

### Museum will present film festival winners

Early eight prize winners from the 10th annual American Film Festival conducted in the spring by the Educational Film Library Association will be showcased in the New Jersey State Museum Auditorium from Monday, Aug. 22, through Sunday, Aug. 28. Screening will be continuous from 10 a.m. to mid-afternoon Monday through Friday and from 4 to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. There will be no charge for admission. Selected from a total of several hundred entries in 48 different subject categories, the films vary in length from 10 to 100 minutes although most last about half an hour.

The festival's major award winner—"Harlan County, USA," a 103-minute documentary examination of social progress in Appalachia—will be shown at 2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 27. Other feature-length offerings deal with such subjects as folk music of the 1960s (1:10-3:30 a.m. Tuesday), a volcano (6:15 a.m. Thursday) and the Nez Perce Indians (2 p.m. Sunday). Other subject categories include nature, crafts, health, sports, science, religion and art. 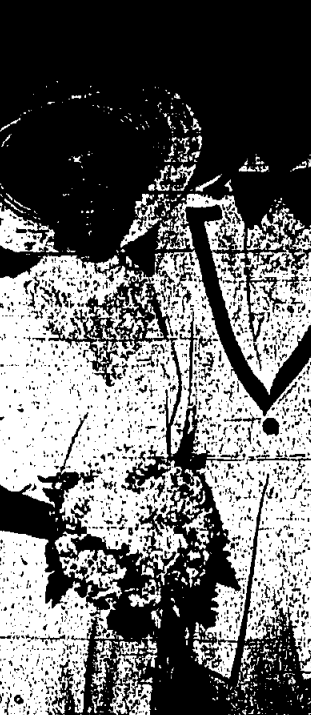

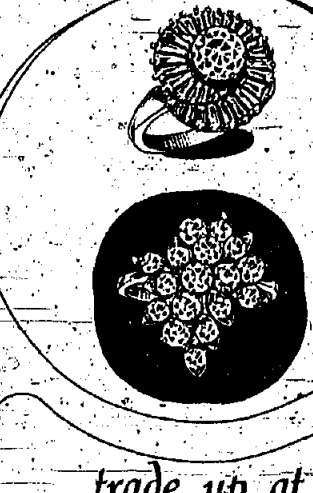

of these changes should call, write or visit their local Social Security office. Failure to do so may result in an overpayment that will have to be repaid. A possible penalty deduction of from 25 to 80%.

"Basically, we're checking to see whether there have been any changes in a person's situation, which would affect SSI payments," said a Social Security official.

"The payments are intended for aged, blind or disabled persons who have limited or no income and limited resources. In most cases, SSI payments will remain the same after the 're-determination' process. Some payments may go up. Others may be stopped."

The major events which can cause suspension, reduction or termination of payments are:

- Increase in income or resources
- Change in marital status
- Recovery of disability or termination of treatment
- Refusal to accept or undergo required treatment
- Absence from the United States for 30 or more consecutive days
- Loss of United States citizenship or permission to reside in the United States

Failure to apply for other benefits under other programs which may be payable to the person receiving SSI.
