The section generating the most interest among civil service employe groups is a proposal to limit "veterans preferencé'' on Civil Service examinations. The absolute preference that government hiring policy currently extends to veterans would be educed, meaning that veterans would no longer automatically move to the tor of the Civil Service list regardless of

test scores.
The Instant Voter Registration Act would permit voters to register and vote on election day, abolishing the current 30-day pre-registration requirement. Opponents of this measure fear that the result would be wide-scale corruption, since election board officials would have no way of

verifying residency, age and signature of a voter until after the election. The Energy Facilities Siting Act would give the Department of Energy broad powers to regulate construction of new energy facilities in New Jersey. This bill is controversial because it raises the age-old question of govern-ment regulation versus the responsibility of the private sector. Opponents feel that this bill, in its present form, minimizes the role of public par-ticipation and usurps power from local

zoning hoards.




