

Jersey traffic deaths are lowest since '64

New Jersey marked its best highway safety record in 13 years last week with a 4.5 percent decline in traffic fatalities from 1976. It was reported this week by Gov. Brendan Byrne. He said there were 1,077 fatalities on New Jersey roads during 1976, as compared with 1,079 in 1975.

"Despite this decline, 1,077 persons still lost their lives, and this figure is 1,077 deaths more than our ultimate goal of zero," Byrne said.

He attributed the drop to a variety of factors including reduced speeds, safety belt use, increased traffic law enforcement and improved driver education programs.

Conservation of communities program theme

Last year, New Jersey shared second place with Connecticut with a 2.2 rate, while Rhode Island was the lowest with 1.5.

Waddington pointed out that New Jersey achieved its fatality reduction despite an increase of 7 percent in vehicle miles traveled within the state during 1976 as compared to 1975.

Survey slated on employment

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will survey employment in this area and report according to John C. Gullinane, director of the Bureau's Regional Office in New York City.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 70,000 households throughout the United States. "Employment" and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation.

For example, in November the survey indicated that 88.1 million of the 95.9 million men and women in the civilian labor force were employed. The nation's unemployment rate was 8.1 percent, up from 7.9 percent in October.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical tables.

Editorial comment

Opposing viewpoints

This is a help wanted notice—for a job where the pay is nonexistent, the hours are long, the responsibilities sometimes overwhelming and the opportunity to receive abuse infinite. But the reward of doing something constructive for the single-most important agency of the municipality can make everything else pale into insignificance.

We are speaking, of course, about membership on the Springfield Board of Education. We are still nearly a month away from the Feb. 17 deadline for candidates to be nominated, but this is most emphatically the time for men and women to think seriously about entering the race for these three-year terms to be filled on March 28.

Philip Feltnich, appointed last summer to fill an unexpired term, did indicate he will run. We're pleased.

However, James Adams and George Doby have stated they will not seek reelection. They have served with diligence and determination, and they will be missed.

Beyond that, their departure poses a special problem. The school board has gradually become perhaps the most liberal we can remember in 15 years of board-watching. If boards can be rated on such a liberal-conservative scale, for the most part, we have agreed and have applauded this willingness to experiment and to innovate, to give our outstanding administrators and teachers freedom to do their best and to pay the price for keeping Springfield what has often been termed a "liberal district," a beacon for others to follow.

Adams and Doby, on the other hand, were noted by the board as being conservative. The spokesman for those who must put cost first in any evaluation, they have done so, we press, without ever forgetting that schools are for children, and school boards exist to serve the children.

We have probably disagreed with these two board members more often than we have agreed, but we have never failed to recognize that they have performed a valuable function.

An entirely liberal board, if we can overstate it, would be as unhealthy as an all-conservative body. In addition to taking the schools to the side of one or another, either could lead to a board that would be even more dangerous.

We appeal, therefore, for responsible spokespersons of the liberal tradition, of those who would continue this tradition of board members who serve as constructive conservatives.

We will probably oppose many of their policies in times to come, but we will be glad they're there.

UC to establish office for consumers affairs

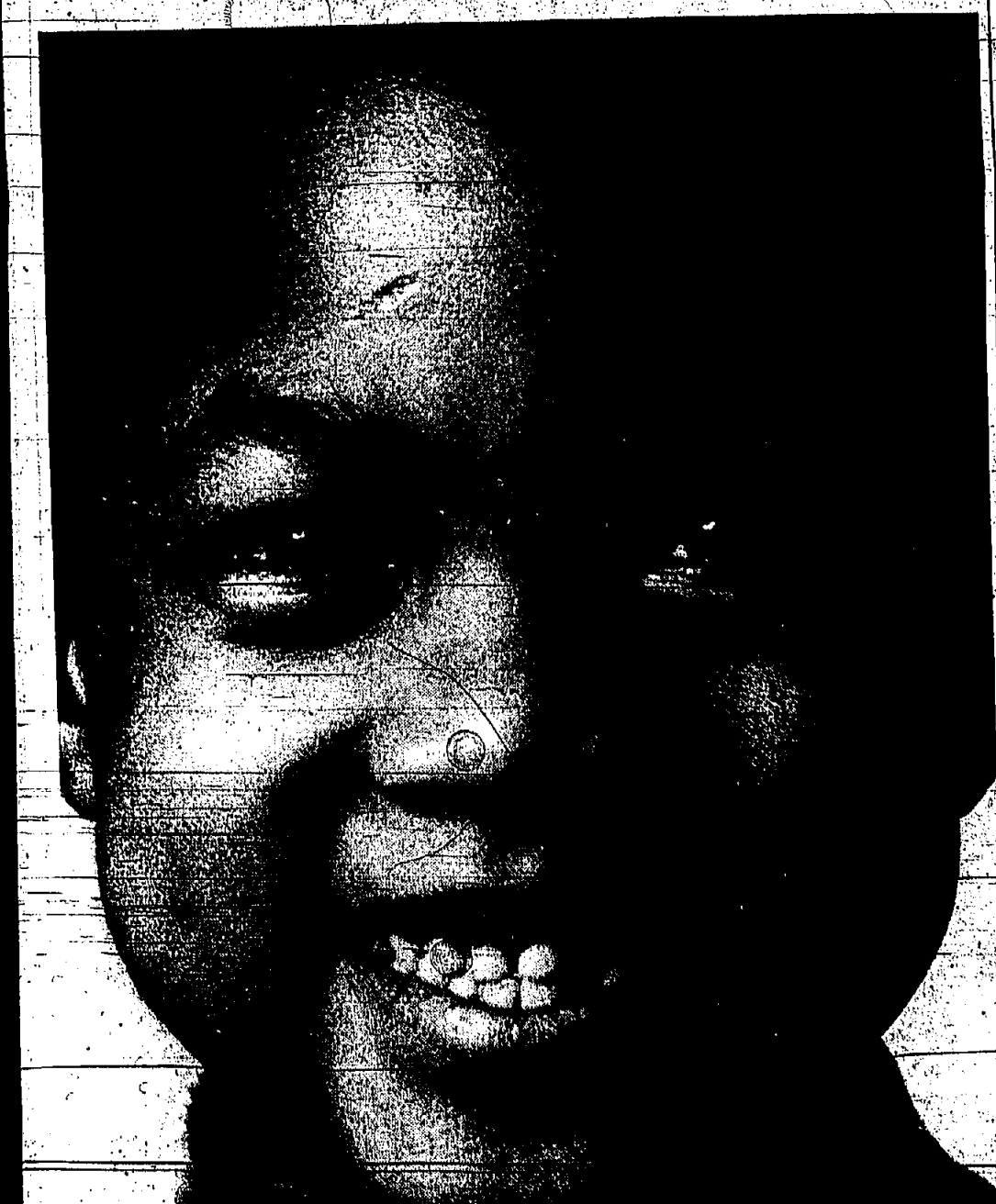

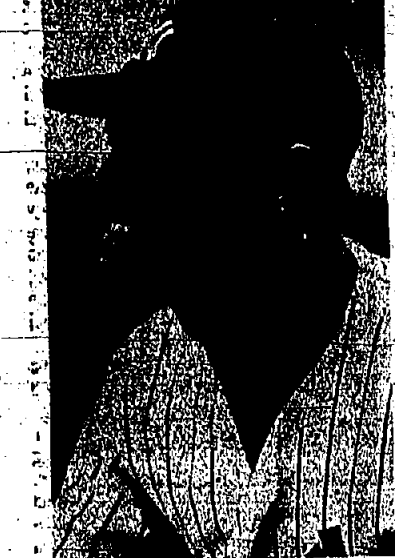

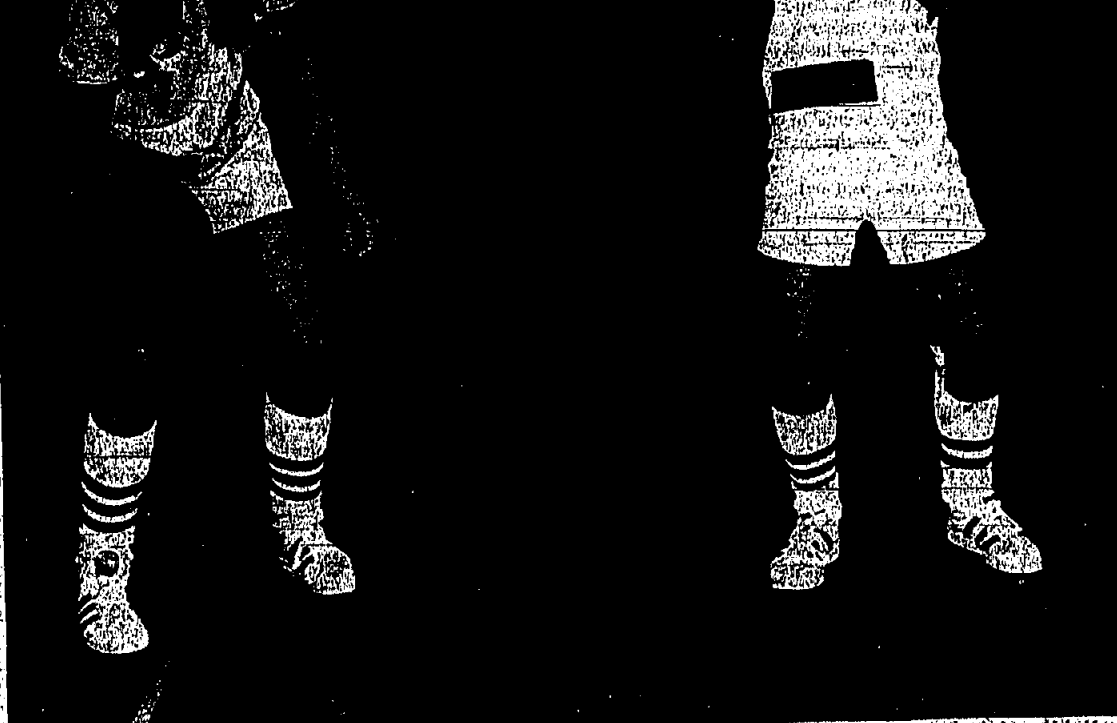
