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Tennis courts nearing construction at Dayton

After five years of setbacks, Union County Regional High School District board members this week said the district is finally ready to advertise for bids on construction of tennis courts at Dayton Regional High in Springfield.

Board members, meeting Tuesday at Governor Livingston Regional High in Berkeley Heights, also took a look at proposed administrative guidelines which adviser Julia Latzer said will give student newspapers much greater assurance of the financial capability to publish regularly.

The long-proposed tennis courts at Dayton, only high school in the district which has none, have received necessary approval from the state's Water, Policies, Commission and a required variance from Springfield Township for 10-foot fences, according to district administrators and their engineer, Richard Jeske.

Township officials had protested the aesthetics of the original proposal to put the courts adjacent to Mountain Avenue and near the tree-lined Vista. State water officials had worried of a flood threat. Jeske said the final design moves the four proposed courts back 18 feet southeast of Mountain, near the clock tower, and preserves all trees, although two trees will need some pruning. He said the design can withstand a flood six inches higher than the record one of 1973.

"And if it gets any higher than that, Springfield's is so much trouble we won't be thinking about tennis courts," commented Lewis Fredricka, assistant superintendent for facilities who said he would speed paper work to get the courts completed before winter ball construction. Lewis said he hopes to get the legal call for bids published within a week to 10 days.

The proposal calls for four courts in a fenced area at a cost of about \$20,000 per court. If inflation during the years of discussion causes problems, Fredricka said, he will recommend that at least three courts be built immediately at Dayton, "where they've waited long enough." The board also reviewed plans for one additional court at Livingston.

Discussing the student newspaper guidelines, board members said the seven-page document was too detailed to constitute board policies but could be useful as an administrative aid. Mrs. Latzer said student journalists would cheer the revision which gives each high school paper freedom to count on \$1,000 legislative. Previously a paper could get up to \$1,300, but only if it had a circulation of 100.

Hecker hits report on counseling

Union County Regional High School District 1 board members Tuesday claimed that a consulting firm was inadequate in its study of the district-wide guidance and counseling program.

The consultants ignored what he considered the "main reason" for hiring the firm, according to board member Roland F. Hecker of Berkeley Heights. Hecker said he thought the primary purpose of the study was to find ways of reducing paper work involved in guidance-counseling functions such as a routine change in a student's schedule of classes.

"But I see no evidence of any effort of any kind to simplify the paperwork," Hecker complained about a 27-page report prepared by Ramsey Associates Inc. of Trenton. Dr. William W. Ramsey and Dr. Charles A. Mahler, representing the consulting firm, presented their report at the board's meeting Tuesday in Governor Livingston Regional High School, Berkeley Heights.

Hecker said the district requested the study after being registered over his objections—20 months ago in some of their papers were primarily the "unbelievable" amount of paper work involved in schedule changes. Hecker said he had no quarrel with the firm's findings.

State hospital survey puts Overlook on top

Overlook Hospital has been rated as New Jersey's premier general hospital in a special report on hospitals in the state issued by the Health of Our Hospitals, puts Overlook in top place, according to hospital authorities.

The report, published by the American Hospital Association, ranked Overlook as an "efficiently managed, highly professional, community hospital with strong supportive services and probably the most respected medical team in the state."

Author Randy Young pointed out that Overlook has attracted an impressive amount of federal money for a variety of "demonstration projects," that the hospital maintains full-time directors for its medical departments and holds a major teaching affiliation with New York City's Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons.

"Single" out were Overlook's pioneering efforts to establish such new concepts as the monitored coronary care unit, first hospital-based total body scanner in the state and other path-breaking achievements.

Overlook's emphasis on out-patient care through its family health centers was also stressed.

The hospital survey, which took three months to conduct, investigated 178 state's 94 acute care facilities and three long-term care facilities. The study was conducted with the help of 100 health care experts, physicians, nurses, hospital planners, consumer advocates, industry officials, medical writers and state officials—all of whom had specific knowledge of New Jersey hospitals and their strengths and weaknesses.

In addition, a study was made of state health department inspection reports on individual hospitals.

EACH INSTITUTION was asked a series of general questions about its operation, supplemented with department of Health data deemed important in judging the quality and efficiency of hospitals.

The basic areas of inquiry covered such criteria as:

1. Does the hospital have a major teaching affiliation with a medical school or university, either inside or outside the state? A major affiliation, according to College of

Search for Health

In 1976, 1 in 12 (high over 25), the percentage school seniors across the country, smoked used marijuana drops marijuana 20 or more times per month. Among those adults aged 25-34, young men 20 to 24 years, who have used the drug in the past, less than one-third report current use. The survey shows that among older age groups, among those who used about half of the 18-year-olds the drug even 25, group who have tried once, nearly 1 in 5 smoke the drug are still current marijuana users.

When comparisons are made on a national basis between marijuana use in the United States reported to the National Institute on Drug Abuse... Among youth one-third reported having drunk alcohol in the preceding month, one-quarter reported having drunk alcohol in the preceding week, and one-eighth reported marijuana use. For adults, the percentages were respectively, 60, 40, and 10. However, in a national survey limited to high school seniors, it was found that the percentage of seniors who had used marijuana in the preceding month (8 percent) exceeded the percentage who had used alcohol that many times during the same period (6 percent).

Early 1900 art songs included in American record collection

Leigh Balber, a Springfield resident, engineer and musicologist, has written this series on a set of recorded music which is being presented to the Springfield Public Library over a three-month period. The 100 records are being shipped to sets of 10 every three months. Three shipments have been received and two are in circulation at 46¢-48¢.

The following is the sixth of Balber's commentaries. "When I have Sung My Song," The American Art Song 1900-1940. "This album is a collection of 17 songs by 14 composers and three arrangements by another composer. The earliest, Edward McDowell, was born in 1862, the latest, Conant Coates, in 1905. The album takes its title from one of its songs, words and music composed by Charles in 1904. The recordings by 15 singers, most of them legendary, were made between 1908 (when there were no microphones, singer simply singing into a large horn) and 1941.

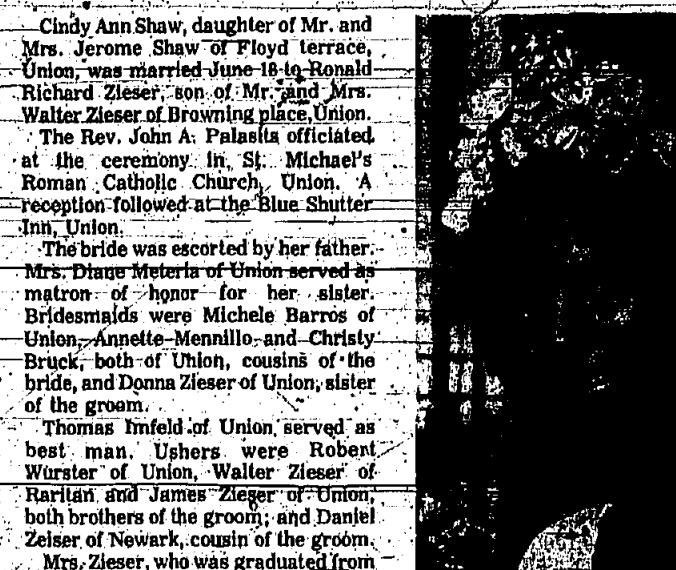

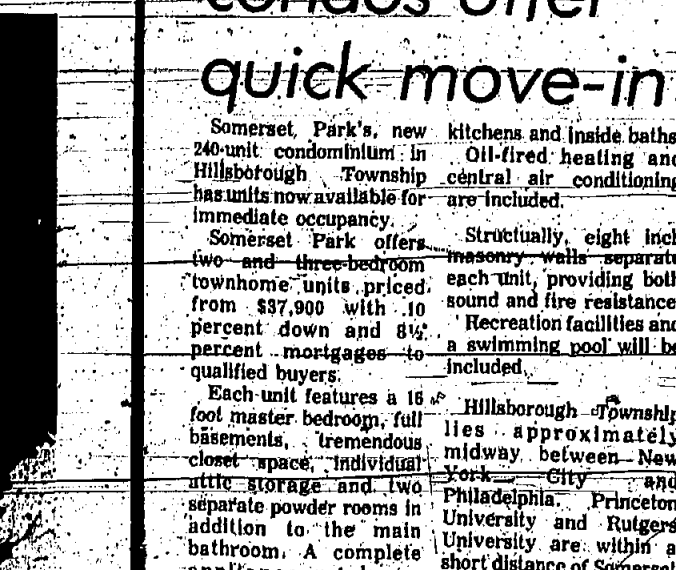

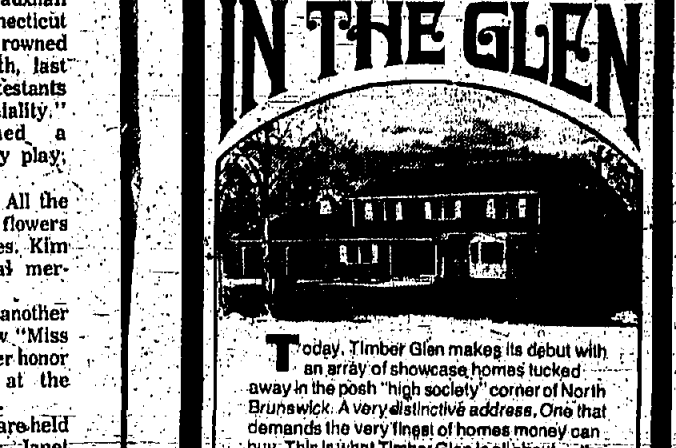

Fall area living costs among highest in U.S.

Last autumn living costs in the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area were one of the most expensive in the country, according to Herbert Binstock, regional commissioner, U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

An analysis of the latest estimates for three hypothetical four-person family budgets showed that at \$23,677 the local cost of maintaining the higher of three levels of living was above any of the 38 other mainland areas studied by BLS.

Living costs in the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area were \$9,918, one-fourth above the United States urban average and \$9,049 (14 percent) higher than in the lowest living cost area, Austin, Texas.

At the lower and intermediate budget levels, living costs are also notably higher in this area. At \$18,866, the intermediate budget for the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area was exceeded only by the Boston area, where the budget was \$218 higher. New York was \$2,630 (16 percent) higher than the national urban average and \$4,627 (33 percent) higher than the national average and \$4,657 (33 percent) higher than the Austin area.

The lowest-level budget, estimated at \$10,435 for the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area, was \$794 (8 percent) above the U.S. urban average and third highest among 38 mainland areas. New York was exceeded only by Boston (\$209 higher) and San Francisco (\$283 higher).

Serious crime in the United States decreased 9 percent during the first three months of 1977, compared with the same period of 1976, according to a quarterly report by the FBI.

The report, which is the first of a series of quarterly reports since 1958, shows a 9 percent decline in serious crime in 1977. The decline was the largest since 1965, when serious crime fell 10 percent.

The report also shows that the number of violent crimes, such as murder, rape, robbery, and burglary, fell 7 percent. Property crimes, such as larceny and auto theft, fell 10 percent.
