Computer at Beth Israel helps prescribe drugs

The day is not far off when computers may prescribe medication a patient will receive during a hospital stay. The computer is already helping physicians at Newark Beth Israel Medical Center choose the most effective antibiotic to combat infections. This is made possible by computerized "microbiology" reporting systems that provide physicians, pharmacists and laboratory personnel.

The entire process is made possible by computerized "microbiology" reporting systems that provide physicians, pharmacists and laboratory personnel.

Incidence reports for different areas of the medical center are also used in the infection surveillance system and members of the infectious disease committee also are capable for investigating any problem areas. Use of the most recent incidence and sensitivity figures by laboratory personnel also serves as a form of quality control. With current infection trends fresh in their minds, technicians are more alert to antibiotic-resistant strains of bacteria and for possible testing errors.

"It doesn't look right and compare with the computer data," states Dr. Bolano, "the technician repeats the procedure. This guards against human error and makes any doubts he may have about a new resistant strain of bacteria." Control in the laboratory insures more accurate test results for use by the physician in diagnosis and treatment of patients. The entire process makes the laboratory more useful to the patient, the physician and the medical center as a whole.

Computerized microbiology reporting will provide physicians and laboratory personnel with a new vantage point from which to view certain bacterial infections. The percentage of organisms resistant to certain antibiotics may vary widely with time and place so it is tremendously useful to the physician to have available current local susceptibility patterns.

The patient benefits from computerized microbiology reporting since his health and recovery from infection depend for a great part on the effectiveness of the chemotherapy administered. Dr. Bolano notes the reporting system acts as an early warning system by indicating infection trends before they become serious, enabling physicians and staff to "nip in the bud" any potential epidemic. Agreements reached with police, firemen

Money—municipal and federal—was the key topic at Tuesday night's meeting of the Springfield Township Committee, as the governing body introduced its 1974 budget and engaged in lengthy discussion of the citizens housing project, the progress of which has been stalled by a freeze on Title 238 funds.

The 1974 budget, introduced by Councilmember Norman Hunter and given unanimous approval by the Committee, totals \$2,064,526, representing a \$107,225 (5.2 percent) increase over the 1973 figure of \$2,007,103. The amount to be raised by taxes has risen \$185,096 from \$1,669,096 to \$1,854,192.

During the session, Councilmember Robert Wetlock reported negotiations had been completed with the Local Patrolmen's Benevolent Association and the Firemen's Mutual Benefit Association and the township attorney will draw up the new contracts. The proposed budget of \$2,064,526, appropriate for police salaries, a \$255,000 total for firemen's salaries. The figures represent a 2.5 percent increase over the 1973 proposals, or roughly half of the entire increase in the total budget.

A copy of the budget statement will be published in the Leader on Feb. 26. A preliminary public hearing on the budget will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, March 2, at the final public hearing coming at the next Committee session, Tuesday, March 12.

APPROXIMATELY 125 persons, the majority of them senior citizens, packed the meeting room in Town Hall for Tuesday's municipal session. Most apparently were in attendance to back the senior citizens Corporation regarding the much-delayed apartment project.

Mrs. Carmichael argued that since the housing committee has incorporated, township citizens who wished to make an appointment to discuss their concerns with the township clerk. She stated that the group "they have an appointment to discuss their concerns with the township clerk."

Regional school board names Vitale over Mrs. Waldt as 1974 president

Charles Vitale of Kenilworth was elected president of the Board of Education for the Union County Regional High School District by a 5 to 4 margin in a closed ballot taken at the board's organizational meeting Monday night at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield.

Vitale was named over Natalie Waldt of Springfield, who served as president of the board the past two years. Lewis Frederick, board secretary, who took over the chair after Stephen Marek of Clark mounted Vitale and Theodore White of Mountaineer nominated Mrs. Waldt.

John (Olin) Garwood, vice-president, also by a 5-4 margin, over White. Garwood was nominated by Vitale, who was nominated by Marek.

Sonya Dorsky of Springfield asked that the board again consider forming voluntary advisory councils to determine school goals. Mrs. Dorsky said the board should give some thought to the idea of forming voluntary committees because of the lack of interest shown in the board's attempt to form the group by means of a random sampling, which had been tried earlier.

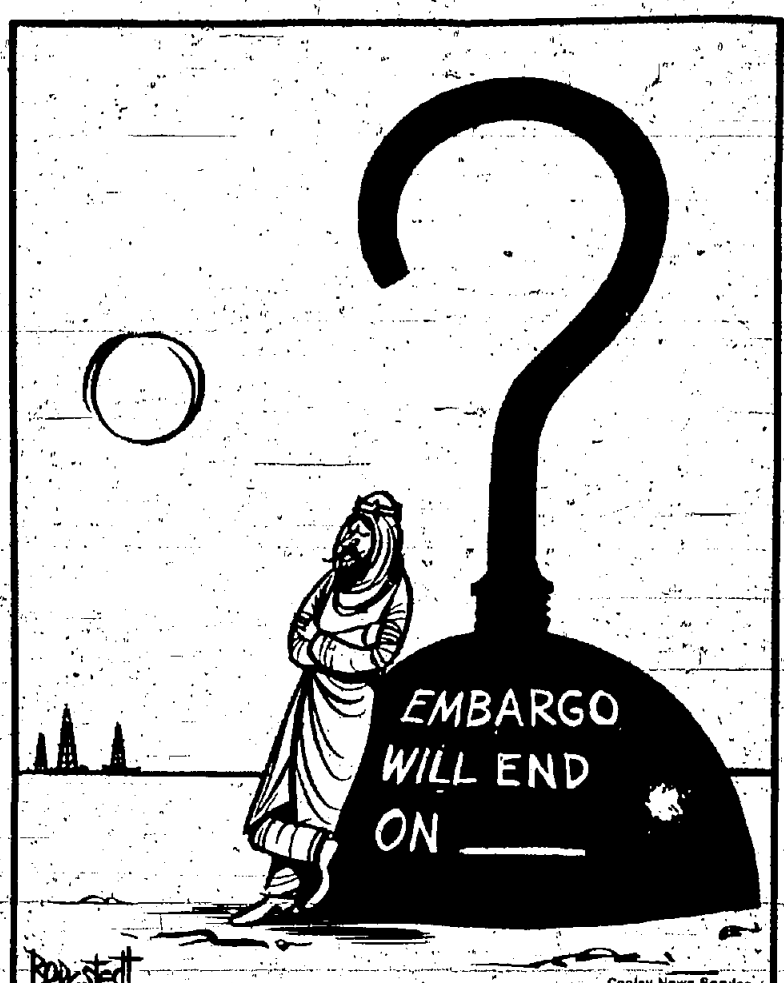

Proper care of refrigerator can save energy and money

BY PENNY SHEARIN
Total Electric Light & Power Co. electricians advise that refrigerators are so carefree and operate so smoothly we tend to forget that they use a substantial amount of power. The energy consumed varies with the size and type of refrigerator-freezer models used.

Some common sense tips: Keep door openings at a minimum and make them short. Discourage "browsing." The longer the door is open the harder the motor has to work to cool air. Plan ahead before opening your refrigerator. If defrosting is necessary, plan to do it regularly. Ice and frost act as an insulator which means more work for the motor and more use of electricity power. Don't over-ice your refrigerator. Don't overwork shelves. This restricts circulation of cold air and cuts efficiency. On the other hand, don't operate two refrigerators when one is really sufficient. Refrigerators and freezers are equipped with a door gasket to seal cold air in and warm air out.

Gas Co. marking 119th anniversary; serves 7 counties

The Elizabethtown Gas Company is observing its 119th anniversary this month. The company, founded as Elizabethtown Gas Light Company, was organized by special act of the legislature, in the oldest act of utility in New Jersey.

In the early days, the firm sold gas for lighting purposes only, since gas as a fuel was too expensive to compete with cheaper sources of energy, namely wood and coal. It did, however, gas was measured by candlepower and made primarily from coal only a handful of customers were served with the manufactured gas. In fact, the company during its pioneering days couldn't supply as much gas in three months as it supplies today in five minutes.

Nilson also suggested that the county government should have a full-time administrator, a position which would be replaced by three full-time freesholders serving five-year terms at annual salaries of \$20,000.

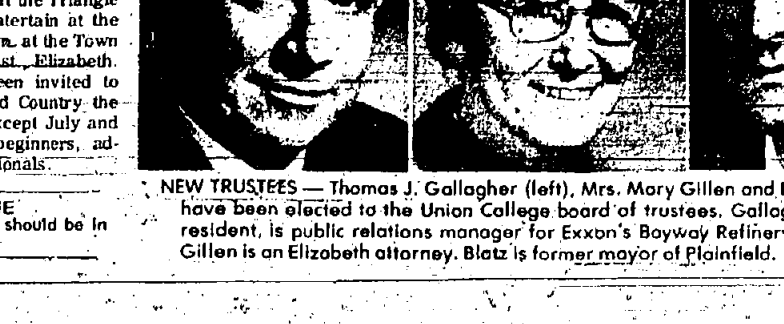
FOR THE BIRDS

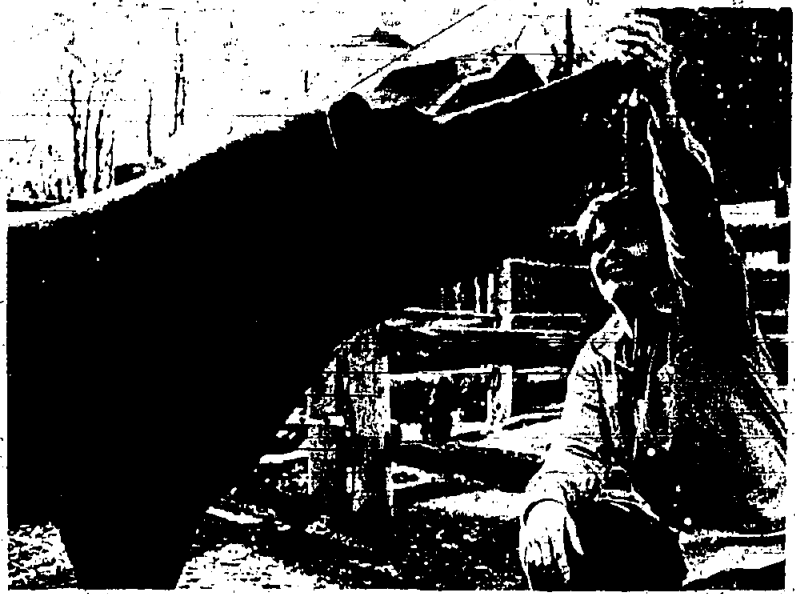
