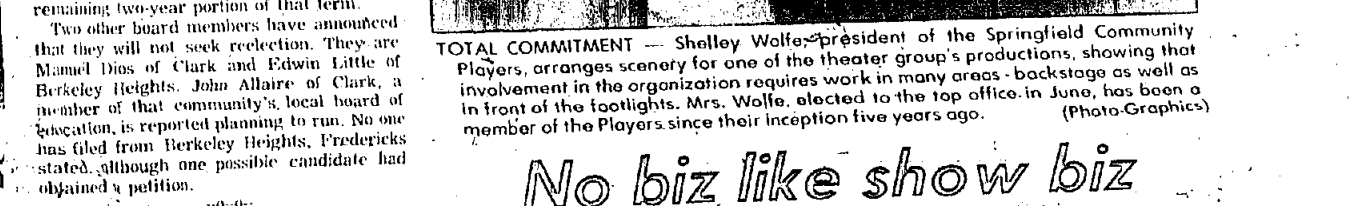


CUTTING THROUGH - Rt. 78 curves through Springfield as it approaches the Watchung Reservation near Hidden Lake.

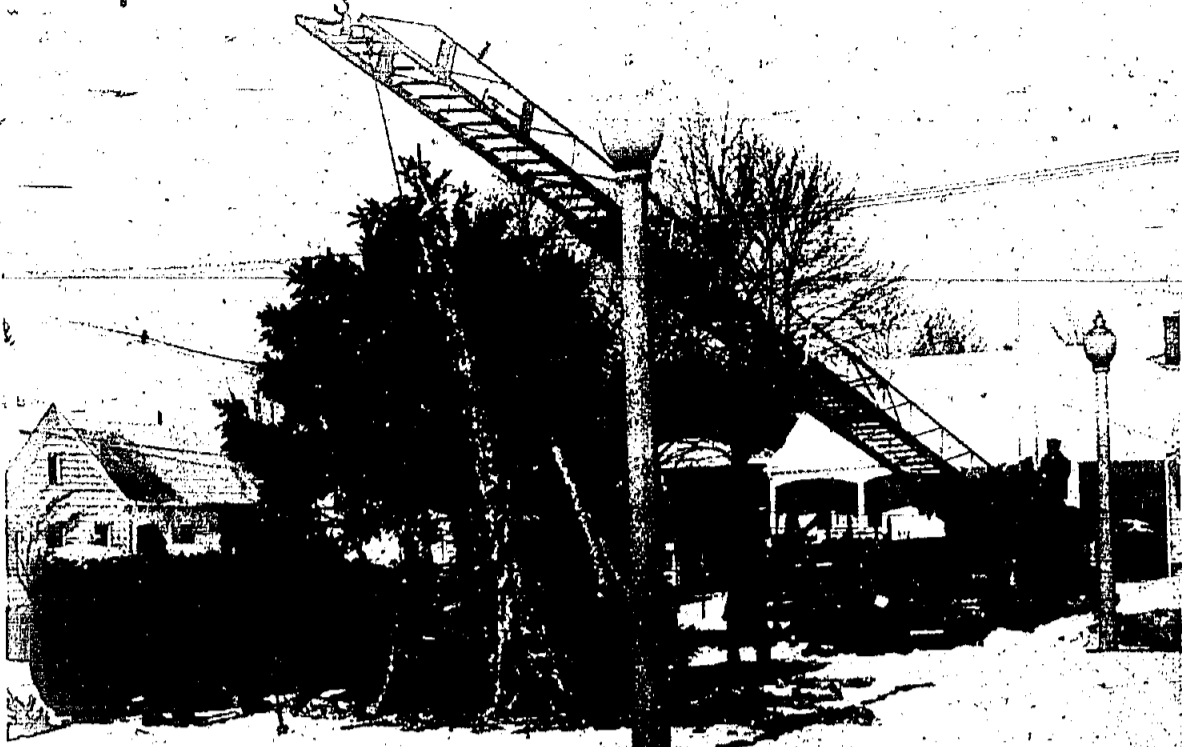
Snowfall and icy roads termed factors in 10 auto accidents on the same day

Below-freezing temperatures soon turned the roads into sheets of ice, resulting in 10 accidents in one day. Wednesday, Dec. 19, brought the series of mishaps, all of which had icy conditions cited as contributing circumstances, only one person was hurt.

Regional board extends recess

The Union County Regional High School District Christmas vacation has been extended until Monday, Jan. 7, by the Regional Board of Education in accordance to the State Board of Education's mandate to conserve fuel. The Christmas vacation for students and teachers of the Cox Livingston Regional High School, the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, the Arthur I. Johnson Regional High School and the David Brainerd Regional High School will be extended through Jan. 2, 3 and 4. The three days lost from school will be counted in the same manner as snow days. However, this reduces the total of calendar days to 10. If additional days are lost during the school year, they will have to be made up prior to June 30, unless the State Board of Education decides otherwise.

Wise homeowner can save on consumption of hot water

The following column on how to save hot water, particularly in the present energy crisis, was issued last week by Penny L. Spear, "total electric living specialist" for the Jersey Central Power and Light Co. Are you perpetually running out of hot water? Maybe your present water heater needs to be serviced—or replaced. But perhaps the problem is that your family is wasting hot water at a time when both clean water and energy should be conserved. How big should the water heater be? A family of two adults and two children should have a 50-gallon quick-recovery heater. If there are four children, the family should have an 80-gallon heater or two 50-gallon heaters if they have a clothes washer and dishwasher. Why? Consider how much hot water we use daily. A tub bath needs 20 to 30 gallons, but a shower bath saves, using eight to 12 gallons. An automatic washer uses 12 to 18 gallons, and the full-loaded dishwasher uses between eight and 10 gallons (and just the same amount if it's only half full of dishes). To handwash dishes takes 9 to 14 gallons—after each meal. Here are some tips which help you stretch your hot water supply and save on your electric bill. Fix leaky faucets fast—especially hot water faucets. The loss is tremendous. Don't use hot water in the clothes washer except for white and colorfast clothes and heavily soiled clothes. Having reserved a slightly dusty crystal ball from behind three old typewriters and four partridges in the attic parterre, we have consulted our psychic sources and come up with our news predictions for the year to come.

The May the language planning study commission will recommend that the Springfield Board of Education close all its schools and situations is terminally irreversible.

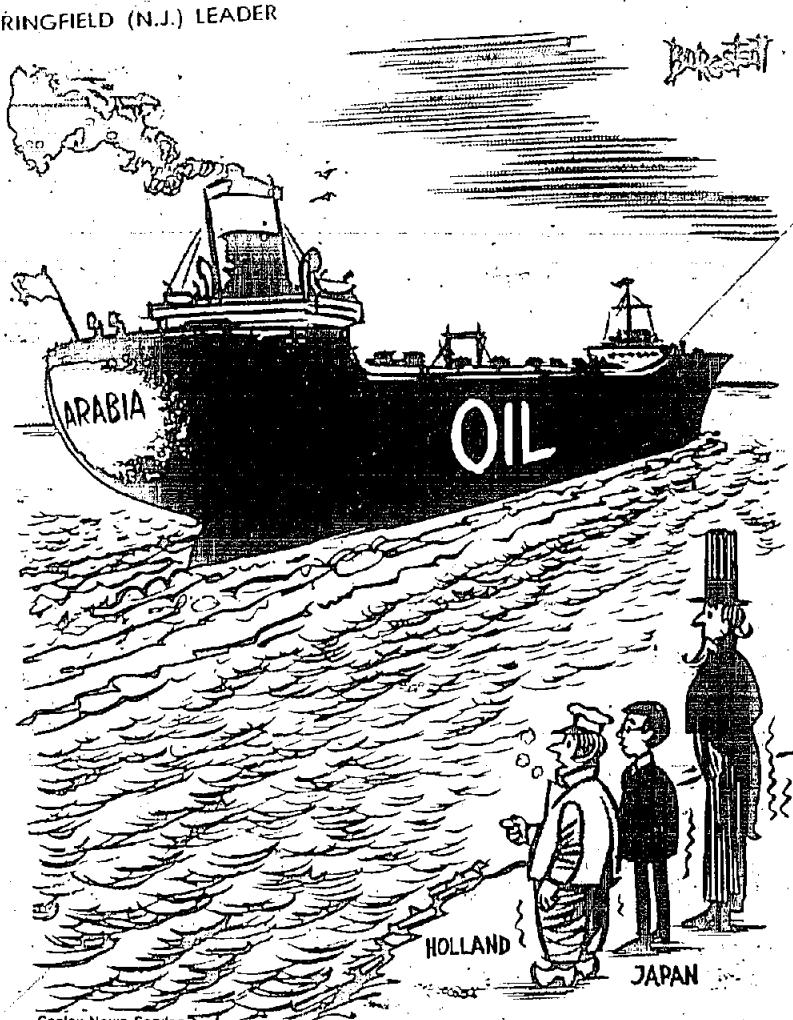
As part of a new policy designed to limit holiday travel, national energy savers will transfer the Fourth of July to August 22.

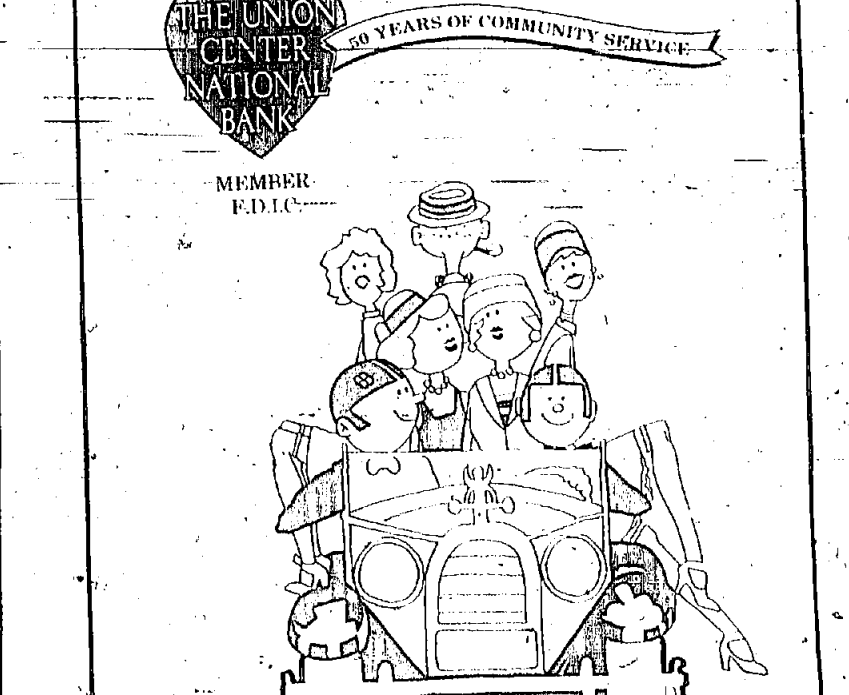

The third fiscal item would be a proposal to construct an auxiliary gymnasium at David Brearley Regional High School in Kenilworth, at a cost of \$40,000. Brearley is now the only one of the district's four high schools which does not have an auxiliary gym. There will be a public hearing on the budget Jan. 22 at Brearley.

The Springfield Board of Education administers the four local schools - James Caldwell, Edward Walton, Thomas Sandmeier and Florence Gaudinier schools - which run from kindergarten through the eighth grade. The Regional District operates four high schools - Jonathan Dayton in Springfield, David Brearley in Kenilworth, Gov. Livingston Berkeley High in and A. L. Johnson in Clark Township. Brearley High, Kenilworth, Clark and Garwood.

There are two board members each from Springfield, Berkeley Heights and Clark and one each from Mountaineer, Garwood and Kenilworth. The other board member from Springfield is Natalie Wald, board president, whose term does not expire this year.

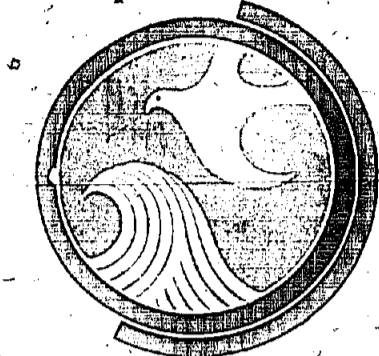

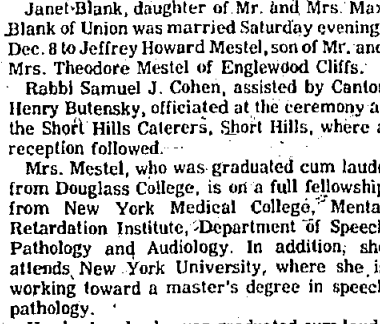

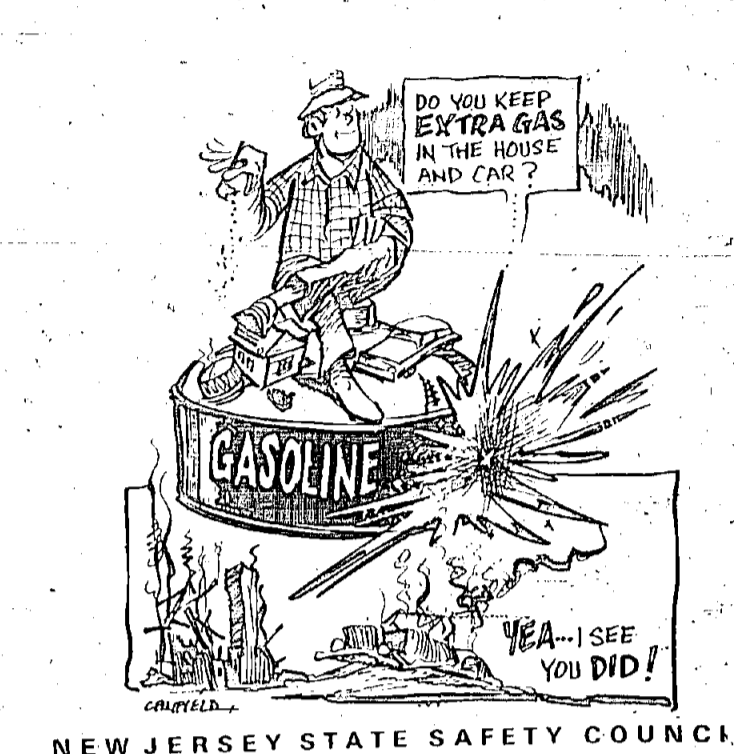

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Rinaldo supports legislation for national energy data bank

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo this week expressed support for legislation to create a national data bank on energy information.

Rinaldo said there is a need for legislation similar to that introduced earlier this month by Senators Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin and Henry Jackson of Washington which would establish a Bureau of National Energy Information within the Department of Commerce.

"We need this type of Census Bureau for energy," Rinaldo said. "Up until now, we have been working virtually in the dark. The result has been a spate of disparate and sometimes contradictory statistics."

The Union County Congressman noted that President Nixon has projected a petroleum shortfall of about three billion barrels a day, while an Interior Department industry advisory estimated the deficit at about 2.5 million barrels a day.

Rinaldo said part of the problem was an excessive dependence by governmental planners on statistics supplied by the American Petroleum Institute and the American Gas Association, energy industry spokesmen.

"We must have independent data that is accurate and reliable," he said. "The government should have the ability to verify claims made by industry spokesmen about our reserves and our energy capabilities."

Congressman Rinaldo called for swift consideration of the Nelson-Jackson bill. "Our failure to have this type of information in the past has helped put us in our present predicament," he said. "We must make sure it never happens again."

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Camptown merger with Investors gets federal board's OK

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board has issued final approval for the merger of Camptown Savings and Loan Association and Investors Savings and Loan Association, immediately consummating the agreement between the two associations.

The New Jersey Department of Banking had approved the application for merger in October.

The combined \$225 million association, operating under the Investors banner, will serve 70,000 customers in Northern New Jersey, according to Roland Levan Jr., president. It is now the fifth largest savings association in the state.

Camptown Savings, chartered in 1910, reported mid-year assets of \$66 million. Its office at 34 Union Ave., Irvington, joins the roster of Investors Savings offices in Millburn, East Orange, Union, Hillside, Short Hills and Plainfield.

One year ago, Investors Savings moved its main office in Millburn to new facilities at 215 Millburn Ave. It was founded in 1926.

Levan noted that the merger will bring benefits to both financial institutions in the area of savings and home financing services, operating economies and customer service.

TAXPAYER ACCESS TO ASSESSMENT DATA

"This year 1973 property assessments only advised the New Jersey Taxpayers Association New Jersey taxpayers wishing to learn the value placed on their property for 1973 local property tax purposes should take advantage of the opportunity to obtain first hand information on the assessed valuation of their property prior to Jan. 15, 1974."

Under the new law which takes effect on the deadline for local assessors to file their complete assessments prior to filing the assessment rolls, the assessor advises in a newspaper serving the taxing district a time and place the assessment list will be available for examination by taxpayers. If a taxpayer thinks he has missed the ad, he should contact the assessor's office to check the date and time the assessor will be holding an open session. This pre-filing meeting permits the taxpayer to discuss with the assessor the accuracy of the assessment and to correct any errors before the documents are filed.

The prediction that some municipalities may experience a lower 1973 property tax rate is based on the fact that the assessor's assessment early. The knowledgeable taxpayer, familiar with the tax rate formula—property tax levy divided by taxable valuations equals tax rate—realizes the tax levy part of the formula usually includes tax requirements of at least three governmental budgets: municipal, state and school district. An increase or decrease in taxes for any of those budgets or in the amount of taxable valuations, can affect the total tax rate on which the June tax bills are calculated.

Appeal urges halt of expenditures for South Vietnam aid

An appeal to press Congress for expenditures to meet urgent domestic needs rather than continued aid to the present military regime in South Vietnam was issued this week by a group of Union County residents, according to Mrs. Milton Zisman of Springfield, local spokesman for the group.

She declared, "During the holiday season both festivals of lights, Hanukkah and Christmas, remind us of thousands forced to live in darkness in Marshall's Thea's prisons and tiger cages in Saigon. How are our federal tax dollars being spent in the aftermath of our withdrawal from Vietnam?"

The statement charged that U. S. aid continues to South Vietnam's national police force and that the Pentagon has sent \$8.8 million to replace military equipment which seems to wear out more quickly under the one-ton replacement equipment," according to Time magazine.

Mrs. Zisman also stated that federal funds have been delayed for Highway River flood control programs in Springfield, as well as for the local senior citizens' housing project.

She added, "The war continues to rage, financed by our tax dollars. The administration obviously thinks that relief for flood conditions in our county is secondary to our support for Thieu."

"If you care about where your tax dollars are being sent, your representatives on all levels of municipal, state and county government, as well as Congressman Matthew J. Rinaldo, where they stand on these issues. Restore our federal funds to our communities. Stop sending our tax dollars to Thieu!"

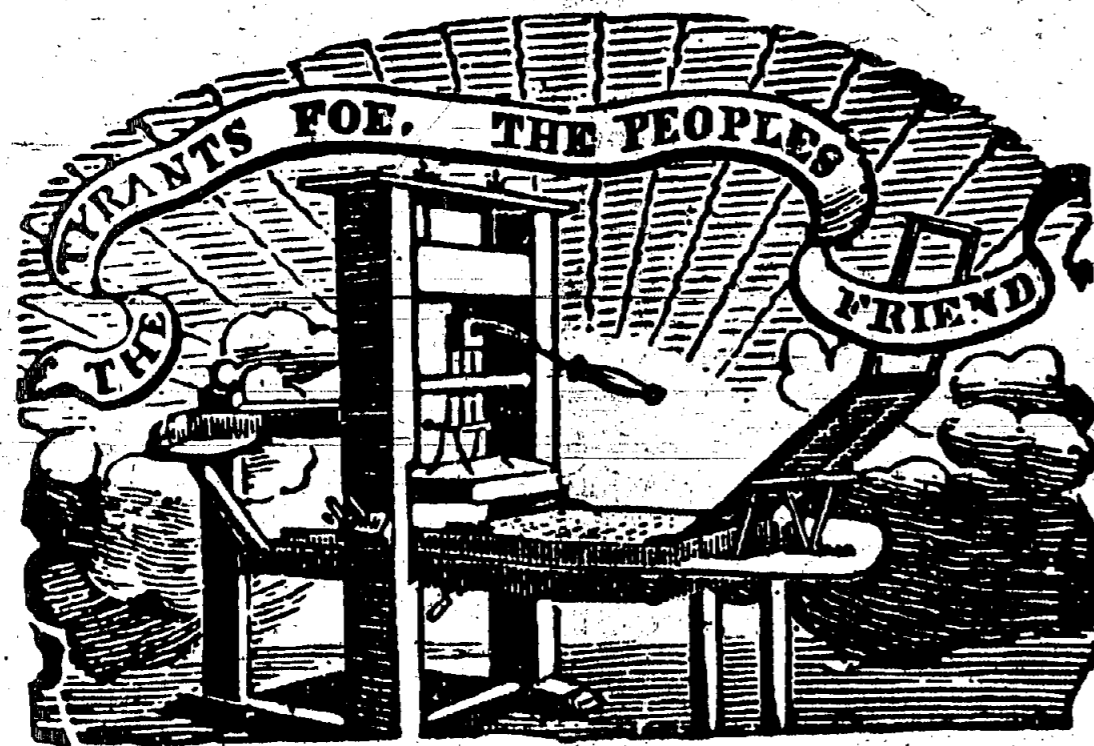

'Don't Drive Over Point Zero Five'

Motorists advised on safe blood alcohol levels

In an unprecedented action, two million licensed drivers will be advised that drinking and driving do mix—in a point.

"Don't Drive Over Point Zero Five" is the message imprinted on two million wallet cards being distributed statewide with registration renewal applications by the N. J. Division of Motor Vehicles Alcohol Control Measures Project.

Roger Surprenant, ACP coordinator, says, "The wallet cards are unique because they are the only available indexes that focus on a safe blood alcohol level—that is, point zero five. And it is highly unlikely that a driver who follows the 40 percent guidelines will ever be convicted of a drinking driving offense because at point zero five a driver is legally presumed sober."

He added, "There is no presumption of sobriety beyond .05 percent."

Although studies have proven that measurable impairment begins at a blood alcohol concentration below .05 percent, all

populations of Hunterdon and Warren counties each year. "When drivers modify their behavior—that is, when they become more conscious of their use of alcohol before getting behind the wheel—there will be significant relief from the drinking driving problem," he says.

Noting that alcohol-related crashes have an impact beyond the resulting grief and heartbreak, which cannot be measured, he reports that alcohol-related traffic deaths are a financial burden to the people of New Jersey in excess of \$15 million annually and may be as high as \$75 million, depending on whether a value is placed on life expectancy.

"As drinking drivers respond to our 'Don't Drive Over Point Zero Five' watchword and become more cognizant of its implications, we hope to see a gradual reduction of drinking driving fatalities," says Surprenant.
