FOR THE GIFTED

This week the Leader begins publication of excerpts from guidelines compiled by the Springfield Board of Education for special programs for youngsters who are academically gifted or artistically or musically talented.

There has been some criticism that the report is less than precise in spelling out just what is to be done—but that is beyond the scope of this report by a committee of administrators, teachers and parents.

The guidelines are designed to serve as a philosophy and framework for a curriculum being set up for the summer by staff members. That should contain all the specifics anyone might want.

What is important is that the school system, which comes up to the eighth grade is aware of its obligation to help each child develop to the limit of his or her potential.

This goal is important, whether the child is a bright or average or gifted in academic ability and whether the special talent lies in athletics or the fields of visual or performing art.

UNDERSTANDING DRUG ABUSE

Robert L. DuPont, M.D., Director, National Institute on Drug Abuse

How much is an adolescent's use of marijuana affected by the parental drug use?

Recent studies of drug use among young people, and of the social and psychological influences which cause them to use or not to use drugs.

Parental influence is most notable among adolescents, especially girls, whose mothers are smokers.

Among adolescents who report this form of parental "use," use of marijuana is compared to 24 percent who say their mothers do not use drugs.

The role of friends is far more crucial. Among adolescents who report that they have not smoked marijuana, only 13 percent use it.

When both parents and friends use drugs, the result is the highest rate of adolescent marijuana use found in any extensive study.

Although the strong influence of peer pressure on marijuana use is well documented, many adolescent researchers are beginning to accept the view that their behavior is a function of group pressures.

They are curious and experience social anxiety and peer influences, attainment of a state of well-being, instant achievement, relaxation, recreation or the avoidance of "boredom."

Home loans restored

VA officials explained that the Veterans Housing Act of 1974 (PL 93-509, Dec. 31, 1974) restored the GI home loan benefit which had been discontinued in 1969.

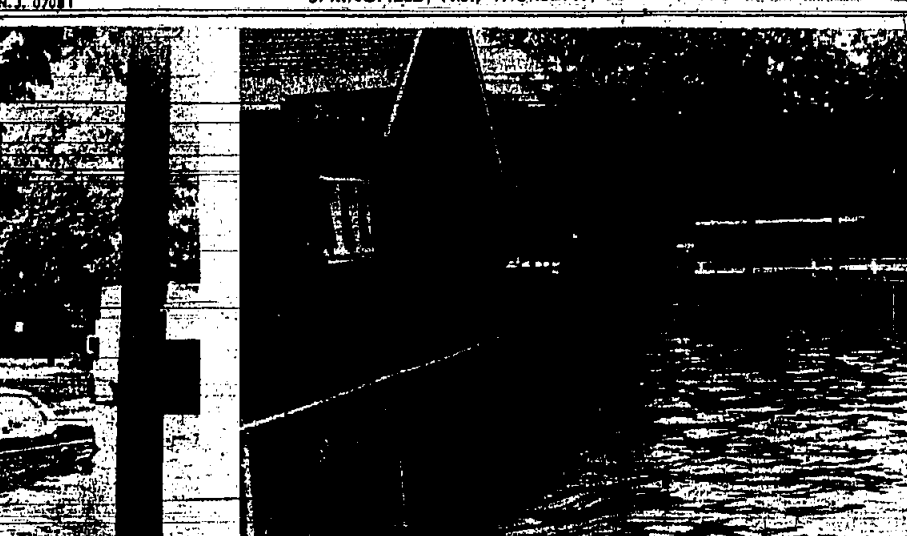

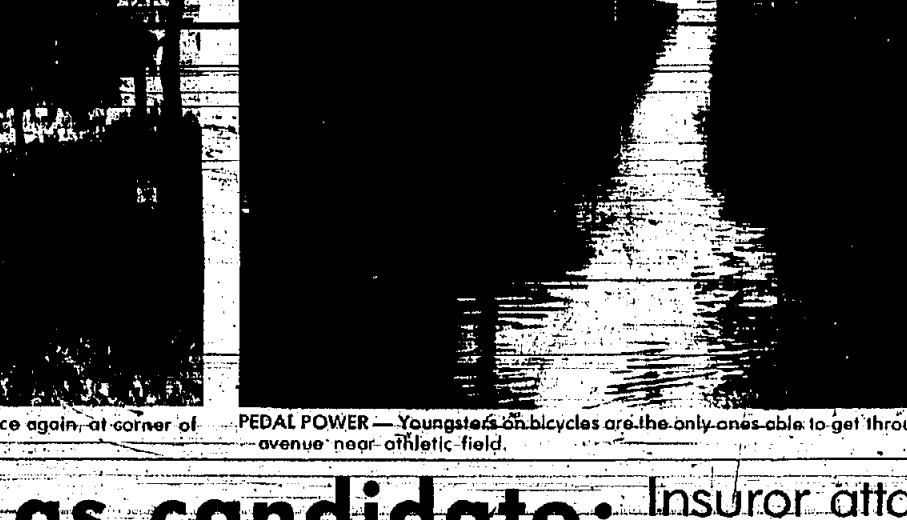
