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## Rosenbaum elected board president

Laura Rosenbaum, the former vice president, Monday was elected president of the Board of Education which governs Springfield public schools from kindergarten through eighth grade.

It apparently will be up to board member Charles Clark to decide on the new vice-president. She was absent from the annual organizational meeting in the Raymond Chisholm School.

When the other eight members dedicated twice, trying to decide between Gregory Clark and Philip Felino. The three newly elected board members—Ellen Dahmen, Nancy Heller and Joe Simpson—and Paul Follis voted for Clark. Clark himself voted for Felino. He did Rosenbaum, John Westerfield and Felino.

After the second dedication, Westerfield asked whether Clark really wanted the office, since he has been voting against himself. Clark replied that he was not voting against himself, but for someone else.

The new board president voted an audience suggestion for a private conference as a prelude to a third ballot. Rosenbaum tabled the matter until Starr returns to town for the next regular board meeting, March 20.

Rosenbaum said she believes "both in the letter and the spirit" of the state Sunshine Law, calling for board members to make decisions in public. Earlier, Clark had prevented a potential deadlock between himself and Rosenbaum for the presidency. Dahmen, Heller and Follis had backed Clark for the presidency, but Clark had voted with the other four members for Rosenbaum.

The hour-long organizational meeting including ceremonies honoring retiring board members Charles Clark, who served three years and was president in 1977, and August Caprio, who served six years and forgot how often he had held the board presidency "about six or seven times," he said.

Caprio, who served on the board longer than anyone else in school district history, grinned at himself when, out of habit, he declared "aye" from the audience on a routine board motion to approve the minutes of the previous meeting.

## Regional budget is approved

### 3 board members named to new terms

A \$15 million budget was approved Tuesday in an off-date election that brought out only 751 of the 46,142 registered voters in the Union County Regional High School District. The winning margin was 444 to 206.

Three incumbents were also reelected to the Regional Board of Education. "We're pleased that voters passed the budget in every one of the six communities," said Charles E. Vitale, chairman of the board.

The turnout was 61 in Berkeley Heights, 1.2 percent of those registered; 132 in Springfield, 1.4 percent; 71 in Kenilworth, 1.5 percent; 50 in Garwood, 1.6 percent; 111 in Mountainside, 2.2 percent; and 206 in Clarksville, 2.2 percent. Registered voters 1.07 percent, believed to be the lowest in the school district's 41-year history.

"I'd have to check the records to be certain, but it's probably the lowest ever," said John O'Hara, school board secretary and chief election official, when he computed the percentage. Some voters ignored one or both of the property-tax requests on the ballot. The tally was 44 "yes" to 226 "no" on \$10,800,000 toward current expenses. It was 423 to 206 for capital projects of \$28,406. The result will be regionwide property taxes of \$12,025,421 for the 1978 fiscal year starting next July 1. This includes \$75,633 for payments on bond debts approved in past elections.

The levy on property will raise about 80 percent of the 1978-79 budget of \$15,033,587 for the regional high schools: Jonathan Dayton in Springfield, David Brearley in Kenilworth, and Kenilworth in Kenilworth.

years after he supposedly retired from education. His salaried career had been climaxed by almost three decades in the Union County Regional High School District, where he started as a foreign-language teacher on the Jonathan Dayton campus in Springfield in 1947.

Caprio would like to abolish one of the elementary system's four principal-ships-and-sends "the principal with the least seniority" back to the classroom as a teacher.  
"And while I'm getting into trouble," he said, "I might as well vented everybody here I feel about teachers. We don't need all the teachers' sides. We could save \$60,000 or so going there."

CAPRIO is especially vocal in his opposition to summer school programs such as Lemay.  
"I'm a prime believer in summer school for remedial work," he said, "but not for fun and games." He thinks it's "pampering kids" when a school district finances a recreation program that is a "politically knowledgeable" Township Committee has not implemented.

He directed his summer school criticism at area high schools, as well as the local elementary schools. In Caprio's opinion, township governments, not school governments, should control recreation funds.

"Township committees hear a broader cross-section of public opinion," he said, "and they're the logical ones to make recreation decisions based on town-wide desires... The only people who show up at school board meetings are those with vested interests, such as their own salaries, or parents with kids in school."

Caprio has always been outspoken about his opinions—frequently being the lone dissenter in a school board vote in recent months. But despite his joking about "getting myself into trouble," he has seldom aroused the personal ire of his philosophical opponents. Nor has he become personal in his own comments.

He believes that Dr. Fred Baruchin, superintendent of kindergarten through eighth-grade schools, has "too much power." But Caprio was the swing vote in 1977 when the school board defeated a motion, 4-3, that would have called for Baruchin to resign.  
"It's seldom a superintendent's fault if he goes too far," according to Caprio. "I believe it is our board members who are afraid to use their own heads... In the

past few years, they've been too eager to follow a leader, whether it's the superintendent or somebody else. They vote the same way and think it's odd if someone takes a different position. Right or wrong, I voted my own mind. I was never afraid of being different."

HOWEVER HE VOTED on the school board, Caprio never had any trouble getting reelected. He outpolled four other candidates to win his sixth three-year term in 1976. He got 1,168 votes, more than anybody else in the school district's history. (This year's top vote-getter collected 806 when snow cut the turnout.)

Caprio didn't endorse anybody as his successor in this year's election, but later admitted that one of his votes went for Lt. Simpson, 21, the youngest board member in history.

"At a candidates' forum, Simpson spoke in favor of Caprio's pet peeve, summer-school programs. He cared less about the difference of opinion than the speaking out."

"She struck me as somebody with a mind of her own, and I like that. Maybe she'll figure out a way to keep funds for the kids—got the township to sponsor it—let the taxpayers vote down a school budget that includes too many extras, as well as to carry over board members that he'll be watching future budgets."

He knows the budget process from three sides of the conference table. When he was a teacher-administrator, he had represented him as the only high school representative on the executive committee of the National Federation of Teachers' Unions in the State of America. He had been waiting for returns to arrive from Berkeley, where the computer printout got stuck in the voting machine.

The board members blamed the record-breaking turnout on state limiting of the rescheduled election. New Jersey Chief Justice Richard Hughes had ordered that the two-week postponement at the request of the state education commissioner and attorney general.

"They should have given us about a month, not just two weeks, to arrange a new election date," said Mrs. Waldt. "And it was ridiculous to schedule a school election during a school recess. Many families are out of town this week, or the mothers are taking day-long trips with the kids."

**Call if you smell gas.**  
If the odor is faint, chances are it is only the pilot light that's out or a burner valve on the range is partially turned on. Check them. Either can be corrected easily and safely.

**Light your oven carefully.**  
To light a match-light oven follow these steps: (1) open the oven door; (2) check to be sure the opening to the lighter tube is clear of burned matches; (3) light the match; (4) turn on the oven burner valve and apply the match to the lighter tube; (5) if the oven does not light, turn off the gas. Wait a few minutes with the oven door open before attempting to relight. Always keep the lighter tube free of matches.

**Good Housekeeping Tips.**  
NEVER store or use combustible materials near any gas appliance.  
NEVER allow trash or other materials to accumulate near any gas appliance.  
ALWAYS use a vacuum in cleaning in the area of gas-fired appliances.

**Other safety tips.**  
Periodically check that the gas pipe and chimney are not blocked. Improper venting can cause the products of combustion to enter the home.

Do not block the air supply to your gas appliances (no identification labels, improper combustion).  
Shut off the gas supply to any appliance before working on it. Do not plug after reconnecting the line.  
When moving gas range or other appliance, be sure to move it far enough to strain the flexible connector and cause it to break or leak.
