, I propose to obtain a small enough to prevent a single contributor or group of contributors from exercising a disproportionate influence on an election campaign.

(2) The requirement of an overall contribution to a single candidate through a precinct design (a) to prevent big contributions from being hidden in the guise of numerous smaller contributions to a large number of proxy party committees and (b) to strengthen the objectives of disclosure and accountability.

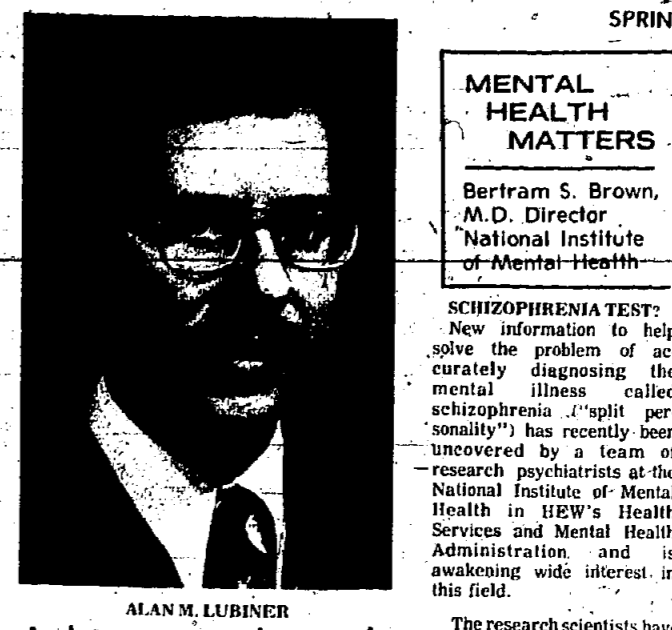

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Bertram S. Brown, M.D. Director, National Institute of Mental Health

SCHIZOPHRENIA TEST:
 New information to help solve the problem of accurately diagnosing the mental illness called schizophrenia ("split personality") has recently been uncovered by a team of research psychiatrists at the National Institute of Mental Health in BEW's Health Services and Mental Health Administration and is awakening wide interest in this field.

The research scientists have found evidence in blood platelets that may identify some persons who have schizophrenia. The scientists tested blood samples from identical twins for an enzyme called monoamine oxidase (MAO). They had previously found that this enzyme's activity was lower in schizophrenic patients than in normal persons or in patients with other psychiatric problems.

One in each set of twins studied was schizophrenic while the other had never manifested the illness. It was theorized that, if the schizophrenic twin had lowered MAO activity and the other did not, then the defect probably was genetically determined.

In the study, MAO, which is an important enzyme involved in brain and nervous system

Roadside hazards studied by Council in safety campaign



The New Jersey State Safety Council announced this week that it is undertaking a statewide program through the 3,000 members of its County Traffic Safety Committees and other organizations to identify and report for corrective action roadside hazards that could kill or injure the unwary motorist who chances to run off the road and hit them. Approximately 30 percent of the 1300 lives snuffed out annually on New Jersey roads are the result of a vehicle striking a fixed object, according to the Council, these lethal fixed objects or "bodytraps" are physical features of the roadside environment such as open end guardrails, rigid unyielding supports for traffic control devices and lights, large rocks and trees only inches from the path of speeding traffic. Debris-abundant areas, other fixed objects into which a vehicle might crash with high injury severity include un-protected utility poles, curbs, ditches, steep banks and "gorge" areas where triangular areas separating a main highway from a narrow road.

most. She works with patients in the most difficult situations, analyzing their needs and solving major problems related to their care. She also interprets the established nursing care principles for all the nurses working in her unit. Any head nurse or staff nurse can ask her to help work out a nursing difficulty. If the nurse expert needs assistance of any kind, she has access to all departments in the Clinical Center.

She may spend an afternoon in the medical library, investigating unfamiliar aspects of diseases under study. She has time to analyze current nursing procedures and devise ways of improving them. Physicians who need nursing assistance to develop new research activities can ask the nurse expert to help them "fill in" on a research project. She may be called upon to help in developing and adapting equipment for use in research projects.

For example, one nurse expert was instrumental in adapting a crib to collect urine 24 hours a day from infants and children up to 6 years old for periods of several weeks. These children have a serious disease; their bodies fail to utilize a substance called cystine. Instead, their bodies deposit it in the form of tiny crystals in their urine, bone marrow and body organs. Tests of the 24-hour urine collections help physicians diagnose this illness and determine if a child is responding to treatment. The clinical nurse expert has an opportunity to use her nursing abilities in the best way possible. Not only does she communicate about her situations and procedures—related to nursing, she also passes on to other staff members her basic nursing skills. 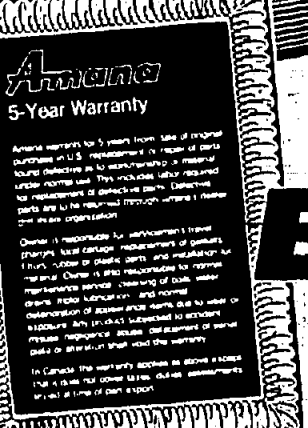

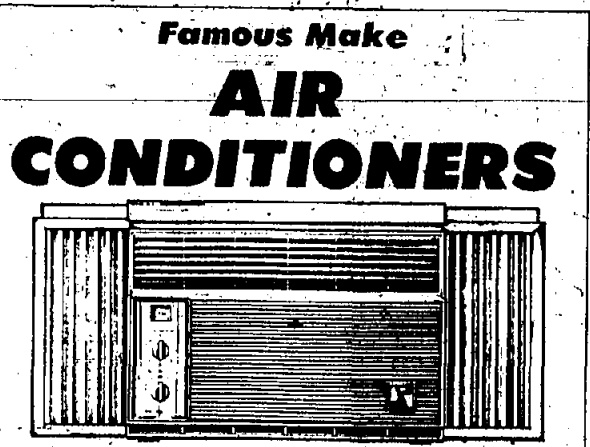

This doctor only makes 'house' calls

Professor prescribes repairs over radio

If you're suffering from "household" problems, the kind caused by cracks, floorboards, leaky basements, clogged gutters and the like, you may need a visit with the "house doctor" for a program and a prescription.

Joseph McNeill, an adjunct professor with the Rutgers University Extension Division, has been making "house calls" by means of a radio series produced by the Rutgers Office of Educational Radio and Television and aired on local stations.

A registered professional engineer and a veteran of the home inspection business, McNeill dispenses during the five-minute program advice on a host of topics, including drainage problems, insect infestation, septic systems, air conditioning and heating and plumbing.

He discusses ways of saving money on materials, tools and equipment, offers tips, techniques and methods used in home care, repair and improvement, and gives advice on how to purchase materials and services.

"The aim of the program, he says, is to convince homeowners that the trick for keeping a house in good working order is regular preventive maintenance.

Gypsy moth aerial spraying provides encouraging results

The 1973 cooperative gypsy moth aerial spray program was completed in mid-June, and early indications are that there was an excellent reduction of gypsy moths in most treated areas, according to Robert C. Fringer, chief, Bureau of Entomology, New Jersey Department of Agriculture, who directed the program this year.

Unfortunately, in some areas substantial population reduction was not achieved and moderate defoliation occurred. In most cases, the defoliation occurred in areas treated with a new short residual insecticide. Evaluations are being conducted to determine the exact reason for the apparent lack of control.

Food program nets \$1.6 million saving for N.J. facilities

The 1972-73 cooperative food program from the New Jersey Department of Agriculture indicates that during the 12-month period ending June 30, state institutions saved over \$1.6 million by using federal commodities made available by the department's food distribution program. An additional \$200,000 was saved by schools throughout the state as a result of the food processing program carried out by the department.

According to Edithworth C. Heiss, coordinator of the program, more and more emphasis is being placed on processing food before distributing it to schools and institutions. Fuller utilization results when foods are made available in processed form. In the case of some products, bulk perishability are problems when raw products are offered.

Prospects rosy for blueberries

Prospects are good for the 1973 New Jersey blueberry crop, according to Secretary of Agriculture Philip Alampi.

The New Jersey Crop Reporting Service has informed that blueberry production in the Garden State this year is expected to reach 1,245,000 12-pint trays, an increase of eight percent over the 1972 crop of 1,175,000 trays.

Average to be harvested is expected to drop slightly — down 100 acres from 1972 to 7,000 acres this year. Yield per acre is indicated at 225 trays, compared with 220 trays last year.

Light harvest of the Yonmouth variety of berries began about June 15, but has been interrupted by scattered heavy showers, and considerable spilling of berries occurred due to excessive moisture. This resulted in much of the early pickings going into cans for processing. "Surely, less humid weather would be beneficial," a spokesman for the N.J. Department of Agriculture noted.

Growers report that both bloom and set were good but that some disease problems exist. Wet weather has made it difficult to maintain a good spray program and problems have been reported with mummy berry, mildew and anthracnose.

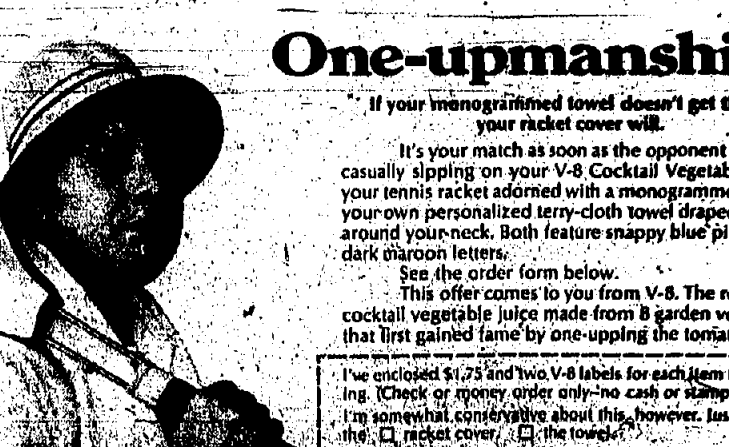

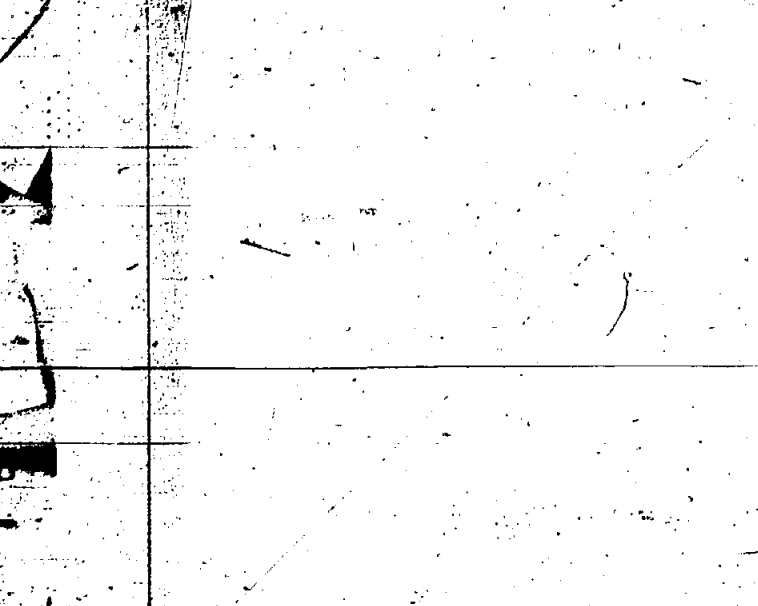
