2 Bell scientists honored by IEEE

Two Bell Laboratories scientists—William S. Boyle and George E. Smith—have been presented with the Morris N. Liebmann Award for "the most important contribution to emerging technologies in the past three years" by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers.

The presentation at the IEEE's International Solid State Circuits Conference in Philadelphia, was given "for the invention of, and the charge control theory and leadership in the field of MOS (metal oxide semiconductor) physics."

Charge coupled devices (CCDs), are a new breed of solid-state semiconductor devices which store large amounts of information in an extremely small space. They can be used in image producing devices such as small solid-state television cameras and scanners for facsimile transmission.

Using the CCD technology Bell Laboratories has just developed black-and-white and color cameras smaller than a clear base Compaq TV camera on the market now are at least three or four times that size.

Seton bills 8 films on work ethic

A film series program of eight full-length feature movies and discussions on the theme of "The American Work Ethic" will be presented at Seton Hall University in South Orange during March, April and May. The Education Media Center of the University has received a grant from the New Jersey State Department of Education to sponsor the series, which will be open to the public free of charge.

All films will be shown in the Lounge of the Student Center at 8 p.m. on the scheduled date. Films are scheduled as follows: "The Graduate," March 18; "Major Barbara," March 21; "They Shoot Horses Don't They," March 28; "Our Daily Bread," April 7; "Grapes of Wrath," April 22; "The Bicycle Thief," May 1; "The Inheritence," May 8; and "Nothing But A Man," May 15.

Following each film a short discussion will be conducted by a humanist from the Seton Hall faculty, stressing the relation of the film to values associated with work. Discussion leaders include: George Browne, Jr., George Reilly and Dr. Edward Hignett, Department of Education; Dr. David Abalos of the Italicus; Dr. Frank Sullivan of the School of Education; Dr. Philip Kaly of the Sociology Department; and Professor, John Harrington of the English Department.

The center was awarded the grant to sponsor discussion of the development of the American Work Ethic. Seton Hall was one of 39 institutions and organizations awarded grants by the Committee for the Humanities, and affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, for the purpose of conducting research on the current topic. Governing body OKs \$3.3 million budget

Additional details with detailed breakdowns of the major line items in the budget. 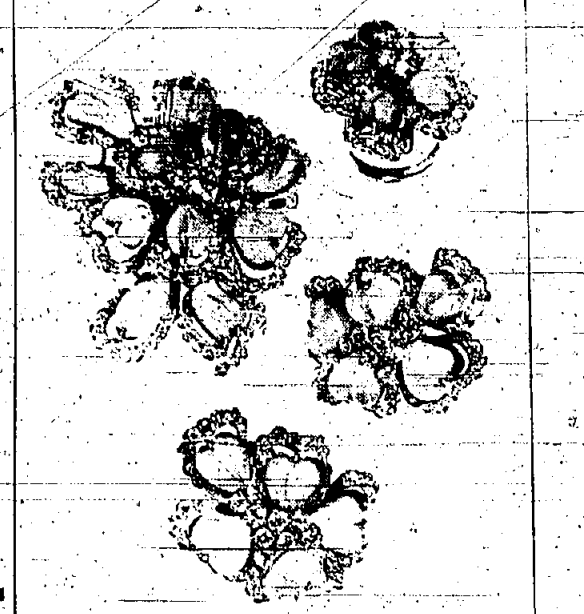

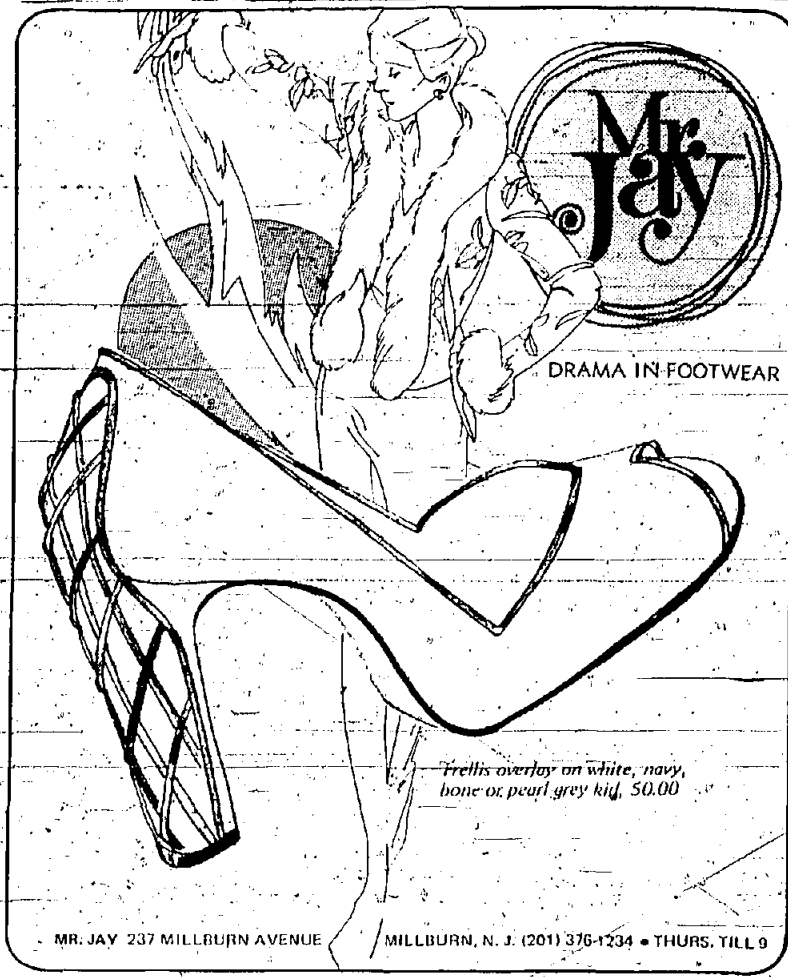

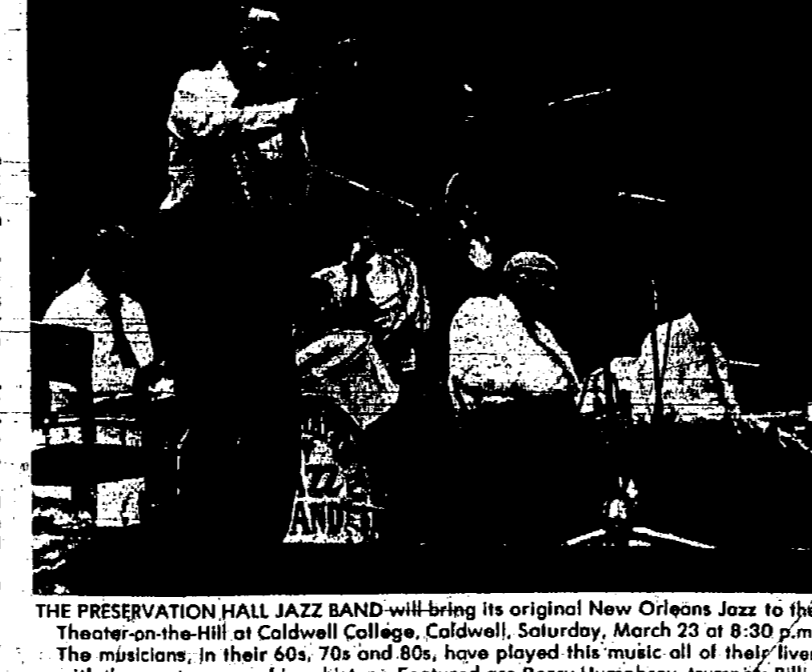

The workshops will be the opening event in the third annual Higher Education Week sponsored by the Union County Council of Parent Teacher Associations, April 1-7, it was announced by Mrs. H. F. Ungar of Scotch Plains, council president.

Each workshop will be conducted twice, giving participants the opportunity to attend the two in which they are most interested. 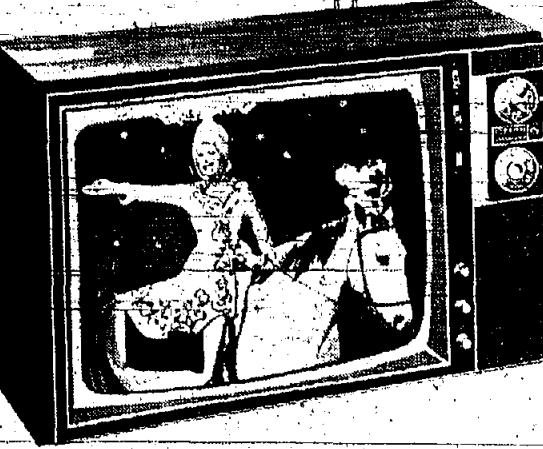
