'Israeli Evening' will feature Moshiko dancers, folksinger

An Israeli Evening, a program of folk and dance, film and lectures, will be presented at Seton Hall University in South Orange, N.J., at 8 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 29. Sponsored by the School of Education in conjunction with its scheduled study tour of Israel, the evening will feature Moshiko dancers, folksinger Elinor May and the Moshiko dancers. Miss May, who has performed throughout Israel and Europe, sings folk songs and ballads in both Hebrew and English, accompanying herself on the guitar. The repertoire of the Moshiko dancers includes Oriental-style dances and modern Israeli folk dances choreographed by Yomente, who is well known in Israel and Europe as an accomplished dancer, choreographer and teacher of Israeli folk dance. Sandy Hook Park conveyed by state for U.S. operation

Richard J. Sullivan, commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), and Joseph Antosca, superintendent of Gateway National Recreation Area, this week jointly announced the recent conveyance of Sandy Hook State Park to the federal government. Sandy Hook park will be the first operational unit of the Gateway project which eventually will have four other units at Jamaica Bay, Brevoort Point, Staten Island, and the Hoffman-Schwabacher Islands. Gateway will be the first major urban national recreation area in the country.

A special use permit was issued by the DEP's Bureau of Parks authorizing the National Park Service to operate, maintain and protect the property until a formal lease agreement has been arranged. It is required that legislation be introduced authorizing the conveyance of these particular state-owned lands and improvements to the federal government as part of Gateway. The formal conveyance will take place after appropriate legislative action.

Dale Engquist, area manager of the Sandy Hook unit of Gateway, said that in the first year during the initial planning and land acquisition stages, the National Park Service will operate the park in generally the same manner as New Jersey has done. Sandy Hook State Park was established in 1962 when New Jersey purchased 11,000 acres of riparian lands located immediately south of the military reservation and leased 745 acres to the Department of the Army. The state constructed two ocean bathing units and in the years since then more than 6,700,000 visitors came to the park. The area is used extensively for surf fishing, ocean bathing and nature study.

An outdoor nature center was established with an old Coast Guard station serving as headquarters for classrooms and laboratories. Thousands of students from schools and colleges utilize the facilities to gain a first-hand knowledge of the local plant and animal life and natural forces existing in a barrier beach environment.

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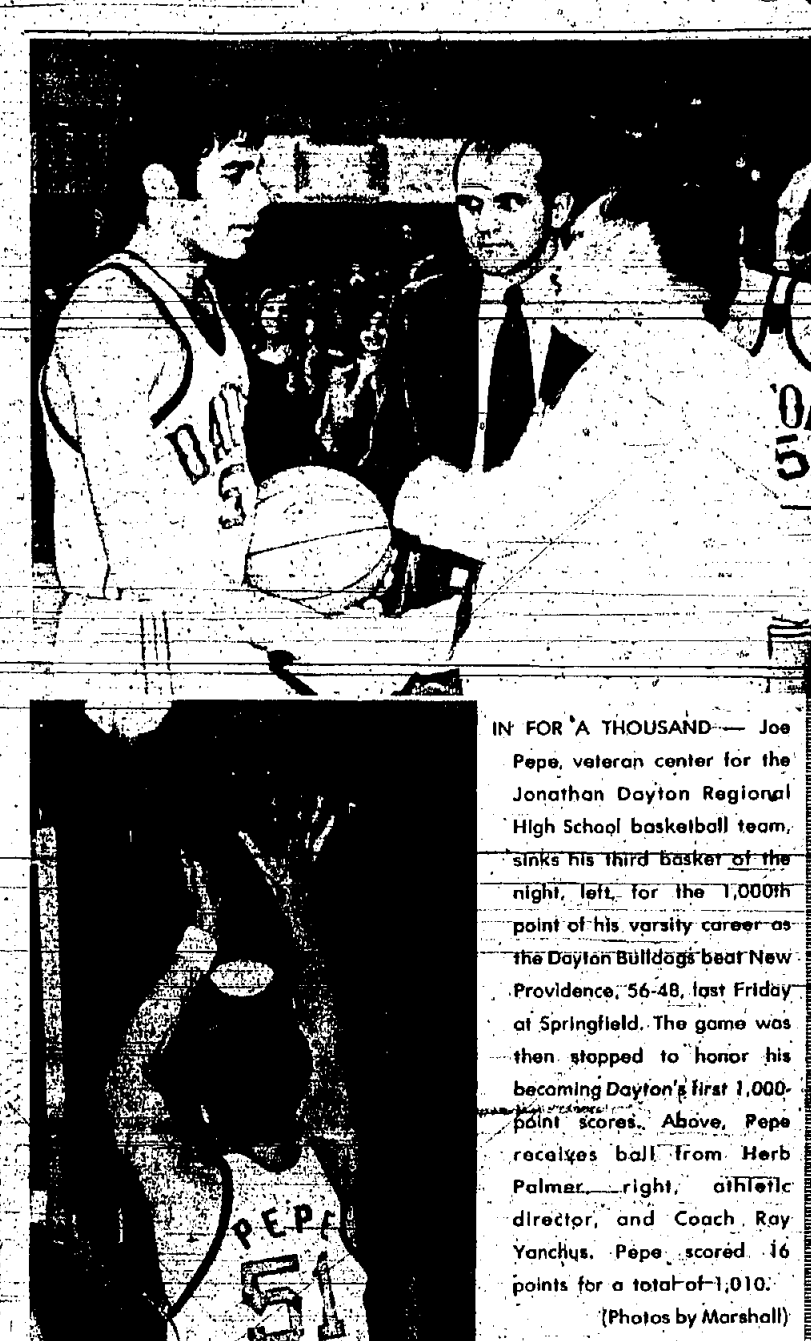

5 express their views on problems

Regional vote Tuesday, local election Feb. 13

A strongly held consensus that the Springfield school system is headed down the right track, at about the right speed, was apparent among the five candidates for three seats on the local Board of Education who spoke during a candidates' night debate Monday at the Florence Candler School. The candidates are James Adams, George Doty, Michael McIntyre, Doris Ruff and John Westerfield. Adams and McIntyre are incumbents and Mrs. Ruff is a former board member.

5 express their views on problems

Sonya Dorsky, who is opposed for a second three-year term as a Springfield member of the Regional High School District Board of Education, emphasized the importance of support for the high school budget at the Regional election this Tuesday. She commended recent improvements at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield and added high praise for the new principal, Anthony Fioraliso.

The Springfield school board election will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 13. The local board supervises four schools, running from kindergarten through the eighth grade. Monday's meeting was sponsored by the Springfield League of Women Voters and all local PTAs. Francis Moore, president of the Dayton Parent-Teacher-Student Association, opened the meeting. Rose Marie Sinnott of the Summit LVM presided.

The meeting opened with questions from the floor. Mrs. Dorsky outlined her opposition to the gym at Brunerly, saying that she had seen either specific plans or a detailed report on why the gym is necessary. She added that if the reasons were spelled out, she might be in favor, but that without facts she must oppose the plan. She added that it should be presented as a separate bonded referendum, rather than as an item to be paid for out of current income.

Mrs. Ruff was asked about her proposal that children and parents be given a choice of open or traditional methods of instruction. She said she had no idea how many pupils would choose (Continued on page 8)

Mayor Stiso calls freeholder support of Rt. 78 construction 'irresponsible'

Mayor Edward N. Stiso Jr. has termed "irresponsible" a Union County Board of Freeholders resolution urging the construction of Rt. 78 through the Watchung Reservation.

"I realize that we're not going to stop this road," Stiso said, "but I want to be absolutely certain that every precaution is taken so that the citizens of Springfield, Summit, Berkeley Heights and Mountainside are not adversely affected by the laying of this 3.2 miles of pavement."

"It is the job of the freeholders to administer the entire county and to be concerned with the well-being of all its citizens. But by unconditionally approving the proposed alignment," said the Springfield mayor, "the freeholders either ignored or gave little weight to the N.J. Department of Transportation's Draft Environmental Impact Statement."

The impact statement, which urges construction of the highway as planned, said Rt. 78 will have adverse impact in noise and air and water pollution in the area. Freeholder Walter Ulrich tried to attach an amendment to the county resolution asking the state to "replace" some of the 266 acres of land being taken from the Watchung Reservation.

"A top priority item for the Regional District is to meet the physical education needs of the David Brearley Regional High School in Kenilworth, which requires an additional gymnasium, according to Natalie Waldorf, Springfield, president of the Union County Regional High School Board of Education. She declared: "An additional gymnasium for David Brearley Regional was a priority item five years ago when the original Regional building referendum was proposed to the voters of the six communities. Unfortunately this referendum was defeated at the polls and the Regional construction program finally approved by the residents actually lacks facilities as the gymnasium for Brearley Regional."

"Springfield and Mountainside were fortunate since the additional gymnasium for the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School was included in the construction program which referendum was approved to the voters of the six communities. Unfortunately this referendum was defeated at the polls and the Regional construction program finally approved by the residents actually lacks facilities as the gymnasium for Brearley Regional."

"In addition, the instruction of handicapped children who live in the Regional District is covered in the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School. Additional gymnasium space would enhance the educational program for our physically handicapped students."

Both the school board and the special question have been endorsed by the executive board of the Jonathan Dayton P.T.S.A.

The local high school provides a good educational program. The steady trend toward improvement can best be helped by a strong vote for the Regional Board.

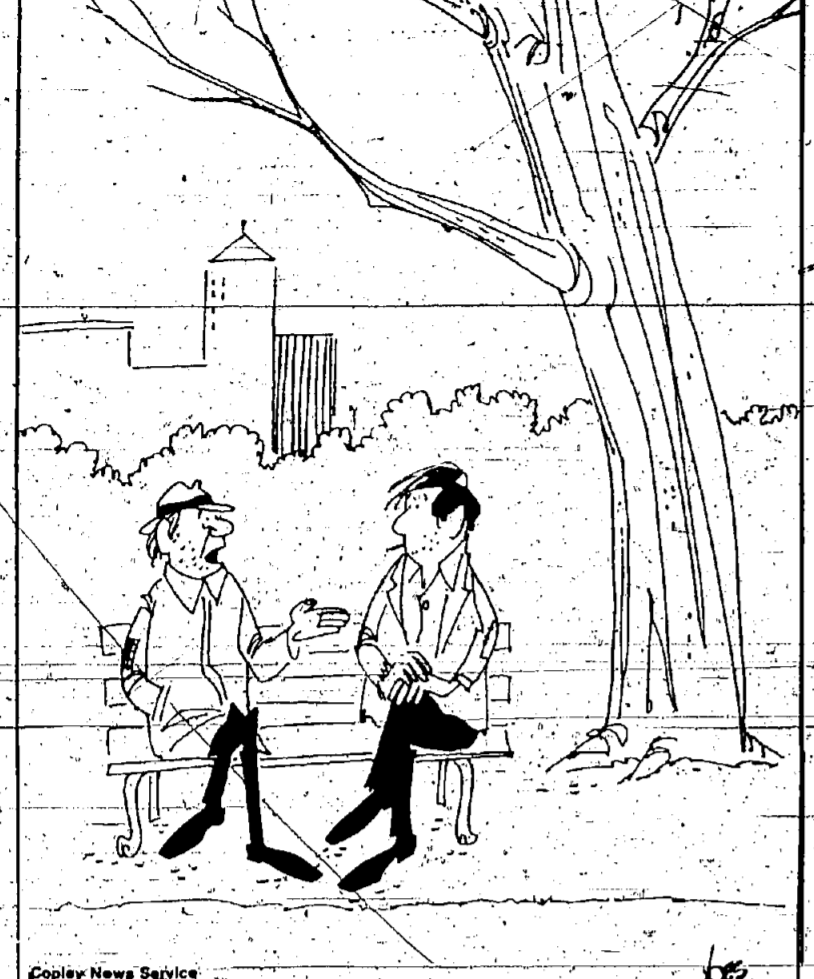

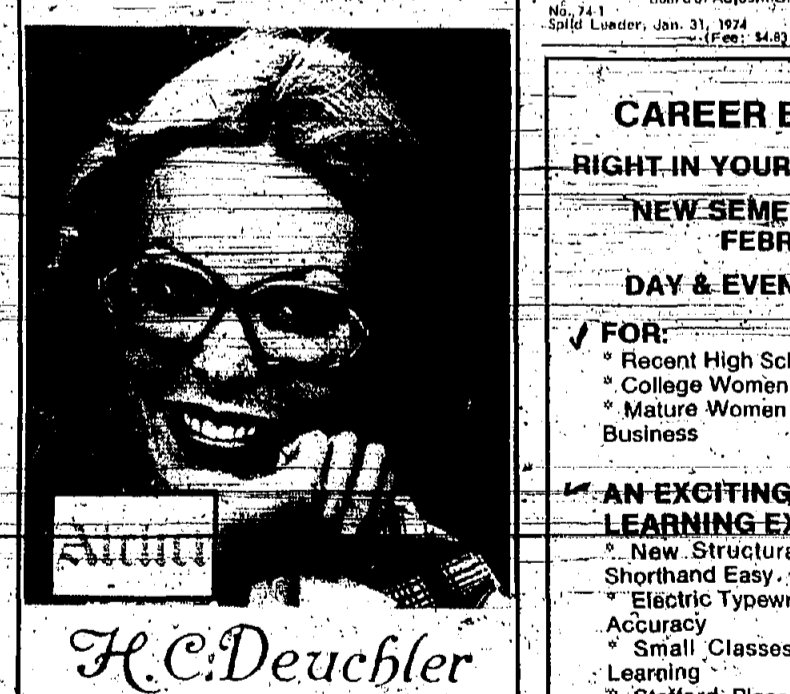

(Continued from page 1) each method if given two alternatives. Voters stated that the open classroom approach "is not one of choice. With proper discipline it can be the best for the majority of children."

IN ANSWER to another question, Dr. Westfield said that he was not participating between the board and the people. He said, "Most people come to meetings only when there is a specific controversy."

While agreeing that the changes would provide more help for less affluent districts, Westfield said that he was not participating between the board and the people.

Mr. Huff said the key factor is the quality of instruction, "and we can achieve positive results with less money, with a sound method." Calling for a choice of methods, he declared, "Public education must be all things to all people."

Task Force is reducing accidents on Parkway

The Special Task Force of unmarked State Police cars on the Garden State Parkway, is definitely having an effect on reducing accidents and adding the Parkway of dangerous drivers, State Police Captain Joseph S. Spina, commander of Troop E, New Jersey State Police, said this week.

Spina said that in 1972 there were 79 deaths in the Jersey traveled section of the Parkway from Haddonfield to Westfield. The Special Task Force came into being in June of that year. In 1973, the first full year the task force was in operation, that same area was the scene of 11 deaths—a decrease of 42 percent. "We have no doubt," Spina said, "that this is a direct result of the task force."

Commissioner Sylvester C. Smith Jr. of the New Jersey Highway Authority, which operates the Parkway, said, "The Special Task Force achieves its goals in two ways. One is, of course, the actual arrests of reckless drivers which immediately removes this individual from the road. Second, and just as important, is the fact that it acts as a deterrent as Parkway motorists know the State Police are using unmarked cars and are therefore more conscious of obeying the law."

Spina said that the task force is an individual to take liberties if he doesn't see a "reaper" behind the wheel. "If you see a car on the Parkway might contain a reaper, then there's a strong awareness of the danger of speeding and of drunk driving and consequently more adherence to the speed limit."

Spina said, "Thanks to publicity given to the force by the news media the word is out that the Task Force is in operation and consequently we have a deterrent effect. It's not a good idea to speed or drink and drive on the Garden State Parkway."

The Special Task Force utilizes a variety of types of cars from family sport vehicles to heavy-duty trucks. The cars are braked in periodically to appear as an unmarked car. Spina said, "We're not out there on a constant search for a reaper. As a matter of fact, our primary job is to let the driving driver know that the Garden State Parkway is a safe place to drive. We're proud of our ranking as the Country's safest major toll road, and the task force is helping us maintain that safety record."

Statistics released by the Parkway State Police for the Task Force since its inception are: fatal summonses for speeding, 1,399; alcohol summonses, 212; drunk driving, 212; Additionally, the Task Force, though not actively engaged in routine police work, recovered 100 stolen vehicles and made other arrests for offenses ranging from possession of narcotics to apprehension of juvenile runaways.

Spina said, "It is not impossible to visualize a day when this type of effective enforcement against reckless drivers will produce a safety record of less than one effective death per 100 million miles of vehicle travel."

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Navy Reserve unit assumes duties at N.Y. command post

Officers from the Military Sealift Command and Naval Central of Shipping Organization units of the Elizabeth-Naval Reserve Center have been assigned to operate the New York office of the Navy's Military Sealift Command on weekends.

Civilian and military ships employed by the Navy for logistics in the Atlantic and Eastern Pacific are controlled from the Brooklyn Command Center of the Military Sealift Command. Communications with these ships and the command duty officers are maintained 24 hours a day. According to Commander James V. Corr, commanding officer of Military Sealift Division 24 headquartered in the Elizabeth-Naval Reserve Center, his officers are thoroughly prepared for their duties as a result of their unit training program.

Under a new Navy policy providing for reservists to work part-time for active Navy units on purely military duties which do not conflict with civilian employment and which provide training for mobilization, manpower-short naval activities have been able to acquire experienced officers and men to augment their active duty personnel.

The members of Naval Central of Shipping, headquartered in Division 24, also assigned to the Elizabeth-Naval Reserve Center, received their briefing for Military Sealift Command duty officers on Jan. 29. They will be assigned to 20 officers to the 20 vessels already being supplied by the center to the M.S.C. Headquarters. These officers are primarily responsible for the organization and operation of merchant ship convoys. They will add their extensive background in naval operations to the command and control of the Navy's logistics fleet.

Actually, said Commander Lee Clark, USN(R), "It is just like running a shipping line. The duty officers will be dealing with emergency situations since most of the routine business is handled during the week. Our officer group is ideally suited for this because their training is partly concerned with these same emergency situations when they occur in convoy situations."

As a result of these increased responsibilities and need for reserve manpower, both of the Elizabeth divisions expect to add both officers and enlisted personnel in the near future. Applications by interested and qualified junior officers and enlisted personnel are being sought by both units.

Williams bill gives endangered animal federal protection

U.S. Senator Harrison A. Williams, Jr. (D-NJ) said this week a newly-enacted federal law which he sponsored offers "new hope" for protection and preservation of animals threatened with extinction.

Williams, in a report to readers of New Jersey weekly newspapers, said he was "very pleased and gratified" that the Endangered Species bill which he introduced in the Senate early last year is now law. The measure was given final approval near the end of the Congressional session last month, and has since been signed into law by the President.

"This law makes it a federal crime, for the first time, to kill endangered or threatened species of wildlife," Williams explained. "Although previous law required the Secretary of the Interior to maintain lists of fish and wildlife which are endangered, there was no provision for federal enforcement authority. Under the new law, however, species listed as endangered or threatened with extinction will be specifically protected."

Currently, Williams noted, 109 species and subspecies are designated as endangered in the United States; the worldwide total is around 1,000.

"Every living thing has its unique role in the ecosystem and whenever the delicate balance of nature is disturbed, the entire system suffers," Williams said. "It is time that we took meaningful steps to insure that we no longer allow the eradication from our environment of irreplaceable forms of life."

The new law also directs the Smithsonian Institution to conduct a study to determine what forms of plant life may be endangered and what steps should be taken to safeguard them.

Chamber sets up Trenton hotline

An information service covering state governmental developments of interest to business and industry has been established by the New Jersey State Chamber of Commerce.

"Trenton Hotline," State Chamber president Donald H. Scott said, will be provided by telephone from the chamber's governmental relations office in Trenton.

Chamber members who dial a special number will hear a recorded report highlighting the latest legislative session. Listings of bills affecting business that are slated for legislative action, bills that have been signed or vetoed by the governor, bills that will affect business—upcoming administrative regulatory and legislative public hearings, etc., Scott explained.

He said the new service has been established to provide Chamber members with fast news on state governmental developments. "For example, the digest of actions of business interest will be on the 'hotline' a few minutes after the conclusion of each legislative session."

Minimum retail milk prices in New Jersey will rise one cent a quart tomorrow, according to Woodson W. Moffett Jr., director, Division of Dairy Industry, New Jersey Department of Agriculture.

The new prices will be 27 1/2 cents a quart, 70 cents a half gallon, and \$1.34 a gallon.

"The higher prices continue to reflect increased prices to dairy farmers caused by exceedingly high feed costs and sharply reduced production of milk on farms," Moffett said.

State adds pollution test to MV inspection list

Chapter 15 of the New Jersey Air Pollution Control Code, which requires all registered vehicles subject to inspection by the Division of Motor Vehicles to comply with emission standards on carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons, becomes effective tomorrow.

All vehicles tested at New Jersey's 88 state-operated inspection lanes will be required to comply. By keeping vehicles in good condition, every owner will have a part in helping clean the air, save precious gasoline and enjoy better vehicle performance.

New Jersey has the highest motor vehicle and road density in the nation and cars, buses and trucks combined are the greatest source of air pollution. The state inspection system is expected, through the exhaust tests, to result in a substantial reduction in emissions.

The program will have its greatest effect in the downtown congested areas of towns and cities where it is expected that up to 25 percent of the carbon monoxide will be removed.

The Bureau of Air Pollution Control in the Department of Environmental Protection estimates that almost 90 percent of cars will pass inspection for pollution. The bureau recommends tune-ups for greater assurance in passing.

No add-on devices will be required. Bureau personnel have noted that many people have the erroneous belief that they will have to buy some kind of anti-pollution device and install it on their cars. That is not the case. The 1966 law is based on the principle that proper maintenance of the vehicle will keep exhaust emissions down to a reasonable level, and the regulation reflects this principle.

William A. Munroe, chief of the bureau, said "There is a real energy deficiency that for years to come will affect the way we live. We will just have to face up to it. Two ways to help are to drive fewer miles and make sure that every mile we travel down the road we are making maximum use of the fuel in our gas tanks. It's wasteful and expensive for any of us to drive a trail of unburned gasoline behind us everywhere we go. We can avoid this by maintaining our cars in efficient operating condition. The hydrocarbon test at the inspection station is a reality measuring wasted fuel passing out the tailpipe. Reducing this pollutant will result in a more efficiently operated engine."

The inspection station exhaust test takes only 30 seconds.

The State Clean Air Council has endorsed the beginning of mandatory pollution inspection without further delay.

The bureau's detailed information indicates that there are at present enough service stations, new car dealers and diagnostic facilities with state-approved testing equipment to handle the testing and maintenance work needed to bring into compliance practically all the cars that fail the test. Of the 8,000 such facilities in New Jersey, 875 have the approved equipment. Munroe said if every inspected vehicle at one of these stations for maintenance, the workload on each of these stations would be less than two tune-ups per day. He pointed out that some cars are virtually beyond repair and shouldn't be on the highway anyway—these cars will usually be rejected for smog emissions as they have been in the past.

Examiners of the Division of Motor Vehicles will hand out lists of repair facilities having approved testers. The lists will include the name, address and telephone number of the facilities to enable motorists to shop around if they wish. All 875 stations have been supplied with posters to put in their windows with the department's emblem to bring over a wave in a circle signifying the earth to help motorists find stations with approved equipment.

According to the bureau, most reliable stations can accomplish the engine tune-up that's necessary in most cases. A motorist who has just paid for a thorough inspection and tune-up is entitled to effective service. The exhaust test he will receive at the inspection station when he returns will, in effect, verify the effectiveness of the vehicle repair job he has gotten. If his car fails "re-inspection" and the driver gets satisfaction from his service station, he may invoke the consumer protection laws of the state.

Munroe said, "A fact little known by our citizens is that effective training programs in servicing vehicles for pollution has been underway for nearly a year. The Department of Education, in cooperation with gasoline retailers and instrument companies, has conducted training courses for some 4,000 mechanics. This program, in cooperation with this department, will be expanded substantially in the coming months."

"Atlantic Hitchfield (ARCO) has offered free pollution testing to a significant percentage of its New Jersey stations for almost a year and has trained its mechanics for this service. For months, EXXON has trained over 250 mechanics all over the state in a program designed especially for its New Jersey stations and personnel."

Over four million cars have been tested for pollution in the inspection lanes during the past year. Data secured on these cars from the Division of Motor Vehicles and recorded and analyzed by the Department of Environmental Protection show that between 85 and 90 percent of all cars can be expected to pass the pollution test.

New Jersey is the only state in the country with state-operated safety inspection stations and the first state to require the pollution test on all registered motor vehicles. These measures are designed to provide cleaner air for the citizens of New Jersey.

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Jersey provide that 1967 and earlier model vehicles should emit not more than ten percent carbon monoxide and 1600 parts per million (ppm) of hydrocarbons. For 1968 and 1969 vehicles, eight percent carbon monoxide and 800 ppm hydrocarbons, and 1970 through 1974, six percent carbon monoxide and 600 ppm hydrocarbons.

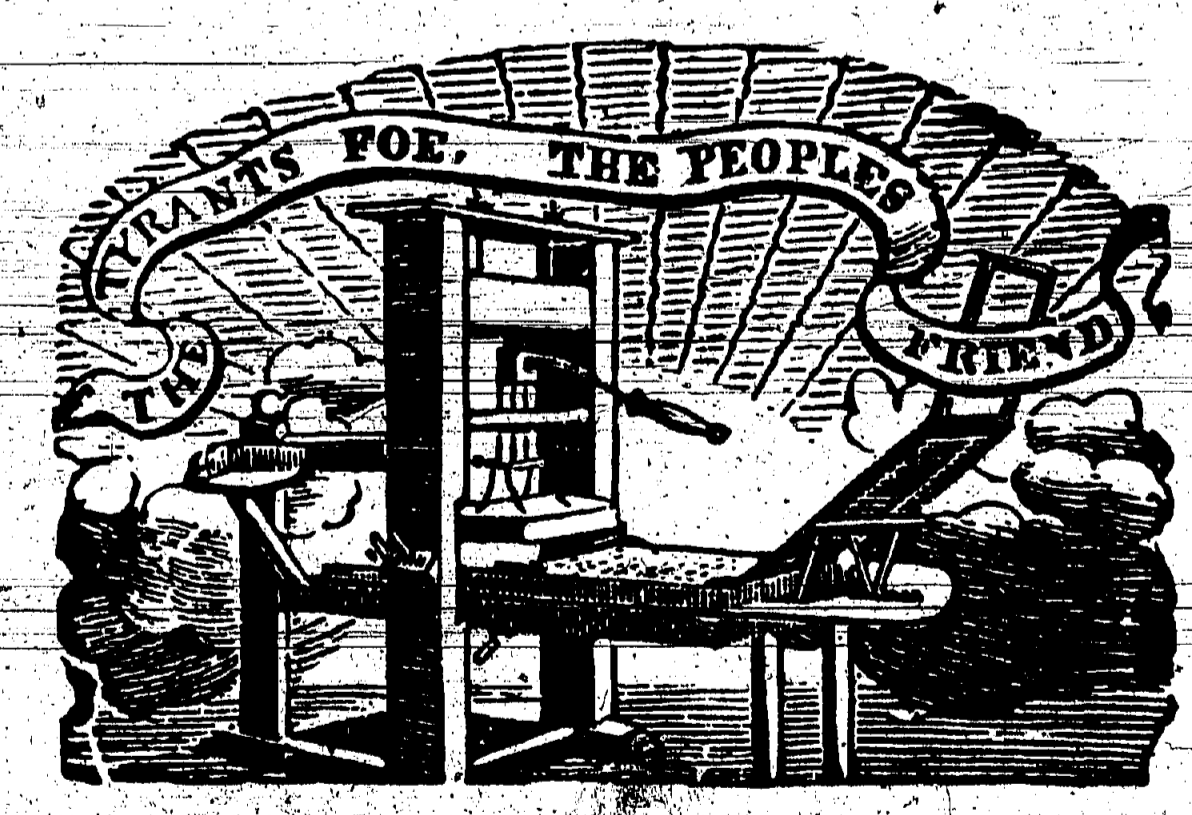

Drug abuse study shows treatment is helping addicts

An extensive year-long study of treatment programs for more than 1,800 users of hard drugs in New Jersey has concluded that the programs are having a measurable effect in reducing drug-related crime.

The Drug Abuse Treatment Information Project (DATIP) survey is believed to be the most comprehensive of its type ever made into large scale treatment of drug abuse.

The survey showed that both treatment methods were effective with younger clients but that neither was particularly effective with clients 27 or older.

Nash said the survey showed that 83 percent of the methadone clients and 57 percent of the drug free clients were arrested after beginning treatment.

Nash said the survey also showed that the individual characteristics of staff members were a key in the effectiveness of the drug free programs but not of the methadone programs.
