### County park commissioners criticize Route 78 planners

The County Park Commission, in a resolution critical of the N.J. Department of Transportation's draft environmental impact statement for construction of Rt. 78, declared last week that "the integrity of the Watching Reservation is not to be violated."

The report said that although the tunnel alignment is the most costly and "somewhat unorthodox," it will "provide the required roadway link with tolerable impacts to the Reservation. Further study may even result in a minimization of these impacts which is presently associated with the alignment."

That language would seem to indicate that the park commissioners would be opposed to any alignment selected by the DOT which would require the acquisition of land in the Watching Reservation. However, George Cron, Park Commission secretary, said the 1972 Memorandum of Understanding would continue to be valid if the DOT selected the original alignment.

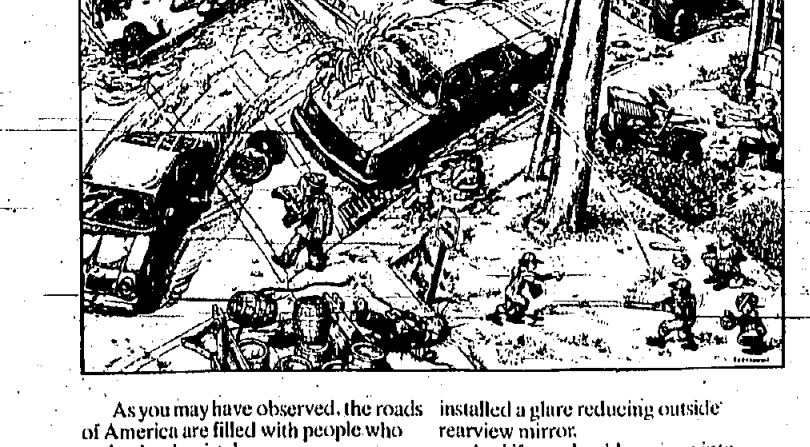

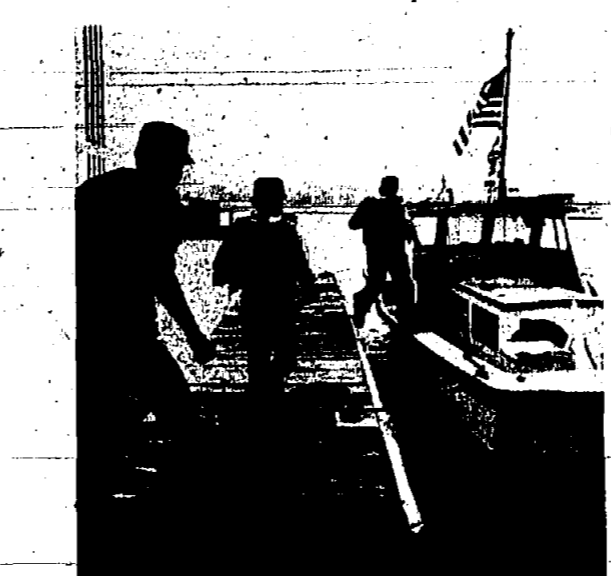

### Flotation devices a must for boaters

**GOVERNOR'S ISLAND, N.Y.**—As the parade of tall ships was slipping through the lower bay past the Verrazano Bridge, a 15-foot outboard motor boat capsized near Heligate. Three of the four passengers managed to cling onto the overturned boat until they were rescued. The fourth drowned despite an intensive rescue effort mounted by the Coast Guard and the Marine Police.

"A great many people were transiting Heligate that weekend," said Lieutenant "Mac" McCurdy, commanding officer of Station New York. "Many of those people were totally unfamiliar with the area and Heligate can be a tricky place to navigate. If the victim had been wearing a PFD (Personal Flotation Device)—the Coast Guard's term for life jacket—she might be alive today."

"Our big problem in New York harbor, as far as rescue work is concerned, is that these waters are notorious for their currents. On the ebb tide, part of Long Island Sound drains through Heligate into the sea. On the flood, the ocean is funneled back into Sound through the same area. The result is that currents are unpredictable, various and strong. We have current charts that tell us generally how the currents run, but the problem is that the current on the surface may be very different from that a few feet below. Once someone gets in the water, without a PFD our chances of picking them up alive are not favorable," said McCurdy.

"I would recommend that when you are transiting hazardous waters, or water you're unfamiliar with, or if there is anything unusual (like a small storm building, or heavy traffic), you should wear your PFD. It's difficult to try to put on a life jacket after you're in the water, and likely as not you're not going to have it with you," warned Lt. McCurdy.

"There were a lot of special events this summer to honor our nation's birthday. They had a big impact on our case load," he explained. The Group New York area stretches from below the Verrazano Narrows Bridge to Albany on the Hudson River. The Connecticut border on Long Island Sound, including all of the East River, the lower bay, Newark bay, Arthur Kill and Kill Van Kull. The 75 men and women and 10 boats committed to search-and-rescue answered 100 calls for assistance during the summer.

"Sustenance" is next and includes beef, veal, lamb, poultry, fish, cheese and eggs. Then comes "Fruits of the Earth," which includes vegetables, salads, fruits and molds followed by the next section called "Manna." This section includes rice, potatoes and pasta and is followed by the section called "Staff of Life," (yeast breads). "My Cup Runneth Over" is the last section which is desserts.

A cookbook was awarded to Rhoda Staub of Mountairside for submitting the title of the book.

The cookbooks are available in Westfield at Made In America, Wyatt Brothers, Westfield Liquors, Lancaster's, Temple Emanuel and in Garwood, the Art Makers Gallery.

**Cooking corned beef**

To cook a three-to-five pound corned beef brisket, cover it with water and simmer, covered, until tender, allowing approximately 50 minutes per pound. When carving, slice across the grain of the brisket.

**Smoking causes 15 to 20 pct. of cancer deaths, meeting told**

"We put out smoking and you eliminate 15-20 percent of all cancer deaths in the United States," reported Dr. Warren H. Knauer, at a recent meeting of the board of managers of the American Cancer Society's Union County Unit.

Dr. Knauer is chairman of the executive committee of the New Jersey Division of the American Cancer Society and chairman of the Department of Malignant and Allied Diseases at Elizabeth General Hospital. He made his statement as part of a report on the cancer control situation in New Jersey.

Dr. Knauer expressed the Cancer Society's concern for identifying carcinogens in the environment, particularly industrial pollutants, but stressed that "the largest and most pervasive source of fatal cancers in the environment which has so far been identified is cigarette smoking—in the U.S. responsible for nearly 75,000 deaths per year from lung cancer alone as well as thousands more from oral, esophageal, stomach, and bladder cancer where cigarettes are known to have a marked influence."

In his speech, Dr. Knauer highlighted many of the advances made in recent years in identifying the causes of cancer, as well as advances in diagnosis and treatment. He means half of those who get cancer can and should be saved if people would practice the seven safeguards against cancer—particularly, not smoking cigarettes.

Dr. Knauer called upon hospitals to form tumor registries. At the present time, cancer, not a reportable disease, that is, there is no law which requires a record to be kept of the incidence of cancer.

"To help us identify high risks, we need a means of recording cancer occurrences accurately," he said.

"The key to better cancer control ultimately rests with the individual," Dr. Knauer concluded. "Today, if six people get cancer, two will be cured and four will die. But of the four who will die, one might have been saved with earlier diagnosis and prompt treatment. This means half of those who get cancer can and should be saved if people would practice the seven safeguards against cancer—particularly, not smoking cigarettes."

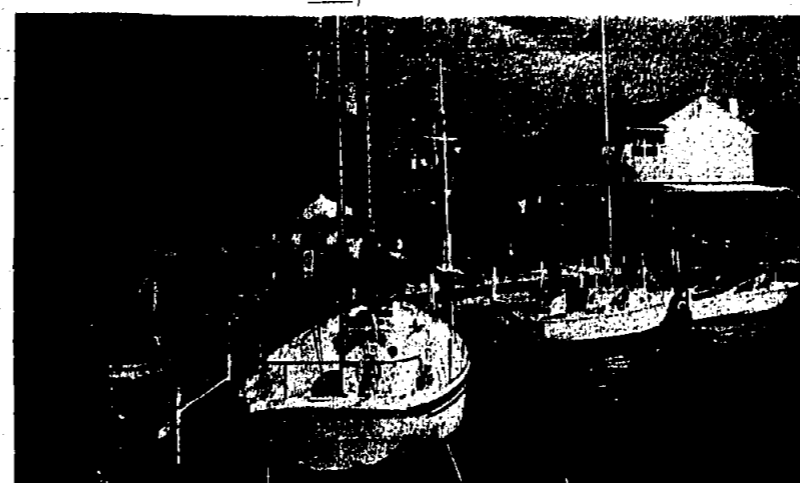

## Transferees urged to sell homes through agency

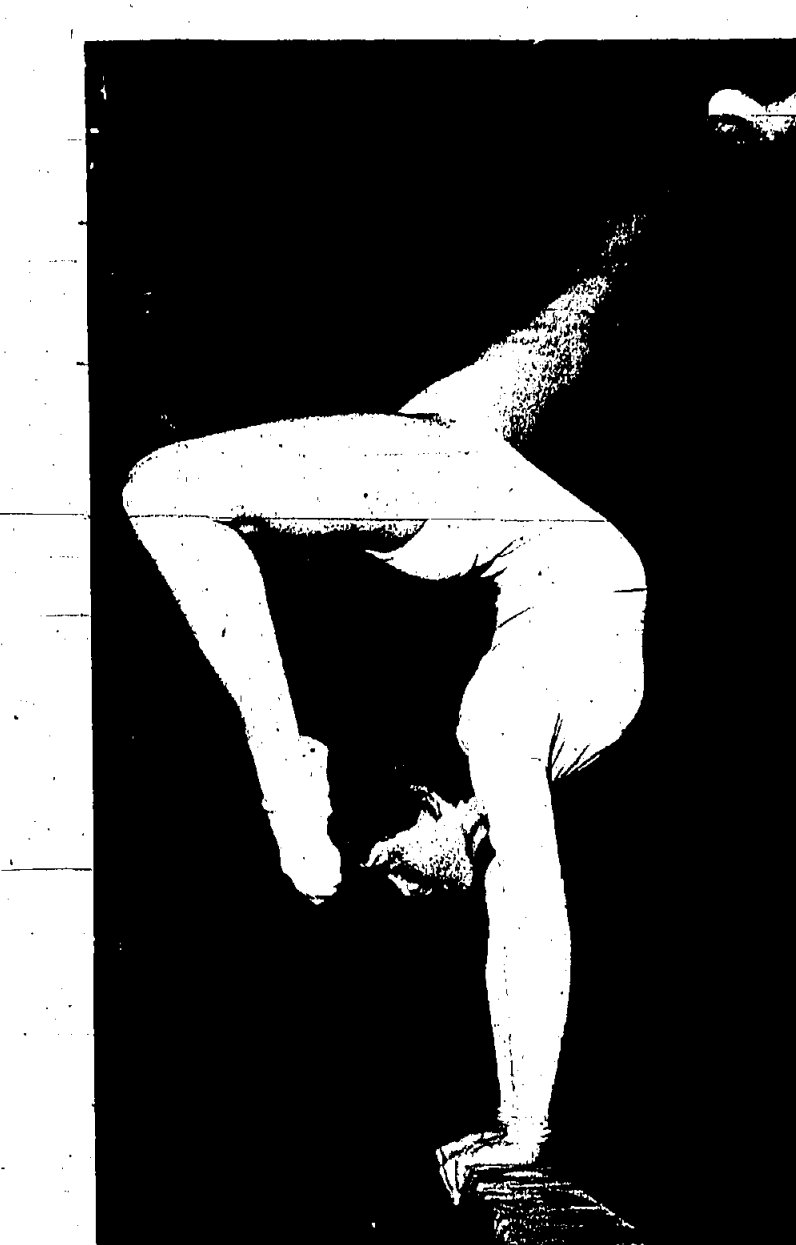

### Workers top off hospital building with tree planting

A tree was planted last week, 138 feet above the streets of Newark.

More symbolic than ecologic, the planting marked the fact that work on the new teaching hospital of the College of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (CMDNJ) had reached its uppermost point. Why a tree, and how long it would stay up, no one at the site could explain, except that it is a custom of the construction industry to erect one at such a juncture.

The hospital, with three wings and nine levels, will have 486 beds. Completion is scheduled for late 1978. It is a keystone of CMDNJ's new 46.5-acre Newark campus, located between Bergen and Norfolk streets and 12th and South Orange avenues.

Construction of the hospital is under the supervision of the state Division of Building and Construction headed by S. Leonard DiDonato. Joffre A. Lewis, the division's deputy director, is in charge on site. The general contractor is Terminal Construction Corporation, of Wood Ridge, N.J., Anthony DiNallo, president. The architects are Eggers, Grad, Solter-Associated Architects, Newark.

Work on the \$78-million college hospital began in early 1972 after sale of a New Jersey Health Care Facilities Financing Authority bond issue.

### A 'key man' on campus

#### Lots of work for locksmith

As with your usual locksmith, Vincent Harder of South Orange has picked a lot of his locks in life. But there ends the resemblance. As a profession, he's been a locksmith for 15 years. As a student, he's been a locksmith for the last 10 months.

For one thing, Harder practices his craft on a college campus exclusively. He is one of three full-time locksmiths employed by Seton Hall University, South Orange, where he spends a lot of time unlocking cars which have had their keys left inside and desks with keys inadvertently locked in the drawers.

For another thing, Harder learned his trade in a spy school. Lock-picking, he notes facetiously, is one of the basic skills for that calling.

Then, too, Harder is an accomplished linguist. In addition to his native English, he's mastered German and Russian and will soon have a degree in modern languages from Seton Hall to prove it.

And finally, he's a published poet, short-story writer and aspiring novelist. But he's writing psychological fiction, not a James Bond-type adventure story.

Being a locksmith makes it possible for Harder to pursue other interests in his life and gives him satisfaction as well as a sure livelihood. In his security-conscious society, it seems the services of a locksmith always will be required. Just on campus he is sure to have a couple of calls daily to open mistakenly locked vehicles, but most of his time is spent rekeying locks for inter-campus office moves.

As a full-time university employee, Harder has taken advantage of his free-time eligibility to complete his college education with a B average and straight A's in his language major. He has taken writing and literature courses and even some computer instruction. "With a computer, something has to be done in one certain way," he explains, which sharpened his own self-discipline and kept him in writing and rewriting. He is a member of the New Jersey Poetry Society and National Association of Published Poets.

Harder is studying languages for his own satisfaction because he enjoys reading German and Russian literature in their original forms.

"You appreciate literary allusions better that way than in translation," he says. "With a statistical degree he could teach, but he doubts if the job market in the field is very good now, as fewer high schools are offering his languages, so he plans to continue in the locksmithing line and writing on the side."

"I just like working with my hands," he says, "and my mind is my own. I can be working out a story's plot at the same time I'm working on a lock or changing a key."

He first learned Russian in the early 1960's under government auspices at the Army Language School in Monterey, Calif., and was sent to Germany as a Russian interpreter, interpreter operator. After service, he studied Russian and German at Utica College and during his junior year was recalled into Army Intelligence as a civilian. He spent several years in Germany as an intelligence agent. He eventually decided he wanted the right temperament for that work, but during that period he became trilingual and an expert locksmith. And that novel he's writing is going to have some international scenes as a result of the experience.

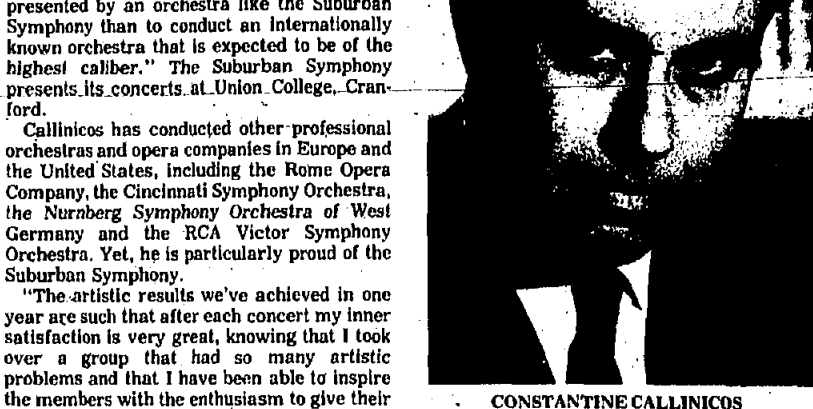

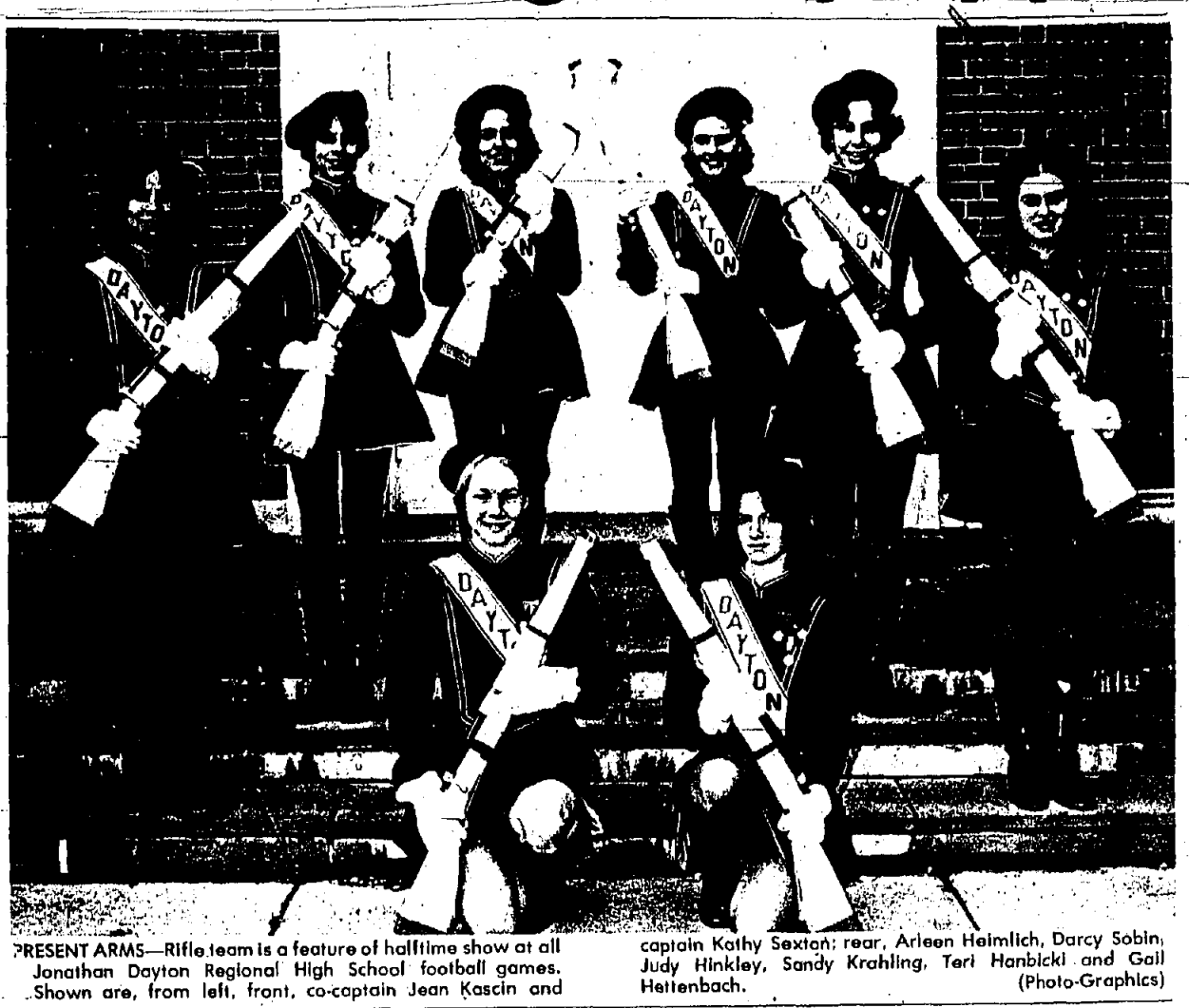

### Bank president indicted on loan fraud charges

The president of the Springfield State Bank, which ceased operations last Feb. 11, was charged with misappropriating more than \$200,000 in the institution's funds in a federal indictment issued Tuesday.

The former president, Donald Spears, 41, of Hammonton, was charged with accepting \$55,000 from three businessmen, whom he had taken out loans from the bank and whose customers he had transferred from the bank. He was also charged with two counts of income tax evasion and two counts of filing false income tax returns.

The three businessmen and Spears' wife were also indicted after a federal probe that took investigators to four foreign countries and involved more than 20 FBI field offices in 16 states.

U.S. Attorney Jonathan Goldstein also announced indictments in a similar loan fraud scheme at the defunct Bank of Bloomsfield, where \$3.5 million was allegedly misappropriated.

According to Goldstein, Spears accepted \$55,000 from Ralph Stein, 48, of Livingston, and Al Rossi, 45, of Upper Merion, N.J. for an investment in a bank. (Continued on page 4)

## Education panel studying possibilities of reorganization, closing of school

Members of the Springfield Board of Education are studying a recently completed report on possible school district reorganization—including factors which might lead to the closing of one of the district's elementary schools.

The report will definitely not come up for discussion at the board meeting Monday night at the Raymond Children School, according to August Caprio, board president. He said that members need more time to consider the statistical and other findings in the report.

The school administrators, teachers and citizen volunteers who compiled the study do not make any recommendations as to whether a school should be closed—or which school it should be.

The school board last spring debated a possible school closing at considerable length, in response to a continued decline in student population as well as a loss of substantial amounts of state financial aid for the current school year.

The board last June decided to keep all schools open for the 1976-77 year, stating that there was not enough time for a complete examination of all factors, including the financial results of a school closing and the impact on the children.

The board then directed Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent of schools, to conduct an in-depth study of all aspects of the matter and to report back to the board so that the proposal could be considered in preparing the budget for the 1977-78 school year.

Caprio stated this week that the board members will examine the report in detail and will then throw the matter open for public discussion and a decision before completing preparation of the budget.

With some uncertainty in Trenton, over legislation concerning school financing, Caprio added, the budget will probably have to be submitted to the "county superintendent of schools" some time in January.

The budget will then go before the voters in the annual Board of Education election the second Tuesday in February. That election, however, was postponed for a month last winter because state officials felt that financial uncertainty prevented local boards from completing their budgets in time.
