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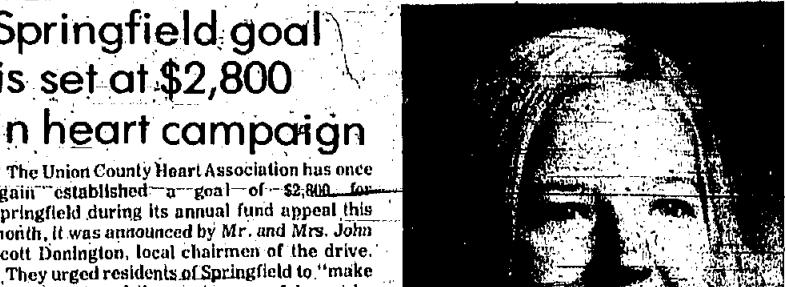
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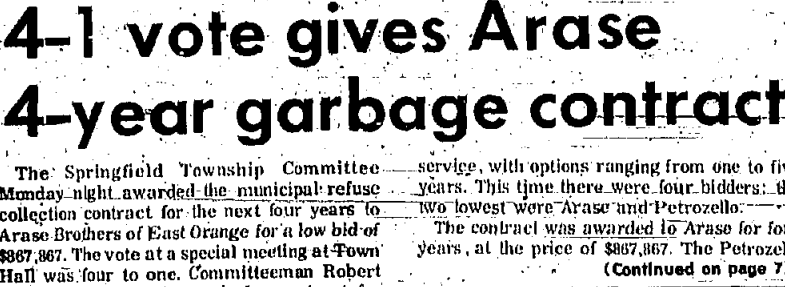

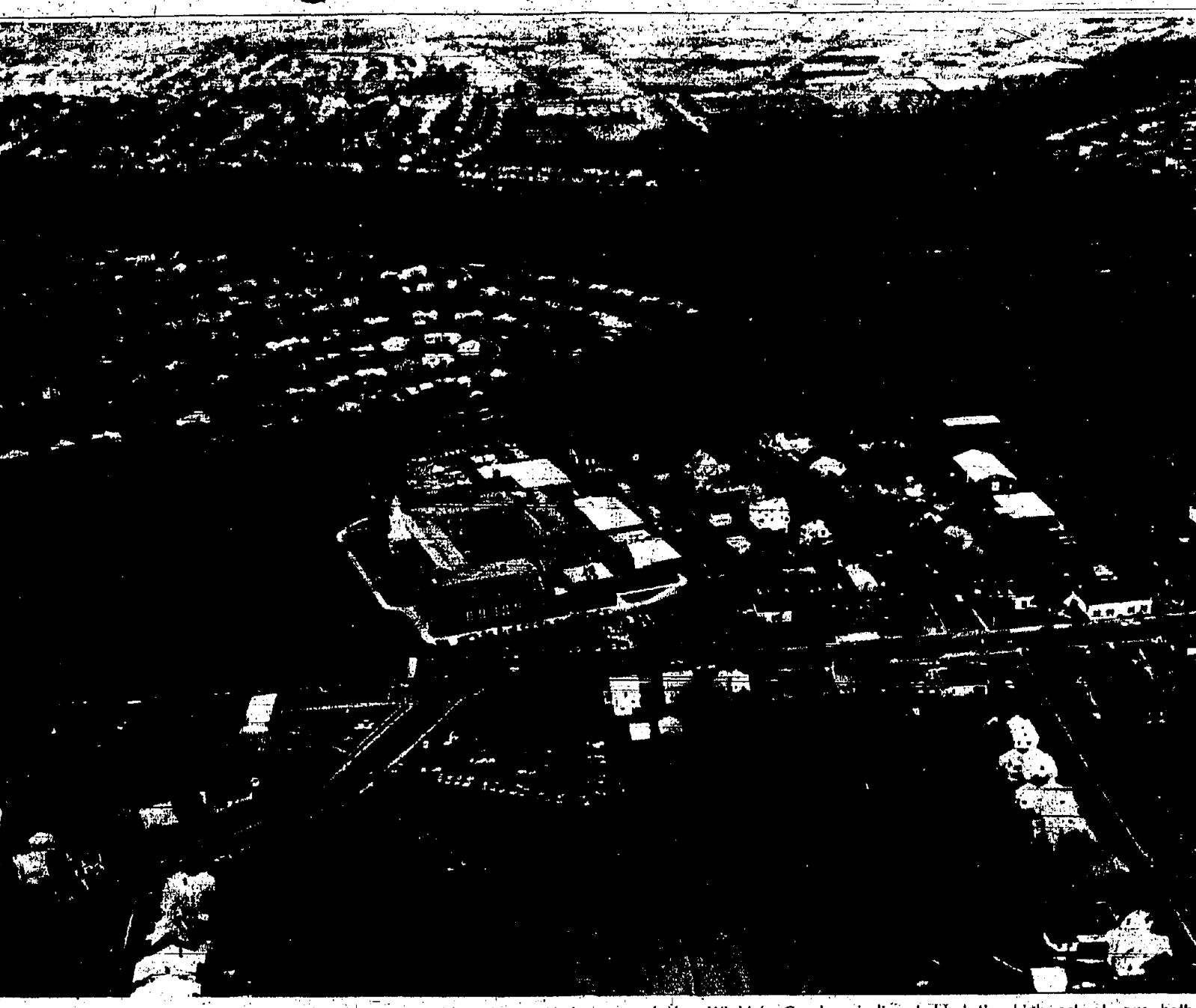

Carol A. Stefany has been named Junior Dayton Regional High School's 1973-74 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow.

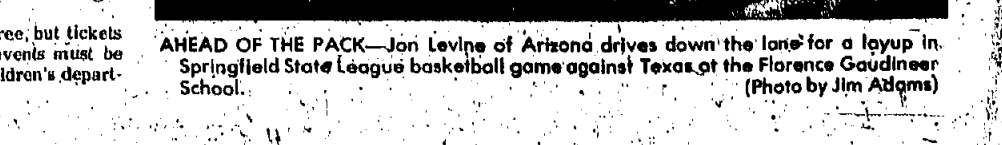

Editorial comment ON PRIDE, AND VOTING

The voters who take such pride in the development of this community have an obligation to manifest their satisfaction in Wednesday's Springfield Board of Education election by supporting the school board budget which calls for some \$2.5 million to be raised by local taxes.

We were proud, too, at last week's candidates might debate to view the high level of candidates and to note that no one candidate or listener expressed serious dissatisfaction with the budget or with the quality of education provided in the four local schools, running through the eighth grade.

There were some differences of opinion, of course. But there was an exciting abundance of pride in the outstanding accomplishments of our schools — and willingness to pay the bills which have made Springfield a light-house district, emulated throughout the state.

Several years ago, Wednesday, in addition to giving their approval (hopefully) for the budget, will choose three of five candidates for three-year terms on the Board of Education.

Our first impression is that there are no warring or dangerous candidates. All five have indicated strongly their commitment to the best in education that can be provided for our children.

Still, we do feel an obligation to outline our preferences, and we endorse James Adams, Michael McIntyre and Doris Ruff.

Adams and McIntyre are incumbents, and they have stated that the voters should judge them on their records. We agree, with the added comment that both records clearly merit reelection.

Profile -- John Westerfield

John Westerfield is something very rare on the local scene — a native of Springfield and a graduate of the local school system now running for membership on the Board of Education.

On the basis of his own experience and speaking as a parent and as a man long involved with working with and for youngsters, he commented, "Ours is one of the best school systems in the state, one which is constantly improving itself."

"I want to be on the board to see that the programs we have set up with a recent years are continued. I have had some contacts with the superintendent of schools, Dr. Fred Burman, and that's not done a great job. I am deeply happy that he is going to retire. And I feel that the entire present board has done a good job — but none."

Westerfield's involvement with the people of Springfield and particularly the young people, is a deep one. He has coached Little League baseball for five years and served on the First Aid Squad for three years. For the past three years, Westerfield has taken a week of his vacation to serve as a change teacher for the People-to-People outdoor education program of the Florence Gaudinier School.

He is also founder and advisor of Explorers-Troop 290, a group of 18 boys and girls aged 12 to 18 interested in citizen band radio operation. Westerfield also has been active in the local black 4-H in the whole troop — my own son.

Looking back at a recent major controversy in the local schools, Westerfield praised the change in districting which merged the old Woodland and the old Sandmeier schools into a single district, on both educational and racial grounds.

"There was no racism in the school system particularly following the redistricting of these two schools. There was some problem with the younger in the older grades, at the Gaudinier School, but those should clear up as the boys and girls get used to the new situation and to re-districting."

Monsters, ogres, dragons enlivened children's books

"Blood and thunder on the front pages and on the TV news. It's tough to read a man to the children's books department. In search of somebody who is 'living happily ever after.' From what I can tell, an entirely new and milder kind of literature is being written for children these days."

Our parents didn't play around, kiddie. They ran you through with a broadsword, buried you alive with the treasure of a secret island. It was pretty gory material, and gave us something to think about in bed at night. "When can you get to bed?" the child psychologists who said all this was "bad for children." They said such things were "righting the daylight out of us and we would grow up sane."

I didn't care if I grew up neurotic. I wanted to be scared. They even took some of our old stories and began "rewriting them." They toned down "Treasure Island" and put that "more appropriate" for school in the morning.

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Parkway accents thrift Survey shows savings in gas

The New Jersey Highway Authority says Garden State Parkway commuters can "super-savings on the nation's safest superhighway."

In other words, you can save gasoline and time on the Parkway in the current energy crisis—and avoid a lot of intersections in the bargain.

For example, the figures show that on a round trip from Montvale to Paramus, the average driver has weekly savings of 4.8 gallons of gasoline and 3 hours and 10 minutes in time.

Between Metawan and Hillside, the weekly savings are 4 gallons plus 4 hours and 50 minutes while avoiding 22 intersections.

From Manasquan to Woodbridge and return, the savings equal 3 gallons of gasoline and 3 hours and 40 minutes—without having to contend with 24 intersections.

From the Oranges to Passaic and return, the motorists save 2 gallons and 2 hours and 45 minutes while missing 22 intersections.

The counts from the Oranges to Paterson are 2.5 gallons, 4 hours and 10 minutes, plus 20 intersections per week.

The pamphlet notes that the comparisons were made by driving from point to point using the Parkway and the best available alternate route.

The Garden State Parkway, it says, "is the main north-south commuter road connecting the major suburbs within the State of New Jersey."

"As there is no alternate means of mass transportation for the parkway, more than 1 million cars travel through State highways adjoining the Parkway, many cities must commute by automobile.

Voluntary testing of the parkway, through State inspection show that between 85 percent and 95 percent of cars "do not" pass the test.

The message to commuters notes that "wasteful use of the parkway is the worst enemy of the parkway in the United States."

Among other advantages in Parkway travel, the pamphlet states: "Parkway patrons have the tale and to emphasize the difference between the masks women 'choose to wear' and those they are 'forced to wear'."

Octane of gas, car age factors in emission tests

If problems with getting cars have your mind here is another that may prove to be more time-consuming and costly. According to a new inspection officer at the Union Inspection Station on Ht. 22, a later octane fuel gives off higher emissions and therefore may cause more cars to fail the emissions testing, that went into effect on Friday.

The test, which is administered to every vehicle that goes through inspection except diesel vehicles and motorcycles, is broken down into three parts. A car can fail for carbon monoxide emissions, hydrocarbon emission or visible smoke. According to the supervisor at the station, Frank Kiphar, "cars failing for carbon monoxide emissions go to the list."

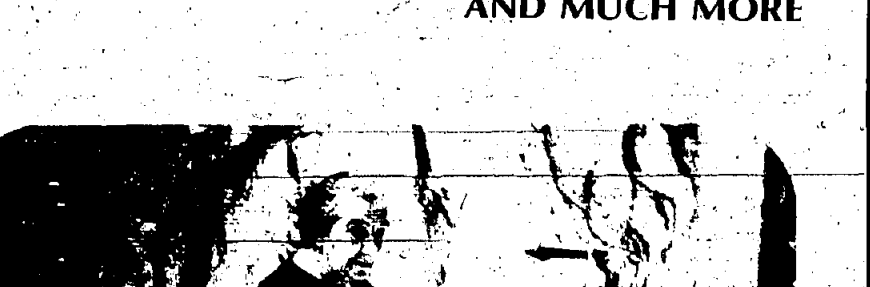
