Families benefit most from Social Security

Many people may not realize that social security can mean as much to a 6-year-old as it does to a 65-year-old. In fact, more than 5 million of the 34 million people now receiving Social Security benefits are children, most of them under 18, according to Robert G. Wilwerth, district manager for the Social Security Administration.

Payment of benefits to people who have never worked under Social Security recently has drawn attention because of the current financial stresses on the system, due primarily to fluctuations in the economy, according to Wilwerth. But benefits to children and other dependents of the insured worker have been a part of the system since the first benefits were paid in 1940, he said.

It had become clear, he added, that if the new Social Security program was going to fulfill its objective of preventing widespread economic dependency within the society, the focus had to be on the family rather than the individual worker.

Social Security has become the primary means of assuring a continuing income to the family when the worker dies, retires or becomes disabled.

A child's benefit amounts to 75 percent of the basic benefit payable on a deceased worker's record and 38

percent of a disabled or retired worker's benefit subject to a family maximum. The surviving parent of the child who is under 18 or disabled may qualify for a benefit if the child is a dependent and the parent is not working.

Proof of age and relationship to the worker is necessary when applying for benefits. A birth or baptismal certificate is generally sufficient. If the application is for an adopted or illegitimate child, other proofs may be necessary.

Benefits end when a child turns 18, but payments may continue under two provisions which recognize that a child's dependency on the worker has not ended. These provisions include student benefits for unmarried children who remain in school up to age 22 and benefits to children disabled before age 22.

About 870,000 students between 18 and 22 are currently receiving Social Security benefits. The benefits are paid if the child remains full time in an accredited school.

Children disabled before they turn 22 may receive disability benefits for an unlimited period of time if the disability prevents them from doing substantial work. About 95 percent of the persons receiving childhood disability benefits have some degree of mental deficiency. Other prevalent conditions include cerebral palsy, schizophrenia, epilepsy, and autism.

The application for benefits can be made at any age so long as the disability began before age 22, and the parent is currently receiving retirement or disability benefits or is deceased.

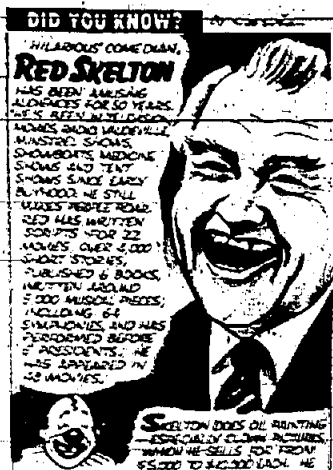
Candidates get questionnaires

McCormack blasts Steiger-Hansen bill

Richard McCormack, Democratic nominee for Congress from the 12th District (Union County), this week expressed "vehement opposition" to the Republican-sponsored Steiger-Hansen Amendment, calling it a "contemptible effort to dupe the average taxpayer by statistical generalizations, intimating that it will provide tax relief for them."

According to McCormack, the amendment would remove capital gains from the minimum tax provisions and set the maximum tax rate for such gains at 25 percent. "We would then have the preposterous and intolerable situation—whereas a wealthy investor who makes millions of dollars in capital gains could pay a lower tax rate than the average worker making under \$20,000 a year in wages or salary," McCormack noted.

UC has advice on financial aid

A series of financial aid workshops for college students and parents is under way at Union College, Cranford, according to Lester Biggs, assistant director of financial aid. The workshops, which are open to the public without prior appointment, are conducted Thursdays at 1 and 7 p.m. through Aug. 10.

Among the topics covered are eligibility requirements for financial aid and procedures for applying for various aid programs, including the federal Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, guaranteed loans and private scholarships.

Assistance is also provided in filling out the new New Jersey Financial Aid Form, which is required by most funding sources. Biggs noted that additional information on the opportunities may be obtained by calling the Union College Office of Student Financial Aid at 276-2600, Extension 229.
