Regional auditions to be held by New Jersey State Opera

The first regional auditions awards program of the New Jersey State Opera, has been scheduled for early in 1976. With winners to receive scholarship awards and possibly a contract with the State Opera.

Six regional auditions will be held in January and February. In April, regional winners will compete in the finals at Symphony Hall, Newark, for first, second and third prizes of \$100, \$50 and \$25. Final winners will be announced in May.

The program is sponsored by Friends of the New Jersey State Opera. In announcing the competition, Mrs. William A. Cromarty, chairman of Friends of the Opera and the regional auditions, said that singers between the ages of 22 and 34 are eligible to participate if they are college graduates or the equivalent and are ready to enter the professional theater.

"Our purpose is to discover and encourage young artists and widen their career opportunities here in their own region without making it necessary for them to go abroad for professional singing experience," said Mrs. Cromarty. She pointed out that audition sites include five colleges and universities.

Mrs. Cromarty announced the following auditions schedule: Tuesday, Jan. 20, Doudass College, New Brunswick; Sunday, Jan. 26, Gloucester State College, Gloucester; Sunday, Feb. 15, Robert Treat Hotel, Crystal Room, Newark; Tuesday, Feb. 17, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Rutherford; Tuesday, Feb. 22, Westminster Choir College, Princeton; Sunday, Feb. 23, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Rutherford.

Judges will include State Opera's artistic director and conductor, Alfredo Silipigni, a well-known voice teacher, a member of the faculty of the host college, and a member of the local sponsoring organization.

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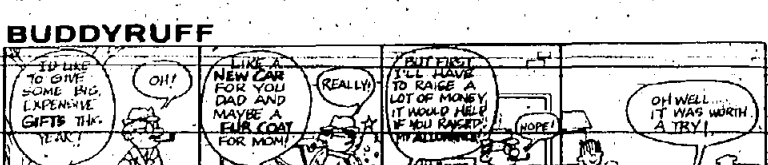

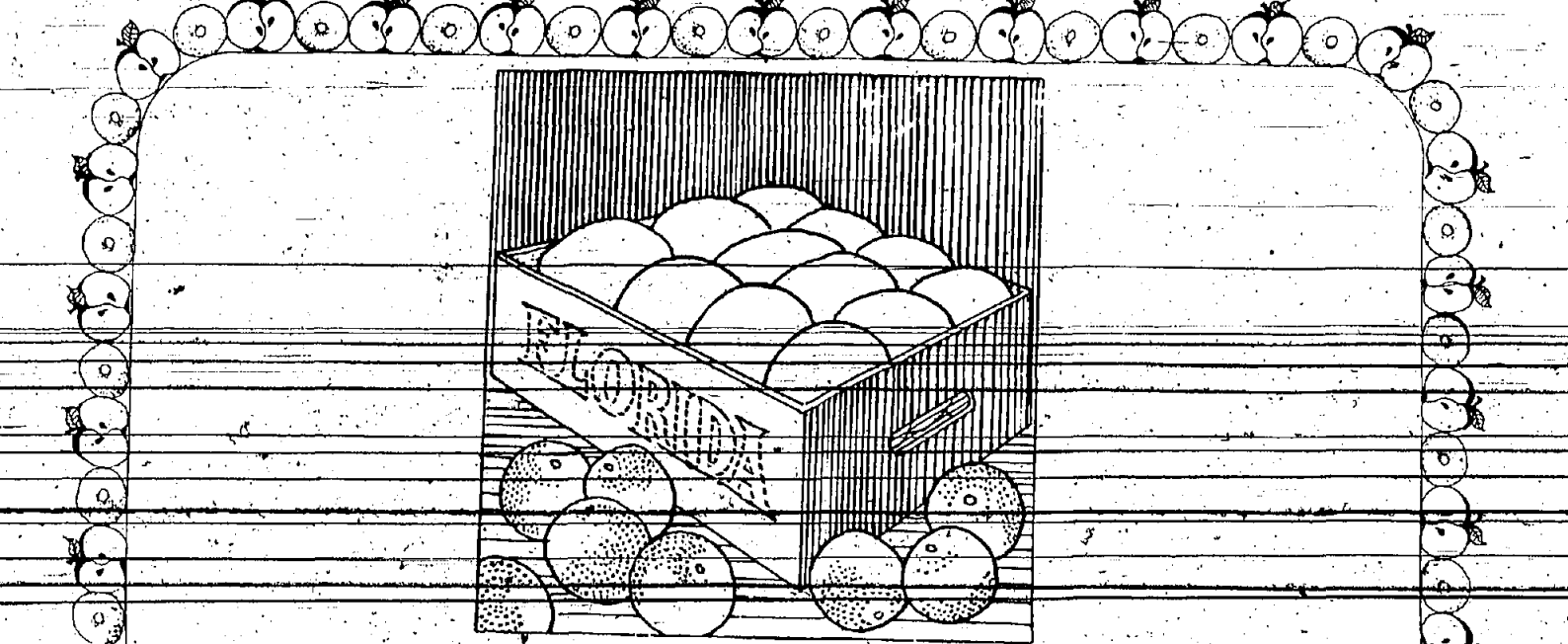

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Township to begin talks on Dec. 22 for dike easement at Rahway River

The Township Committee will meet Dec. 22 with the owner of property needed for a dike along the Rahway River near Marion Avenue. Committee member Edward Sileo Jr. said the town is seeking federal funds through the county block grant organization for six local projects.

Noting that the dike was approved last month by the Bureau of Water Policy, Bureau predicted speedy agreement on the necessary easement. He added, "Then we will appropriate the money and start work."

He also reported that the Bureau of Water Policy had found the papers filed on alleged encroachments along the Hillside Avenue brook. The papers had been mislaid last week. He said the bureau plans to send an inspector to examine the brook "shortly," and that "we will keep after them every week."

Committee member Norman Hammer announced that the town will conduct its last collection tomorrow. After that, he said, all leaves will have to be bagged and placed at curbside for the garbage collectors.

Mrs. Madeline Lancaster, president of the Springfield-Historical Society, reported the committee approved two ordinances. One appropriates \$6,000 for improvements to the main building of the annual school year-end. The other is a \$20,000 bond ordinance for a building for senior citizens.

Improvements at the Cannon Hall House operated by the Historical Society. Funds for a new fire house at a central site. Also mentioned, "Phisphus for the 1976 funding is not on drainage projects, as it was for this year. But if we get enough we will be participating for Springfield."

"We do not expect the paper company we have been dealing with to give us another truck for obvious reasons," the spokesman continued. "We hope this will be true for other companies. Until now, we enjoyed a pretty good reputation, but now we simply are not sure. We will try to hold a Glass-In on Dec. 29."

"Please bring as much paper as you can, tied in bundles, glass, sorted by color and with the rings and open-ended and aluminum cases if a can does not stick to a magnet, it is aluminum."

Discussing the club's project, he said, "The Glass-In provides the community with its only major source of recycling of any kind. It is important because it helps avoid pollution caused by the disposal of reusable items, saves energy and helps manufacturing these articles, and prevents the additional pollution which accompanies their manufacture."

The Glass-In also provides the Key Club with the funds it needs to operate its services to the community and the school. The money raised from the Glass-In goes to our foster child in Columbus. To the donations we make to the fight against various diseases, to our charity drives' expenses, such as those for diabetics and Huntington's Disease, and other contributions we make to the community.

"The Key Club feels that this drive was not accidental," he continued. "It was set by someone who didn't really care about the consequences to himself, the club or the community."

"As far as we know, the facts are as follows: Our people finished cleaning the area between 8 and 1:30 p.m. When they left, all the doors to the truck were closed. Almost no one in Key Club smokes, and if they do, they certainly do not do it in the truck. At 7:45 p.m. Andy Decker, a Key Club member, was coming home with his family along Rt. 22. He noticed smoke coming out of the open back of the truck and immediately notified the fire department."

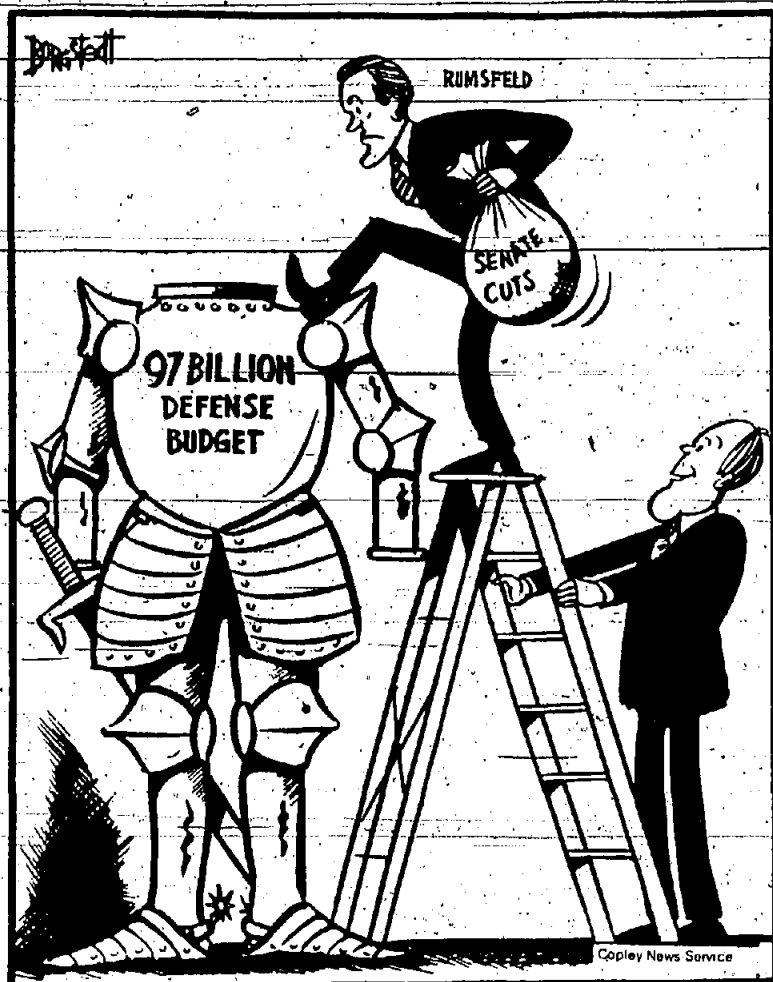

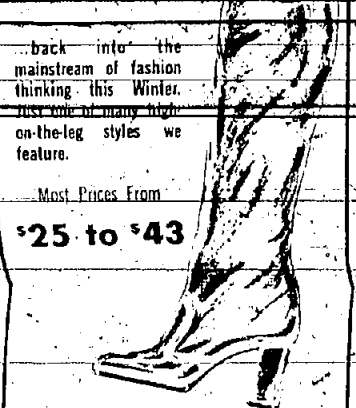

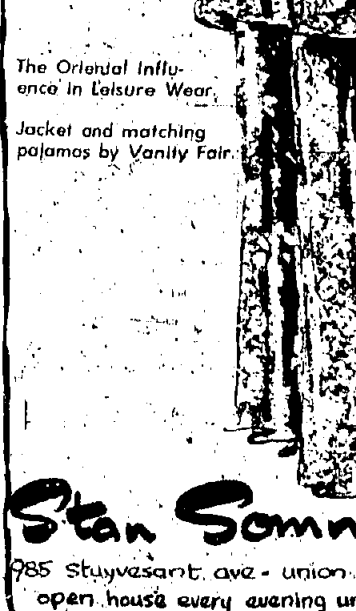

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U.S. to reimburse welfare board for child support cost

The Union County Welfare Board has been notified to reimburse the state for the cost of child support enforcement. The board is eligible for reimbursement by the federal government for 75 percent of the expenses incurred in child support activities.

Gladys Swanson, chairman of the board, explained that Title IV-D of the Social Security Act is designed to reduce welfare costs through the enforcement of the child support obligations of absent parents.

"Each parent who currently receives or who applies for welfare assistance under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program will be required to assign to the state his/her rights to support from an absent parent. When the absent parent is located and compelled to pay support, 25 percent of the net amount collected by the welfare board during each of the first 12 months will be retained as an incentive bonus," she said.

"Under the federal law, each state is required to establish a uniform program of child support enforcement. This program must include such activities as location of absent parents, establishment of paternity and enforcement of support obligations.

"The services of the county welfare board will be expanded, where necessary, in order to conform to federal regulations. This expansion of service would require that county welfare boards hire additional staff. Additional expenditures should be affected by the federal reimbursement. This program becomes effective July 1, 1975, and is for a 15-month period," Mrs. Swanson concluded.
