



# Springfield temples to sponsor '77-78 institute on Jewish life

The fall semester begins next week in the fourth annual combined education institute, jointly sponsored by Temples Beth Ahm and Sha'arey Shalom of Springfield and including seminars, language classes and mini courses on Jewish life and traditions.

"Modern Answers to Questions About Judaism"—Presented by Rabbi Reuben Levine of Beth Ahm on Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m. This will be an open-ended discussion course, based on questions posed by the students and guided by the book, "Eight Questions People Ask About Judaism."

"A Page From the Midrash"—Led by Rabbi Howard Shapiro of Sha'arey Shalom on Tuesdays at 8:45 p.m. This course will enter into dialogue and encounter with some of the Midrashim (first and second century allegoric and sermonic materials), dealing with the meaning of creation, God's names, parenthood, marriage and Proverbs.

"Lunch and Learn"—Thursdays from 12:15 to 1:30 p.m. The Bible will be studied as a broad survey of events and people, reflected in the early beginnings of the nation of Israel. The instructors will be Benjamin Margolis, Beth Ahm director of education, on the Book of Joshua; Rabbi Levine, Book of Judges and Rabbi Shapiro, Book of Samuel I and II.

"Coffee and Controversy"—Led on a rotating basis by Rabbi Levine, Rabbi Shapiro and Margolis on Sundays from 9:30 to 11 a.m. The format will be an open discussion, focusing on Jewish issues.

"Lecture Series on Jewish Mysticism"—Presented by Rabbi Herbert Weiner, spiritual leader.

Temple Israel of the "Oranges" and Maplewood, on three consecutive Thursdays, starting Oct. 15, at 8:30 p.m. The first lecture will be "The Middle Ages," and the third, "Tassidim."

"Mists of the Jewish People," led by Israel Barzak, center at Beth Ahm, and by Ronald Brown, musical director at Sha'arey Shalom, on Thursdays at 8 p.m. fall semester. This course will attempt to cover the Jewish musical expression from its use in the early Temple to the Diaspora and on to the present.

Hebrew I—Two classes will be taught on Wednesdays. Margolis will be the instructor for the morning class from 10 to 11 o'clock. Mrs. Mary Reichman will instruct the evening class, 7:45 to 9:45. No previous knowledge of Hebrew is required. For students who desire it, preparation may be continued in the morning class for Bar-Mitzvah or Bat-Mitzvah in either congregation.

Hebrew II—To be taught by Mrs. Reichman at 8:45 p.m. Wednesdays. The education program is offered at no charge to members of either temple. Non-affiliated adults may attend at a nominal fee, according to Mrs. Guss and Mrs. Karp. Registration forms should be returned to either temple office as soon as possible, the co-chairmen said.

# U. S. funds available for neighborhood use

Year IV applications for community development are now available for residents, agencies and municipalities participating in the 16-community Union County Urban County Block Grant Program, according to Mary Ellen Irwin, chairwoman of the County Community Development Revenue Sharing Committee, and George J. Albanese, county manager.

Formal proposal submission forms are available at the offices of the municipal clerks for the 16 participating municipalities, as well as at the offices of the Union County Planning Department, Court House, Elizabeth. The participating municipalities include Kenilworth, Linden, Roselle, Roselle Park and Springfield.

Most communities will be holding public meetings this month to solicit ideas for programs. All proposals must be submitted to Ken Shattles of the county planning department no later than 4 p.m. Friday, Nov. 4.

Government and agency officials and municipal clerks will meet last week with county staff representatives to discuss the application process and the community development program in general.

Union County—to this date, has received more than \$4 million in federal funds under the program. The estimated funding level for the fourth year is for slightly more than \$2.1 million dollars.

The intent of the community development program is to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing, suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunity by eliminating slums, conserving and expanding the housing stock, increasing public services and improving living conditions.

The participating program includes housing rehabilitation and preservation programs, code enforcement programs, acquisition, construction or installation of neighborhood facilities, senior citizen centers and other public works improvements, as well as the improvement of public services in eligible areas. All projects to be eligible must serve areas with high concentrations of lower-income residents. In addition, public service projects may be funded only in cases where other federal assistance is unavailable.

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# Church law, theology experts to open adult school Sunday

Two leaders in the fields of law and theology will open the "Adult School of the Presbyterian Church of Springfield on Sunday at 9 Church School, 700 Lake Dr. C. William Hockel of the Rutgers University School of Law and Dr. J. Milton Bell, of the American Bible Society, will lead a discussion session on "The Christian Family in Crisis," stressing the changes attendant upon a modern family. Dr. Bell will conduct a class on "Old Testament Prophecies" emphasizing the fulfillment of ancient prophecies in the Gospel of Matthew.

Dr. Hockel has long been a church leader. His role as churchman began after World War II, in which he served as legal officer for the Seventh Fleet, when he accepted the position of superintendent of the Sunday School of the First Presbyterian Church of Bloomfield. Twenty-five years later he was elected to the position of moderator of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, the highest elective office in that denomination.

A graduate of Dartmouth College, he is a native of Ontario, Canada where he did his undergraduate work at Queen's University in Kingston. He was ordained by the United Church of Canada and later did graduate work at Princeton Seminary and the Temple University School of Theology.

In addition to his leadership in various evangelistic and preaching missions throughout the United States, Dr. Bell has authored articles for The Churchman's Almanac and Church Administration and numerous radio programs in the field of Bible interpretation. He conducted a similar Bible Class for the local church last spring and is returning by popular request.
