We recently watched a televised American Town Meeting debate on "Who Runs Our Schools?"

The Springfield board for nearly a decade has welcomed comment from the public and has often modified its proposals in the light of information from the audience or letters to the board offices.

Advisory committees have been organized, and their counsel and advice is rapidly moving in that direction.

Significantly, the search for a principal for the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School included participation by both students and the community in the process.

Just this fall, the high school established a committee of men and women picked at random from the community to work out a set of goals and priorities for secondary education.

The trustees is that a community gets the kind of schools it deserves. Thanks to the open minds and responsible actions of our board members and administrators, we are well on the way to demonstrating the full and positive potential of that old adage.

We still will have to be a pretty good town to deserve that kind of school.

Right now, the immediate problem is to solve two new problems in the Springfield board to succeed two very good ones who are retiring—Robert Southward and Zachary Schneider.

We urge everyone interested in furthering the cause of the highest education, at the lowest grade levels, to give serious thought to running for election.

3 potential sources listed for stratosphere pollution

Supersonic transports, aerosol sprays and nuclear weapons are all potential sources of catalytic agents that produce the earth's stratosphere and decrease the ozone that screens off the worst of the sun's ultraviolet radiation.

According to March and Hammond, the increase in radiation is approximately twice that in the stratosphere. This increase is five percent decrease in ozone would produce a 30 percent increase in radiation.

"In "Science," the weekly journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, staff-writers Alan Hammond and Thomas H. March II, discuss stratospheric pollution.

The catalytic agents in question are oxides of nitrogen, which are released into the upper atmosphere by the jet engines of supersonic transports, by nuclear explosions and by chlorine-chemically decomposed by light from chlorofluorocarbons such as Freon.

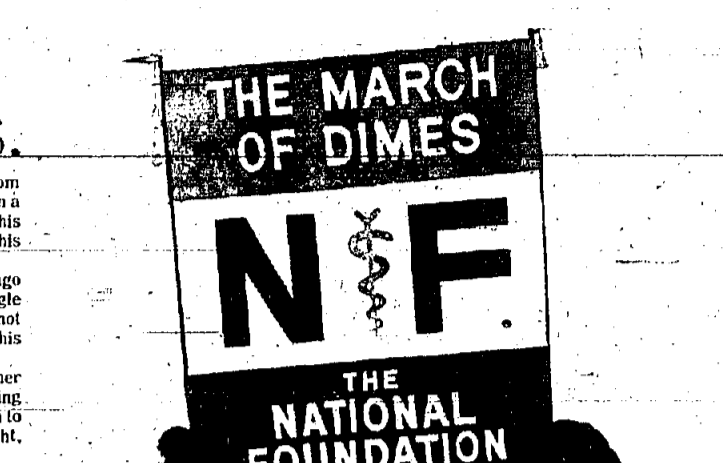

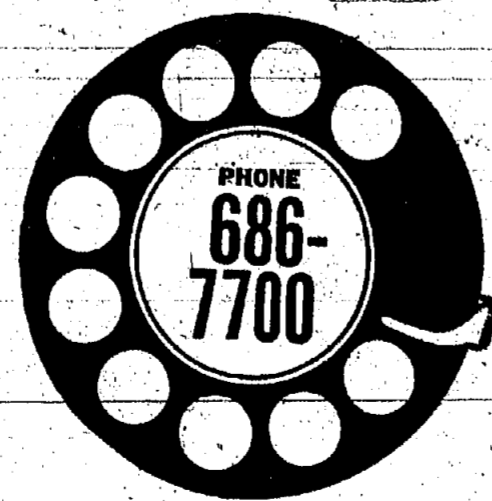

THE STATE WE'RE IN

So far nobody has blamed falling hair or hangnails on environmentalists, but I won't be surprised when it happens.

Right now, a lot of thoughtful-brows from outdoor Avenue and its ilk are gleefully licking their chops while contending that inflation is being aggravated by the first serious movement toward adequate industrial pollution controls.

What they are scheming to do is rechannel it, however justified the price of sugar has become. They are scheming to do it by getting into some kind of environmentalism. If they can do that, they figure, they can make bigger profits by not having to spend money on pollution controls.

Last year at this time, their gambit was to blame environmentalists for the energy crisis. That's like using the doctor for inactivity when he warned you 10 years ago that if you didn't stop smoking you'd get cancer—and you didn't stop.

One of the secrets of public relations is that, if the public can ignore detestable public relations types and stay a good jump and a half ahead of a lot of politicians. The public voted down excessive gambling and highway construction, and then overwhelmingly approved the Green Acres bond issue of \$200 million.

I should stand as evidence, throughout the country as well as here, that the public has the ability to know what's really important and what's merely being shoved under its nose by special interest types.

That's why I don't think people generally are going to fall for arguments that inflation and/or the energy crunch are the fault of environmentalism. A recent story by Glenn Hill in the New York Times pointed this out in more polite terms than I've been using here.

I quoted people like Roy L. A. former President Nixon's appointee as director of Management and Budget, as warning that expensive pollution abatement programs are "non-productive," because they don't produce goods for selling.

I also noted that federal economists, plus three independent economic research organizations, have all concluded that just about one-half of one percent of the past year's rise in the Wholesale Price Index can be blamed on pollution control costs.

And the U.S. Department of Commerce, never known as a hot bed of environmentalism, is quoted as reporting that of \$12 billion spent on new plants and equipment so far in 1974, only \$5.1 billion is for air and water pollution controls.

We might point out that the benefits of those expenses lie in public health: cleaner water (one drinking water doesn't cost as much), cleaner air (fewer people are suffering from respiratory disease) and much more desirable open space (public lands near former sources

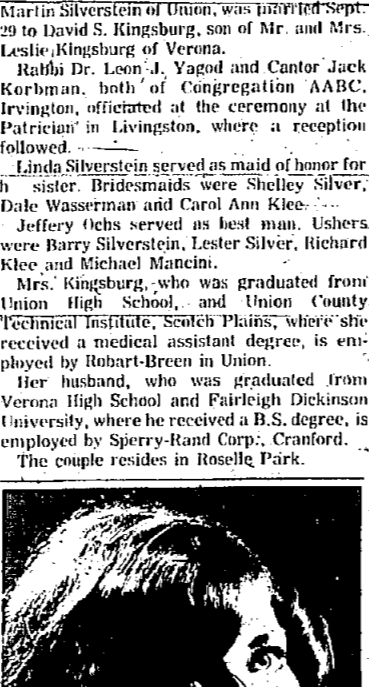

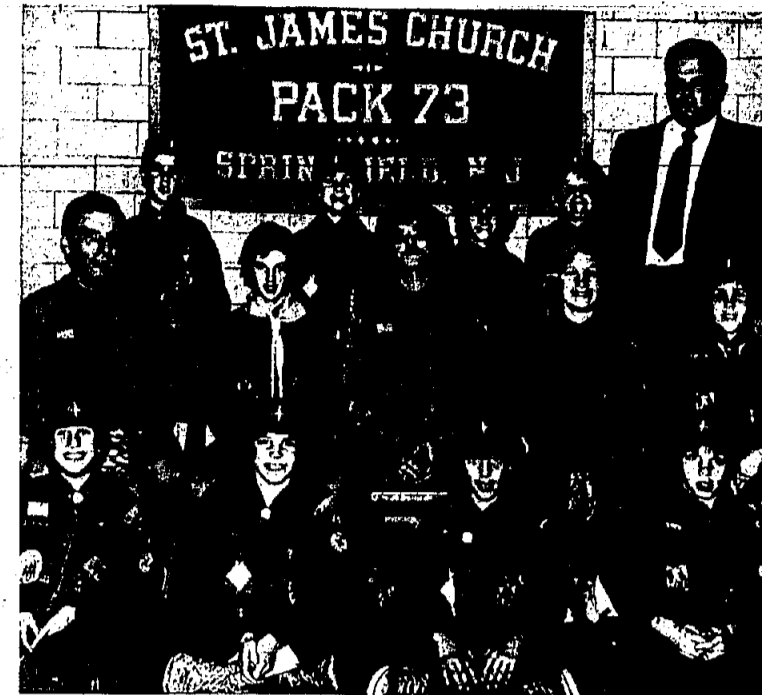

HOLDING COURT Tips on controlling emotions to help play winning tennis

Tennis is a difficult game to play when overly excited. Your body doesn't respond. Although your head knows what to do, your obstinate arms and legs won't listen.
Is it possible to force yourself to relax and keep your peace? Sure it is. Athletes in all sports have subtle tricks to remind themselves to stay relaxed. Here are some things you can do to relax and play up to your potential in tennis.
(1) Don't serve the ball until you are ready. Your opponent can't do anything until you serve the ball, so take your time. Calm yourself by bouncing the ball a few times before serving. Take a deep breath and think the ball to the target.
(2) Relax your grip. A "sawdust" grip is a major cause of tennis elbow and a characteristic of a nervous game. When serving check to see that you are allowing the grip to breathe.

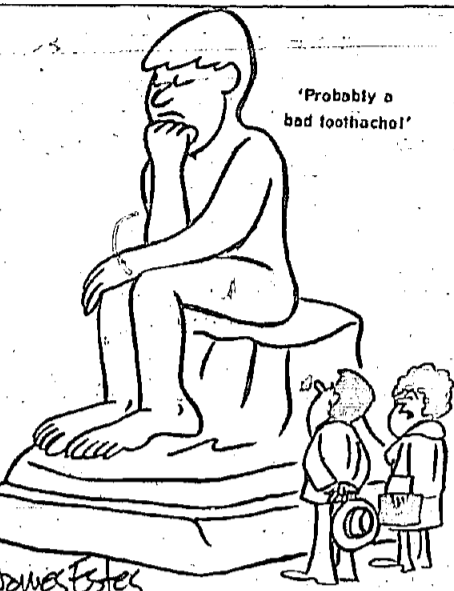
