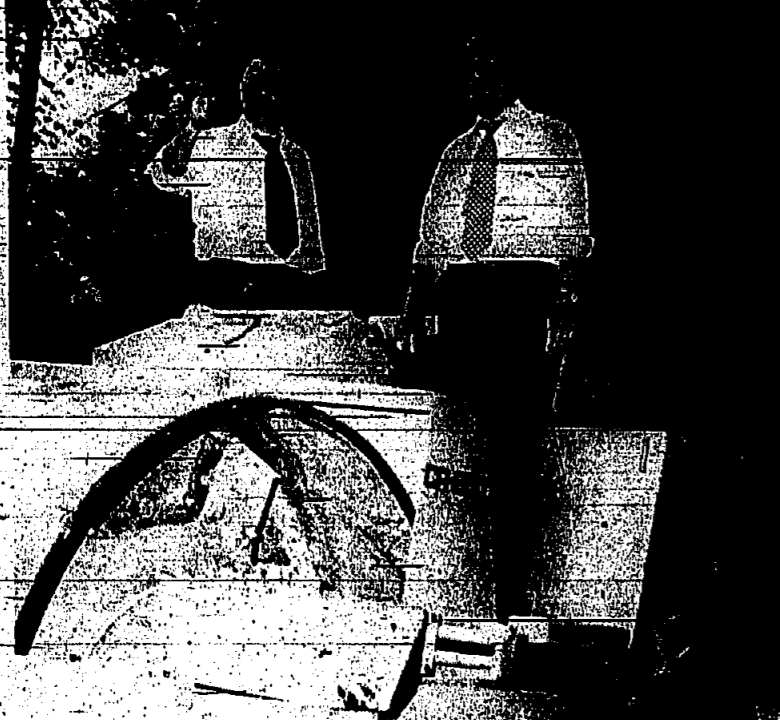
Miss Davis, daughter of George Davis, majored in liberal arts and urban studies at Union College. She is a graduate of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School.

### Weltchek and Stokes proud of community improvements

Mayor Bob Weltchek and former Mayor Nick Stokes, running for re-election to the Township Committee in the Democratic primary election on June 8, this week took time to visit the site of Springfield's flood control project. They are joined by other community leaders in Union County in flood control.

"Our opponent in the primary has never given any indication of awareness of community activities or needs," says Weltchek. "I have presented his record to the Township Committee and to the Democratic and Republican parties in town and we reject his record. We have in large measure been responsible for the many improvements to be found in our local government."

"How he opposes us in the primary election, we are sure the voters will agree that our qualifications for office are better."

"We are adding to the review some of the changes that have been made in Springfield while we have been in office. At the time we began our terms, we were being granted in Springfield a flood control project. We were pleased to stop that and we did. Not one office building has been destroyed in a residential area since then."

"A major shopping center was about to be developed in the 22nd street area. We first decided to office. We opposed this development and blocked it."

"Springfield's citizens were plagued by flooding from the various streets and brooks each time it rained heavily. Since we have been in office, a dike has been built along Washington avenue, Bryant Brook has been channelled, the brook by the high school is being channelled and a dike along Washington avenue has been moved forward. We are ahead of every other community in Union County in flood control work."

"At the time we took office, tenants in Springfield were being gouged with 20 and 30 percent annual rental increases. We formed a tenant-landlord committee to mediate disputes and enacted one of New Jersey's first rent control ordinances. Our tenants have equitable treatment of landlords and tenants."

"Senior citizens programs have broadened during our office holding. The town now has a meal service and a lunch program. We recently received a grant to expand Sarah Taylor Civic Center to provide additional facilities for both senior citizens and teenagers. And, of course, planning our senior citizen housing project has gone forward with a wall section on funding proposals."

"In the area of recreation, we formed the citizens' recreation committee. There was here under our predecessors. We have an entire new girls' softball program. A gymnastic program has begun. Two new tennis courts were added along with a system of baggins to limit their use to the town's residents. A day camp was begun and the pool along with more evening activities."

"A very important accomplishment that is not nearly so visible as flood control dike and tennis courts is our holding of the municipal part of the tax rate—the only part we have controlled. Last year, we cut it 2 1/2 points this year."

"We have worked to prevent regressive government and would like to continue to do so. We need the support of all Democrats and Independents in the June 8 primary. Our record bears out our campaign slogan: 'Progressive, not premature.' Vote for Weltchek and Stokes on June 8."

### Electric use in the outdoors requires common sense care

WHETHER AN electric device, it is for this reason that electric outlets located outdoors should always be weather-proof. In addition, the National Electrical Code now states that all outdoor receptacles must have ground-fault circuit protection.

A ground-fault is a defect in electrical equipment which allows current to leak to ground. Ground means wet areas or a metal surface. A person touching faulty electric equipment "ground" can be injured. A ground-fault interrupter automatically shuts off the power when the listed leak occurs. Such a device may be installed, but if you are already healthy, you won't be hurt. Ground-fault interrupters are effective and helpful.

In any case, don't let power look outdoors when it is damp or raining. Don't use them when there is rain.

WATCH THESE THINGS: Only heavy duty insulated three-conductor cords should be used with electric tools outdoors—and the refer to equipment as well as the cord attached to the tool. Store the cord indoors when not in use. If you need to use an extension cord to operate equipment on the patio or porch, make sure that it is also the three-prong type and rated to carry the amperage needed by the appliance.

Be especially careful that these cords will be handled and stored properly. Do not allow a cord to play around your car or unsupervised.

SUPPLEMENT OUTLETS: If you are adding a porch or patio to an older home, be sure to have the wiring done by a qualified electrical contractor. He will provide outlets for the activities you plan. Consider at least one fixture for general lighting with a wall switch control either inside the house or in the garage. Installation of the right type will enable you to turn off electricity when in a store, and enjoy clear cooking when the soft broom blow.

In addition, you may want to ask your contractor to install a weatherproof outlet near the front entrance of the house for use as a weatherproof outlet.

Electricity can greatly add to the joys of outdoor living—but it's up to you to treat it with respect.

# New bills are criticized as fostering state authority over local health units

Local health rule has been a headache to Charles E. Napolitano, ABC Lycoming. It's been a pain to any governor, New Jersey ever had. Home rule is logically the other end of the tug line to centralized government. The result: a battle for power, an inevitable consequence of close but competitive political spheres.

Ever since 1968 each New Jersey State administrator tried in its own way to centralize local health departments under actual or quasi-state control. The reasons lie in the facts of power inherent in health law and in the traditional weakness of health financing and leadership.

The state recognizes how battles over land use are less likely to be lost to judicial decisions when the arguments are soundly health-based rather than "zone-biased." This health-environmental reality in New Jersey is increasingly recognized by each central administration. It is recognized that fingers pointing the multiple police may easily become the political opportunity.

The Department of Environmental Protection is a state centralized instrument created in great part to dilute powers of local health authorities and of the State Department of Health. The acquisition of "new environmentalism" into public health carries a healthful tone, but the peculiar phenomenon is that health departments lose money to environmental departments, and the planning initiatives pass from health professionals to engineers, from epidemiologists to the practical policies of a laboratory's last hurrah.

The State Department of Environmental Protection is a nice name for practical cash politics. We have seen the observance by the

DEP of New Jersey's high cancer rate and its association with air pollution, while the DEP at the same time recommended relaxation of factory emission standards that would allow more air pollution.

It is an coincidence that emission controls were relaxed by the DEP while Gov. Brendan T. Byrne had a tax fight, needing all the industrial and labor support he could get, by promising the emission relaxations desired by industry and labor. The DEP means health by public relations. It works from the governor's office. Centralization of health-environmental power in New Jersey is a stabilizer for the political health of New Jersey.

Gov. Byrne, recently proposed Bill S-130, a bill which orders municipal governments to maintain health departments in any one of three ways. The municipality may construct and maintain its own health department, an expensive proposition for small municipal units, or the municipality may join in a region by contract with other municipalities under a single health officer, or the municipality may become part of a county health department.

Should the municipality become part of a county health department, all health-environmental functions would be taken over by the county, which will establish laws, programs and budgets for the municipality and apply penalties to maintain the personnel and programs. The county will also dissolve all local health departments.

County government in New Jersey has never been as light as municipal control. County government is also more aligned to state government.

It would be far easier for any state government to maintain controls of local health authorities through county health depart-

ments. It would therefore be reasonable to expect the state to coerce municipalities not yet aligned to health departments to become absorbed into county units.

True to form, in all moves and releases of the new law, the state has placed public relations priority on the formation of county health departments while practically ignoring the other two possibilities open to cities and towns.

The car flipped over and skidded on its roof, coming to rest upright on a guard rail.

Swanton, suffering from shock and knee and wrist injuries, was taken to Overlook Hospital. He was treated and released.
