



# Pianist, soldier, chemistry student

## Haggai Niv comes to Springfield from Israel

It's a strange and involved tale that takes a man from a concert stage in Jerusalem to a machine gunner's post in the Golan Heights to a chemistry laboratory at Rutgers University. Haggai Niv, now a resident of Springfield, is a pianist, a soldier, and a chemistry student. He is all of these things, and he is all of them at the same time.

ALTHOUGH NIV retains his interest in music-biochemistry and research in mutations, in particular, in the field of his professional life. "The minute I decided to study for my first degree in science, I knew music would not remain my career," he declared.

Most people, trained and accomplished in one field of endeavor, would be hesitant to drastically change their lifestyles, but Haggai Niv, now a resident of Springfield, did exactly that.

One of the factors that led to his rejection of a continuing professional role was his self-assessment that he wasn't "aggressively enough," especially here, where if you don't "sell yourself" you don't get anywhere. I hate that approach.

"I CAN'T REJECT" others," he stated. "My life will always be torn between science and art, but I do not see a problem. I see a beautiful combination. Creativity in science today can be very artistic. You have to have a feeling for your subject to take it forward. It is not enough to derive conclusions from data, I can compare the situation to the art of cooking, for instance. After all, everything can use a book, but not everything is a good cook."

In his new career, Niv hopes to combine both teaching and research. "I enjoy both," he explained. "Some days, I want only to be involved with my research, but I also like to share ideas. It's very easy to get into a job and spend all your time with test tubes. But I feel my place is among people. I never understand my work so well as when I get to the point where I have to explain it to others."

Niv, who has not entirely forsaken his first career, he will be featured in a concert for Israel at Union College on Dec. 8—does not see any conflict between the scientific and the creative impulses in his life.

"I think it is very difficult to be a composer these days. They are always striving for new effects. What shook an audience 100 years ago would not impress them now. But if you run after effects, you cannot develop your own style. To do that you have to divorce yourself from the world—and that is almost impossible. We are exposed to so much, influenced by so much."

Niv, who said he always considered science his hobby, and majored in science in high school, fell drawn anew to the subjects when he was exposed to such much, influenced by so much.

"The 'Guide' is divided into 10 sections covering both fundamentals and details of all phases of the program. Included are the role and responsibility of state and local government, steps a community must take to qualify, how the insurance system works, rates, and an annotated directory of flood insurance coverage. It is a loose-leaf format, it will be kept up-to-date with supplements as changes occur."

He went on to study for a master's degree in the subject, and has a teaching offer from Rutgers University.

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Editorial comment  
**TIME FOR THANKS**

The average Springfield resident today has many aspects of his life for which he or she should indeed give thanks—and somewhere near the top of the list must be the availability of Overlook Hospital as this town's community hospital.

And one of the best ways to express thanks is through support of Overlook's recent \$500,000 fund drive.

A doctor recently gave us some advice on the choice of a hospital in this area.

Use Hospital A, he said, for outstanding scientific equipment. Use Hospital B for the best view of the mountains and Hospital C for friendly and dedicated nurses. And go to Overlook for the best combination available in this area of modern science, trained doctors and nurses with enough time to think of their patients as individuals.

The people of Springfield, for the most part, seem to have followed this advice. There were 1,097 Springfield patients at Overlook in 1972, and 2,513 emergency room visits and 177 visits for free clinic care.

But being a good hospital now is not enough. The current fund drive is a first step in Overlook's master plan for continued progress. It is designed to meet the needs of an expanding population in a technological society.

Overlook, which has 542 beds and 640 bassinets, has set its sights on 640 beds by 1975 to 1980 and up to 700 beds by 1990.

In addition, the 1973 capital expense budget of \$940,912 is designed to meet many urgent needs. These include an expanded medical education program in conjunction with top medical schools, with residences in technical fields as family practice, internal medicine and pediatrics.

Also on the shopping list are not just Christmas but to save lives all year round, are such items as cardiac stress lab, chemical and X-ray equipment, anesthesia and surgical equipment and some badly needed air conditioning and building alterations.

In the field of health and hospital care, as in many others, people usually get what they pay for. We would do well to make a down payment now in the form of contributions rather than have to make up for it later in the form of inferior care.

And because all this is freely available to all patients, we have the heaviest obligation of all to express our thanks on this day in the most tangible method of all.

**Modern Israeli art featured in fair at Sha'arei Shalom**

"To Life: The 1973 Israeli Fair" to be held at Temple Sha'arei Shalom, Springfield, from Dec. 1 through 5, will exhibit and sell the works of modern Israeli artists along a street of shops which will also feature ceramics, jewelry, clothing, toys, hand-blown glass and a "super Star" supermarket selling an array of Israeli food products.

Among the artists whose works will be displayed during the fair are Zvi Ehrman who works in oils, water colors and sepias; Helene of Sadek (Helene von Moogel), who creates colorful batik which are sold at Masaki shops and are being introduced in America; Ella and Zvi Ehrman who create drawings; painters Batya Adith and Eliyahu Spinrad; Ella Ra'ayon, creator of collages, and her husband Samuel, also one of the foremost of Israeli artists.

Zvi Ehrman immigrated to Israel in 1948 and had his first exhibition there in 1950. For the past eight years he has been a prominent member of the artists colony in Sdeh. His works are exhibited throughout his own country and Europe.

Helene von Moogel came to Israel just two weeks ago. She produces brilliantly colored batik which are sold at Masaki shops and are being introduced in America.

Ella and Zvi Ehrman both came to Israel in the 1920s. Samuel is noted for his lively abstract watercolors, gouache paintings on printed Indian silk and bold semi-abstract oils. His wife, Ella, his former pupil, creates "paintings" with scissors instead of a brush. Her fabric collages are numbered among the collections of museums throughout the world.

David Tzur began his study of drawing and painting in Israel after his arrival in 1948. His work is characterized as being poetic and full of fantasy and has been extremely popular in European art shows in the last few years.

Batya Adith creates the ancient Middle East. She was born in Jaffa and is known for her translations from the past to the present in the media of oil.

The Youth Aliyah program is responsible for fostering the talents of Edward Cantillon, who came to Israel under its auspices when only 16. He is recognized as one of Israel's leading artists and portrays scenes of his adopted country in water color, gouache and line drawings in ink.

The fair will also have a special and a copiousmith creating works in pottery and studio-workshops set up for them at Temple Sha'arei Shalom during the hours the fair is open, from 10 in the morning to 10 in the evening. Gady Lior, one of Israel's most promising young cabinet artists will be performing each evening at the fair's Cafe Sabra.

### BUYING WISELY

Dear Larrie: You're expecting my first child in four months. I recall reading several months ago about the new Food and Drug Administration's regulation that would set standards for baby crib manufacturers. I want to know if the crib that I intend to buy soon would have been made to these standards set forth by the Food and Drug Administration? Can you tell me just what these new standards are?

**MOTHER-TO-BE**

Dear Mother: Manufacturers are producing baby cribs intended to comply with new Food & Drug Administration regulations. So far there is no uniform standard. Standards will stipulate maximum allowable flat space, to prevent baby from getting caught between the slats; minimum rail height, to protect baby from falling out; standardizing interior dimension of cribs to do away with improper fitting mattresses; and prohibiting the use of wood screws on parts of the crib the parents assemble themselves.

Dear Larrie: I had at one time taken diet pills prescribed by my doctor and lost 20 pounds. That was ten years ago and since then I have gained back 20 pounds. I now need to lose the 20 pounds and I want to buy diet pills I have seen advertised in a magazine. The advertising sounds so promising and easy. They even guarantee that these diet pills will produce results. Is such a source?

**SECOND TIME AROUND**

Dear Second: You can always check your Better Business Bureau. Also, the Federal Trade Commission has issued a guide for private vocational and home study schools. The guide contains restrictions on misrepresenting facilities, equipment or qualifications of instructors, and future employment opportunities for graduates. It also restricts offering a degree that hasn't been authorized by the appropriate state or national educational agency. You can obtain a copy of this guide from your Regional Federal Trade Commission Office by writing the Federal Trade Commission in Washington, D.C., 20540.

Many of the measures implemented at the other township facilities also are being done at Dayton. In addition, orders have been given to reduce by 50 percent the amount of outside air introduced into the school via the ventilation system, and to cut operating time of the boiler by one hour.

The school also has received a number of new interior decorations—decorations which are attached to light switches in classrooms, offices and storage areas. They read, "Please turn off lights when leaving."

Authorities have suggested that citizens form car pools or use bicycles on their feet to transport them from place to place as a way of saving gasoline. The idea has met with approval from many, but some Springfield residents expressed resentment that they be asked to sacrifice mobility when their postmen now use Jeeps.

It seems the local post office recently took delivery on 18 of the vehicles for use on all routes.

THERE IS an apparent advantage to their use, for in addition to making deliveries easier, the mailmen now can carry all parcel post items with the regular mail. This factor was used in defense of the Jeeps by Postmaster Owen Morfitt.

"We used to have two one-ton trucks to make Jeeps that replaced them use less gas. In fact, the 18 Jeeps together actually need less gas than did the two trucks."

On the whole, it seems township residents are responding well to the crisis situation—with concern and plans for conservation. And at least one, Dr. Baruchin, has developed an optimistic attitude about the whole thing.

In a small heavy saucepan heat 1 cup sugar until golden, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and gradually stir in 1 cup boiling water. Return to heat. Add 3 teaspoons butter or margarine and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Mix 2 tablespoons cornstarch with 2 tablespoons cold water. Stir into sugar mixture; cook until thickened, stirring well. Cool. Beat 1 egg heavy cream with 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract until stiff. Fold into cooled mixture. Serve over ice cream, fruit cake, etc. Yields 1 1/2 cups.

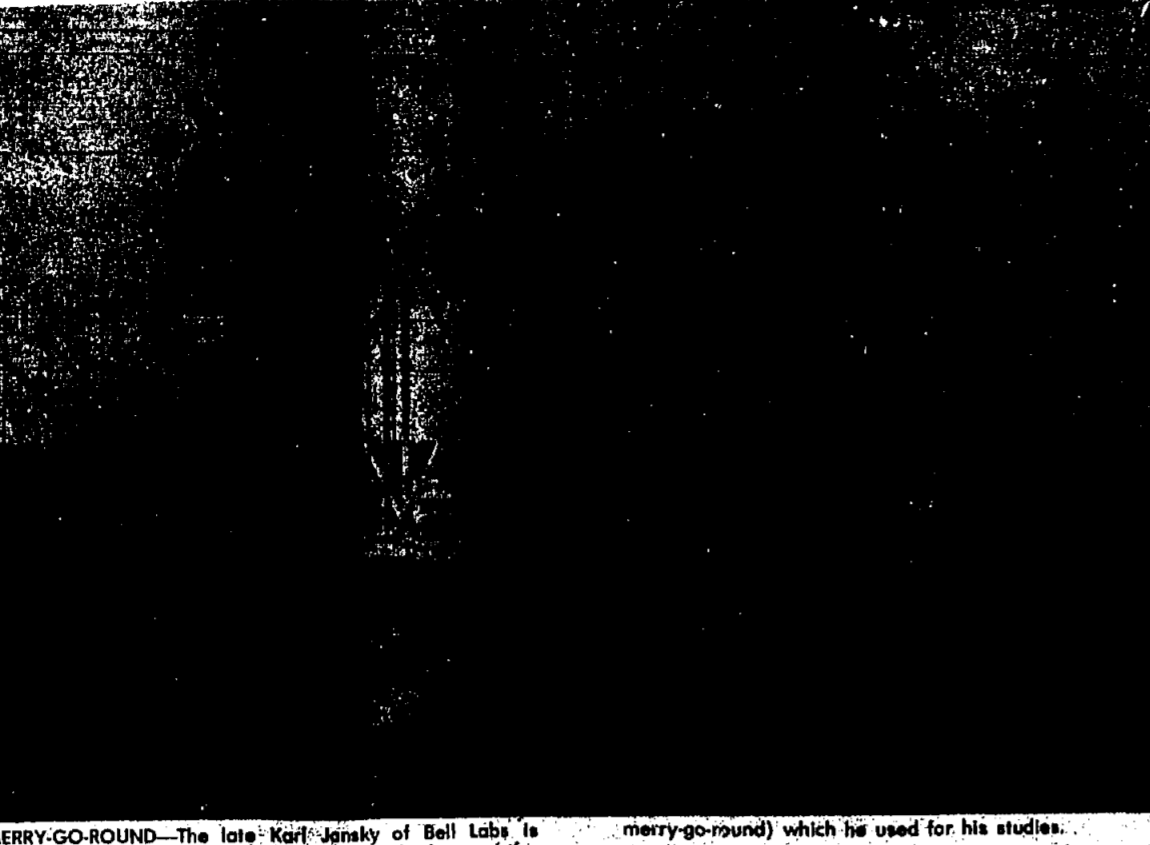

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## Rinaldo presses for Rt. 78 impact study OK

The New Jersey Department of Transportation issued its long-awaited Rt. 78 environmental impact statement this week, concluding that the highway through the Watchung Reservation and parts of Springfield, Summit, Mountaineer and Berkeley Heights will increase air pollution along the route and seriously damage the health of Lake Umbagog in the reservation.

Rinaldo said "Swift action on the environmental impact statement will enable the New Jersey Department of Transportation to conclude negotiations with the Union County Park Commission for the portion of the right-of-way through Watchung Reservation. Every minute delay means added cost and added inconvenience to motorists who would be deprived of the benefits of using this highway as an alternative to Rt. 22."

The air will be a little less breathable, the background noise a little louder and the view aesthetically displeasing when traffic finally speeds along Rt. 78, according to the environmental impact statement issued by the New Jersey Department of Transportation. Air pollution generated by Rt. 78 is predicted to exceed the eight-hour Environmental Protection Agency standard for about nine hours in 1976. However, changes in air pollution requirements for vehicle manufacturers will reduce the number of hours affected to five by 1981.
