Philip Feltnich, appointed last summer to fill an unexpired term, was indicated by the board to be replaced.

Beyond that, their departure poses a special problem. The school board has gradually become perhaps the most liberal we can remember in 15 years of board-watching...

For the most part, we have agreed and have applauded this willingness to experiment and to innovate...

Adams and Doby, on the other hand, were tied to the double-edged sword of the spokesman for those who must put cost first in any evaluation...

We have probably disagreed with these two board members more often than we have agreed, but we have never failed to recognize that they have performed a valuable function.

An entirely liberal board, if we can overstate it, would be as healthy as an all-conservative body. In addition to taking the schools to the side of another, either could lead to a backlash that would be even more dangerous.

We appeal, therefore, for responsible spokespersons of these two board members who would continue this tradition of board members who serve as constructive conservatives.

We will probably oppose many of their policies in times to come, but we will be glad they're there.

Both these items account for a share of kilowatt-hours and electricity bills. The Smiths added insulation to their attic floor this year, and this has saved on heating costs. They also have thermal-lined draperies in their living and dining areas. This saves heat loss.

In addition, the Smiths enjoy eating in a restaurant once a week. Furthermore, during the period in which the two families compared notes, the Smiths took a 10-day cruise.

The N.J. Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) plans to expand the state exhaust testing program to reach high gasoline powered trucks and buses, and new cars prior to their delivery from the showroom.

"New cars testing for pollution-causing 'lemons' is now up to the manufacturers' discretion," said Environmental Protection Commissioner David J. Bardin, "and the DEP-powered trucks and buses are currently exempt from inspection."

Bardin said other related regulations proposed this week would require testing programs "to achieve more effective pollution control, energy conservation, consumer protection and overall fairness."

State inspection stations will continue to apply the emission standards now in force until the new regulations are adopted. Public hearings will be held in March in Trenton and Newark with a decision expected next summer.

The proposed amendments also set a separate standard for light weight fuel economy cars, and more restrictive standards for heavier models.





**Coffee boycott given support by freeholders**

The Union County Board of Freeholders has gone on record in support of a consumer-boycott of coffee following a recommendation from Freeholder Walter E. Boright. Boright stated "the skyrocketing cost of a pound of coffee has approximately doubled over the course of about one year. This is such a horrendous increase that it far exceeds even the cost of inflation. In spite of foreign excises there really seems to be no sound reason for these unconscionable increases. Many consumer groups and advocates have suggested that the public take any of the following steps to support the boycott of coffee: 1. Completely eliminate purchasing of any coffee, and substitute in its place tea, soup, bouillon or other beverages. 2. Cutting down on the number of cups of coffee one drinks each day. 3. Drink your regular number of cups of coffee, but fill the cup only half way. 4. Brew less coffee in the pot with the usual amount of water, but brew the coffee longer than usual and if at work replace the coffee pot with a hot plate.

A Consumer Affairs Office will open at Union College, Cranford, Tuesday, it was announced today by Douglas Sedelmeyer, director of community services.

The new office, located in the Union County Room of the Kenneth Campbell Mackay Library on the college's Cranford campus, will serve county residents who have consumer complaints or who are seeking information about their rights as consumers, he said.

The office will be an affiliate of the New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs and will be under the direction of a member of the state staff.

In addition to handling individual questions and complaints, the Union College Consumer Affairs office will conduct workshops, lectures and seminars to help county residents become better informed and more alert consumers, Sedelmeyer said.

"The rights and needs of consumers in today's economy cannot be minimized," he added, "and Union College believes that this new community service is an appropriate activity for the college in its role as a community college."

In addition, he said, the program will afford students a valuable experience and—the opportunity to serve the residents of Union County. The students, who will earn college credit for their efforts, will participate in a survey of pricing and quality of consumer-related goods and services as support for the State Division of Consumer Affairs; in the development and dissemination of consumer education materials; in the formulation of policy for the county office, in drafting new legislative and regulatory initiatives, and in the evaluation of the college office's progress.

Union College, in cooperation with Union County Technical Institute, serves the community college needs of Union County under the aegis of the Union County Coordinating Agency for Higher Education.
