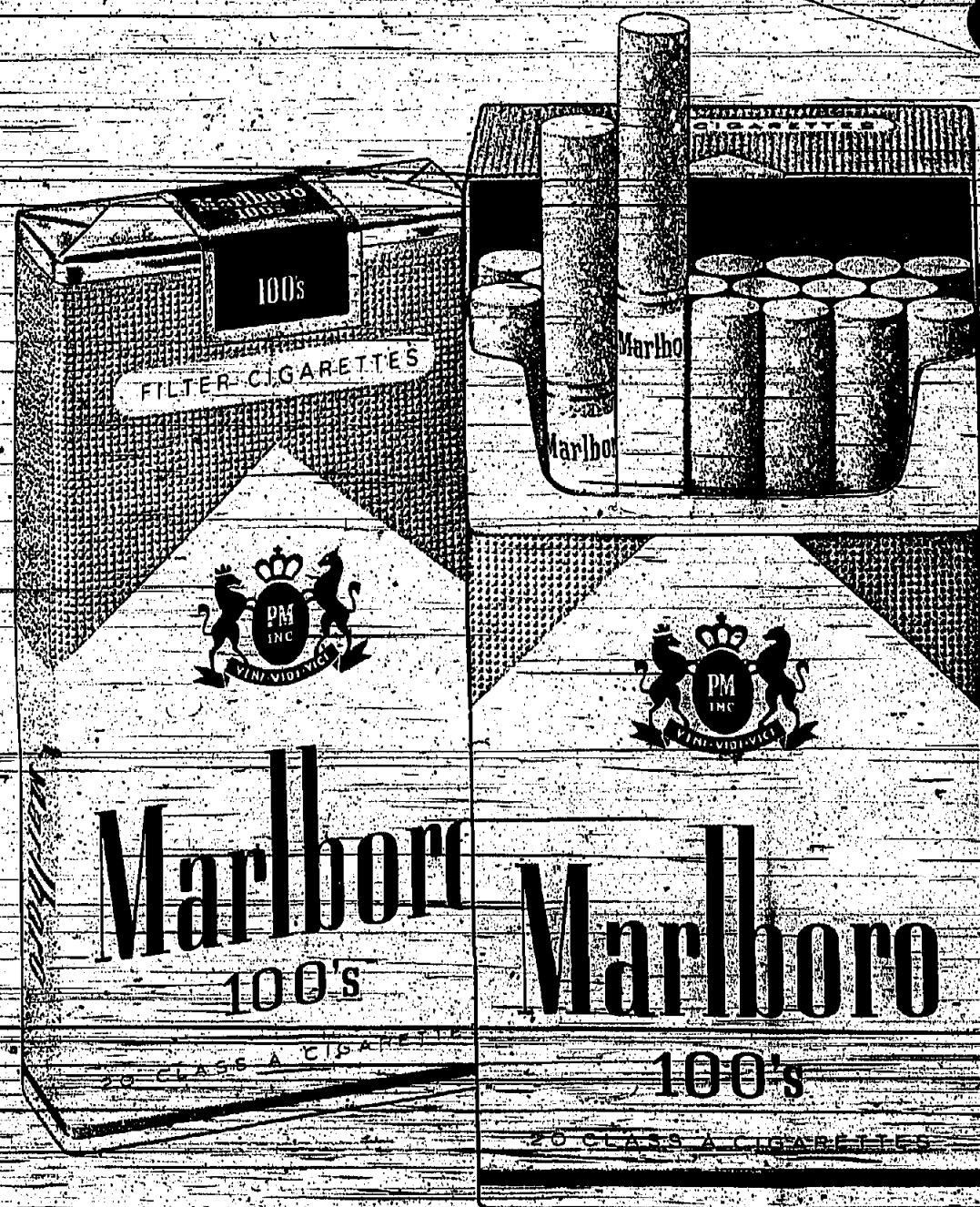

Buehrer begins term leading to tenure in '78

The Township Committee began its work for 1976 with the annual organizational meeting on New Year's Day. Joanne Rajoppi was sworn in as Springfield's first township committeewoman and Robert Weltchek was named as chairman of the governing body with the title of mayor. Both are Democrats.

Arthur Buehrer, a Republican, was sworn in for his second three-year term as township clerk. He will automatically receive tenure in office at the end of 1977.

"As he moved into the mayor's seat, at the center of the job, Weltchek commented that he has been in all five chairs. "This is the most comfortable," he added, "four years tend to be the better."

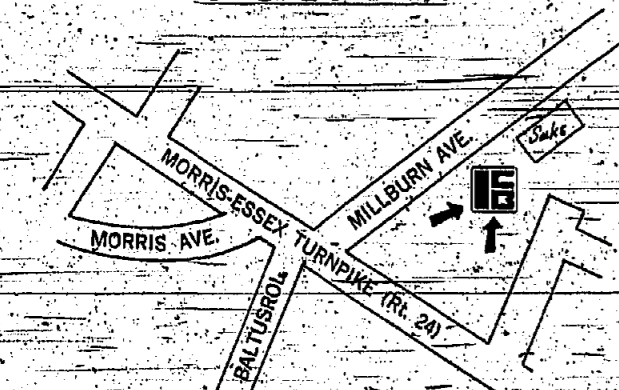

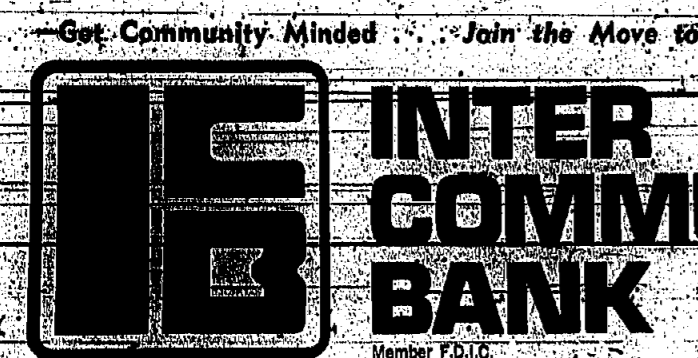

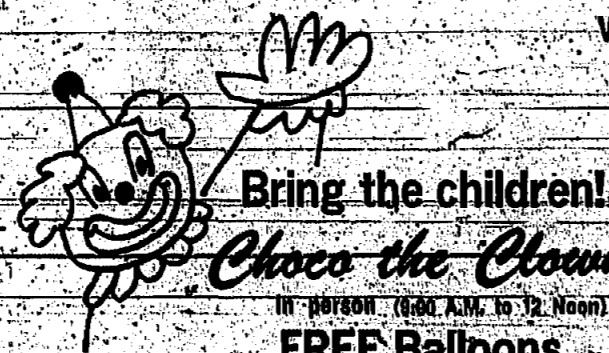

Viet vet relives Revolution Jersey Blues recreate battles

While many Americans will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Revolutionary War, Walter Meyer of Elizabeth will be reliving them — as a soldier of the American Revolution.

Director of veterans affairs at Union College and Union County Technical Institute, Meyer enlisted last year in the 150th member Brigade of the American Revolution and is committed through 1976 to participating in the 1776-1781 Revolutionary battles and commemorating the use of duty firearms and equipment as a member of the brigade.

Attached to the 3rd Regiment of New Jersey, nicknamed the "Jersey Blues," Meyer's involvement in the Revolutionary War has already taken him to Quebec, Saratoga, Newburg, N. Y., and East Hampton as well as to many smaller battlefields. The New-Year will bring him to Morristown, Fort Dix, West Point, Aberdeen, Md., Fort Stanwix, N.Y., and finally to local spots such as Springfield, where the 3rd Regiment fought.

"If someone had told me a year ago that I'd be researching minute details and original documents of the American Revolution, I would have thought them crazy," Meyer admitted. "When we set up an 18th century camp, demonstrate military maneuvers — for the public, and live an early American existence all weekend, I can't help but become absorbed in the entire period.

Authenticity is the name of the game for the soldiers. "For example, our shirts must be handwoven of loose weave, not synthetic, and if we wear knee breeches, we have to wear buckled shoes. We are not allowed to wear any rings or watches or other jewelry. If I see a pair of jeans, they must be made and finished in 18th century frames."

Meyer confessed that part of his attraction for the brigade is recreation. "There are no phones, ringing on weekends, no running around," he said. "Everything is slower and easier. It's difficult to get re-accepted to the work week after an early American weekend."

Who will Meyer, who fought on unopposed at the Battle of the Clouds, would like to become involved in another — the American Revolution — is "I'd like to see the 1781 campaign."

"There is a pressure to join the brigade and my involvement is more fun than anything else," Meyer commented. "We don't get ourselves as good as a good sleep."

Actually, the American troops didn't start winning the war until 1781. "Mentally, they were not as good as the military discipline."

The 200th anniversary of the United States will not be the activities of the brigade, Meyer said. "The Revolution lasted until 1781 when the Treaty of Paris was signed and Great Britain recognized the independence of the States. After the Revolutionary War, the British may leave but those who are really interested in American history will remain."

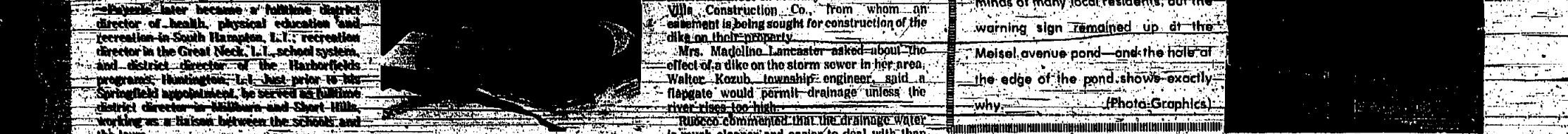

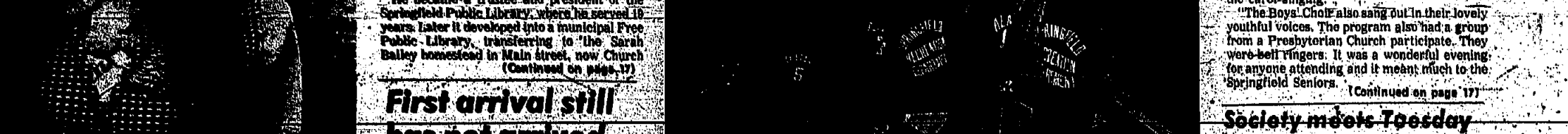
