Should the wife be less than four months pregnant, an intrauterine test called amilocentesis can be performed, with the parents' consent, and a Tay-Sachs fetus identified before birth.

Through this professional monitoring of a pregnancy, said Dr. Kushnick, if the fetus is diseased, the pregnancy can be interrupted by abortion—again with the parents' consent.
