
Thursday, April 4, 1974-Enlistment delay now Navy option



The Caldwell place project is expected to take two months, during which time traffic will be detoured along Mountain avenue. Upon completion of that work, reconstruction of the other spans will start, and also continue for a wo-month period.

During work on Mountain avenue and Salter

street, the police department will post tem-porary "No Parking" signs along Caldwell place, which will serve as the primary detoni route. The police also are expected to contac the state on the possible retiming of the traffic signal at the intersection of Caldwell place and lorris avenue to facilitate traffic flow. Detour barricades will be installed at intersections closest to the work sites, so motorists are afforded immediate exits from the blocked roads, instead of being faced with a "dead end" in the middle of a block.



You should not touch a heater if you pipes or faucets—to avoid shock. 

Parkway credits, special troopers for safety record

A special task force of state troopers who patrol in unmarked, unrelated cars was credited this week with being an important factor in the Garden State Parkway's national traffic safety leadership in the past two years "It is significant that since 1972, when the task force went into action, the Parkway has had the lowest traffic fatality rate among the nuntry's major toll roads " Com-Authority said.

The commissioner pointed out that the authority operated Parkway had a rate of 1.7 and did even better in 1973 by attaining remarkably low rate of 1.1.
