Dr. Kenny said. "The mathematics ability of students who were 10th graders during 1974-1975 in the Regional District is very good. It is indicated by an overall balance between skill areas in mathematics."

Instructional reinforcement may be indicated in the area of study skills on the items dealing with dictionary skills, the use of maps and the use of tables of content.

Dr. Kenny reported that the main body of the 10th graders did very good. Ability to deal with fractions, decimals, percent, algebra and geometry is consistently above reference scores.

In comparison to the reference criteria, scores on working with fractions were higher on 87 percent of the items; decimals-percent score was higher on 58 percent of the items. While scores in the whole number cluster paralleled reference standards, one item indicated difficulty in the location of points in a coordinate plane, which is influenced by the area where the skill is emphasized.

According to Dr. Kenny, strengths shown in 10th grade reading and math were as follows:

- Reading comprehension is at a good level of development. Ability in the use of reference books and card catalog is very good. Skills in reading and writing are highly developed. Ability to solve problems in algebra and geometry is very good.
- The 10th grade reading and math results, as compared to the reference criteria, do not indicate any areas of need for algebra. Their good understanding and use of the skills required in algebra and problem solving are good.

Prospects come looking

Subtraction. More attention to the subtraction of multiple numbers with regrouping is indicated.

Multiplication. Division—Results suggest a need for more multiplication practice with two-digit numbers, with and without a remainder.

Number and operation. This cluster included cardinality, ordinality, locating points on a number line, properties of number operations, commutative and associative principles, informal concept, identity, simple addition and subtraction problems, addition-subtraction problems in real areas.

Phonetic analysis. This cluster is characterized by identification of short and long vowels, vowel and consonant digraphs, word-building, slight consonant and vowel sounds. Students performed satisfactorily on all items.

SEVENTH GRADE-MATHEMATICS. Analysis of test results indicated highly satisfactory achievement for 7th graders. Students toward the grade for mathematics are:

- Reading comprehension.** Above average performance was noted.
- Interpretive skills.** This cluster consisted of character identification, drawing inferences, prediction of outcome, fact, fiction and selection, interpretive illustrations. Performance on all items was satisfactory.
- Study skills.** The emphasis of this cluster was on glossary library skills, alphabetizing, dictionary skills, table of contents, index, following directions. Results were again satisfactory.

Revolution benefitted art of surgery Colonial medicine featured in Rutgers exhibit

The familiar saying that "the operation was a success" is a modern-day idiom, a phrase that would have been unheard of in the days of the American Revolution. In fact, the very word "operation" was not used until the late 18th century.

But Ronald B. Becker at Rutgers' Alexander Library here points out that the library's intriguing Bicentennial exhibit, "New Jersey Medicine: The Revolutionary Era," traces the history of medicine in the state during a time when the art of surgery was in its infancy.

Becker, assistant curator of special collections at the library and the man responsible for setting up the exhibit, explains that the primitive art of surgery was practiced by those who were trained in the military. He says that the military surgeons were often "remarkably skilled."

A catalogue entitled "New Jersey Medicine in the Revolutionary Era" is available at the exhibit in the Library's New Jersey Room and published by The New Jersey Historical Society.

An article by Dr. Fred B. Rogers, physician, states that approximately 4,000 American soldiers died in battle during the Revolution.

"Significantly," Rogers writes, "it is estimated that to these military deaths were attributable to illness—small pox, typhoid fever, dysentery and pneumonia being the chief causes. Average expectancy then was about 35 years; medicine and public health as we know them, hardly existed."

Only two medical schools, those at Columbia University and the University of Pennsylvania, existed in the 18th century, the subtext of the Revolution. Most physicians
