Rinaldo, leader in GOP survey, undecided on gubernatorial bid

A statewide poll showing that Congressman Matthew J. Rinaldo could defeat any of the possible Republican candidates for governor will not be the decisive factor in his decision on running for the governor, according to informed sources.

They said that Rinaldo is withholding a decision on whether to run until the 21 county Republican chairmen agree to accept or reject his conditions for seeking the nomination. The chairmen are expected to meet within two weeks to discuss the situation.

The Union County Congressman recently met in Atlantic City with the county Republican chairmen to spell out his views on the platform and issues for the campaign. Rinaldo initiated the meeting, which was held to repeat the income tax and to support an amendment to remove "through and efficient" education from the state constitution. In addition, Rinaldo asked the chairmen to establish a special screening committee that would select the "most desirable" Republicans to receive the chairmen's support in the primary.

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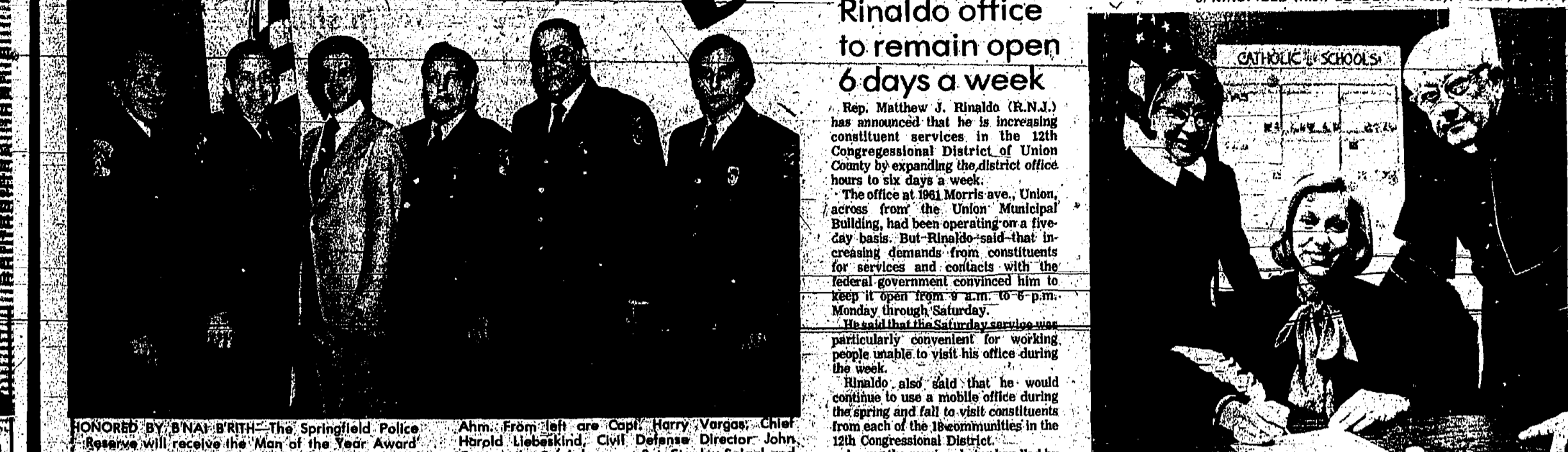

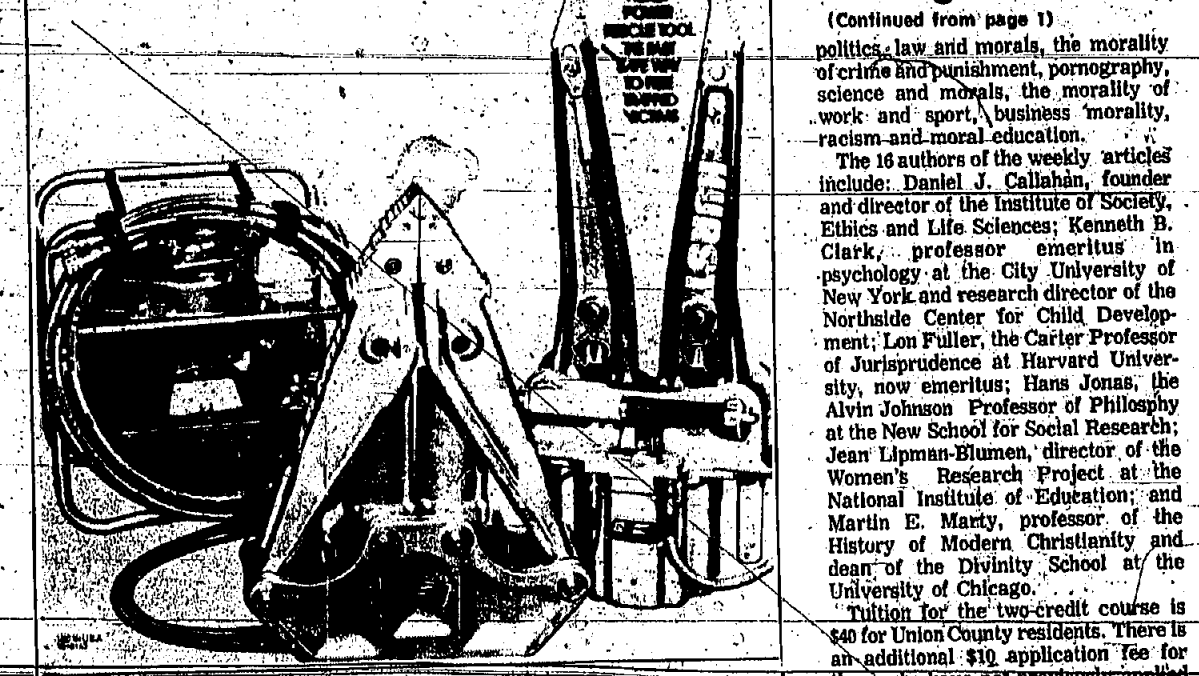

Increased acreage a '76 county park highlight

The year 1976 brought success to the Union County Park Commission, as evidenced by its features and programs, as well as the attendance, a spokesman noted last week.

"The Union County park system, covering approximately 1,500 acres, provided areas and facilities for recreation, relaxation and enjoyment by approximately 1,000,000 people who visited the parks during this past year, acreage increased and plans were drafted for improving and redeveloping parklands," he said.

To finance such programs, the Union County Park Commission filed for a \$8 million grant under the Green Acres program. The commission submitted to the county a \$27 million proposal for a six-year capital improvement plan to include an aquatic center and sports and culture center.

Plans for Lenape Park—400 acres of land in Springfield, Union, Kenilworth, Cranford and Westfield-

includes plans for a police pistol range and relocation and expansion of present shooting facilities, archery ranges, lakes for fishing, boating facilities, picnic areas, play fields and a tree and shrub arboretum.

Another project is the proposed bikeways system which eventually will be part of county-wide network.

In conjunction with the Cranford Township Committee, the commission has completed plans for a section of the Cranford bikeway, to run through Nomahegan Park, and is making application for an additional bike-way segment proposed for the Cranford Heritage Corridor section of Railway River Parkway.

During 1976, five acres of land purchased from the Celanese Corp. and 12 acres purchased from Household International Co. completed completion of 81 acres for Hidden Valley Park, Summit and Springfield. The new park will be kept in its natural state and will provide nature trails, and opportunities for fishing, ice skating, skating and other recreation.

Acquisition of smaller parcels of land (approximately 10 acres), including donation of five acres of land to be added to the Acadia Arboretum in Scotch Plains, was accomplished.

Ecologic concerns under the title of flood control commanded the attention of the commission. During the past year, plans for flood alleviation structures and the actual facilities were a major topic. Projects such as tandem dams in the Watching Reservation,

flood retention in Lenape Park, and the widening and deepening of the channels of the Railway River were among them.

The consultant firm of Metcalf & Eddy, Inc. was hired to study the flood control problems concerning Watching Reservation and Green Brook and to make recommendations to the Commission.

The County Park is under study for flood control plans, as well as previously mentioned recreation facilities. The county, with its consultants, Dickelohr and the Park Commission engineers and the Commission's consultants, Edwards & Kelcey, are analyzing flood retention plans consisting of dams.

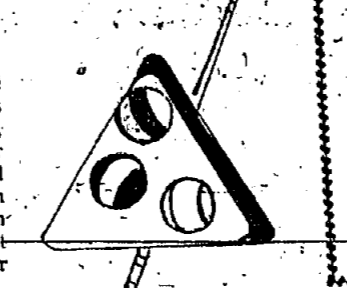
and if they want to arrange for donating blood, we will set up an appointment at the Freehold Hospital or at the Red Bank Blood Bank Center. Contact me for details.

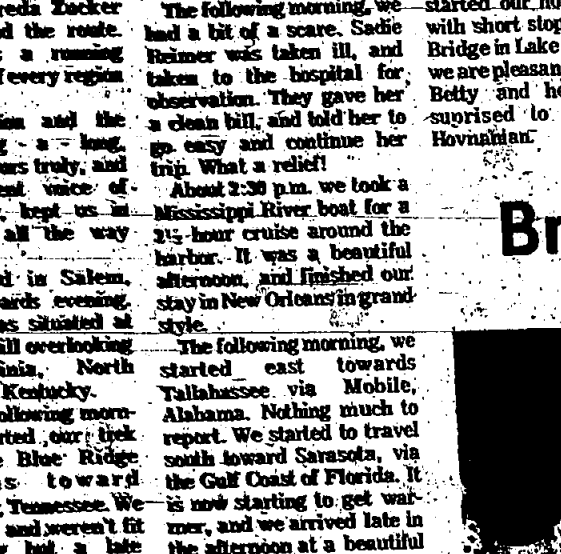
