Bill would erase word 'pesthouse' from TB statutes

A bill which would wipe the word pesthouse from the state's tuberculosis statutes made it up another day of the legislative ladder when the Assembly voted 6 to 0 to send it to the Senate.

Endorsed by the American Lung Association of New Jersey, the bill would update the TB statutes to reflect the modern concepts of TB treatment and prevention. It would repeal 40 statutes while making major revisions in nine others and minor changes in 14 more.

ANSI president Walter Hilsop said some of the statutes date back to the 1800's and reflect the philosophy of isolation of patients in sanatoriums. "We can appreciate how old some of these laws are," said Hilsop, "when we realize some of them may have been adopted around the same time as Stephen Crane's birth in 1897 in Newark. The famous author of the 'Red Badge of Courage' died at the age of 28 from tuberculosis."

Hilsop said legislation has not kept pace with medical advances in TB treatment and prevention. Among the laws which need updating are ones dealing with TB sanatoriums. "These laws are obsolete since TB can be treated without special hospitals and these hospitals no longer exist. It is no longer necessary to send the TB patient away from his community for treatment. With modern drugs, TB is being treated rapidly and noncontagiously which means he can be treated as an outpatient in a community health center or physician's office. Some patients may require hospitalization in a general hospital for various reasons."

Even though TB has decreased, the disease remains a threat to the urban poor, Hilsop said. "Last year 1,271 deaths of our state were attributed to having TB that needed treatment."

FOR THE BIRDS

The total number of whooping cranes alive in the world in the fall of 1928 was about 27, 14 in the Louisiana Refuge in Texas and probably 13 near White Lake in Indiana. The species was perilously close to extinction. Few wild families have survived when their numbers have fallen this low.

The vulnerability of their situation was clearly demonstrated by the fate of the Louisiana birds. In August 1948, a high wind and cloudburst hit the White Lake area. The 13 resident whoopers were blown inland and only six returned to the marsh. Of the seven missing birds, it is presumed that six were shot and eaten. Although injured by gunshot, the seventh survived. By 1942 the population had dropped to five and the next year there were four. Only one bird remained alive in 1947. The sole survivor injured a wing in November, 1941, and was taken to the Audubon Park Zoo in New Orleans. Thus, the Louisiana whoopers were wiped out and the colony has never again been re-established. Now only the Aransas birds remained to prolong the life of the species.

Although man knew where whooping cranes spent their winter, he had no knowledge of their breeding grounds. The migration route was reasonably well known, went north from Texas over Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dakota and Montana and then the great birds disappeared into the wilds of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Robert P. Allen of the National Audubon Society with the aid of government conservationists in both the United States and Canada, undertook a search for the whooper's nesting spot. His first two attempts failed in failure by 1948. Then on July 15, 1952, Robert Smith, the biologist with whom Allen had been working, wrote his former partner, "Two of the elusive great white birds found north of Great Slave Lake—just north of Deep Bay." Further aerial and ground reconnaissance in July, 1953, checked remains of their parents. A daring experiment was conducted to determine where their eggs were carried to Great Slave Lake. White eggs were placed to be hatched and raised by resident sandhill cranes. Unfortunately, cranes cleaned out 26 sandhill crane nests along the lakeshore and with them went four of the whooper eggs. The 11 remaining eggs hatched but one of the young died of pneumonia two days later. June saw storms and starvation kill five more of the

population which will call Idaho its home. The hand of man has been responsible for the extinction of many species. There are still a considerable number of birds on the endangered list, but the story of the great white whooping crane shows that man can help if he will. Education of the public, particularly those living along the migration route, was a major factor in the whooper's comeback. Dedicated work on the part of U.S. and Canadian biologists did the rest.

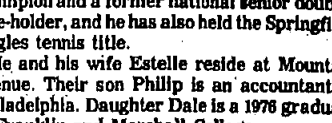

Purchase power of take home pay drops a third time

Purchasing power of New York-Northeast New Jersey area factory production worker take home pay was down for the third consecutive month between July and August, dropping sharply by 1.4 percent. It was reported this week by Herbert Blesnick, Regional Commissioner of the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. Blesnick noted that since May, purchasing power of area factory worker earnings has declined 2.3 percent.

Blesnick attributed the August decline to a drop of \$2.08 or 1.0 percent in gross average weekly earnings to \$199.41 as well as a 0.5 percent rise in consumer prices. The decline in gross average weekly earnings, which dipped below the \$200 mark for the first time since April, reflected a seasonal drop of 1 cent in average weekly hours.

Between August 1975 and August 1976, Blesnick noted that purchasing power (average weekly earnings of all factory production workers, reduced for inflation) and federal income tax rates applicable to a married worker with three dependents who earned the average amount, and adjusted for area consumer price changes) was 1.5 percent, reflecting the combined impact of tax law changes and increases in area consumer prices.

Gross average weekly earnings rose \$10.60 or 5.8 percent from August 1975 and August 1976 entirely reflecting a 28 cent rise in average hourly earnings. Average weekly hours edged down six minutes over the year.

New apartment leases reflect a full range of tenant rights

The estimated one million New Jersey residents who live in apartment buildings have been guaranteed that all new leases "will reflect the full range of tenant rights."

Public Advocate Stanley C. Van Ness disclosed this week that the department and printers of form leases in the state had reached a settlement under which the printers have agreed to revise the forms to exclude a number of illegal provisions.

Van Ness said that the department acted in the wake of the Truth-in-Renting law which took effect Aug. 19 by warning the printers that injunctions would be sought against the further sale of illegal form leases.

Knemeth Meiser, assistant deputy public advocate and architect of the revised lease forms, said the department's Division of Public Interest Advocacy will continue to monitor the switch to the revised lease forms.

Meiser noted that the Truth-in-Renting law also requires that a copy of the truth-in-renting statement be posted in all apartment buildings by Oct. 15. Only apartment buildings of two or less units are excluded from the new regulations, he noted.
