Few declare a desire for board posts

Education last week introduced a proposed budget of \$11,490,685 for the 1974-75 (school year, representing an increase of 8.3 percent over the present figure, a board spokesman disclosed this week. The board acted after a closed executive session which followed the meeting last week at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield.

Meanwhile, the likelihood grew that Sonya Dorsky will be unopposed in her bid this winter for a seoud three-year term as a Springfield representative on the school board. With the deadline today at 4 p.m. for candidates to file petitions to run in the Feb. 5 Regional school election, no one had filed as this paper went to Mrs Dorsky had earlier announced her intention forum, and she had obtained a petition. No other petitions had been obtained by any

other candidates from Springfield, according to ewis Fredericks, assistant superintendent of schools and board secretary.

Three other seats on the Regional board will also be filled in the Feb. 5 election. Theodore White of Mountainside, named to fill a vacancy left by the retirement of Dr. Minor C. K. Jones. has amounced his plans to run for the remaining two-year portion of that term.

Two other board members have announced that they will not seek reelection. They are Manuel Dios of Clark and Edwin Little of Manuel Dios of Clark and Polarical Berkeley Heights. 

Wise homeowner can save on consumption of hot water

Are you perpetually running out of hot

water? Maybe your present water heater needs to be serviced-or replaced. But perhaps the water at a time when both clean water and energy should be conserved. How big should the water heater be? A family of two adults and two children should have a 50gallon quick-recovery heater. If there are four heater-or two 50-gallon heaters if they have a clothes washer and dishwasher. Why? Consider how much hot water we use

A tob bath needs 10 to 15 gallons, but a shower hath saves, using eight to 12 gallons. An automatic washer will use between 18 and 50 gallons. The fully-loaded dishwasher uses between eight and 16 gallons (and just the same amount if it's only half full of dishes). To handwash dishes takes 9 to 14 gallons—after

your hot water supply and save on your electric faucets. The loss is tremendous.

Don't use hot water in the clothes washer

except for white and colorfast cottons and heavily soiled clothes. All synthetic and peror cold water wash if appropriate detergents are used. (Consult labels.) Use a cooler rinso than the wash water to reduce wrinkles. If you're buying a new washer, consider machines with suds-savers, controlled partial . fill and pre-soak cycles. Besides being helpful,


