In other business, the committee accepted the retirement of Sgt. Daniel Madinger Jr., a 25-year veteran of the police force.

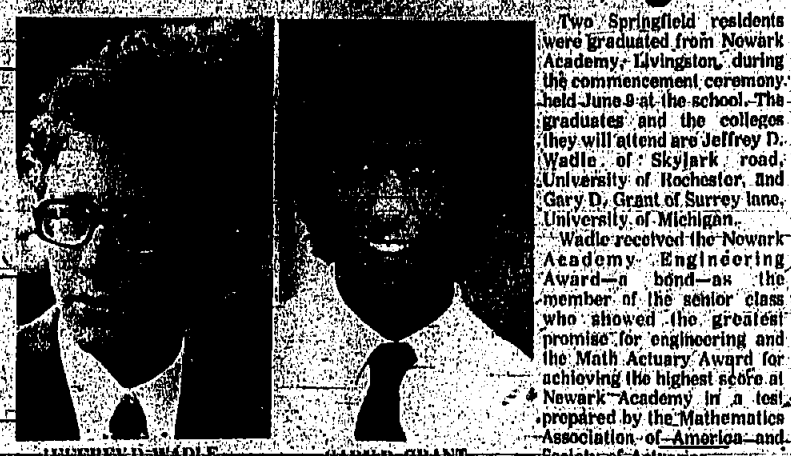

Report from Washington

By Matthew J. Rinaldi

It really is possible to fight Washington's paper army and win.

Responding to my recent call for a reduction in the federal government's paper army, leading federal agencies tell me they welcome the suggestion and have put it into effect.

The department is well in the lead in this new war on government paperwork.

Reports received by the department have indicated that the paper army is being reduced by 11,239 forms, resulting in a saving of \$34,027.

That's not a start. The Agriculture Department tells me that it is continuing its attack on paperwork and expects to achieve further savings.

For certain federal agencies have been reduced by a cut in their paperwork by pointing a finger at the Congress. They believe that the paperwork has been created because of laws passed by Congress.

They are right to a certain degree. Congress has passed laws creating new agencies, requiring the supply of information to be obtained from businesses and individuals. But this isn't the time for argument over who is to blame. What we need is more of the kind of spirit shown by the Department of Agriculture.

The Department of Education, for instance, tells me it has reduced its paperwork by 13 percent in the past few weeks and expects to achieve an even more significant cost, obligation, or credit risk to the state.

The Department of Education is also being attacked by the U.S. Department of Commerce. An agency which had been a major offender.

The department has ordered an immediate 10 percent cut in man-hours devoted by its employees to paper work and expects a result in the actual paperwork reduction will exceed 10 percent. A similar goal has been set by the Department of Labor.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare has launched a review of its form filling and report writing demands. So has the Federal Reserve Board.

Now it's time for all the other federal agencies to take action. They should be directed that paperwork be substantially reduced.

It is important that the cuts being achieved demonstrate that taxpayers and taxpayers are being overburdened with form filling and report writing demands, and that a reduction in paperwork would mean the collapse of government.

The New York City financial crisis has been cited as contributing to the high interest rate paid on other local debts.




