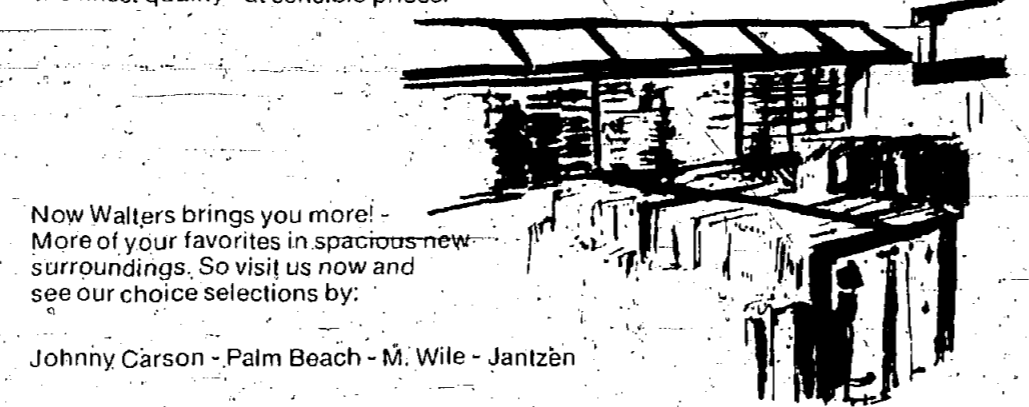

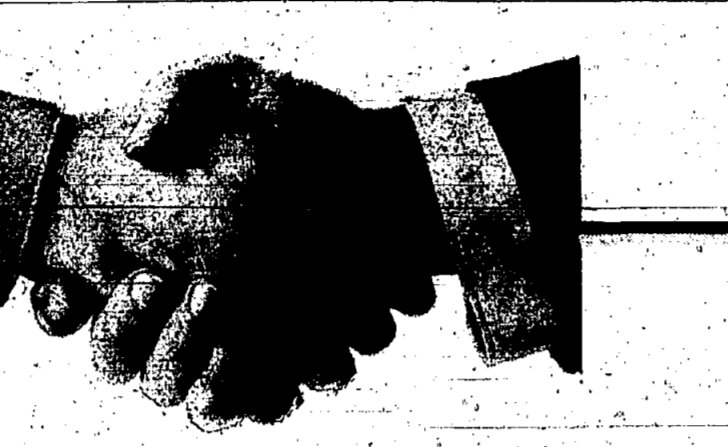

Early Warning Flash Flood System is now operating throughout county

The Early Warning Flash Flood Alert System for the Rahway River, Elizabeth River, and Morris Creek drainage basins is now installed and operational, according to Union County Freeholder Director William J. Maguire, who initiated implementation of this system in conjunction with the Union County Environmental Health Advisory Committee.

Maguire said that the system, which was established by the Union County Planning Board and Union County Civil Defense in cooperation with the National Weather Service, enables the county to make its own flash flood forecasts, independent of outside sources, and provides valuable advance warning time for municipalities to make preparations for impending floods. It is the first system of this type in the state and one of the few in the entire country.

The system is known as a "Community Self-Help" system because it consists of rain gauges manned by voluntary local observers, located throughout the county.



Observer locations are: Overbrook Hospital, Summit; Runnells Hospital, Berkeley Heights; Mulhberg Hospital, Plainfield; Union College, Cranford; Union Police Headquarters; Keon College, Union; Exxon Refinery, Linden; Rahway Valley Sewerage Authority Treatment Plant, Rahway; and Lion-Roselle Sewerage Authority Treatment Plant, Linden. The observers were chosen on the basis of geographical location and because they are institutions with around the clock personnel, so that there is always someone to take readings, even at night.

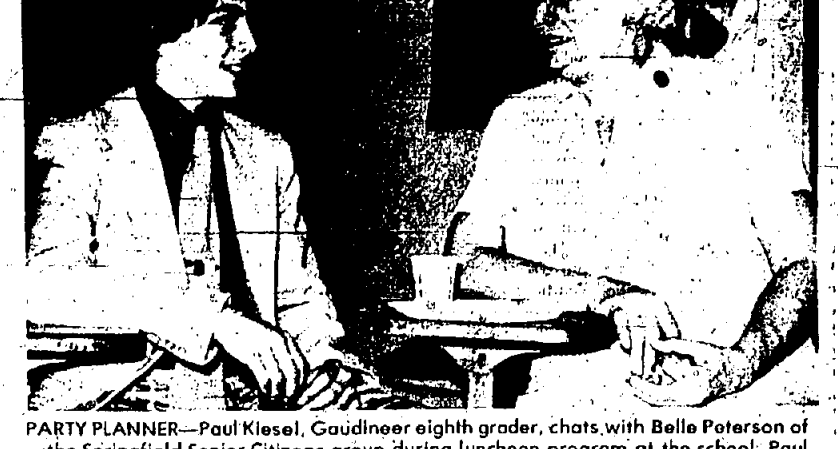

Solomon Schechter school to add 10th grade program

Levin calls Nixon decision on tapes 'evasive refusal'

Democratic Congressional candidate Adam Levin has urged the House Judiciary Committee to make President Nixon's non-compliance to its subpoena "an article of impeachment."

In a telegram to New Jersey Congressman Peter Rodino, chairman of the Judiciary Committee, Levin said he supports the decision by a majority of the committee to reject the president's offer of edited transcripts as a substitute for the tape recordings of Watergate conversations.

"His deliberate and evasive refusal to release the legally subpoenaed tapes not only adds to the already widespread suspicion that white evidence is being concealed, but it senselessly prolongs an impeachment inquiry that has already disrupted our nation's domestic life," Levin said.

"By refusing to comply with the subpoena, Mr. Nixon creates a situation in which he, as a potential defendant, determines what evidence will and will not be used."

The 12th District candidate said it is apparent that President Nixon is trying to defame and discredit the investigation by stalling the process as long as possible.

"It is up to the Judiciary Committee to move swiftly and of its own volition to complete the facts and evaluate the evidence needed to either impeach or exonerate the President," Levin continued.

"Edited transcripts, especially those edited by the administration, cannot serve that purpose. If a fair and intelligent decision is to be made, the actual tapes must be made available to every member of the investigating committee; especially the attorneys responsible for preparing the case."

"I agree that Watergate must be laid to rest before we can get on with the business of running the nation and solving the problems of inflation, the energy crisis, and unemployment, and the energy crisis. However, without a full and fair airing of all the evidence, Americans will never regain respect and confidence in their elected leaders."

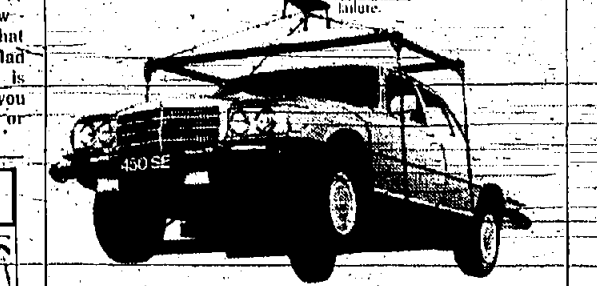
