N.J. Lapidary Society to exhibit at annual show

Paul Ondrejok of Union, president of the New Jersey Lapidary Society, announced this week that the society will have an exhibit at the 1977 Annual Mineral, Gem and Fossil Show of the New Jersey Earth Science Association, Saturday and Sunday at Seton Hall University, South Orange.

The New Jersey Lapidary Society exhibit will be one of nearly 100 from mineralogical and lapidary societies, private collectors and several major museums. Among the museums exhibiting will be the American Museum of Natural History from New York, the Academy of Natural Science from Philadelphia and the Royal Ontario Museum of Toronto.

In addition to the displays, there will be several working exhibits. Skilled craftsmen will demonstrate cutting and polishing gems from the simple tumbling of pebbles to the shaping of cabochons and the faceting of stones. Silversmiths will show how jewelry is designed and crafted. Mineralogists will demonstrate microscopic crystals. There also will be special activities for children.

There will be several illustrated talks. Robert Middleton, curator of the Academy of Natural Science, will give a guided tour for children and those unfamiliar with the mineral world at 11 a.m. on Saturday. His topic will be "What To Look For At A Mineral Show." The program also will include Most-Of-Us—Mineral—mineralogy.



\$23,100 firehouse plans item passes vote, but faces opposition

The Springfield Township Committee has introduced a proposal to spend \$23,100 for architectural plans that would lead to a long-range, \$200,000 expansion of the firehouse. The \$23,100 proposal squeaked through introduction Tuesday as part of a \$68,000 revenue package — \$62,000 of that amount to be raised by a bond issue.


