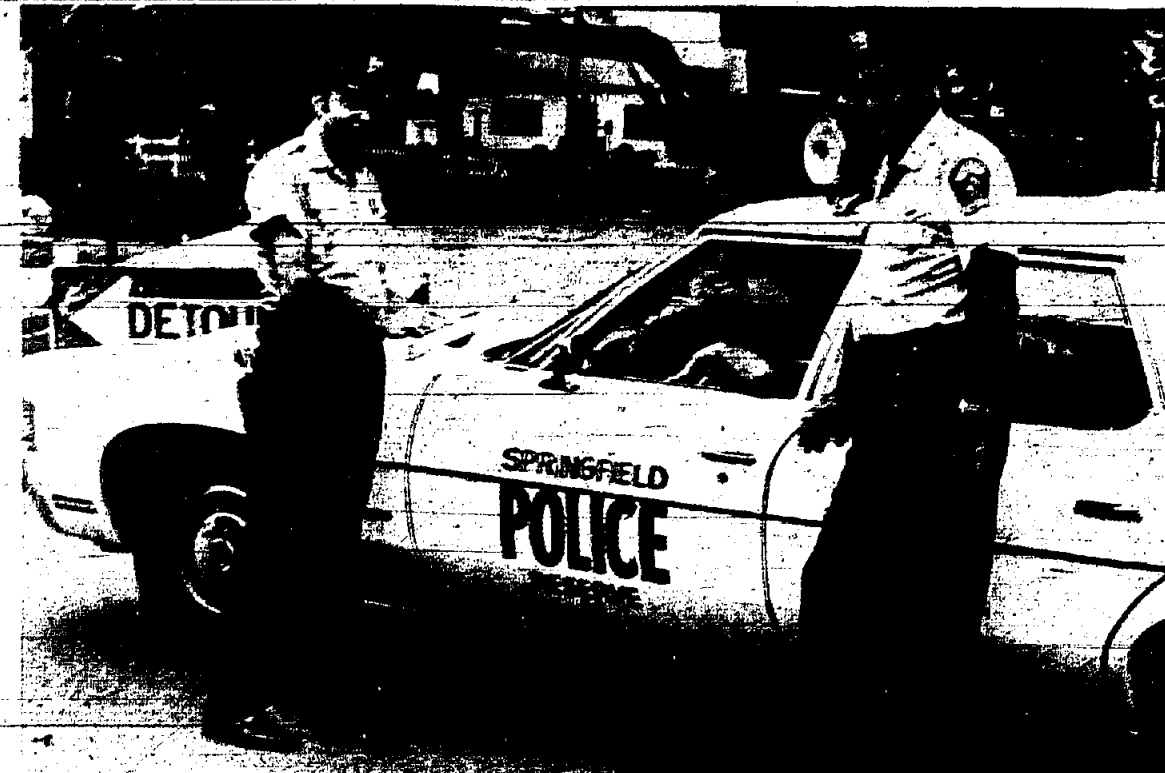

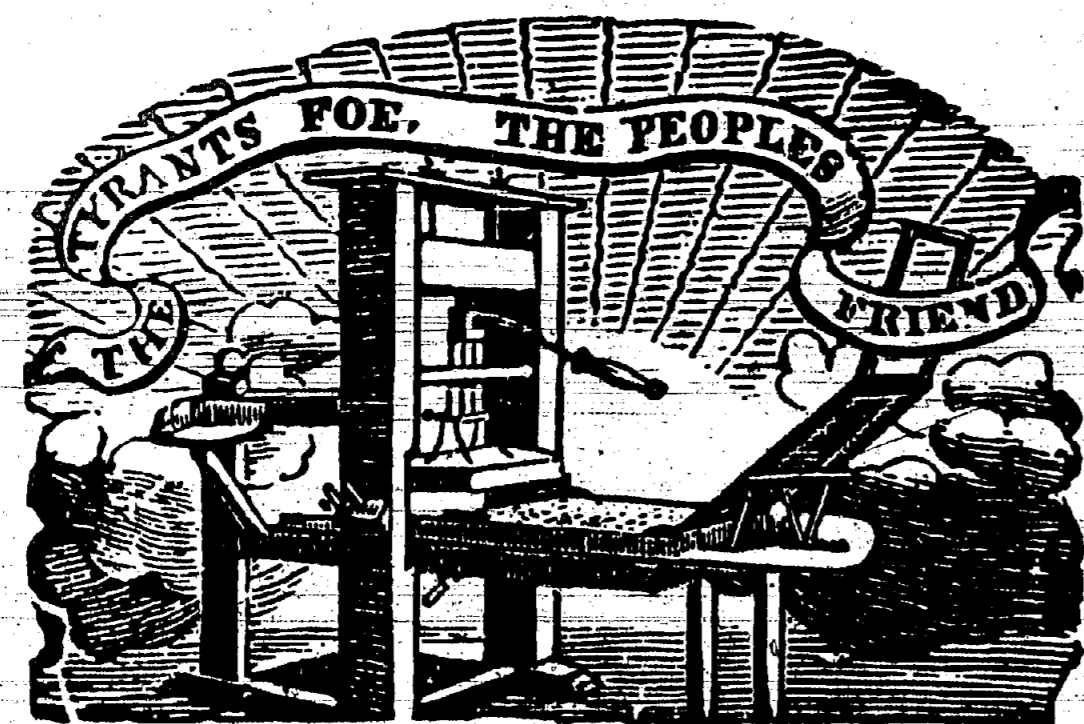

Students 'test' technologies in UCTI one-year program

Having difficulty choosing a career? Union County Technical Institute, Scotch Plains, offers a one-year pre-technical program giving students an opportunity to sample several different technologies while taking their basic studies in English and mathematics.

Dr. Harvey Charles, president of UCTI, said this week: "The program permits a student to explore several engineering and business technologies to determine where he or she fits in, if they'd like the work, and if they have the ability."

Students in the pre-technical program earn college credits for the basic courses which may be applied toward their associate in applied science degree in several technology programs. "The students become exposed to the different technologies in well-equipped laboratories by instructors who have had vast industrial experience," Charles said. "The students will discover what each technology involves, its career ladder opportunities, and the educational and personal job qualifications."

Among the areas students may explore in the pre-technical program are chemical and environmental technology, civil technology, mechanical technology, electronics technology, electromechanical technology, data processing-accounting, and data processing-computer programming.

In-depth counseling is available in the pre-technical program, enabling the student to gain insight in his selection or rejection of a field, Charles said. "Rejection of a field is just as important as selecting one," he stated. "The more a student explores, the greater the chance he will find the technology that suits him best."

A few openings for the pre-technical program that will begin this month still exist, Charles noted. Interested prospective students in contact with the admissions office at UCTI immediately for additional information and application procedures. The telephone number is 893-3000.

Steingrabe, coordinator of the department. Applications can be accepted and processed by mail until tomorrow, Steingrabe said. Registration can also be handled daily at MacDonald Hall at Union College's Cranford campus between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Special evening registration will be held next Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday between 6:30 and 8:30 p.m. at MacDonald Hall. Classes will begin Monday, Sept. 23. The courses range from one-day seminars to 16-week courses and cover a variety of fields, including day or evening schedules, weekdays or weekends, Steingrabe said.

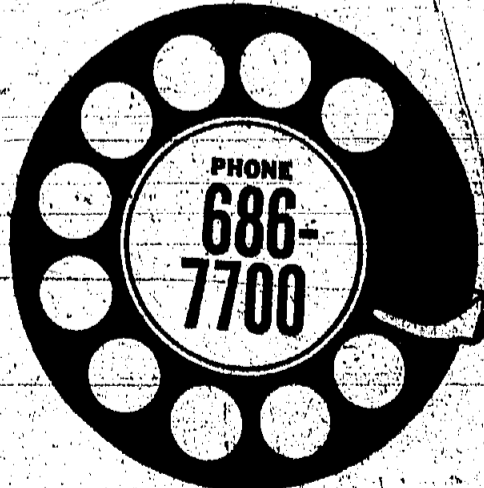

Levin describes gas shortage as potential threat

Democratic Congressional nominee Adam K. Levin has proposed a comprehensive program to provide temporary and long-range relief to the nation's natural gas shortage, which he describes as a "potentially lethal threat to New Jersey's already sick economy."

"There are disturbing indications that producers in certain gas-rich states are hoarding natural gas supplies to control price levels and hike profits," Levin said this week. "As a result, many states face a critical shortage of natural gas this winter. Not only will home owners be affected, but thousands of workers will be laid off if gas dependent plants are forced to close."

The 12th District, Union County, candidate called for quick action on a recently introduced amendment to the Natural Gas Act of 1954 that would provide partial relief for this winter's expected shortage by empowering the Federal Power Commission to regulate both intrastate and interstate gas markets during periods of national emergency, thereby offering a fairer distribution of heating gas to hard-pressed areas of the nation.

Levin said he also supports passage of the Stevens-Moss Consumer Energy Act which would stimulate long-range competition within the natural gas industry by exempting small and independent producers from FPC regulations on the setting of wellhead prices, while retaining controls over large producers.

The Consumer Energy Act would also guarantee pipeline use by independent producers and establish a Federal Oil and Gas Corporation, modeled on the TVA, to develop natural gas and oil sources on publicly owned lands, now estimated to contain between 9 and 25 percent of the Nation's future resources.

## Survey taken on 'blue collar blues'

### IAM official finds most workers satisfied

Reports of the "blue-collar blues" have been exaggerated, says a Machinists union official working toward a master's degree at Rutgers University. Andrew Kenopensky of 620 Niles rd., Union, bases his opinion on personal experience as a business representative for District 15 of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers (IAM). As such he negotiates labor agreements, handles arbitration and generally services automotive mechanics throughout New Jersey and New York City.

Kenopensky polled leadmen, truck mechanics, mechanics helpers and partsmen in five New Jersey truck repair shops for a term paper in a course on current labor problems, offered by the Department of Labor Studies at Rutgers University College. Each of those surveyed completed a questionnaire on aspects of his work, the results were broken down according to age groups.

"If anything, our members are alienated by outside forces they have no control over," says Kenopensky, citing inflation and wage controls as prime examples. In making the study, he was particularly interested in the response of those still in their field who are young workers.
