Methodists here since 1827

Early 'Society' met in a stone farmhouse

(Editor's note: The following article is the first in a series by the pastor of the Springfield Emmanuel United Methodist Church, which is celebrating its 150th anniversary.)

The spiritual father of Methodism was the Rev. John Wesley (1703-1791), a priest in the Church of England who was denied a parish because of his enthusiasm for spreading scriptural holiness across the land. The Wesleyan movement touched every hamlet in England and Wales and eventually reached America.

In 1827 the movement came to the Springfield and Millburn area, where the first Methodist meeting was held in a stone house belonging to Pillsbury Dickerson. This farmhouse on Millburn Avenue, south of the Wyoming Railway Station, was the birthplace of the present church, and Methodists were welcome to worship there. Later Methodist meetings were held near the stone arch bridge on the Morris Turnpike. Methodists met in small groups called "societies" until the present church was built. In one instance they met in the Denman Paper Mill in the glazing room.

with extreme examples of social problems, "and it only makes sense" to try to view these problems in context, according to Calabrese. The policeman also deals with attorneys and other college graduates in doing his job, "and it helps to understand their language." Calabrese says there are also less esoteric advantages from college: "It forces you to keep up with new developments in police work. When you have a test coming up (in class), you can't just say, 'I'll read about it when I have the time.' You have to make the time. The more you read, the more you have an edge in taking promotional exams (on the job), too.

"The 100 percent in favor of continuing education for police officers, in college as well as through in-service training programs," concludes Calabrese.

Grouping numbers of Springfield policemen—obviously—agree with Calabrese, although their views, Chief Parsell, has mixed emotions on the subject.

Parsell says the township's education budget is "very liberal—really too liberal, in my opinion." He says he has seen to evidence his force that a college degree, or a lack of one, makes any difference.

The township has offered educational incentives for police since the early 1970s, with the latest ordinance providing a bonus of \$350 per year for officers with 20 college credits (one year's work), \$440 for 40 credits, \$550 for 60, \$770 for 80 credits and a maximum of \$1,000 a year for a bachelor's degree or post-graduate degree in fields related to law enforcement. Bonuses for degrees in other fields are reportedly a bone of contention between the ranks and management.

IN ADDITION to the township pay incentives, police can collect aid for college tuition and books through the state's Law Enforcement Education Program (LEEP) and the State Law Enforcement Planning Agency (SLEPA).

But the Springfield policeman point out that they receive no time off from work for continuing their college studies. They give up off-duty time with families and friends to go to class.

"We don't do that just for a few hundred dollars a year," declares one of the policemen.

And it is demonstrably true that township pay incentives, in some cases, play no role in the continuing education of Springfield police. Kennedy and Calabrese, for example, were already receiving the maximum incentive bonus when they started work on master's degrees.

The concert series will begin on Oct. 22 with the appearance of Dutch soprano Ely Ameling. Miss Ameling has made annual visits to the United States and Canada since her American debut in 1964 at New York's Avery Fisher Hall. Lifestyle, by John McVie & Yoko Ono (A & C RECORDS-AB 1007). There's beautiful instrumental listening on this album. One that will get many replays.

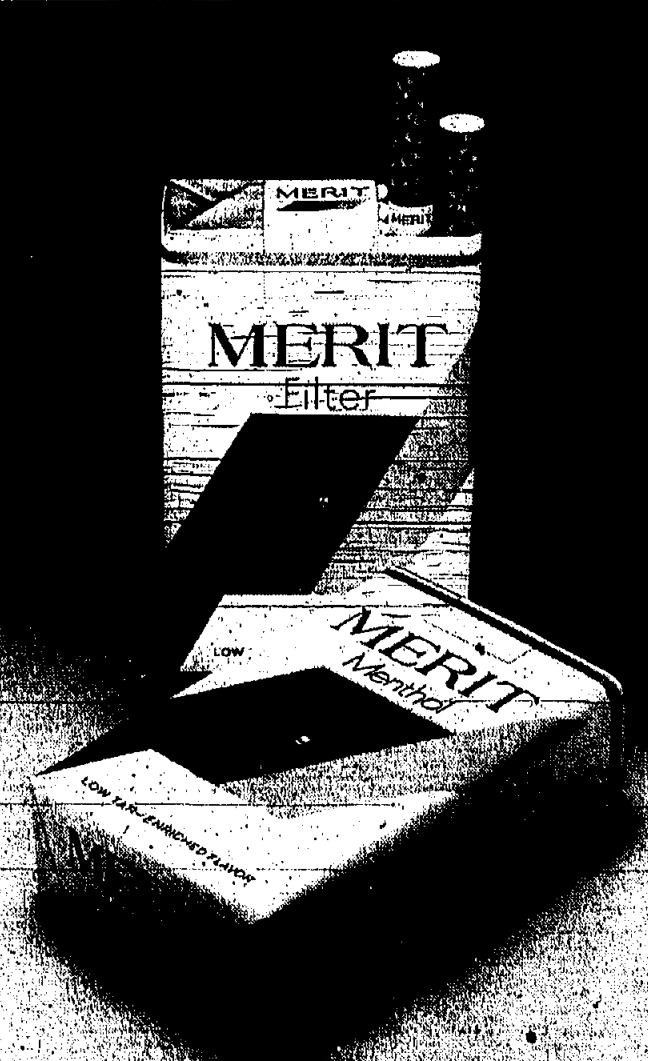
