### VA advises vets to convert policies to permanent plan

James R. Purdy, director of the Veterans Administration, advised veterans to convert their National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) policies to give consideration to the insurance level premium plan.

The NSLI program was started in 1940 to serve the insurance needs of World War II veterans. Purdy explained that up to 2 million policies were issued before the program was phased out.

Term insurance premiums increase sharply at each renewal. The VA is now offering a permanent plan which is more economical than term insurance.

The VA offers a number of permanent plans of insurance, all of which offer cash and loan benefits. The VA also offers a conversion privilege for NSLI policies.

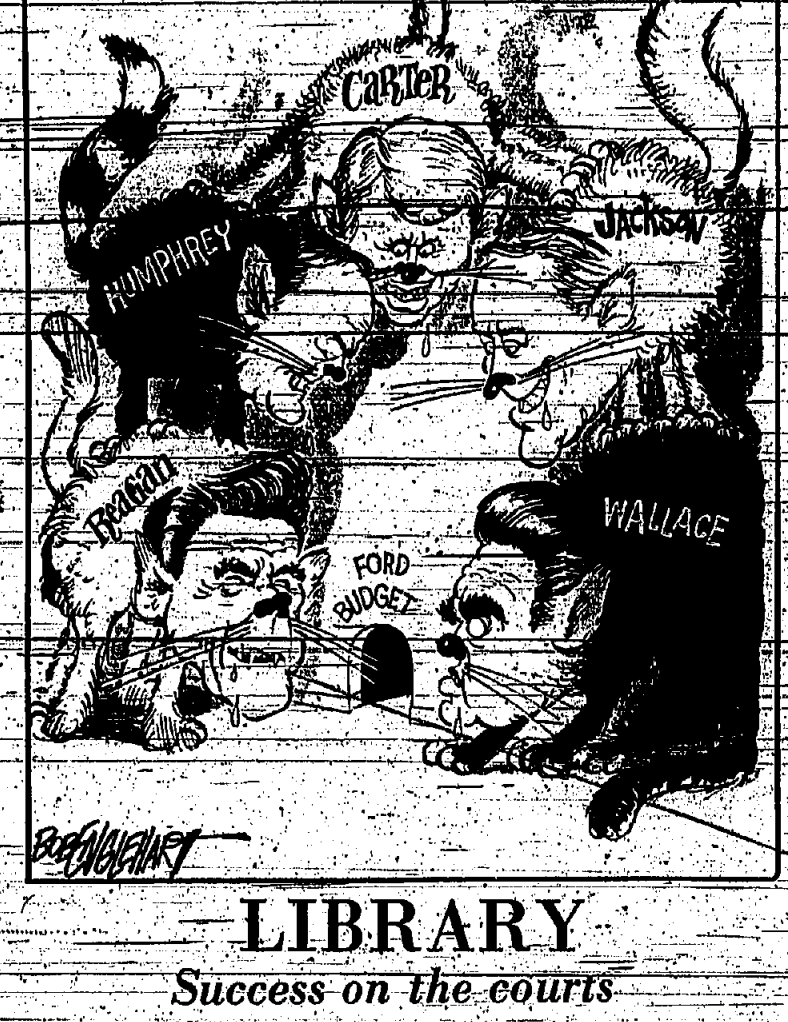

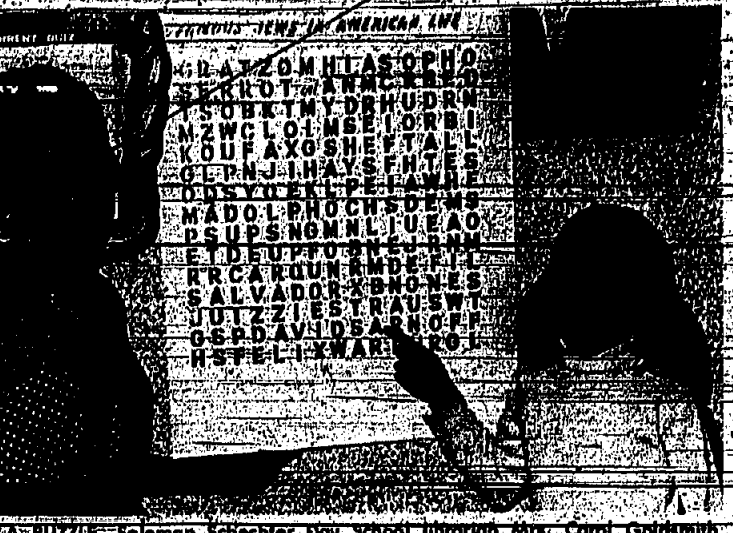

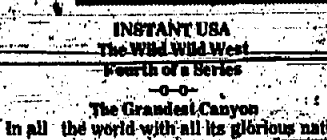

COLONEL FRANCIS BARBER  
Elizabethan Educator and Soldier

Colonel Francis Barber, the son of an Irish immigrant, was born in Princeton in the year 1721. He attended Rutgers, then the Elizabethan School in Elizabethtown where three of his classmates were Matthias and Aaron Ogden and Aaron Burr.

At the completion of his education at the Classical School, he continued his studies at the College of New Jersey graduating in 1742. For a short time thereafter he taught at Newbridge, Hackensack.

Upon receiving a notice of resignation from the Trustees of the Elizabethan School, he was elected the trustee of the school for Upper Meriden. He was a fine and able man for the position. The board members - Dr. Thomas Caldwell, Dr. Thomas Chandler, John Chewwood and Elias Boudinet interviewed many applicants before offering the post to 20-year-old Francis Barber who accepted. He was a fine and able man for the position.

One of Barber's brightest students during his tenure at the school was 14-year-old Alexander Hamilton. He was a fine and able man for the position.

Barber married Mary Ogden, the daughter of Matthias and Aaron Ogden, in 1748. Their marriage was of short duration as Mary died at the age of 21. Following her death Barber continued to live with his mother-in-law, Mrs. Ogden, until the late 1750s.

In the year 1774 just about the end of schooling in Elizabethtown, Congress offered Barber a major's commission in the 3rd Battalion of New Jersey Militia. He accepted the commission. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the 3rd New Jersey Regiment. Barber's role in the war was to lead the 3rd New Jersey Regiment in the Battle of Red Bank. He was a fine and able man for the position.

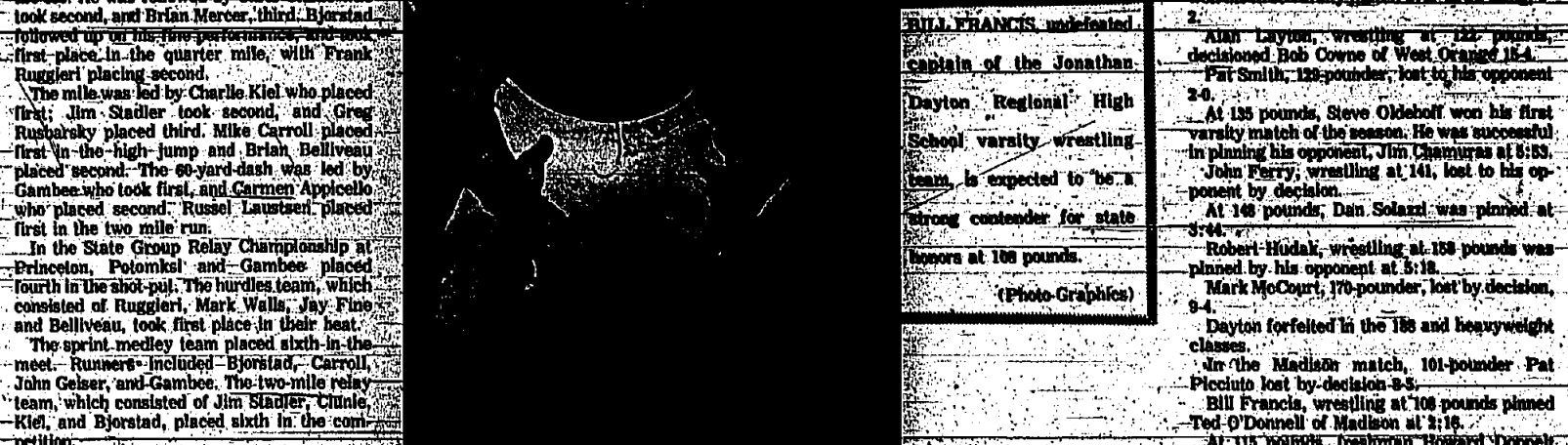

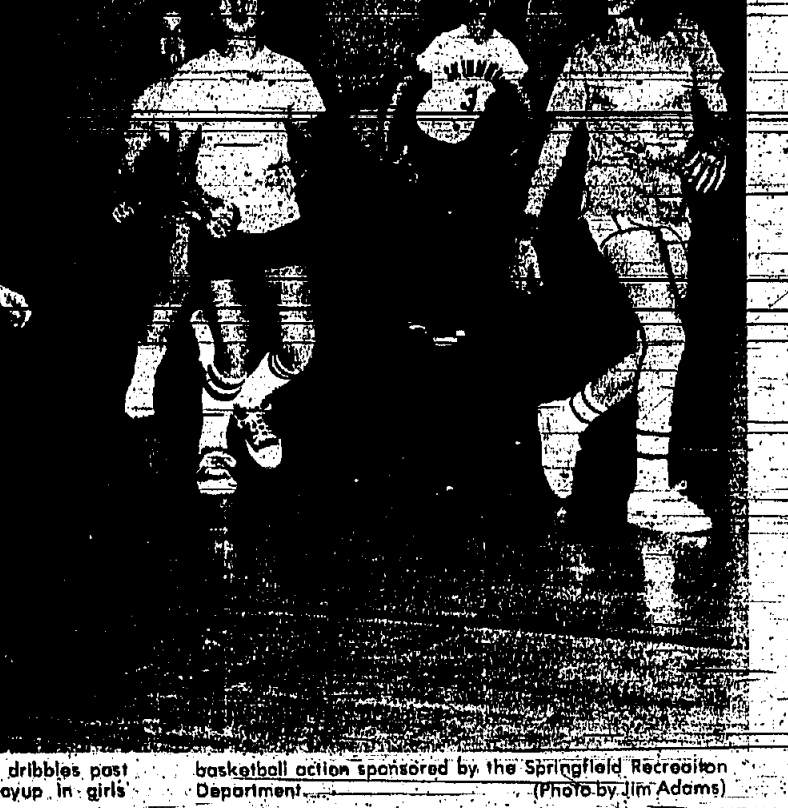

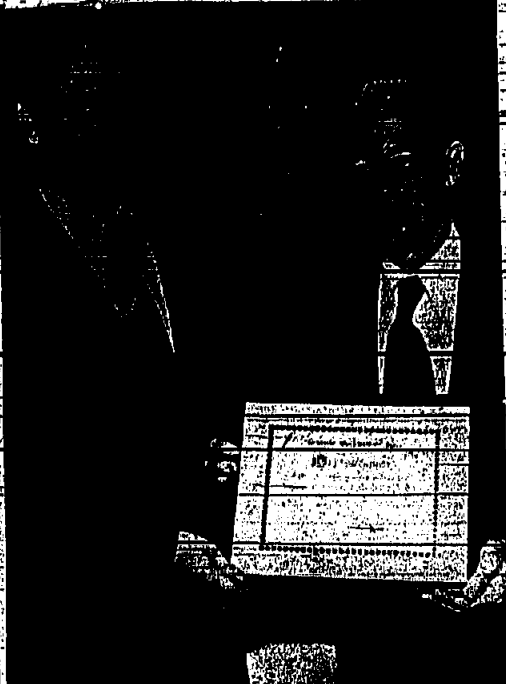

## Mayor: state creates chaos in school and town budgets

Mayor Robert Weltsch Tuesday night blamed state officials for the difficulties that municipalities and boards of education face in trying to prepare their budgets for the coming year.

The mayor spoke to the 20 members of the Board of Education at a meeting Tuesday at Town Hall that committee members are at work preparing their new budget, which will have to deal with a probable loss of all state aid to the township and to the Springfield and Regional High School boards of education.

Weltsch said, "There is a general feeling of outrage. The state is creating chaos in the municipalities by solving its own problems. They are eliminating sales tax payments to the municipalities, and forcing the boards to take over former state contributions to the pension fund - contributions mandated by state law."

He added, "I hope the special session will give serious reflection to what they are doing before they pass this budget. In Springfield, it will result in a tremendous burden to the taxpayers. The upper local residents to express their concern in letters to the legislators. (See listing of legislators on page 4.)"

**IN OTHER BUSINESS**, the committee introduced an ordinance to permit a limited municipal pool. A final hearing is set for Feb. 24.

Committee member Jeanne Rajmoff said that residents would be permitted to take out associate family memberships 60 days after all local families are informed that memberships are available. Each household family would have to be sponsored by a local family member. The maximum number of memberships would reach 4,000 persons, out of a total capacity of 8,000.

The governing body is taking this action reluctantly to avert a probable deficit as the only alternative yet found to an increase in membership fees. Supporting efforts by the Recreation Committee to find another avenue, she called on all concerned citizens to attend a meeting of the recreation panel Tuesday night at the Sarah Bailey Civic Center.

Martin Manes Recreation Committee chairman, said after the meeting that membership receipts for the past seven years have been as follows: \$104,000 in 1969, \$100,000 in 1970, \$103,000 in 1971, \$96,000 in 1972, \$93,000 in 1973, \$105,000 in 1974 and \$101,000 in 1975. The pool was opened in 1965.

The membership fee was \$75 from 1969 to 1972, \$85 in 1973 and \$90 for the past two years. He stressed that costs have continued to rise through this period. Membership in 1969 was 1,331 families or 5,839 persons; last year, 1,613 families or 6,452 persons. Other members of the governing body noted that the decline has paralleled a drop in school population.

The controversy over possible flood damage caused by encroachments along the Hillside Avenue brook continued with the release of a letter sent to the board of education by the town engineer. The letter stated that the board of education has been an spokesman for residents in this area - either by recurrent flooding.

The letter stated that there are several encroachments, but that "The removal of these structures will not eliminate or decrease your flooding problems; most of these structures have existed for 30 or 40 years, and most if not all of these neighbors purchase their property with those various structures in place."

Burnham read his reply, which listed extensive flood damage to the area.
