"Tuition in New Jersey's public colleges, including the state's 17 county community colleges, should not be increased and Gov. Brendan Byrne can help maintain his own policy in this regard by signing the \$36 million supplemental appropriation bill," Dr. Donald Smith, vice-president of the Association of County Community College Presidents of New Jersey and president of Brookdale Community College, Lincroft, said this week. The governor has threatened to veto the supplemental appropriation bill, which includes \$4.7 million for New Jersey's com-

munity colleges.
"Our primary concerns are that reduced appropriations will lead to increased tuitions, which work against the concept of open access for all qualified students, or restricted enrollments," Dr. Smith said. "Our young people and adults should not lose the benefits of higher education simply because they do not have sufficient funds to pay tuition and fees." Dr. Smith explained that the state owes the county community colleges the \$4.7 million. thousands of students in the 1974-75 academi-

"We anticipated receiving these funds under then-existing regulations and we planned our educational programs and our budgets on the basis these funds would be provided as they had been since the county community college system was established in the Mid-'60s." The spokesman for the college presidents association said he agrees with Gov. Byrne that tuitions should not be raised in the state colleges and that the governor should extend this policy and his concern to the community college segment of the state's higher

educational system.
"If the supplemental appropriation is not will be forced to consider tuition increases heyond those already imposed. ## Consumer prices stable after 30-month increase

Consumer Price Index for the New York-Bienstock pointed out that the area consumer had to spend \$17.90 in November 1976 to buy what \$10.00 could in the 1967 base period. The Northeastern New Jersey area remained unchanged in November 1976, it was reported this week by Herbert Bienstock, Regional Commissioner of the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics. ### State sends out new tax tables to employers

State Tax Director Sidney Glaser announced this week that employers' instructions for are in the mail to 175,000 employers, reflecting the lower withholding rates which go into effect

after Jan. 1, and should be used to determine the amount of tax to be withheld on wages, tips, fees, commissions and other income for ser-

The amount to be withheld after Jan. 1 will be reduced by one third since it is no longer necessary to withhold for the two months between the effective date (July 1) and the

The tables have been compiled at rates estimated to yield an amount intended to approximate an individual's tax liability.

Employers must report withholdings by the 15th day of the month following the month for which the tax was withheld. The new tables will be used for the first time in reporting the withholdings for the month of January. The first reporting form and payment of the lax withheld for January will be due on Feb. 15. Glaser pointed out that certain employers may file quarterly reports. 
