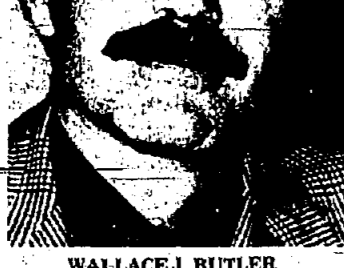

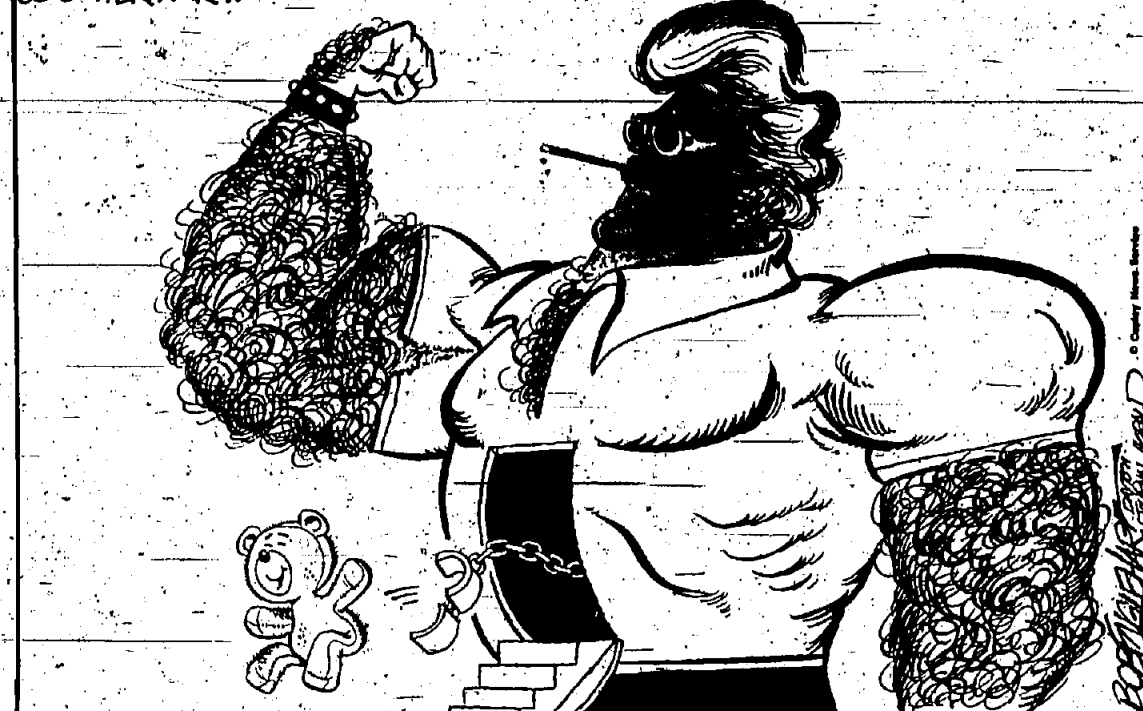

But the big action, in terms of scope and speed, should come from Washington.

New Jersey's Senators Clifford P. Case and Harrison A. Williams Jr. have co-sponsored a bill to establish a National Reserve System, which would begin with the Pine Barrens. It would have federal, state and local levels of government, plus the private sector, cooperate in protecting outstanding natural areas. Outright acquisition would be kept to a minimum and existing agricultural pursuits like blueberry and cranberry growing would be maintained.

Money would be provided to compensate landowners for relinquishing development rights and for the right to

have long harbored an inordinate fondness for one of the most despised characters in literature, perverser as I am; namely, a grocer named Scrooge.

THE STATE WE'RE IN

Action in both houses of Congress to protect the Pine Barrens of New Jersey is gaining momentum.

A bill by Representative James Florio and another co-sponsored by Representative Edwin Forsythe and William Miller would also utilize all levels of government to achieve the same ends.

Florio's bill would provide \$50-million for acquisition of 50,000 acres for a Pine Barrens National Ecological Reserve, plus management costs and tax compensation.

The Forsythe-Miller bill would provide nearly direct federal control over planning and management at the expense of regional or state agencies, and would have the federal government buy up 50,000 acres for a Pinelands National Wildlife Refuge.

All three bills have good points. I hope the best ones are retained in whatever legislation emerges from a joint House and Senate committee. But first, I hope they pass in both houses.

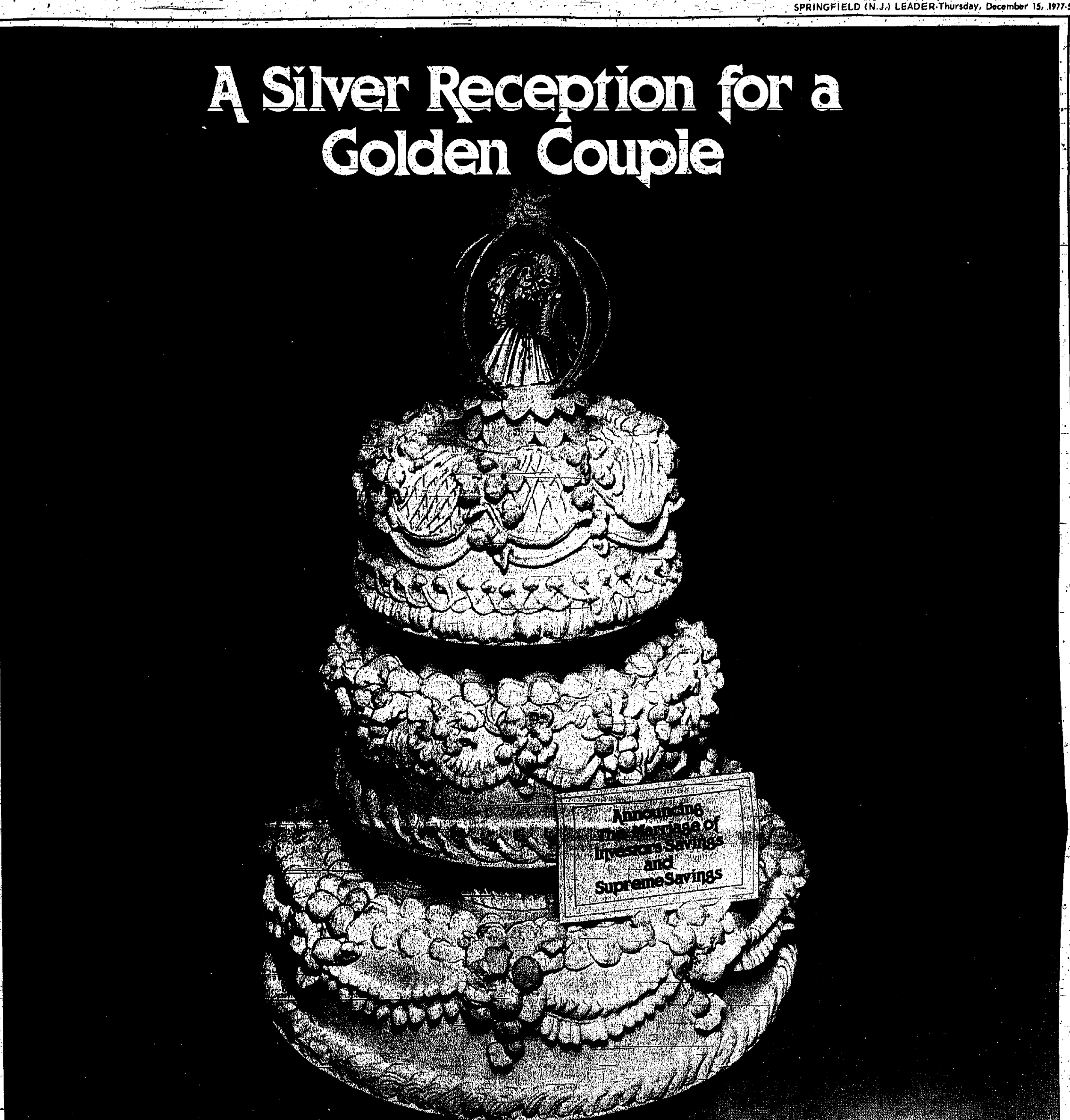

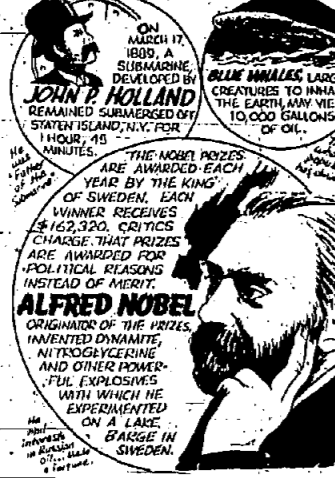

Woman electrician A first for UCVC course

Putting your finger in an electrical outlet isn't recommended as a vocational aptitude test for electricians, but that first shock as a young child "sparked" an interest in electricity that led to Patricia Debus' enrollment in the electrical program at Union County Vocational Center, Scotch Plains, where she is the first and only woman in the program.

Patricia admits that her interest in electricity also stems from the fact that her father is an electrician and that she comes from a long line of electricians.

Patricia's subject matter "isn't the same," she said. "The subject matters that women should not be stereotyped and that they should be able to go into any trade that is open to men. That view is shared by her family, her boyfriend and Leslie N. Kiray, directors of the Vocational Center.

"Her first day in class was difficult. The only girl in a class of 45, "it was scary," she recalls, "because I didn't know how they would treat me. But they've been great."

Patricia likes to study, even to write reports, and gets As and Bs in her academic courses. She does equally well in her electrical studies, noting that it is easier for her to use her hands. She is even able to bend the electrical mechanical tubing used by electricians, a real test of strength.

Patricia is thinking about college but worrying about the cost. She is also considering joining the Air Force and has already spoken to recruiters about opportunities in electronics and aviation electricity.

Union College gives extra aid to student vets

Leukemia unit donations grow

The 1977 Leukemia Society of America residential fund-raising drive of the Central New Jersey Chapter has raised \$127,000 so far, it was announced by Harvey H. Richter, president.

Leukemia, a disease of the blood-forming organs, takes the lives of more children than any other, kills more adults than children and will go on taking lives until research finds a cure. Today, the effectiveness of treatment, length of survival and future outlook are far more encouraging than even a year ago.

"Contributions to the Leukemia Society of America," Richter said, "were up 10 percent over last year. We wish to thank the many people whose donations of funds and time made this possible."

The Society asks volunteers who still have their marcher kits at home to help by sending the contributions in as soon as possible. During the past decade, leukemia research has provided drugs to prolong life. Some patients are surviving for five or more years. Our continued support eventually will provide answers to survival questions.

November rain neared record

A near-record rainfall and the season's first snowfall marked November's weather, according to Raymond J. Daly, director of Union College's U.S. Cooperative Weather Station.

A total of 4.5 inches of rainfall for the month and 2.5 inches of snow on Nov. 29 were reported by Daly in his monthly meteorological summary to the National Weather Service.

The month's 8.95 inches of rain is the second highest rainfall for November in the records of the college weather station, topped only by the 11.21 inches of rain in November 1972, the weather director noted.

Temperatures for the month were close to average, with a mean temperature of 46.23 degrees, 0.95 degrees above average. The warmest day of the month was Nov. 4 with an average temperature of 65 degrees and a high of 71 degrees. The coldest was Nov. 29 when the average daily temperature was 21.5 degrees.

The lowest temperature of the month was 25 degrees, registered Nov. 12 and 14.

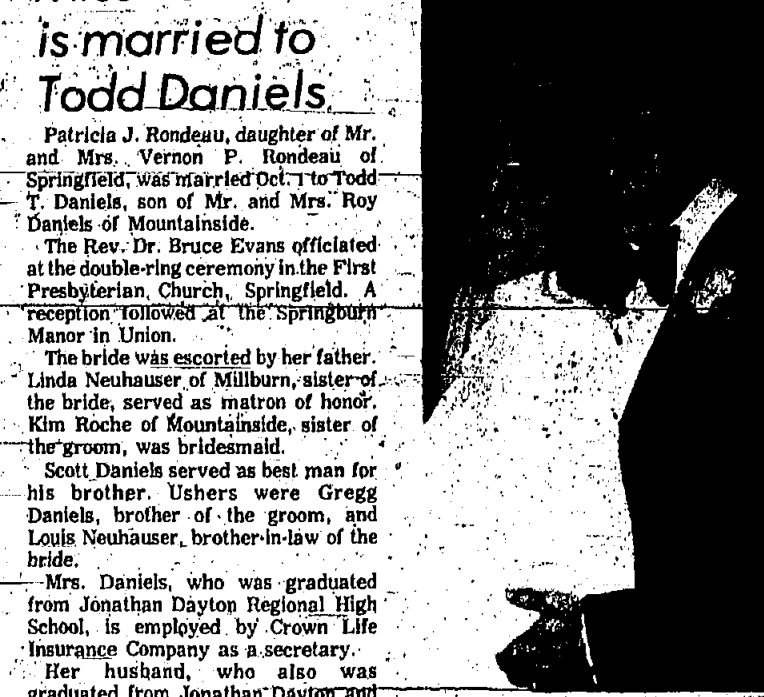
