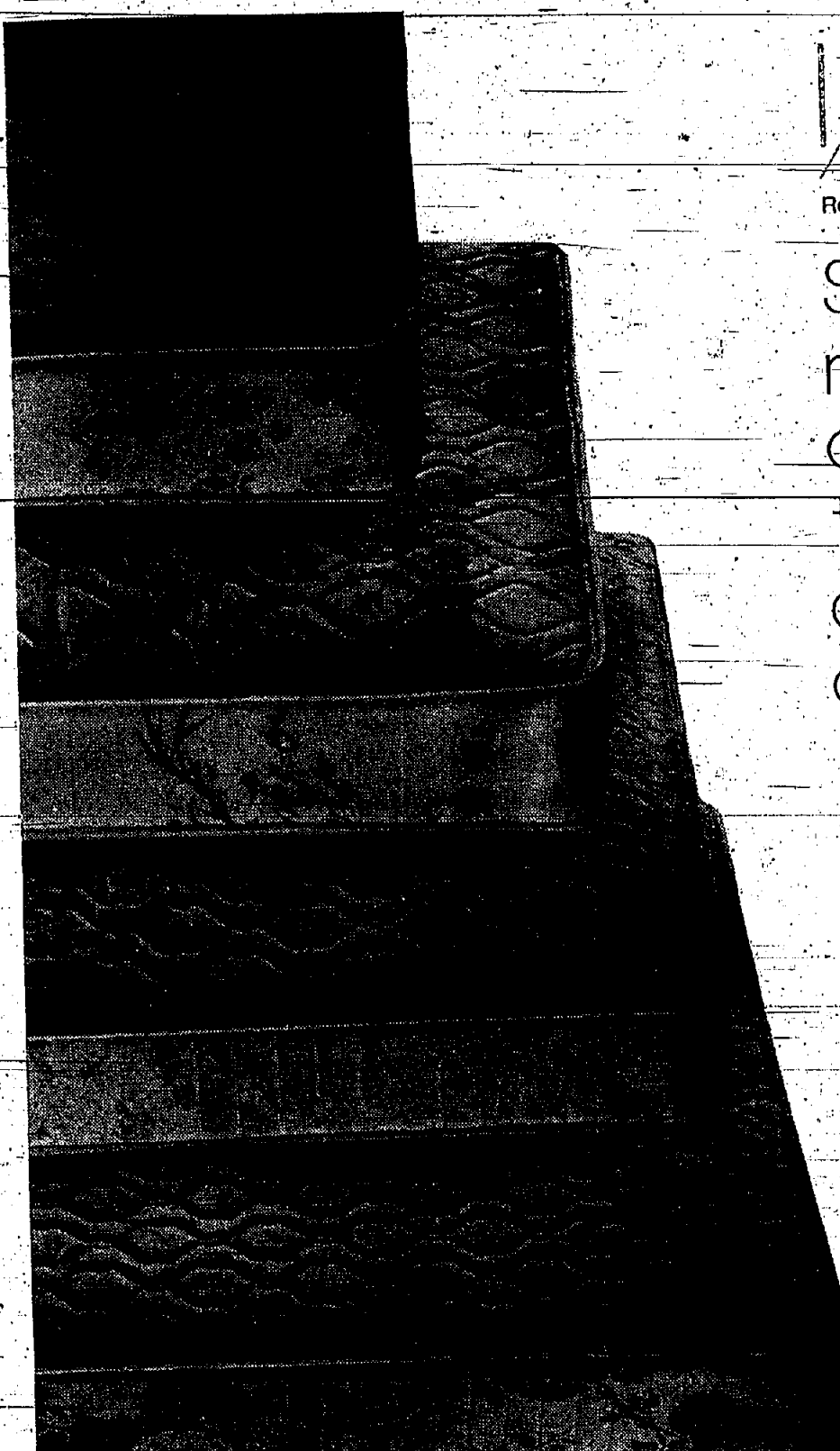

## Contract to be for 3 years

Final draft awaited before ratification

Negotiating teams for teachers and the school board last week reached tentative agreement on a three-year faculty contract in the Springfield School District.

The tentative agreement came at the first joint session with Julius Malkin of Hickenack, Hefflinger, appointed by the state Public Employment Relations Commission (PERC) after negotiations had reached an impasse.

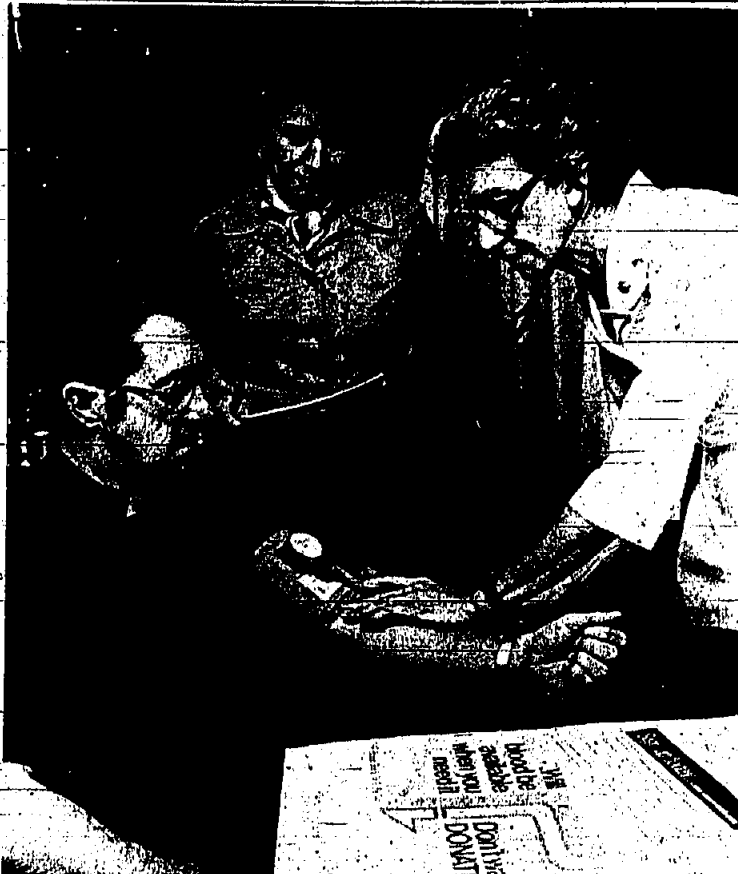
The two negotiating teams—Blanche Treloar, Annette LaCoppa and John Lacy for the teachers; Charles Cohn, Laura Rosenbaum and Gloria Starr from the school board—refused to disclose details of the proposed contract before formal presentations to their colleagues in the teachers' organization and on the board. Reportedly, the insurance package had been the last area of dispute.

The negotiators said a final draft of the proposed contract must be written before presentations at separate ratification meetings of the teachers and the board.

"We should have these final details wrapped up in the very near future, hopefully, within the next couple of weeks," said Lacy, a teacher at Gaudinier School.

Board member Starr said the tentative agreement would extend through the 1979-80 school year.

Teachers have been working under carryover provisions of an expired contract since school started in September.

## Firefighters register 100 township homes in detector program

About 100 homes were registered during the first two weeks of the Springfield Fire Department's reminder program on smoke detectors. "People have been telephone-ing or coming in at the rate of about 80 per week," said Fireman Donald Stewart. "The response has been very good, and the people have had a lot of nice things to say," according to Fireman William Graa. "But we still have a long way to go. There are about 6,500 homes in Springfield. Our target is to have at least one smoke detector in every home and to have every home registered."

With Stewart and Graa as the spearheads, the fire department "pushes" the free public service of registering each home containing one or more detectors. Then the firemen will telephone each registered home at six-month intervals and remind the family to replace "batteries" if necessary, and to check test buttons and warning lights.

Springfield residents wanting the service may stop by or telephone the headquarters, next to Town Hall. Stewart and Graa urged people to use the non-emergency telephone number, 376-0142. They said a few calls had come on the alarm line.

"Aside from that," said Stewart, "everything has been going very well. It's extra work for the fire department, but the men are more than willing to do it."

Stewart said he and Graa "have had 100 percent cooperation" from everyone in the fire department.

Firemen said they are also offering, on time-available basis, to look over a home and to give advice on the best

## PTA Council issues 10 tips for Halloween

The Springfield PTA Council this week issued 10 suggestions to parents for Halloween safety. The list includes:

- Encourage children not to participate in "trick-or-treat" if a PTA Council spokesman commented: "It's not legitimate mischief for any reason."
- Encourage children to "trick-or-treat" during daylight hours.
- Stress to children that they should stay away from unfamiliar areas and never "trick-or-treat" alone.
- Parents "trick-or-treat" to your own neighborhood.
- Remind children to use the sidewalks and crosswalks.
- Check your child's costume to be sure it will not be a fire or tripping hazard.
- Makeup is preferable to masks, because masks may obscure vision. Encourage older children to accompany and help younger brothers and sisters.
- Keep front porch lights on.
- Exercise special caution on Halloween and observe residential speed zones if you drive.

## Town expands lunch program to first graders

The Springfield School District will expand its lunch program, starting next Monday, to serve pupils in the first through fifth grades.

District dietitian Agnes Kim said the first menu for Thelma Sandmeyer, James Caldwell and Edward Walton schools will include orange juice, a berry sandwich with shredded lettuce, a Halloween cupcake and milk for each child who buys a lunch. Other menus for the week appear on page 3 of today's Leader. The dietitian said peanut butter and jelly sandwiches also will be available daily for children who do not want the standard menu. Kim predicted that about 450 youngsters will take advantage of the "cold lunch" program.

The district traditionally has offered a school lunch program only for pupils at Florence Gaudinier, the sixth-through-eighth-grade school. Children in the lower grades have brought their own lunches or have gone home to eat. But the state has ordered New Jersey school districts to provide lunch programs for all full-time pupils no later than the 1977-78 school year.

Dr. Fred Baruchin, the school district superintendent, said a full-scale hot lunch program will be available at Sandmeyer, Caldwell and Walton early in 1978. The cold-lunch program at the three schools is a temporary measure, Baruchin said, until the Gaudinier school has been expanded and renovated. Lunches will be trucked from Gaudinier to the other three schools, which have no kitchens.

The Springfield Board of Education has been less than enthusiastic about expanding the lunch program. Board members, predicting the program will take funds needed for educational services, have said the younger children should stay within walking distance of home and do not need hot lunches at school.

"But I don't believe in denying the law," Baruchin declared, when he announced lunch program plans last August.

## Congregation Israel new building started

Construction has begun on the new Synagogue Center and Religious School of Congregation Israel of Springfield, the oldest orthodox Jewish congregation in the metropolitan New Jersey area.

David L. Warner, president of the congregation, and Jack H. Siffelman, chairman of the building committee, said occupancy is targeted for the Passover holidays which start on April 22, 1978.

The building is being erected by Ben Assis Architects and is located on the corner of Mountain Avenue and Shunpike road at a cost exceeding \$600,000 for construction and furnishings.

During construction the congregation's services, including daily morning and evening minyan, religious school, Shabbat functions and youth activities are being conducted in a temporary synagogue at 42 Shunpike road. The temporary facility was acquired, according to Warner and Siffelman, because of its proximity to the permanent site. They said the congregation's program had previously been housed in temporary quarters on the construction site, and many of the congregation's members have purchased homes in this walking distance of the location.

The new synagogue will contain a permanent sanctuary seating 320

## Silver PBA life-cards go to two businessmen

Two Springfield businessmen, Patrick J. Imbraccio and William Perrelli, Monday night received silver life-card awards, highest honor given to members by the New Jersey Police Benevolent Association (PBA).

The award presentations highlighted a dinner meeting of the Springfield PBA at the Chandler, Millburn.

"A local PBA can award no more than one person per year to receive this high honor," explained a Springfield PBA member. "Since our dinner is a biennial event, we get to award two at once."

Imbraccio, 65, is the youngest of three brothers who have operated the Colonial Motor Court in Springfield for 27 years. His brothers, Dominick and Nando, were earlier recipients of the award.

## Town is named in shooting suit

Relatives of Warren Brisson, a 19-year-old black man fatally shot by Union police officers, have filed a civil complaint asking U.S. District Court Judge William Conroy to award them \$1 million in damages. The Township of Springfield is named as one of the defendants in the case.

The suit claims police conspired to violate federal, civil rights law and constitutional rights of Brisson's relatives "because they are black."

Union policemen Stephen Connolly and Robert Burrell said they shot Brisson after Brisson followed, shot and wounded Connolly. Brisson was killed in his car at the shooting scene in Union. But Union police said they initially, though mistakenly, believed that Brisson had an accomplice who escaped on foot. They called for help from nearby police departments in an area-wide search for the supposed second man.

The lawsuit was filed Oct. 19 against Union policemen Connolly, Burrell and David Stewart, as well as "unknown agents" if police departments in Irvington, Maplewood, Millburn, Springfield and Hillside, Union and the other five towns are cited as defendants employing the police departments.

Hubert Johnson, partner in an East Orange law firm and a former deputy state attorney general, filed the suit on behalf of Brisson's mother, two brothers and the wife and three children of one of the brothers. The plaintiffs all reside in a Union home searched by Union police after the shooting.

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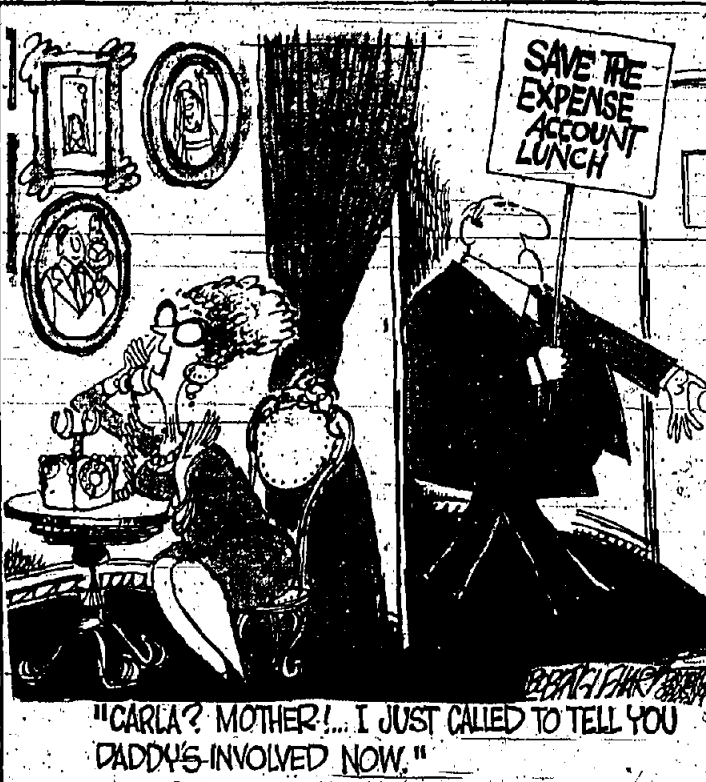

### The State We're In

The New Jersey Department of Transportation is about to do something concrete to hasten the downward spiral of the quality of a lot of lives in Bergen County. The concrete will be applied to widen Route 9-W for a distance of 1.8 miles in Englewood Cliffs and Tenafly at a cost of at least \$1 million. Plans by local officials and experts on open space have "fallen" to deter the highwaymen. Bids on the job are due to be received Nov. 3. What we've got in Bergen County has happened elsewhere. It's a case of big government and big business gangling up on the hapless public and shuffling off serious consideration of alternative plans to this impetuous collection. The Bergen situation is all the more galling because the alleged need for the highway widening is due mainly to the traffic generated by a mere handful of corporate headquarters offices. This shows the hidden cost of attracting such glamorous installations to a community. Because of the few destinations of the rush-hour traffic which is supposed to make the 9-W widening necessary, it seems self-evident that a system of van or bus transit up and down the highway would be the best solution. The whole thing demonstrates how traditional "widening" thinking by highway bureaus causes often unnecessary economic and social losses to a lot of people, while benefiting a few. The few include highway construction people and those with a chance for a quick profit through land deals either directly or indirectly tied with such a project.

### IN CONGRESS

### Harrison Williams

In Washington, there is a group known as the National Transportation Policy Study Commission, which is taking a critical look at the way we move people and products across the country. Created by Federal law, the commission has been charged with preparing a report outlining the nation's transportation needs between now and the year 200. This report will eventually serve as the basis for legislative action by Congress and administrative action by the President. As a member of the 19-person commission, I have been thinking of ways to dramatize New Jersey's transit needs to this impetuous collection. Transportation experts, without a doubt, New Jersey is one of the nation's leading transportation hubs, so it stands in reason that our state is an ideal place to see how national policies affect the average citizen of transportation services. At my urging, the commission will travel to Camden and Jersey City on Nov. 15 and 16 to do a "hand look" at transportation problems in our state. Through excursions by rail, highway and helicopter and by listening to local and state transit officials and concerned citizens groups, I think the commission will be able to gain a real feel for what our state—and our nation—need in the transportation field. Among the many issues we will be considering during these two days of hearings are: Improved commuter service through Camden and Atlantic counties to Atlantic City, perhaps by light rail service from Bayonne to Jersey City. These are by no means the only topics for consideration. But by discussing these issues and others, I think the commission will have a much better idea of what it will take in future years to build a modern and efficient transportation system for New Jersey.

N.J. Taxpayers Association. NEW JERSEY RANKS SECOND IN PER-CAPITA PERSONAL INCOME. New Jersey's per-capita personal income rank rose to second among the 50 states in calendar 1976, according to a report recently released by the U. S. Department of Commerce. Ranked first for the fourth consecutive year was Alaska, which is in a class by itself because of its unusually high cost of living. The annual revision of rankings shows New Jersey tied in 1974 and fourth in 1975. The 1976 ranking was the highest New Jersey has ever reached in per-capita personal income although for at least 30 years Connecticut and Illinois took the top 10. This state's rank occurred despite high unemployment during the year. Following New Jersey in per-capita rank are Connecticut and Illinois, which slipped from second and third in 1975.

A series of CLEP (College Level Examination Program) orientation programs will be conducted by Union College this fall to increase public awareness of the opportunities that exist to earn college credits by examination. The first of five CLEP orientation programs to be conducted through Union College's Elizabeth Urban Educational Center, Bayway and Broad street, at 7:30 p.m. Adults who believe they have acquired the equivalent of a college-level course through independent study or work experiences may attend the orientation to learn how they can translate that knowledge into college credits that may be applied toward a degree. Billy Snapp, former professor of English at Springfield College and Joaquin Garcia, director of Union College's CLEP—General Education Development and CLEP Test Center, will conduct the orientation. Most colleges will accept CLEP credits toward the requirements for an undergraduate degree. Union College will accept up to 32 CLEP credits toward an associate degree. A fifth program to be conducted in Spanish is yet to be scheduled. All are at 7:30 p.m. and are free.

In a joint press release, the Democratic freeholder candidates—incumbent Walter Boright of Scotch Plains, Springfield Mayor Joanne Rajopp and Thomas Dillon of Elizabeth—claimed the Republicans are "continuing to conceal from the public a proposed location for the prison facility. Boright stated: 'The Republicans came up with a lunatic plan to release from the Union County jail murderers, rapists, armed robbers, child molesters and other long-term prisoners and to put them on a minimum-security prison farm that would have to be located somewhere in Union County.' Rajopp said: 'We have repeatedly asked the Republican freeholder candidates if any combination of open lands or portions of open lands in this area of Union County will be used for the county prison farm. The Republican freeholder candidates have vigorously related giving us a yes or no answer.' Dillon claimed that the Republican freeholder candidates have "have also proposed using the farm for rapists, burglars, and child molesters to work in chain gang style on the county roads doing the tasks normally performed by the county public works department. Such a plan, if implemented, would expose every community to unprecedented dangers." In their joint statement, Boright, Rajopp and Dillon said: "The 'Republican county prison farm' proposal would require the use of open tracts of land, parks, undeveloped industrial and residential zones, golf courses, and other open spaces not readily available lands that could be condemned to make way for the Republican prison facility.

## Cancer risk seen high near petro industry

People who live in areas where petroleum industries are heavily concentrated may be at a significantly higher risk of death from cancer of the lung, nasal cavity and sinuses and the skin, say four researchers at the government's National Cancer Institute (NCI).

The four, William J. Blot, Louis A. Briston, Joseph F. Fraumeni Jr. and B.J. Stone, have published the results of a survey on cancer mortality in a recent issue of Science, the weekly journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS).

The investigators compared statistics on death from types of cancer in 39 American counties where petroleum refining takes place, with similar statistics from 117 counties that have no petroleum industry. They found that "mortality in the (petroleum-industry counties) was significantly high for cancers combined. The largest ratios were for cancer of the nasal cavity and sinuses and for lung cancer. In addition, mortality was significantly high for cancers of the skin, testis, stomach and rectum."

Suspect in the case are chemical carcinogens, such as substances known as polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), which are found in crude petroleum, in certain residues of the oil refining process, in soot and in the air surrounding refining operations. Although exposure to PAHs has been linked to certain types of cancer in several occupational groups, "there has been no clear indication that petroleum refinery workers are exposed to excess risk," said the authors. "Recent studies, however, provided indirect evidence of a hazard to petroleum workers, prompting the NCI researchers to undertake the survey."

The results of the study must be "interpreted cautiously," according to the scientists. Certain data, such as occupations of other workers who died of cancer, were not taken into account in the survey. In addition, many of the petroleum-industry counties surveyed housed other chemical industries which have been linked to some cancers. However, the NCI survey results appear to correlate with observations on cancer in related occupational groups. Lung cancer, for example, is found more often than usual in other PAH-exposed workers, including roofers, electric workers and gas-fitter workers.

Survey statistics also showed a high rate of lung cancer among female residents of the petroleum-industry counties, suggesting a possibility that cancer in related occupational groups could be spreading beyond the workplace.

In conclusion, the authors of the Science report call for an industry-wide study "to clarify the risk of cancer among various groups of petroleum workers and to evaluate the possible effects of petrochemical emissions released into neighboring communities."

## Five men enter not-guilty pleas in body-snatch

"Not guilty" pleas were entered last week for five of six Springfield men indicted in the disposal of a dead body snatched May 20 from Hollywood Cemetery in Union.

Arlingwood Friday before Superior Court Judge Chester A. Wedelbuerger were Stuart Anker, 30; Dale Nitolo, 19; Alan J. Tomlin, 38; Robert Rosenkrantz, 21; and Michael V. Lieto, 26, all of Springfield.

A Union County Grand Jury accused Anker and Nitolo of breaking and entering, removing the body from its grave, defacing a memorial to the dead, possessing a burglary tool and unlawfully disposing of a dead body. Also indicted on the unlawful disposal count were Tomlin, Rosenkrantz, Lieto and Keith Brink, 27, also of Springfield. Lieto has not yet been arraigned.

The body, buried 13 years earlier, was discovered floating in a Springfield pond last May 20. Cemetery officials had reported it missing the previous day.

## HOW TO RECOGNIZE

Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, Box 2345, Rockville, Maryland 20852.

"Alcoholism" is marked by dependence on alcohol and loss of control over one's drinking. This loss of control may develop almost imperceptibly over a long period, or it may manifest itself almost from the start of a person's drinking.

When a person continues to drink despite the fact that it causes serious psychological, physical, or social problems, alcoholism is developing or is already present.

We tend to think of "typical" alcoholic people as skid row inhabitants, but only about three to five percent of alcoholics are in that category. Actually, alcoholic people represent a cross section of the nation, embracing rich and poor, young and old, white-collar workers and blue-collar workers. In fact, every level of society. Most alcoholics are employed and most have families — much like their neighbors and fellow citizens.

Seldom can you spot alcoholic people by their appearance. However, for those close to a person who seems to be more and more dependent on alcohol in order to function, there are indicators that his or her drinking may be reaching the danger point.

For example:

- Is there the immediate reaction to pour a drink when faced with any problem?
- Has getting drunk become a regular occurrence?
- Is there a record of missing work because of drinking or regular attendance at work with an ill-disguised odor of liquor on the breath?
- Has the person's driving license been suspended "for driving while drunk"?
- Has the person had trouble with authorities for "irrational" reasons?
- Has the person been involved in unusual, unexplainable accidents without evidence of physical impairment?
- Has his or her home life become intolerable because of excessive drinking or arguments resulting from drinking?
- When such signs are present, it means that a person's drinking pattern, if not already out of control, is heading that way.
