Retail chain may discuss store plans

Firm owns property south of Route 22

The possibility that a mammoth shopping center based on an Alexander's Department Store might spring up south of Route 22 arose once again Tuesday night as Mayor Edward N. Stiso Jr. told the 26 members of the planning and zoning Township Committee meeting that the governing body will meet late in March with attorneys and representatives of the retail chain.

The issue became of prime importance several years ago when Alexander's purchased a 160-acre tract bordering the town of the Howard Johnsons on Rt. 22. A portion of the land was reportedly sold to Macy's. Local residents expressed strong opposition, objecting primarily to the prospect of massive traffic congestion throughout Springfield, as well as a heavy drain on police, fire and other municipal services.

Town releases details on \$3.3 million budget

The \$3,300,000 budget introduced Feb. 12 by the Springfield Township Committee represents a total increase of \$77,000 over the 1973 figure of \$3,223,000, and will result in a total tax levy of \$1,041,000, up \$165,700. The formal public hearing on the budget will be held at 8 p.m. March 12, during the regular Township Committee session. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 9.

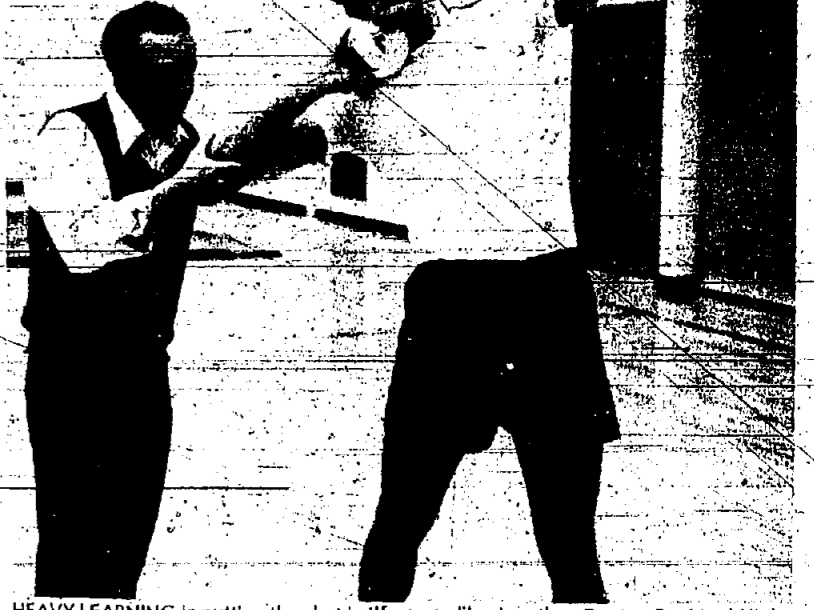

Now, this form has been eliminated, and total amounts received are entered on Form 1040.

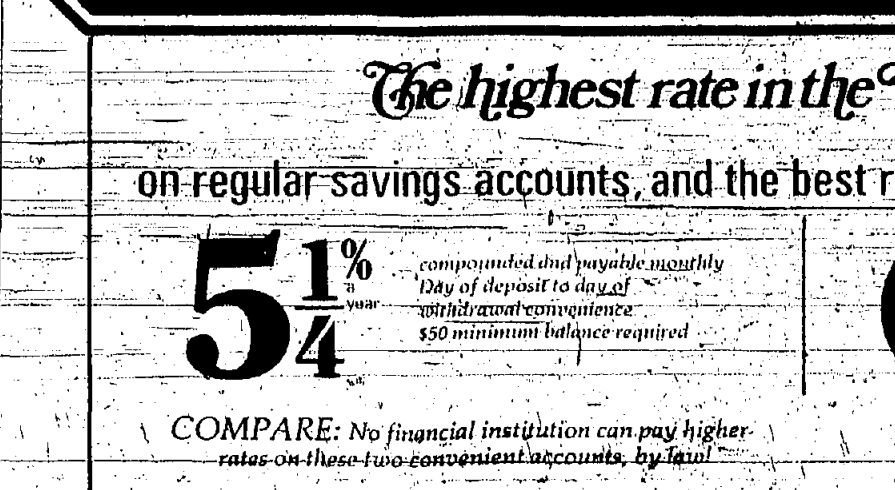

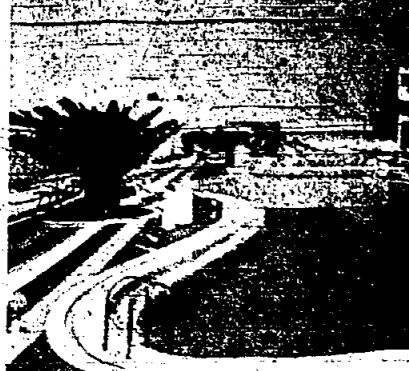

Dumping of wastes in Atlantic set at 5 billion gallons in '74

GOVERNORS ISLAND, N.Y.—During 1974, some five billion gallons of sludge, dredge spoils, acid wastes and debris are expected to be dumped in the Atlantic off Long Island and New Jersey... At points as close as 10 to 20 miles off New York Harbor and as far as 100 miles or more from Atlantic City, N.J., and New York City.

Although this is a well-known figure, commented Lt. Charles Huber of the Third Coast Guard District's environmental office... The dumping figures kept here over the last six months of 1973.

The figures show that almost 23 billion gallons of wastes were barged into the Atlantic and dumped... The dumping is regulated by the "Marine Protection, Research and Sanctuaries Act of 1972" and by the "Federal Water Pollution Control Act" administered by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

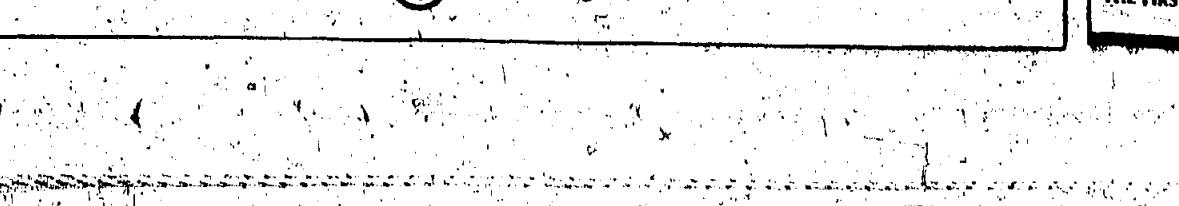

Harvest from the sea Nodules hold mineral wealth

Billions of tons of nodules scattered on the ocean bottom in the form of nodules—small lumps of minerals, geographers and industrialists both agree that these nodules are a mineral resource of great value, if they can be mined.

In Science, the weekly journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, staff writer Allen L. Hammond discusses the possibility of harvesting the mineral wealth that nodules hold.

Man has only begun to tap the ocean's vast riches. Fish, salt, tin and bromine are the largest resources that have so far been extracted from the sea. This, however, is likely to change as more research is done on the

economic viability of mining nodules. The most commercially useful nodules, says Hammond, are black or brown agglomerations of manganese oxide and iron-oxide minerals. The nodules include iron, copper, manganese, cobalt and traces of at least two dozen other metals. Unlike the other minerals, however, large manganese deposits are found both on land and under the sea.

Nodules form on the seabeds of many parts of the world, Hammond explains, but only in mining worthwhile. The Pacific Ocean southwest of Hawaii is the most favorable mining area that has been found.

Where these metals came from and why they are concentrated where they are, is the subject of much debate, says Hammond. It is known that iron and manganese were formed by submarine volcanic eruptions and runoff from the continents, but sources of nickel and copper are uncertain.

A study of nodules and their chemistry has only begun, concludes Hammond, but research has clearly shown that there is a great mineral wealth below the sea.
