Local schools

Local schools are looking for volunteers for various purposes at the schools. The discussion was prompted by a report by Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent of schools, that "John Westerfield, a local resident, is currently involved as a resource volunteer in an elective program concerning radio communication at the Florence Gaudinier School. A CB radio operator for the past decade, he is well qualified to develop their interests in this increasingly popular activity." Baruchin said the course will teach the theory and practice of radio operation, using antennas and equipment, the district already owns, stemming from an unsuccessful attempt several years ago. Board members questioned board liability in the use of a volunteer for a continuing project of this sort, even with the supervision of a certified teacher. The superintendent, who has begun to study details of the program, was directed to report back to the board before proceeding any further with the proposed course. He was also told to expedite work of a staff committee studying a possible policy on all aspects of the use of volunteers. The volunteers could range from "resource persons" for one-time programs to specialists involved in long term projects in ceramics or other subjects, or others who would be available as general classroom assistants. In other business, the board approved an increase in the price of lunches at the Gaudinier School, from 55 to 60 cents for students and from 65 cents to a dollar for adults. The previous prices had been in effect for more than two years. The new schedule will take effect March 1. James Adams, designated liaison person, reported on plans to improve communications between the board and the Township Committee. Adams, who is retiring from the board this winter,

Local citizens asked to reflect on problems of police officers

Phil Edwin Glasman, president of Springfield Local 76 of the Policemen's Benevolent Association, this week issued an appeal for local citizens to reflect on the problems of police officers. Glasman, in a public address, requested that citizens take time to think about the police officer's role in the community. He noted that police officers are often misunderstood and that their work is often thankless. He asked citizens to show more respect and understanding for the police officers who serve them.

The Christmas in the radio car or walking "beat" - the unexpected emergency that brings a vacation to an end, and the wife home alone alienated from her friends since she can't go to the party because her husband is always working. As a result, invitations to the parties become rare as people take it for granted the job has the officer working, and friendships weaken. Then, when the police officer goes to work, he often hears in the line up, "Special attention, we have a woman alone in a house." "As this is heard, all the officers reflect upon their own wives who are alone and wonder why they can't have their own wives in such a situation. The officer's economic situation, in order for him to support his family, is a major factor in the problem. He is often forced to take on a second job. The result is a greater absence from home. He thus becomes known to his children as the guy who uses the house to change his clothes and sleep. He is not there when his children come home with problems and his home is a broken home. His wife, in the judicial system this would be called hearsay evidence. As a result of these situations, his home is subject to the problems that result. Often if a police officer is not married to a girl that is as dedicated as he is, his marriage ends up in a divorce. It is a sad situation. How does this affect the police officer's family, as attitudes are easily reflected? How much is sacrificed to God and religion? Over all the sacrifices are numerous and only a few were reflected on, but the answer to the question of how much must a police officer give remains unknown. "The breaking point is reached more often than statistics can evaluate. It may appear to be a broken home or mental breakdown, but nevertheless is a reality for a great number of people who are not required to give so much.

Buehrer wins Jaycee award

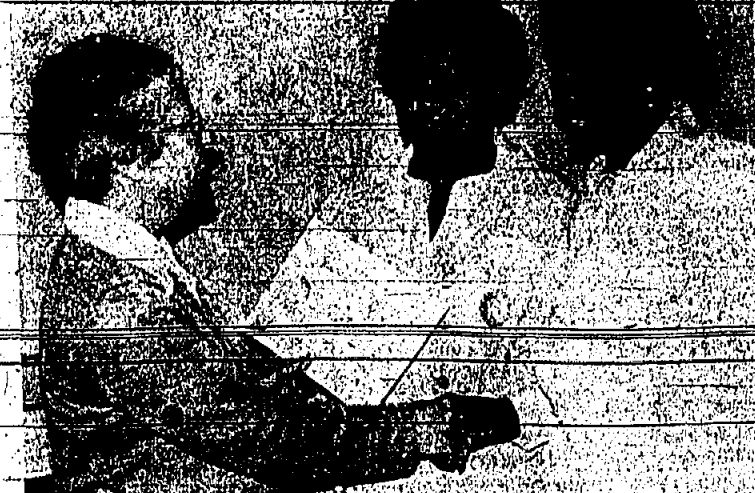

Senator WILLIAMS Reports

MAKING GOVERNMENT WORK We hear much these days that government and officials have nothing to contribute to the wellbeing of our society. I think it is important to take note of the things that prove government can and does work.

The vast majority of the laws which come out of Congress are designed for the good of the people. But they are exercised in full only after they go on the books, their purposes are not fully carried out due to administrative incompetence or neglect. There is a new spirit of commitment in Washington now that I think will contribute greatly to the efficient and productive operation of our government.

Success in making government work depends on this same spirit of dedication and conscientiousness all down the line—from the President to the agency or department official at the desk or in the field. And it requires substantial effort by ordinary citizens with no government titles—the kind of selfless, outgoing humanitarianism that finds its satisfaction in helping others what circumstances dictate these others cannot do for themselves.

One of the best examples I know is that of the Westfield Community Center. For 40 years, this center has provided pre-school services, senior citizens services and full-time day care for people of all kinds of backgrounds, blacks, whites, Jews, Catholics, Protestants—all on segments of the social and economic structure. The center receives some federal money, but by far the greatest contributions in money and time come from voluntary, unselfish local citizens, who are dedicated to making the community work.

On the other side of the coin, New Jersey has an excellent wastewater treatment program that has benefited from \$1.3 billion in federal grant dollars during the past four years for sewage cleanup. Between now and 1990, 29 more treatment projects will be completed, while 43 additional projects have been funded and are in the planning stages. Sixty more are being authorized. With these facilities, current bans on housing construction, because of sewer inadequacies will be lifted, thereby allowing for sharply increased housing starts in many municipalities.

These programs illustrate how intelligent cooperation and sensible action from the federal level down to the municipal level makes government work.

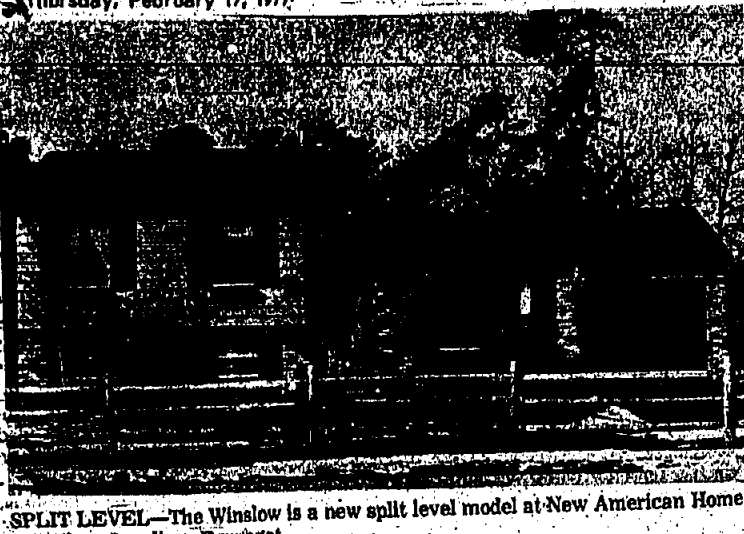
