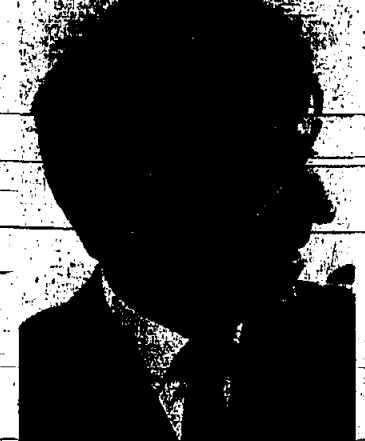


Kean students learn ad skills the agency way

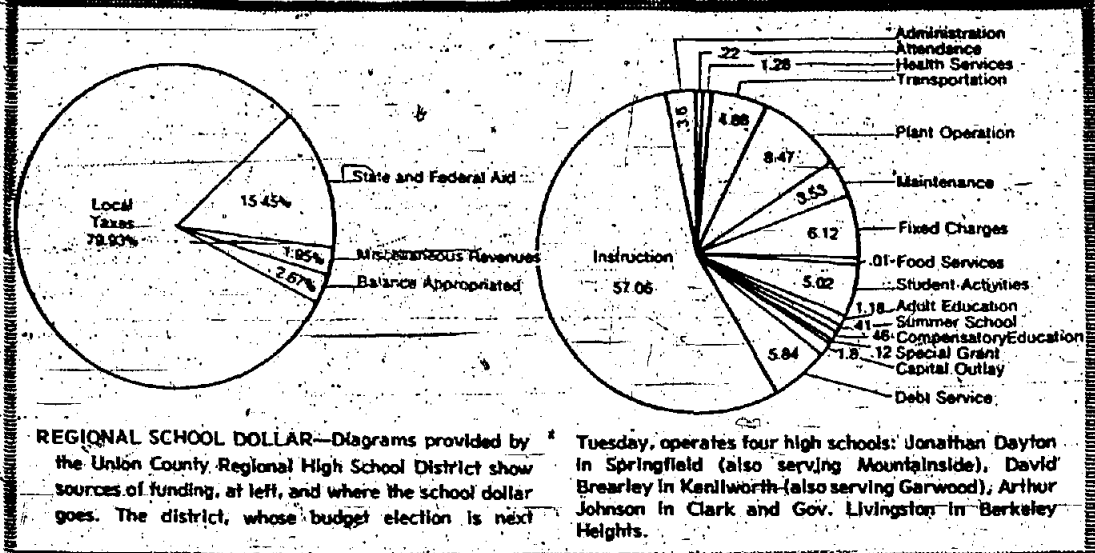

Rinaldo to press for correction of Medicaid eligibility inequities

A plea to press for legislation to correct the inequities which exist in Medicaid income eligibility limits at \$150 a month for nursing home care but only \$200 for home health care was made by Rep. Matthew Rinaldo R-N.J. Monday at a public hearing of the House Select Committee on Aging.

Rinaldo said the present \$150-a-month limit is "unfair and inequitable" and that the only other committee member at the hearing was Rep. James Cooper R-N.J., the only other committee member at the hearing. He predicted that they would be supported by the remainder of the committee as well.

Earlier in the day Rep. Mario Biaggi D-N.Y. and Rep. William Roth R-Del. also had been heard for the first Congressional hearing to be held in Union. Similar hearings dealing with nursing care and income eligibility of the elderly had been held Friday in Atlantic City and Saturday in Hackettstown. Speakers included more than 100 doctors, nurses and social workers. Testimony to the need for more long-term nursing care beds and alternative services for the elderly such as day care, respite and home health care. Meeting in Union as a result of arrangements made by Rinaldo, township resident, the committee was welcomed by Mayor James Cooper, who said the community has a "special concern" for the elderly.

Biaggi, who presided at the morning session, called the hearing the "No. 1 problem" of the old. Other committee members expressed similar views.

Another witness, Thomas Russo, acting director of Medicaid for the state, said income inequities have been tightened away from the nursing home industry by fraud and abuse. Describing nursing homes as a profit-making industry, he noted a shortage of

In his opening statement, Rinaldo cited estimates of a shortage of at least 1,500 nursing home beds for Medicaid patients in New Jersey. This does not include thousands of others who do not qualify for Medicaid, he added.

"It seems to me that the real needs in nursing and home care are the elderly who are largely invisible," he said. "This committee wants to find out about those who are not counted in the official statistics."

The "dimension of the fiscal picture under Medicare and Medicaid" in New Jersey was described by William Tobey, regional administrator for Health Care Financing Administration, Region II, U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

In 1976, he said, federal Medicare payments for nursing home care in New Jersey totaled \$1.3 billion. Medicaid payments came to \$28 million.

HEW has given "tremendous attention" in recent years to finding alternatives to long-term institutions, he said, adding that many people in homes should not be there.

A NEED for "more than one type of long-term health care" also was emphasized by Rosemary Cucero, executive director of Visiting Nurse and Health Services, who suggested home health care, including prevention, nursing, homemaker health aides, chore services, multiple and transportation, day care and group homes.

School make-up days scheduled for June

Students in the Union County Regional High School District will get to class two or three days longer next June because of the blizzards of 1977, unless the governor and legislature change the rules.

The Regional Board of Education decided last week to make up for blizzard closings in June, unless state officials act to amend the legal requirement for public schools to be open at least 180 days, not counting summer school.

Cops grinned and bared snow calls

Township Clerk Art Buehrer, part of a blizzard crew handling office work during the Feb. 6 blizzard, looked out a window at the Municipal Building when he heard a grinding car engine.

A lone car was slipping and sliding its way along N. Third Street through the wind-driven snow that had covered the pavement again immediately after the road department had cleared it early Feb. 7.

"Must be a major emergency," Buehrer mused aloud as the car lurched to a halt in a waist-high snowdrift. A man jumped out with two books under his arm. On foot, the man fought his way to the Public Library's bookdrop on Hanson Street, where he deposited them. Buehrer watched in amazement. The library was closed during the blizzard.

"I'd bet the guy has never returned a book in his life," Buehrer said. "And blizzard or no blizzard, he wasn't about to be late this time."

The incident was just one of many that kept policemen and Buehrer grinning when they weren't groaning about human nature when Mother Nature was doing her worst.

Police and Buehrer said these telephone conversations were among those that took place "Moody and Tuesday, Feb. 6."

Caller to police department: "Why are the (expensive deleted) snowplows running all night? It's keeping me awake. I have to get up at 5 a.m. tomorrow to dig out my car. Snow or no snow, I have to get to work." (Policeman's reply: "If they don't plow tonight, where will you drive your car after you dig it out tomorrow?")

Caller to Buehrer: "I want to send the town a bill. Your snowplow ran over my garage—can you—I need proof to collect? The evidence is buried somewhere in a snowdrift."

Caller to Buehrer: "My front and back doors are blocked with snow. The litter box is full. How can I let my cat out?" Buehrer's reply: "Open a window."

Caller to police: "If I leave my car on the street tonight will I get a ticket?"

Caller to Buehrer: "Could you mail me a dog license and send me a bill? I can't get through the snow, and I don't want to be late." (Buehrer's reply: "The license deadline was a week ago.")

Caller to Buehrer: "Eighteen hours is too long to wait for a person to clear the snow from the sidewalk. How do we change the law?"

Caller to Buehrer: "When will membership applications be ready for the town swimming pool this year?"

Caller to Buehrer: "Who do you have to know to get your street plowed first?" (Buehrer and police noted that Mayor William Curt was in Town Hall at the time—waiting his turn, like everybody else, for snowplows to reach his street.)

Caller to Buehrer: "I was supposed to pick up my marriage license today, but I'm snowed in. The wedding is Friday."

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DiFrancesco backs proposal to limit energy

Assemblyman Donald T. DiFrancesco (R-22) has introduced legislation that he says will encourage energy conservation in the state of New Jersey, and promote consideration of solar energy as a power source.

DiFrancesco's legislative package, which includes two Assembly bills and a joint resolution, will require government agencies considering any construction or renovation of a major facility to include in the design phase a "life-cycle cost analysis" to determine the cost of energy consumed over the facility's economic life.

Passage of this "Life-Cycle Cost Analysis Act" would insure that total energy consumption costs be considered early in the design phase of publicly-owned buildings, so that only the most efficient energy systems will be used.

"We have long required state agencies to present construction cost estimates before beginning work on projects paid for by the taxpayers," said DiFrancesco. "Now, because of costly fuel and dwindling energy supplies, it is only proper that we require a serious examination of potential energy problems before a project is begun."

DiFrancesco's construction legislation, "the construction or renovation of any publicly-owned or leased building having more than 25,000 feet of usable floor space would be preceded by an analysis of its initial cost, the cost of the energy consumed over its economic life and the energy-related cost of its operation and maintenance."

A companion resolution introduced by DiFrancesco directs the state treasurer to consider the installation of solar energy heating and cooling systems in all new state-owned construction projects.

"While solar energy is not a complete answer to our energy-consumption problems, its use in public buildings would help reduce the demand on other valuable energy sources," he said. "We must encourage the exploration of alternative power supplies."

DiFrancesco is a member of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee of the General Assembly.

The proportion of adult Americans who smoke cigarettes has declined since 1970. At the same time, the support for stronger action against smoking has increased.

Highlights of the survey are: The proportion of male smokers 21 and over dropped from 53 percent in 1964 to 42 percent in 1970 to 38 percent in 1975.

CBers to the rescue Aid to Overlook lauded

Citizens Band Radio in Overlook Hospital is a new answer to storm emergencies. When staffing for patients can be critical. A group called the 'CBside-winders' appeared on the scene before noon, asking for the highest point in the hospital from which to broadcast the alarm. Township plows kept clean-up costs down

The 33 inches of snow in the January and February blizzards cost Springfield taxpayers about \$300,000 more than overtime pay, extra fuel and equipment repairs for the snowplows, according to Township Engineer Walter Moschella.

The estimated cleanup costs for the two year blizzards at \$10,000 more than budgeted for snow removal all winter long. He said Springfield saved \$200,000 more than budgeted because it has its own snowplows and was not forced to rent extra ones at a time when competition for them was high. Neighboring towns have estimated their blizzard costs up to \$1,000,000 more than had been budgeted for snow removal.

"We did very well, although there may be some additional costs for equipment repair not included in that estimate," Moschella said. "All of the equipment was under heavy stress, and there could be some breakdowns in the next few weeks as a result."

Koub estimated the Jan. 19-20 extra costs at \$6,500 and the Feb. 6-7 at \$3,500. Because most of the February blizzard came on normal workdays, Monday and Tuesday, overtime costs were not as high as they had been for the weekend storm in January, he noted.

expected to drop to \$54,232 by June 30, 1979, unless the reorganized board finds ways to cut budgeted spending.

The approved levy of \$2.5 million will provide most of the financing in a \$3,345,631 budget for current expenses of the schools during the 1978-79 fiscal year which starts next July 1. The local levy will actually total \$2,945,688 and the budget, \$3,891,268, with bond-debt payments included. But the \$245,579 for debt service was approved when voters passed the bond issues in past years, so this amount was not on the ballot Tuesday.

The new board members will be taking office with the largest single budget item, teacher salaries, already negotiated until July 1-1980. Teachers agreed on a three-year contract late in 1977, including raises of about 6 1/2 percent annually.

Questioned about school finances during the campaign, the three winners said they would favor a line-item approach to any cutting. All said they would be reluctant to close a school, but made no promises. A school closing has been the most controversial subject in cutting proposals studied by the board in recent years. Edward Walton School has been frequently mentioned as a likely target of closing.

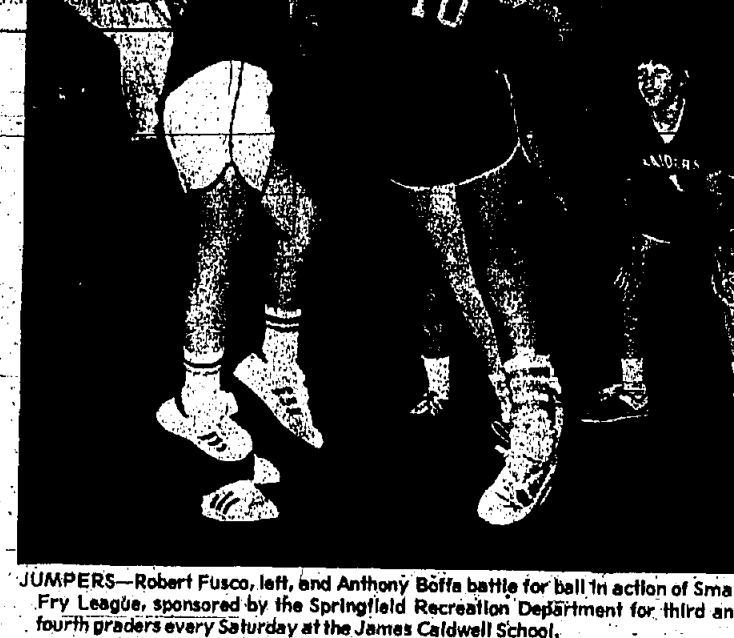
Senior Kevin Doty last week reached the 1,000 point peak of his varsity career, the second player to reach the mark in Dayton varsity basketball history.

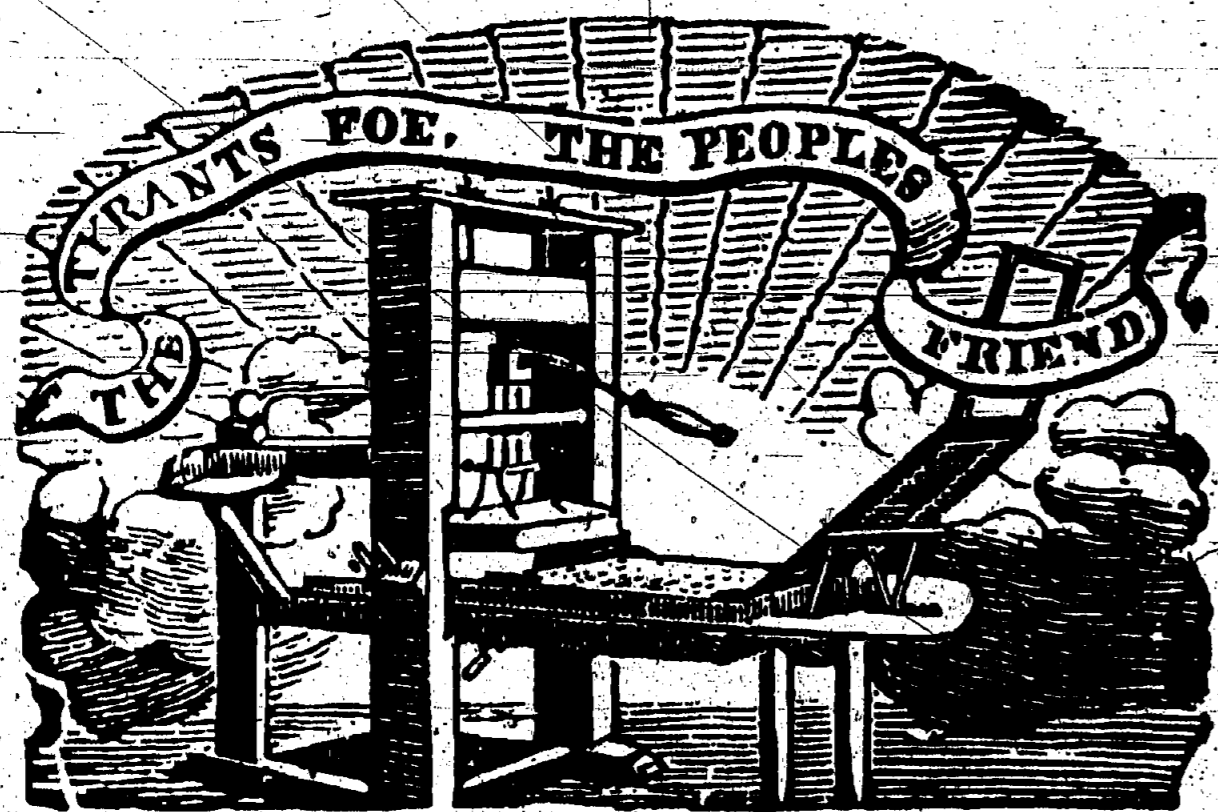

Grocery prices show increase by 0.2 percent

Retail grocery prices in the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area edged down 0.2 percent between November and December. It was reported today by Herbert Bienstock, Regional Commissioner of the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The December change primarily reflected declines for coffee and eggs, as well as lower prices for a number of pork and poultry items. Over the year ending December 1977, area grocery prices rose 6.5 percent.

Seasonally adjusted, the food at home index was down 0.8 percent between November and December. Bienstock noted that the December decline compared favorably with a 1.3 percent rise for the prior month.

Over the last half of 1977, Bienstock said relative stability in food prices contrasted with increases averaging one percent a month during the first half of the year.

The December 1976 and December 1977 increase of 6.6 percent followed a dip of 0.2 percent in the preceding year, according to Bienstock. Coffee prices, up 81 percent over the year ending December 1977, accounted for over half the food at home index rise.

The food at home index was 198.0 (1967 equals 100) in December. Expressed in terms of purchasing power, the New York-Northeastern New Jersey area consumer had to spend \$198.00 to purchase the same grocery basket of nearly 90 items which cost \$100 in the 1967 base period. Bienstock noted that, between November and December the price of 49 items went up, 33 declined and six remained unchanged.
