

FBI joins hunt as \$10,000 heist

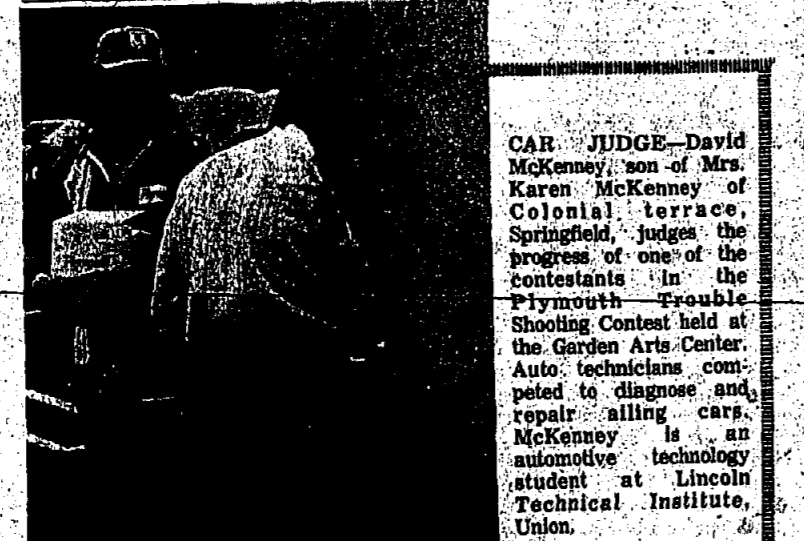

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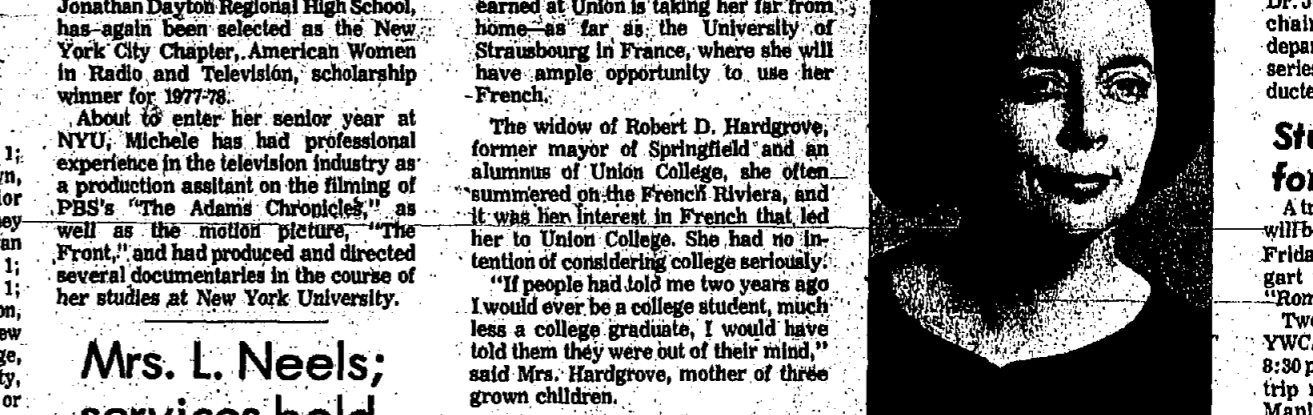

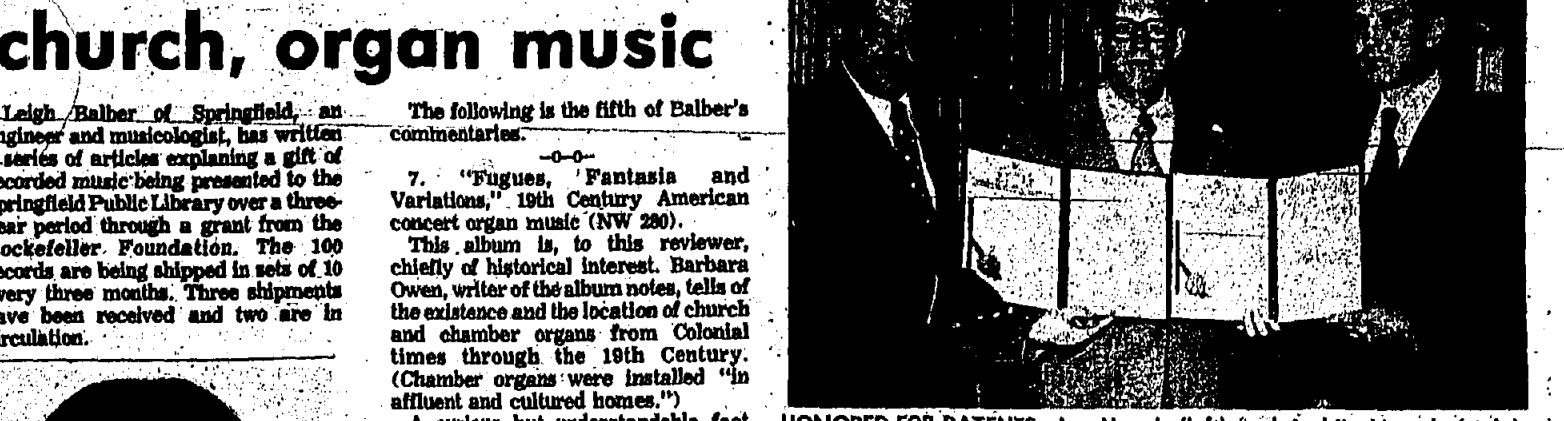

The proposal to use about 15 percent of Leasing for shooting was produced by a 10-foot fence.

Cron said snow and trap-shooting has been part of a "well-rounded" park recreation program for almost half a century in Union County. An assistant, Jack Sapp, said he had no objection to giving him for the new steel shooting facility, but recalled that as many as 7,000 clay pigeons have been shot in a four-year period.

"It's a trade-off," said Cron, claiming the existing facility could not continue when the artificial lake is created, and shooters need an outdoor range not only for recreation but for training to make hunters safer in the field. He said there have been four complaints about noise from residents near the present steel-trap facility.

"It's been there almost 20 years — it was there before they had the artificial lake created, and they know what they were getting into," replied Zeller. "It's different here, we didn't buy homes expecting that kind of noise."

Another audience member questioned whether the noise would interfere with delicate technical work of Western Electric Company on Lawrence Road.

County park officials conceded that so far Western Electric has not been consulted and that there have been no technical studies of noise levels and no environmental-impact statement (EIS) on the recreational plan at Leasing Park. Although an EIS was made in conjunction with flood-control plans, the county officials emphasized that recreational planning is still tentative, and said county freeholders will conduct hearings before any funding.

The 1 1/2-hour session on Leasing Park came at the end of an otherwise routine Town Committee meeting.

The committee called for Fanning to draft a bonding ordinance for \$20,000 to give Springfield a dining facility.

Earlier this year a Superior Court Judge ruled that the approval of a new county charter by the voters gave the freeholders the right to restructure all facets of county government not controlled by the state. The park commission, which has been an independent agency for more than 20 years, told the freeholders to court in an attempt to maintain its autonomous status. The commission, however, receives its funds for operating and capital expenses through the Board of Freeholders.

The commission, however, receives its funds for operating and capital expenses through the Board of Freeholders.

GOP hopefuls: Bateman to lure Dems' support

State Sen. Peter J. McDonough (R-22) and his running mates, Assemblymen William J. Maguire and Donald T. DiFrancesco, this week said the election of Sen. Raymond H. Bateman as governor "would restore the two-party balance" to New Jersey. They said they expect Bateman to attract "overwhelming" Democratic and independent support and defeat Gov. Brendan T. Byrne in November.



McDonough said the Assemblymen added to the legislative houses to move even closer to a balance this year.

The Republican incumbents said Bateman's landslide victory in the June 7 primary will unite the Republican party behind his candidacy.

"We hope the income tax issue does not dominate the campaign as the press has speculated," Maguire and DiFrancesco said. Many other failures of the Byrne administration and the Democratic-dominated legislature deserve public debate.

McDonough, the Senate minority whip, seeks reelection to the upper house and Maguire and DiFrancesco seek to retain the Assembly seats they won in 1975.
