### Two Dem candidates term Banner too silent

Bill Cieri and Stanley Kalsh, Democratic candidates for Springfield Township Committee, criticized Republican Township Committeeman Norman Banner for "failing to represent the interests of the town" while serving as a member of both the Union County Park Commission and Springfield Township Committee.

Their comments were stimulated by the June 28 township meeting at which they said, the Park Commission unveiled a multimillion-dollar proposal for redesigning Lenape Park. Despite the millions involved, the plan "left little but sharp criticism directed at what they termed a sleet and rifle range that would be moved within existing (and possible rifle shot) of Springfield homes."

They added, "Banner, who sat at the meeting in both capacities as a member of the Township Committee and the Union County Park Commission, served neither group. He refused to support, refused to criticize, refused to contribute, refused to comment."

Cieri and Kalsh continued, "Banner's silence on the Lenape Park shoot shooting range is only the latest example of the peculiar manner in which he fails to serve both bodies. His approach is to remain silent on matters concerning Springfield. If he is going to do that, he is going to be utterly worthless to the interests of the people of our town in vital areas."

For example, another matter concerns an ongoing dispute between the Township Committee and the Park Commission over the building of detention basins along Riverstone and Meigs avenues to help control flooding in that area.

The Park Commission argues it cannot permit the town to build this basin on park property without receiving an equivalent amount of land elsewhere. The town argues it is not taking the land, only improving it, much as it did in the area across Meigs.

### Rt. 78: another meeting

State will discuss details of highway

Representatives of the N.J. Department of Transportation will discuss that agency's plans for the construction of Rt. 78 through the Watchung Reservation next Thursday, July 21, at Town Hall from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.

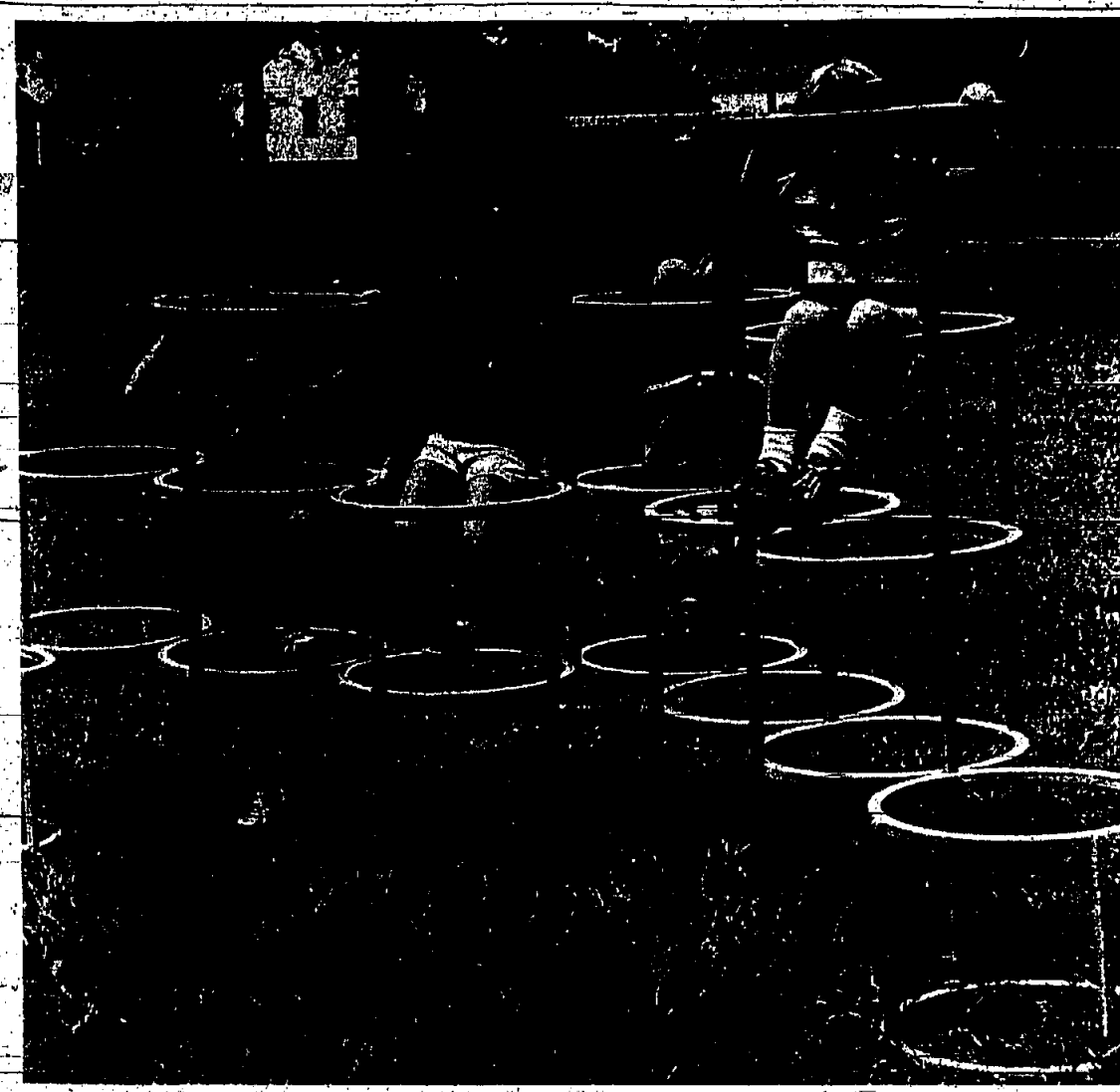
Unlike previous hearings on the department's draft environmental impact statement, where comments from the public were inserted into the official record, next Thursday's all-day session is designed to inform residents on progress in the completion of the final environmental impact statement and to discuss procedural and engineering details.

The department has designated as its "preferred alignment" a tunnel scheme for the interstate highway through the reservation. The route it proposed four years ago in the first of two draft environmental impact statements. In announcing its selection late last year, the department said the tunnel plan was the only "feasible and prudent" alternative. Under the National Environmental Policy Act, public lands like the Watchung Reservation cannot be used for federal highway construction unless there are other "feasible and prudent" alternatives.

When the final environmental impact statement is completed, it must be approved by the district, regional and Washington offices of the Federal Highway Administration. After review by the U.S. Secretary of Transportation, a final decision will be made by the Council on Environmental Quality.

Opponents of the road, under the banner of the Impact 78 committee, are recommending that the "existing link" connecting existing portions of Rt. 78 east and west of the Watchung Reservation be abandoned and replaced with improved mass transportation services and better use of existing highways.

She said, "This total combines refunds, exchanges affected, avoided or completed through the efforts of the Consumer Affairs Office."

Mrs. Bloom urged that each consumer assume his or her responsibility within all retail transactions. "Read every word of anything you sign—front and back. I am amazed at what intelligent people will sign."

"There should be no blank spaces within any purchase order, and certainly a total cost figure must be provided before you sign."

"Do not allow any salesperson to persuade you to purchase an item that you do not fit your needs—regardless of the difference in price."

"Treat your reputable retailer. He will back what he sells. It may cost a dollar or two more, but that will be the most beneficial deal you can expect."

"Buyer beware! Reliability and that has to cost more."

Det. Dominick Olivo, 30-year veteran of the Springfield Police Department, was promoted to sergeant Tuesday at the Township Committee meeting.

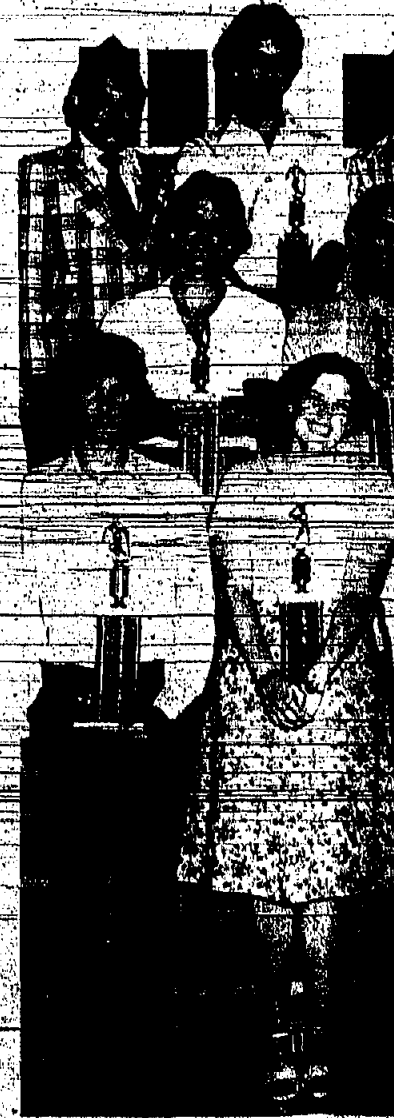
Mayor Joanne Rajoppi and township committee members gave standing applause, as well as unanimous approval to the appointment recommended by Police Chief George E. Parsell. An audience of a dozen people, including two of the detective's four daughters, joined in the applause. Olivo was sworn in by Town Clerk Art Buehner. The mayor pinned a new gold badge onto Olivo's chest. And daughter Elaine, 11, and Kim, 9, promptly pinned the detective into a big hug.

Olivo was among the top three candidates of five who passed a promotional examination to become the fifth sergeant on the force of 40 people. Committeeman Robert Welschek, quoting a letter from the police chief, praised Olivo's "exemplary performance as a police officer and detective" since he joined the force April 1, 1967. The letter pointed out that Olivo has received seven commendations including praise from the county prosecutor's office for his professionalism.

The promotion officially takes effect tomorrow according to Chief Parsell.

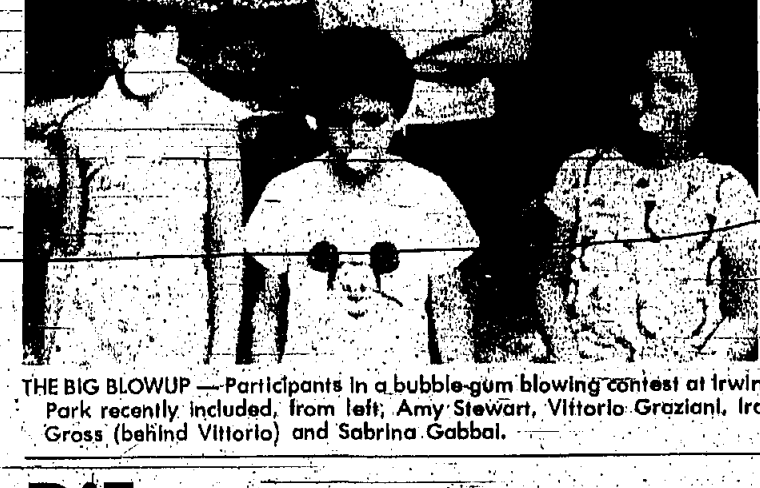

## Judge flunks learner for 2 traffic offenses

Gordon Peterson, 17, of Springfield, flunked his driver's license test, before even took it, according to Springfield Municipal Court Judge Malcolm Bohrod.

In court this week, the judge ordered the youth not to apply for a driver's license for at least six months. The judge also penalized Peterson \$100 in fines and court costs for two traffic incidents — the first June 10 on Baltusrol way, the second June 22 at Tree Top and Highland.

Police said Peterson was behind the wheel of a car June 1 when he was ticketed for careless driving, for using his learner's permit without having a licensed driver with him and for failure to have an insurance card. Penalties for these offenses totaled \$65.

In other traffic cases Monday in Springfield Municipal Court, Robert D. Welch of Mt. Kisco, N.Y., was penalized \$115 in fines and costs and ordered to drive in New Jersey for 30 days because of a drunken-driving conviction. Welch had been convicted in April, but the sentencing was deferred under new state law.

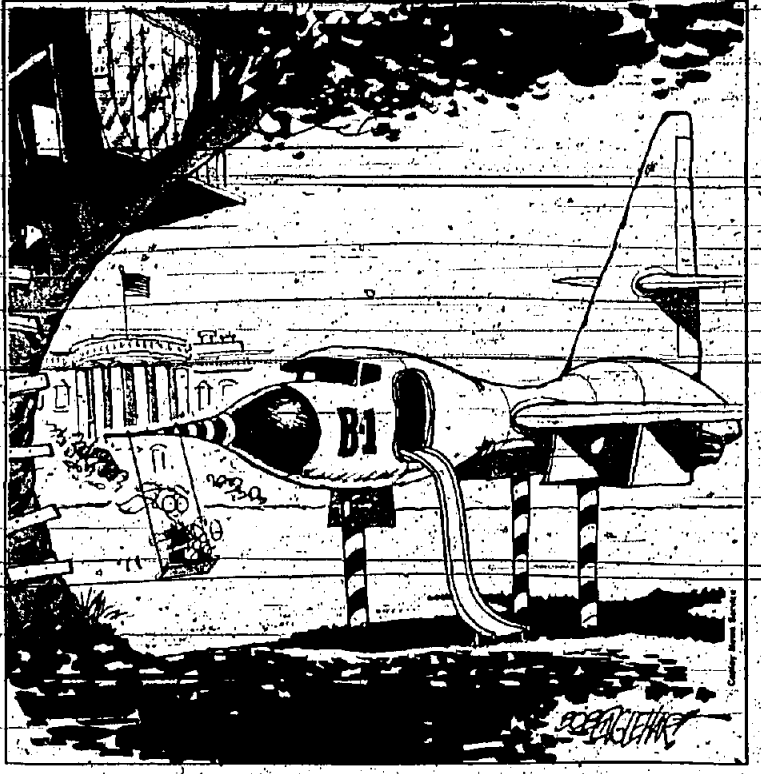

# Griffes' music the latest addition to township library's collection

Eight Baler of Springfield, an engineer and musician, is writing this series of articles on a gift of recorded music which is being presented to the Springfield Public Library over a three-year period through a grant from the Rockefeller Foundation. The 100 records are being shipped in sets of 10 every three months. Three shipments have been received and two are in circulation at this time.

The following is the seventh of Baler's commentaries.

Charles Tomlinson Griffes. At the peak of his career in December 1919, the music critic of the New York Tribune called him "after a performance of his 'The Pleasure Dome'...

Kubla Kahn... "that rare bird, an American composer" with imagination. That performance was by the New York Symphony Orchestra under Walter Damrosch. A week earlier, a performance by the Boston Symphony Orchestra under Pierre Monteux had brought the same kind of acclaim. Two weeks later Leopold Stokowski led the Philadelphia Orchestra in three other pieces by Griffes including his well-known "The White Peacock." But Griffes was too ill to go to Philadelphia. Four months later he was dead at the age of 36, still another gifted composer who died young.

Doris K. Anderson has written an excellent sketch of Griffes' musical life.

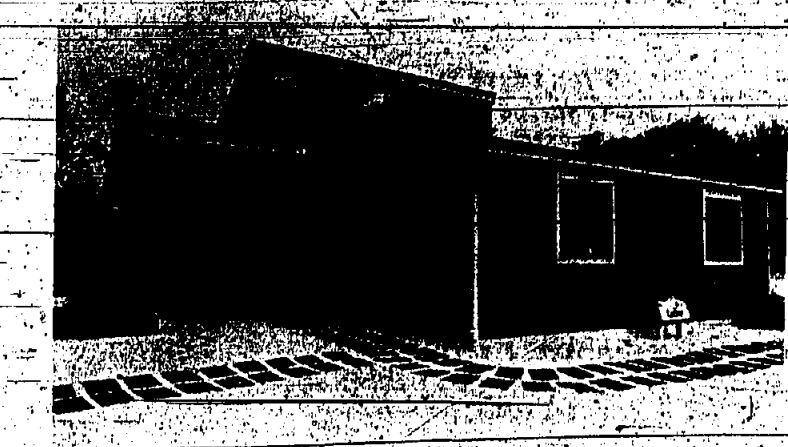

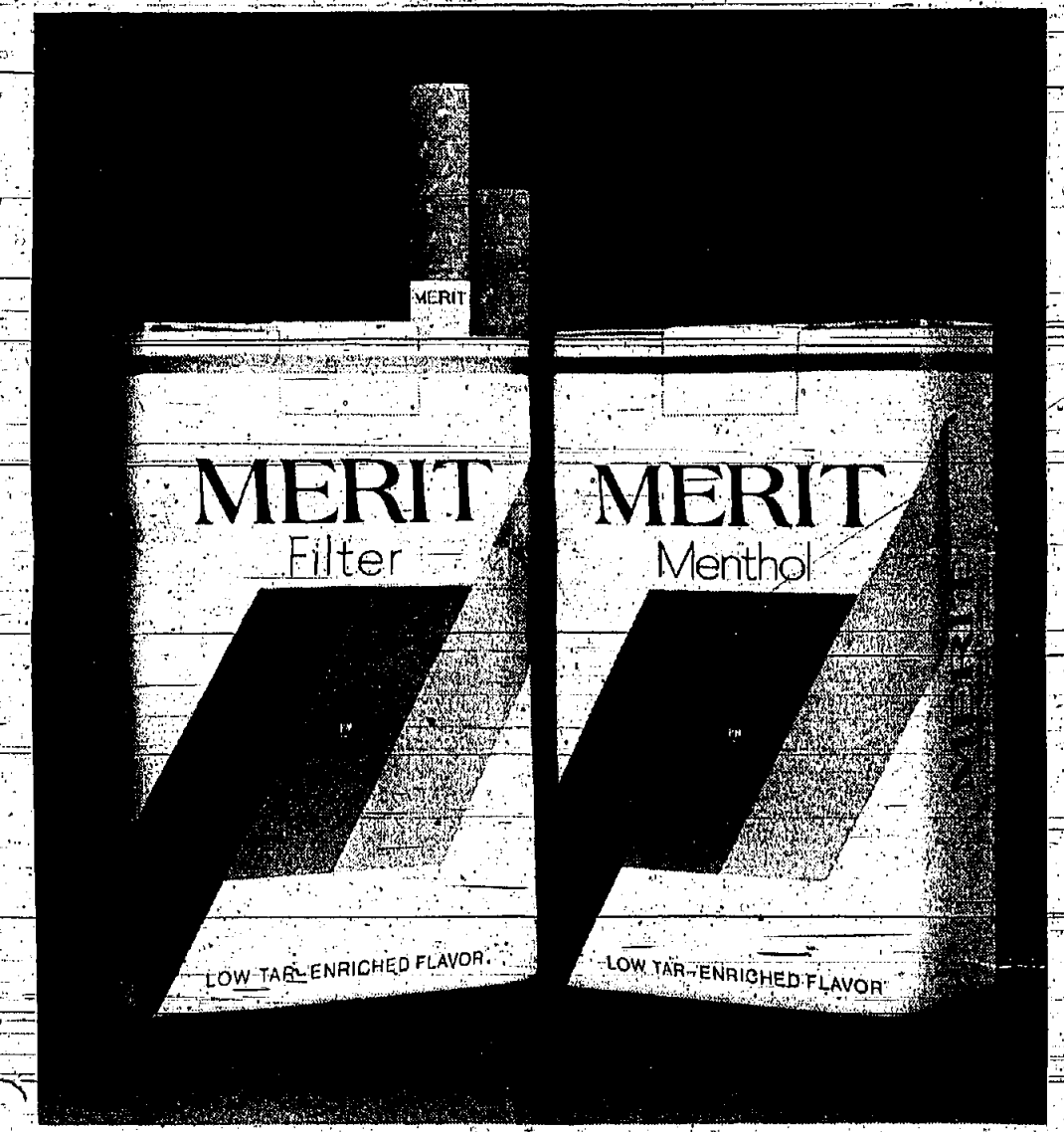
