The center, designed to provide basic and developmental studies in the areas of reading, written composition and mathematics, is open to all Union College students as well as to non-student "underdevelopment" and "handicapped" residents of Elizabethtown and other Eastern Union County communities through a manager service program.

"Whether one wants to improve his basic skills or to receive specialized instruction in vocational goals, the Learning Resource Center can provide assistance," said Pufahl. "The center stresses individualized instruction and permits students to learn at their own pace and convenience."

The center will be operated Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Students who are referred to the center are tested and counseled to determine deficiencies and needs, and the result is a tailored program to meet individual needs. The center is under the direction of John Pufahl, director of the center.

The center has also taught all students in the Hamilton County area, including students at Union College, Eastern Union County Community College, and the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. The center is also open to students at other colleges in the area.

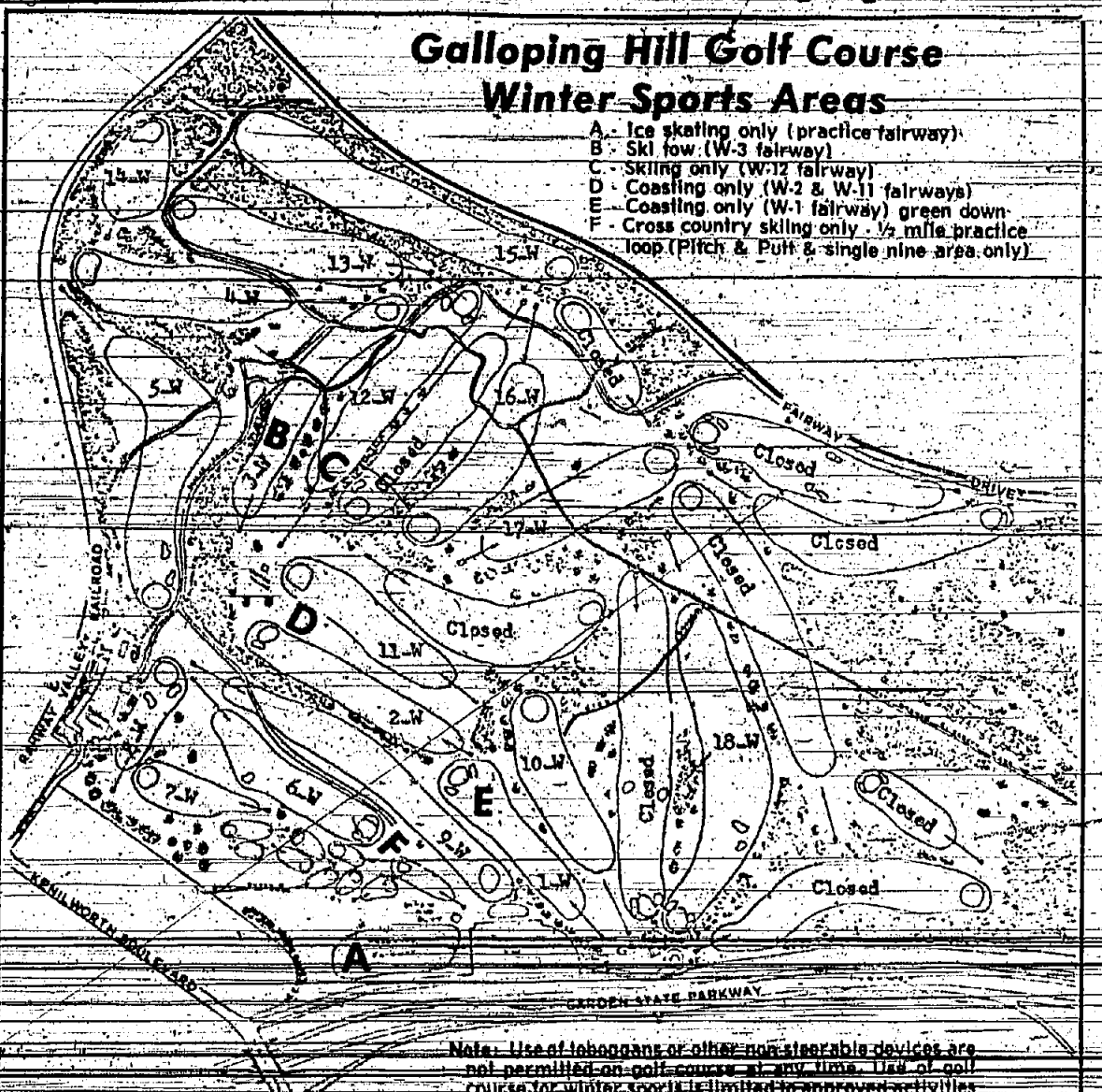

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THE STATE WE'RE IN

New Jersey Gov. Brendan T. Byrne last week was host to representatives of the American Legion, Princeton, organizing a set of state-wide protests against carrying federal support of oil drilling outside the three-mile limit.

When the governors of all these states meet together later in February in the presidential election, I hope they will agree on at least one point: to restrict the federal government's power to support energy and defense programs.

High taxes for oil producers are one thing. Energy programs are another. I think the public would prefer to see a reduction in the federal government's role in these areas.

The obvious cause of this change is that politicians tend to think in terms of the next election. They are not thinking in terms of the long-term interests of the country.

It is not surprising that the Washington lobbyists for the oil industry and other interests are so active in this area. They are trying to influence the government's policy on energy.

I suspect that governors may be more likely to take the public's lead in this area. They are more directly accountable to the voters.

New Jersey's energy policy is one of the most environmentally sound in the country. It is a model for other states to follow.

That New Jersey's government is looking for a way to reduce its dependence on oil is a sign of progress. It shows that the state is taking a long-term view of its energy needs.

Washington knows it. It can add a lot of heat to the argument. But it cannot change the fact that the public is beginning to demand a change in policy.

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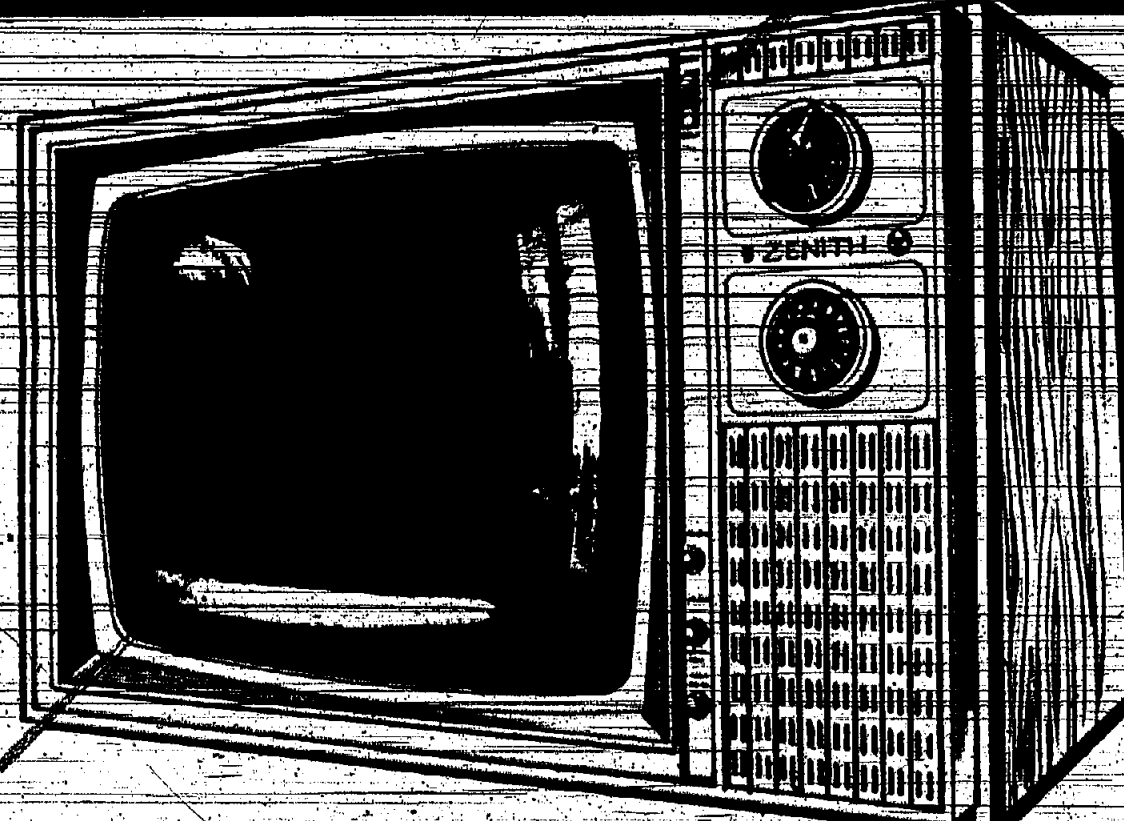

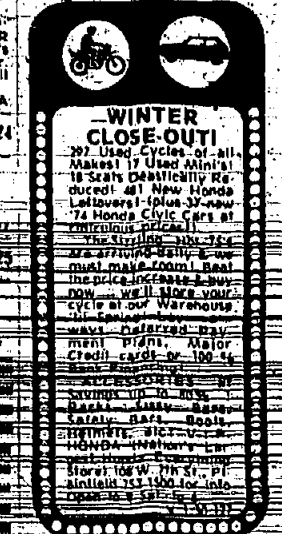
