Exxon executive talks to Kiwanis

The large quantities of fuel consumed by today's jumbo jets are free of harmful impurities as distilled water because of refining processes, fuel additives, handling equipment and fueling procedures developed by petroleum companies, David Wynn of Exxon Research and Engineering Company told members of the Milburn-Springfield Kiwanis Club last week at the club's Christmas dinner at the Overlook Hotel.

When comparing your electric bill month by month and paying special attention to the number of kilowatt hours you consume, you will most likely find that your bill varies with the seasons.

If your home is not air conditioned, your winter bills are usually higher than your summer bills. What elements contribute to the higher winter bills? Experts in the period from December to March.

For starters, you use more lighting in winter. Heating systems use more electricity in winter than in summer. Hot water heaters use more electricity in winter than in summer. More people cook more on colder days. The use of electric space heaters is also a factor.

Firemen note precautions for holiday safety

In an effort to prevent holiday fire tragedies which can result from careless use of Yuletide decorations, the Springfield Fire Department has issued the following list of safety precautions:

—Check decorative lighting strings for frayed wires, broken cords, and loose sockets, which pose potential electrical hazards. Do not plug strings bearing UL labels.

—Do not overload the electrical sockets in your home. Read carefully the manufacturer's instructions on lighting strings and do not use more than the recommended number of strings on one circuit.

—Don't place your Christmas tree near a fireplace, radiator or television set; any source of heat may cause the tree to become dry, creating an additional fire hazard.

—When you leave your home or retire for the night, turn off all lighting decorations.

Per capita property taxes in New Jersey rose nearly \$1 per capita in fiscal 1974 over 1973 to \$29.66, according to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis. This is the highest per capita property tax in the nation.

Per capita property taxes in New Jersey are nearly all assessed and collected at the municipal level, were only about four dollars per capita less than in California, and Connecticut follow the list of high per capita property taxes. New Jersey continues to rely heavily on this form of taxation. More than 50 percent of total tax revenue financing state and local government in fiscal 1974 came from property taxes. Only New Hampshire at 38 percent depends more on revenue from other sources.

The total per capita tax burden of the Garden State, \$68, resulted in retention of a national ranking of 10th. New York heads this list with \$92 per capita, \$18 above Massachusetts, and the third category of taxes — "all other," which in New Jersey is mainly non-property state taxes, has state's per capita amount of \$34 dropped its rank from 44th to 46th, even though it increased by \$22 per capita. New York is second at \$600 topped by Hawaii with \$621 per capita.

Inviting everyone to "come on up to the top of the world," 200 New York and New Jersey school children this week will be looking at the world's highest, open observation deck atop the Port Authority Trade Center.

At the opening day celebration, 1,275 feet above the Hudson River, Port Authority Chairman William J. Honan said: "I am sure that this spot, at the crossroads of international commerce, will attract thousands upon thousands of visitors from all over the world."

Mayor Abraham D. Beame, who was also present for the festivities, pointed out that "this observation deck tops off the new identifying landmark on the nation's greatest port and the world's most interesting and vital city."

The observation deck, located atop the Trade Center's South Tower Building, includes an enclosed observation gallery on the 107th floor, as well as the open rooftop promenade above the 110th story.

The "Industrial Bats of New Jersey," the seaports, Newark International Airport, the cities of Newark and Jersey City and as far as the Washington, D.C. area are visible to the west.

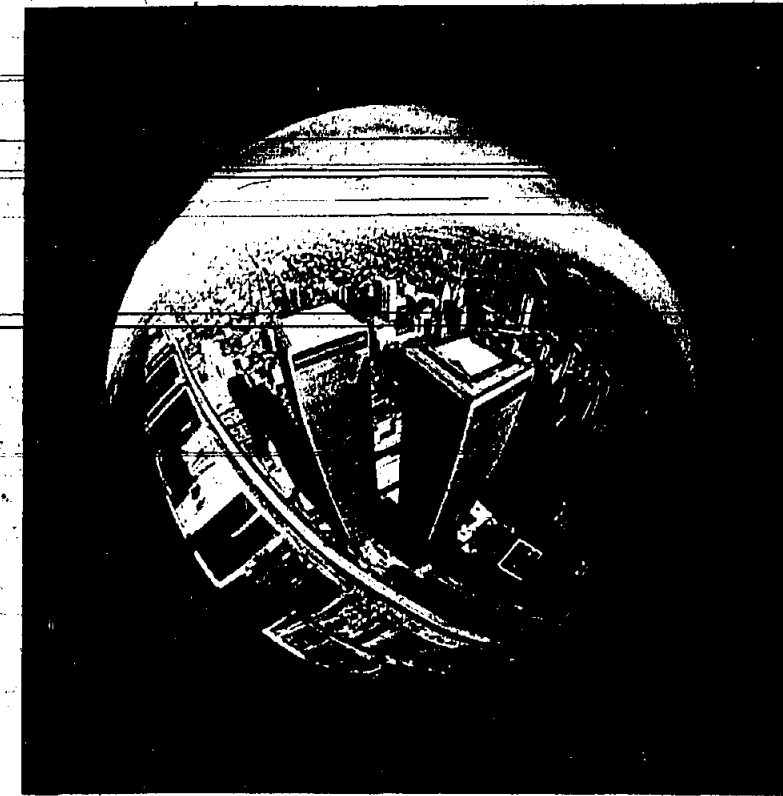
To the north, the Hudson harbor, the Statue of Liberty, Staten Island, Coney Island, Sandy Hook and the Atlantic Ocean dominate the vista.

The World Trade Center observation deck also offers a history of Trade exhibit on the 107th floor observation gallery.

Tracing the development of international commerce from ancient times to the present, the multi-media exhibit covers such subjects as the first use of trademarks, the development of money and currency, patterns of trade in the Port of New York-New Jersey, and predictions for future developments in world trade.

The 107th floor also houses a seasonal gift shop. The Sky Caravan will bring from Manhattan's Rockefeller Center and cafe is scheduled to open next summer.

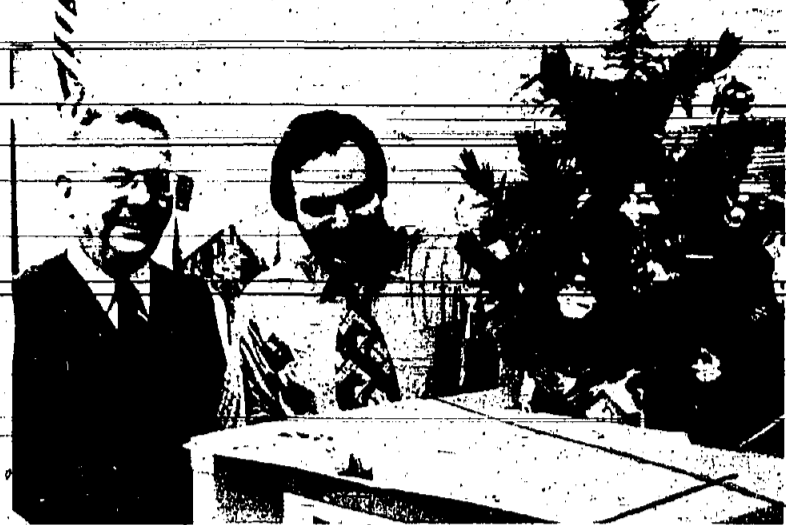

State survey ties college education to family's income

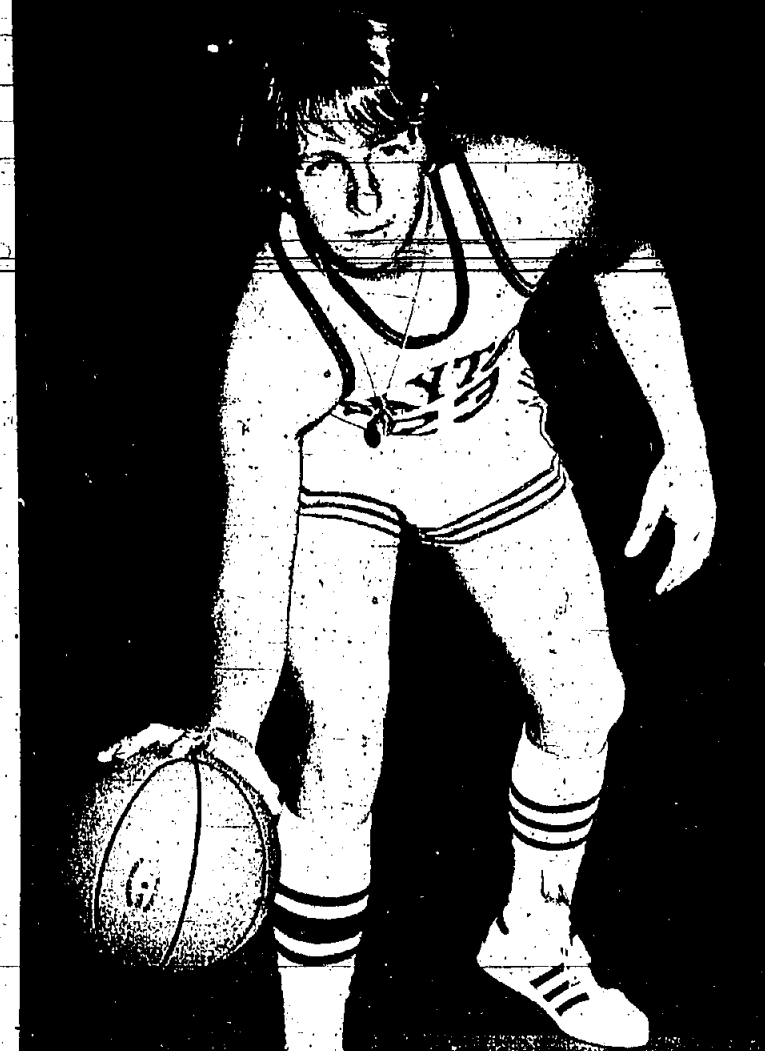
