

Push-buttons do work Traffic signals

Those pedestrian pushbuttons on the signals located next to crosswalks on highways really do work. And the Department of Transportation pedestrians to use them. When the button is pressed, a message to the traffic signal. It says, in effect, "pedestrian, not a vehicle. Stop traffic longer time, so that I can get across. Of the more than 1,000 traffic signals maintained by the state on its 2,150 miles of state roadways, 85 percent are demand-actuated signals which can be made to respond both to vehicles passing over sensors in the road and to pedestrian pushbuttons. The other 15 percent are the less complicated, fixed-time type, often used in high-traffic areas.

Most of the traffic-actuated signals are equipped with pushbuttons for pedestrian timing. Signs placed next to the pushbutton read: "To Cross Street—Push Button—Wait For Green Light."

Editorial comment

JUSTICE FOR ALL

With the legislators in Trenton still trying to shape Gov. Brendan Byrne's proposal for a state income tax into something at least palatable to their constituents, if never particularly tasty, we feel that too much of the discussion about the plan is beside the point.

The better decision—the court ruling which requires equitable state funding of local school systems—has changed the issue from one of whether we need a new tax to one of which new levies will best provide fiscal justice for all of New Jersey's taxpayers.

We certainly do not believe that property owners, and tenants who pay indirectly, in the affluent communities which have been either fortunate or prudent enough to establish a healthy balance of homes and industries should be penalized unduly for their forethought.

At the same time, and as we have said many times before in many contexts, we do believe strongly that we are indeed our brothers' keepers. Both for moral reasons and in our own self-interest, people in the affluent suburbs must bear some of the burdens of the impoverished and declining cities. Each time the gap between the two widens, the likelihood that the blight of urban decay will spread is increased by the same amount.

Citizens of Springfield can rightly be proud of the education we provide for our children, to give them the best possible start in what may not be the best of all possible worlds.

But we must also be concerned lest the children in other communities be schooled according to other standards so much lower that we will eventually be responsible not only for their education but also for their support.

The ultimate solution to the problems of the ghetto, for that is what is at the root of many of our generalizations and euphemisms, is not special classes but special buildings. As long as our neighbors are confined to areas of inadequate housing, inadequate governmental services and inadequate schools, the problems will continue.

If we could demolish all the slums, tear down all the racial and economic barriers and achieve a healthy economic mix in all our towns, we would indeed take a giant step toward liberty and justice for all. However, this is probably a task not for years but for generations.

We must, nevertheless, concentrate our energies on equity—in our tax structure as in all other phases of our life.

This does not mean, of course, that the taxpayers of Springfield must be required to pay an unfair price.

Rather than offering blind obedience or doctrinaire dogmatism, our legislators should lead us in the difficult quest for fiscal as well as social justice.

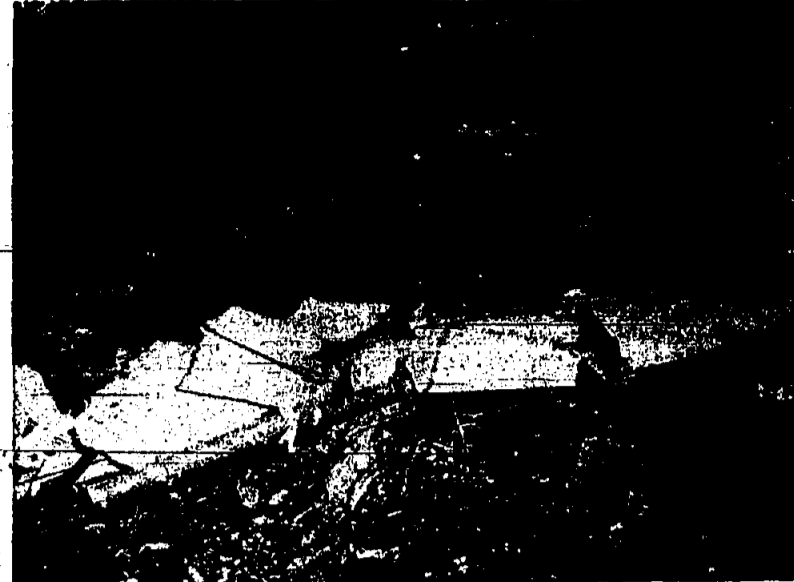

Fifth graders at the Edward Walton School, Springfield, have recently been cleaning up the woods in the back of the school. These woods were filled with garbage and a small hut which was poorly constructed with old, decaying wood and pieces of scrap cloth. Vandals had also cut down and destroyed 19 young saplings which were providing the oxygen we all need.

Led by Mary Ackerman, the fifth grade science teacher, each class went out in the woods to clean up. Soon there were piles of wood, old decaying branches and pieces of rotting cloth. They cleaned up because of the harmful insects and rats that are attracted to this sort of place, and it was also a direct response to the school.

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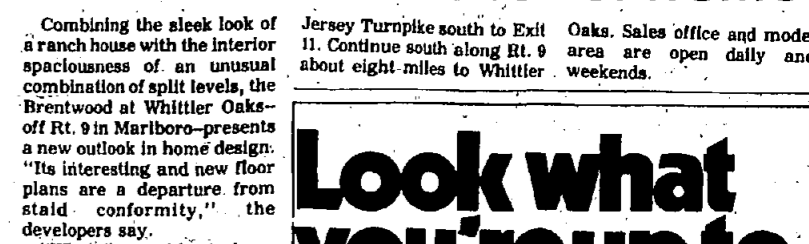

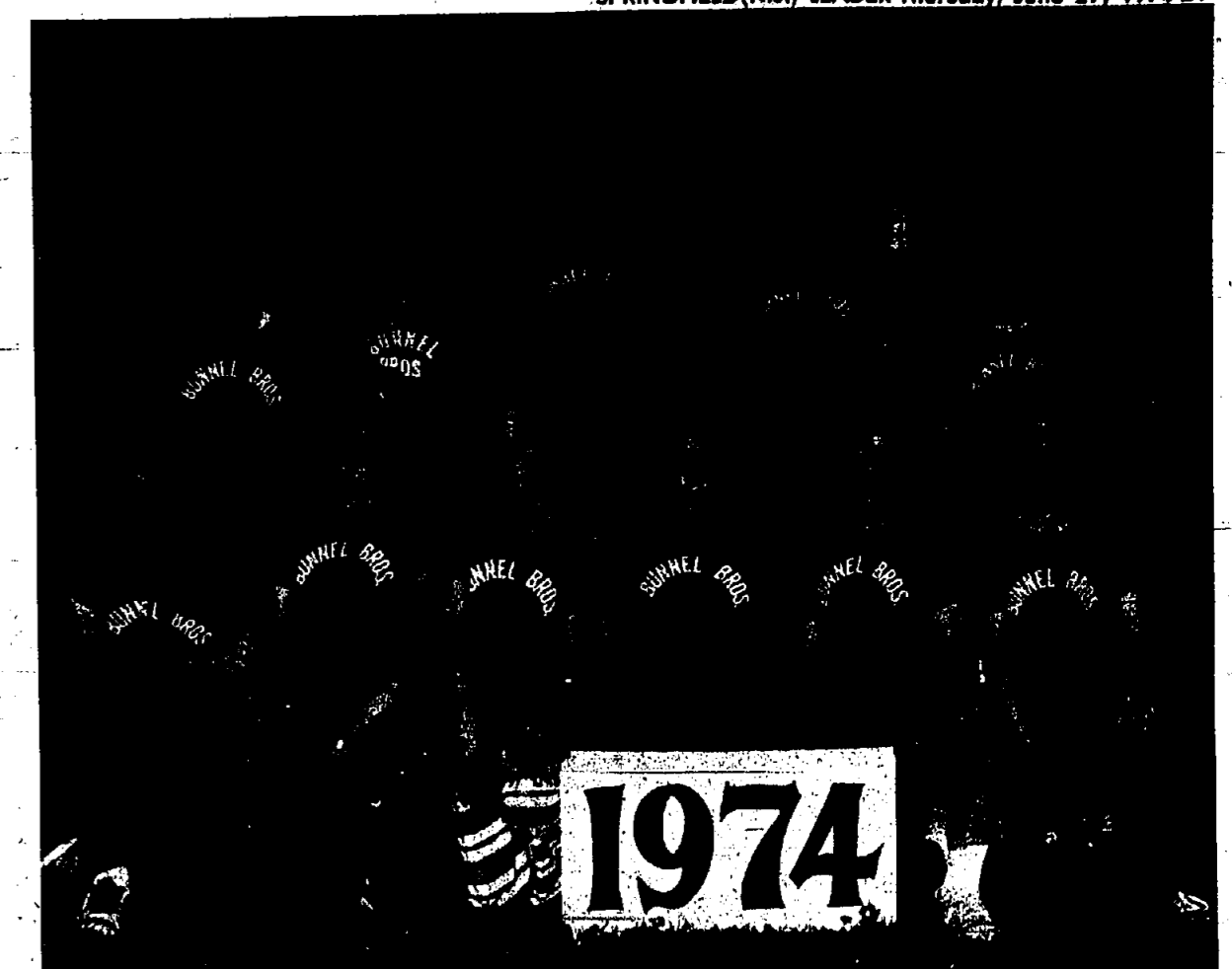

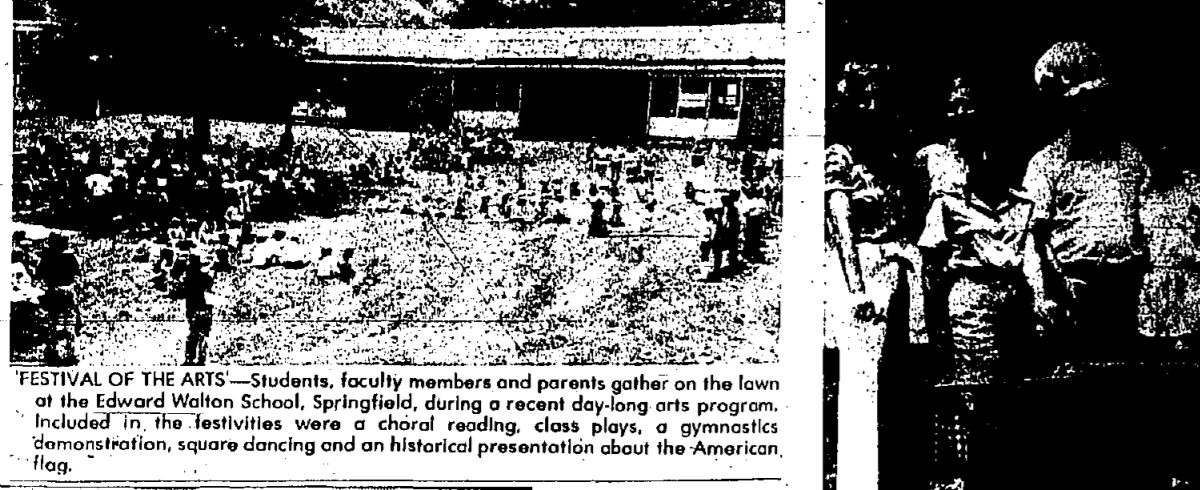

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Revision in method of selecting judges proposed by article in law publication

The Bar Institute and Law Center, in an article to be published in the summer issue of the Seton Hall Law Review, has recommended changes in the procedures for the selection of judges in New Jersey.

The author of the monograph, Margaret Gordon-Seller, associate director of the Institute, was commissioned by the trustees of the Bar Institute to investigate the matter and the study represents her findings.

The present system of selection is one where there is voluntary cooperation between the New Jersey State Bar Association and the governor, who has the constitutional authority to appoint judges, subject to confirmation by the Senate.

Computer talks at MIT Machine invented to aid blind

"Supercalifragilistic" is the word typed into the computer sitting in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology electronic laboratory.

Even more remarkable is that the computer never has encountered a word before, but can pronounce it by figuring it out much the same way humans do.

The text-to-speech system, developed by MIT engineers under the leadership of Jonathan Allen, associate professor of electrical engineering, began as part of an overall effort at RLE to build a machine to read to the blind.

The reading machine project actually involved two enormous problems, first building a machine to scan and recognize printed matter and transform it into computer language, and second, building a computer to transform the scanned text into understandable speech.

Regional plan unit urges support of state tax reform

The Regional Plan Association, a civic organization which has been planning for New Jersey and the rest of the New York Region since the 1920s, this week urged support of tax reform.

The position was outlined in the current issue of the association's publication, "The Region's Agenda." Five goals were listed as basic to any tax reform program that might emerge in discussions between the Governor and the Legislature.

Two goals are clear, the Association said—fairer distribution of the tax burden and more money for schools where pupils have the greatest educational needs.

Three important objectives are less apparent, Regional Plan explains. One is to increase school taxes, but in order to free municipalities from the penalty of extra school taxes if they allow more homes on small lots.

Another goal is to attract a large office building, store or factory onto open land, whether the site is appropriate or not in order to increase school taxes.

Strengthening the cities because they will be able to attract more jobs and services to their doorsteps if the suburbs no longer try to attract these facilities. Also, greater equality in tax burdens and more aid to city schools will make the cities more attractive to business and to prospective residents of all income levels.

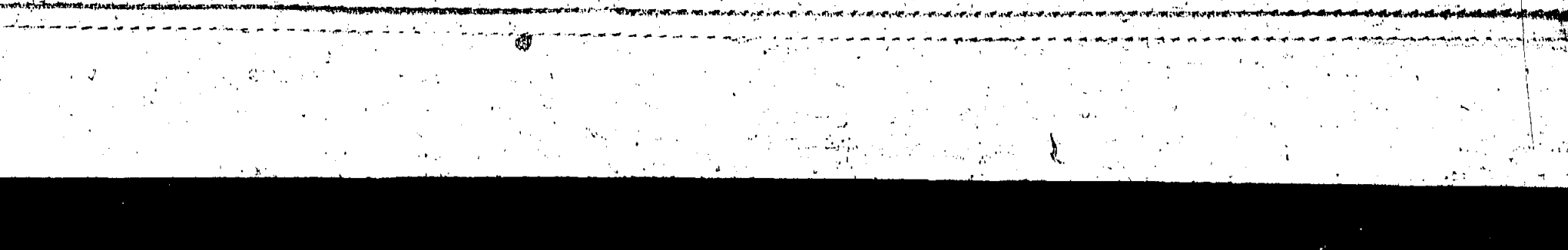
Dr. Frederick Baruchin, Springfield superintendent of schools, recently issued a report on the activities of the system's Special Services Department during the past school year.

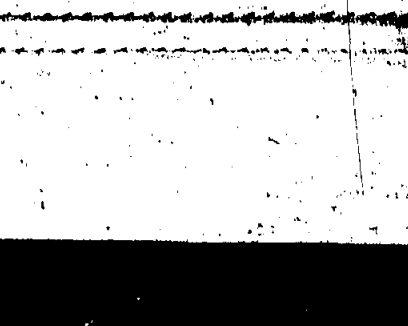
