Sinatra back at Arts Center for shows on Aug. 25, 26

Frank Sinatra will return to the Garden State Arts Center to sing in two special performances, Aug. 25 and 26, it was announced by Robert J. Jablonski, vice-chairman of the New Jersey Highway Authority which operates the Arts Center.

Commissioner Jablonski pointed out that Sinatra's performances will be by mail order only. Ticket orders will be date and time stamped and filled on a first-come, first-served basis.

However, season subscribers and box seat holders will be given priority and will be allowed to purchase up to four tickets each by using their special subscriber's benefit coupon. Mail orders from subscribers and box seat holders must reach the Arts Center box office no later than July 17.

Mail orders from non-subscribers will not be processed until after July 17. Only tickets for lawn seating will be on sale at the Arts Center box office.

"Ticket prices for the Sinatra performances are: Center box seats and Section A center, \$50; side box seats, \$30; Section A side, \$20; Section B, \$17.50; Section C, \$15; and Section D, \$12.50. The price for lawn seating is \$8.50.

A portion of the ticket price of \$50 for the Center Box Seats and Section A Center will go to the Garden State Arts Center Cultural Fund which each year sponsors free entertainment for thousands of deserving New Jerseyans.

Quarry control ordinance unveiled by governing body

The Township Committee Tuesday night introduced an ordinance to control local quarry operations. Baltusor Top residents have long complained about noise and damage to their homes caused by blasting at the Houdaille Quarry adjacent to their neighborhood.

Committee member William Russo commented following the meeting that the ordinance is patterned after one approved in Warren Township which has been upheld by the courts.

He added that the details are still under study, with some revisions anticipated at the Aug. 10 meeting. The measure is scheduled for a final hearing on Aug. 24.

More than 20 people attended the meeting at Town Hall. In other business, Mayor Robert Weisbeck debated operations of the Police Department with Marvin Teitelbaum, first man of a citizens' advisory committee named by the Holcomb's Benevolent Association.

The quarry ordinance requires that all quarry operators (Houdaille is the only one in Springfield) be licensed by the township. Operators must file and live up to reclamation plans for their land. Slopes may not exceed 45 degrees, and loess must be retained to cover "cut" when quarry work is finished.

The plans must also include "such other factors that may bear upon or relate to the control, maintenance and harmonious physical development of the township."

The ordinance creates the office of quarry inspector. Quarrying may be conducted only one hour per day, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday to Saturday. Rigid measures are required for dust control. A six-foot chain link fence must surround the property.

There must be a 50-foot level buffer area between work areas and adjoining property. Buffer areas must include a "solid and continuous landscape screen" consisting of "matured evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs of such species of density as will provide a solid and continuous screen throughout the full course of the year."

Local district gets \$57,000 grant to continue preschool 'Dy Dee' class

The Division of School Programs of the New Jersey State Education Department has announced that the Springfield School District has been awarded a \$57,000 grant for the second year of the pilot preschool project for hearing-impaired children.

Known by the acronym "Dy Dee," the program is conducted in cooperation with the William-Schick Center for the Deaf.

Dr. Fred Beruchin, superintendent of schools, said that the purposes of the project are fourfold:

- 1. It provides both hearing-impaired and normal hearing pre-school children with respective "total communication" skills and abilities.
- 2. It promotes a natural and spontaneous interaction between hearing-impaired and normal hearing pre-school children.
- 3. It enables the hearing-impaired child to develop concepts along lines which are parallel to those of his hearing peers.
- 4. It helps all children maximize their respective "total communication" skills and abilities.

Hearing-impaired, pre-school children from Essex, Morris, Union, Somerset, Hudson and Middlesex counties and normal hearing pre-school children who reside in Springfield are eligible for the hearing program which is located in the Raymond-Childs School. Each school year consists of two 2 1/2-hour sessions.

Beruchin said, "Parents are regularly invited to participate in meetings, conferences, workshops, panel discussions, lectures, and demonstrations which are planned by the staff. Parents of hearing-impaired infants and pre-school children become involved in the educational development of their children through parent effectiveness and infant stimulation components of the program."

Transportation will be arranged by local boards of education or by parent/guardians. For information concerning possible admission to this program contact should be made with William Fallon, principal, Theaia Sandmeier School.

Local franchises sought by cable television firm

Suburban Cablevision of East Orange, the state's largest cable television company, has started engineering studies which hopes will lead to service for 65,000 Union County households.

The firm has already applied to provide cable television service in Union, Springfield, Roselle, Roselle Park, Hillside, Westfield and Summit. If these applications are approved, the firm plans to expand to other Union County communities, including Mountaineer, Linden, Halyway and Clark.

Hearings on the applications will be held Aug. 2 in Union and Aug. 31 in Springfield. Suburban Cablevision also has applications pending in Millburn, Belleville, Nutley and Clifton. Towns already served by the company are Livingston, Irvington, Maplewood and West Orange. Service will begin between now and early next year in West Caldwell.

Channels now relayed by Suburban Cablevision include 2, 4, 5, 7, 9, 11, 12, 21, 23, 31 from New York, 41, 47, 50 and 68 from New Jersey and 17 and 26 from Philadelphia. But the regular over-the-air station lineup is also available through cable television. Suburban Cablevision is an outlet for Home Box Office (HBO), which provides first-run movies, sports events and special entertainment programs nationally through a satellite network.

Instead of antennas, cable television operators string wires on utility poles and drop the lines into subscribing households. Signals from over-the-air stations are picked up by antennas on top of tall buildings or hills and fed into the cable system; other programs can originate from the cable company's studios or from outside sources, such as HBO.

A box with selectors for different program sources is connected with each television set on the suburban cablevision system. The firm offers 26 channels but has the capacity for 50, said Kleinhaender.

ESTABLISHING A CABLE SYSTEM is an expensive proposition. More than \$5 million has been spent so far by Suburban Cablevision to set up the firm to expect to lay out \$5 to \$10 million in the next 12 months just to wire Essex County. The money is coming from a Caudan (Continued on page 3)

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BICENTENNIAL VIGNETTES Iron works blazed in N.J.

Even the slightest scrap of good news was welcome in November 1776 when General Washington's demoralized, beaten army struggled into Bergen County.

Men were deserting in droves from the army. Tories were coming out of hiding in expectation of a British triumph.

There, at last, was good news. Furnace and forges blazed nearly everywhere in the North Jersey highlands - at Ringwood, Andover, Hibernia, Mt. Hope, High Bridge, and in a score of other mountain strongholds.

Iron had been worked in the Highlands since about 1700, and by 1750 production had become so great that Parliament forbade any export of "His Majesty's Colonies" to work iron products.

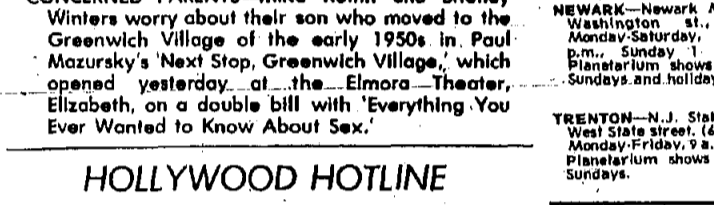

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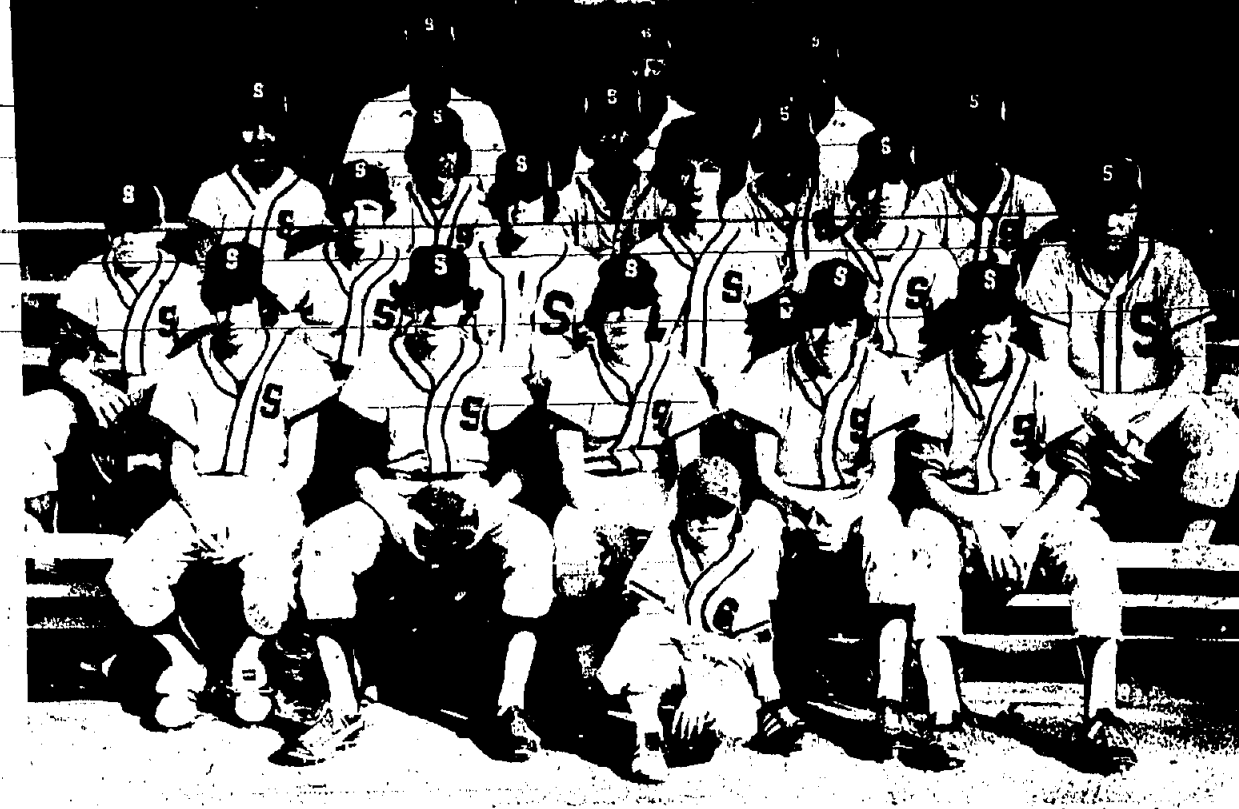
