

From the top down, something new has been added to the old at Union College where a fifth decade of serving educational needs was launched on Tuesday.

A new college president, five new programs, new enrollment habits, new credit and continuing education courses, and new faculty are expected to have a significant impact in helping Union College to meet its challenge as Union County's community college.

Dr. Saul Orkin of Hillsborough, former dean of Somerset State College, took over at the helm of Union College on Aug. 1 and is determined to enhance Union's reputation in serving community educational needs while maintaining the strong academic transfer program for which Union College has been distinguished in the past.

"We will continue Union College's tradition of providing the academic and continuing education programs that Union County residents need," said Dr. Orkin. "But we will take a long hard look at just what those needs might be. I want a college that is embedded in the community and is responsive to the needs and aspirations of all its members—the young and the old, the rich and the poor, the most recent arrivals to the county and the long-rooted."

Union College's traditional associate degree programs in the liberal arts, business administration, science and engineering fields which have enabled its graduates to transfer with advanced standing to over 500 colleges and universities in the United States and abroad, will be supplemented by five new career-oriented programs this September, Dr. Orkin reported.

UNION COLLEGE WILL BE one of the first in New Jersey to offer medical record administration, a program that combines management and science courses to assist the administrator in meeting the medical, scientific and legal demands of his profession. An associate degree program in engineering management will be added to the curriculum offerings at Union College as well. The program is geared toward preparing professional engineers whose career objectives include industrial management, plant engineering, and marketing.

New on-year programs in retail sales management, pre-health training, and day care have been added also at Union College and will be based at the college's Urban Educational Center in Plainfield.

Pre-health is designed for those with the high school background to enroll in many of the allied health fields as well as those who are unsure of the field they want to enter. Day care is designed to upgrade and develop professional personnel to work with managers of nursery school age, Dr. Orkin explained. The program will also assist current personnel in meeting the proposed state licensing requirements for day care workers.

Union College also offers associate degree programs in education, urban studies, biological sciences, physical sciences, environmental science, environmental engineering, criminal justice, public administration, and nursing, Dr. Orkin added.

DR. ORKIN PREDICTED Union College will surpass any previously-set enrollment records in 1975—a rarity at many colleges today. "Despite shifts in college attendance patterns, Union College will serve more than 7,000 students this year," Dr. Orkin said. "While many more recent high school graduates are now delaying college entrance or choosing to go part-time, increasing numbers of women, senior citizens, and middle-aged adults seeking careers are enrolling full time and part-time at Union College."

Union College waives tuition for senior citizens, Dr. Orkin explained, enabling many more people than otherwise possible to consider college attendance.

Possibly the greatest number of new courses Union College will offer this fall will be through the Department of Continuing Education, Dr. Orkin commented. "Starting from one-day seminars to sixteen-week courses, the programs are designed to meet the professional and personal needs and interests of adults rather than provide credits toward a degree," Dr. Orkin explained.

Among the subject areas that will be explored in Continuing Education courses are drawing and painting, music, dance, psychology and human relations, management and sales, real estate, literature, rapid reading, and a variety of leisure topics.

The Department of Community Services will be offering consumer education seminars, a landlord-tenant relations program, and a free secretarial training program, jointly sponsored by the Union County Urban League. The GED and CLEP Testing Center will continue this September, as well, Dr. Orkin stated. GED exams enable adults to acquire a New Jersey high school equivalency diploma and CLEP is a national program that awards college credit to adults based on self-teaching and experience.

The credit and non-credit courses, seminars, and community services will be offered at the main Cranford Campus of Union College and its two Urban Educational Centers in Elizabeth and Plainfield.

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Some areas have been reserved for new lawns.

Preparations for the opening of the new Trailside Nature and Science Center in the Watchung Reservation, sometime in the fall, involve more than the building and its furnishing, equipment and displays. A vast amount of landscape and related work has been carried on for several weeks by employees of The Union County Park Commission.

According to William Anderson, chief of the forestry and horticulture division, about 1,500 manhours have been spent on the outside work up to early August. This could be interpreted as one employee working about 47 weeks on the landscaping and other outside needs.

Anderson pointed out that because of some of the new grades along the slopes in the vicinity of the new structure, it was necessary to construct long stretches of rock walls before creating new terraced gardens and lawns. The project included the spreading of about 11,000 yards of topsoil, as well as transporting a considerable amount of sod from other Union County park units.

Actuality it is, in terms of the dimensions of this state we're in. Higbee's Beach is all the way down at the end of Cape May and most people have never heard of it. Which is lucky because it's still an essentially unspoiled remnant of the Middle Atlantic waterfront scene which is getting bulldozed into oblivion.

Judicious land purchases, and the support for them, must come from all over New Jersey. One doesn't try to keep just one end of a boat from sinking.

Perhaps birdwatchers are most familiar with Higbee's Beach because of two freshwater ponds and the desired vegetative cover. It's an important staging point for birds migrating south and forced to await favorable weather before the long hop across Delaware Bay.

Right now, Higbee's Beach is practically unique because it's unspoiled, with its graced dunes and other dimensions of the nearly vanished bayshore dune forests. In a state with population density moving southward, it's a vanishingly rare precious all the time.

But saving must come quickly if it's going to happen at all. The last I heard, several hundred acres of Higbee's beach had already been sold to a developer.

Is that a bulldozer I hear to the south?
